FACULTY AND ALUMNI HONORED AT 2022 HALL OF FAME EVENT

Approximately 250 PMA alumni and guests joined in the festivities to honor three former faculty members, eight alumni and two track champion teams as they were inducted into the PMAAA Hall of Fame. The event was held at the Immaculate Conception Center located in Douglaston, New York. As always, the food and drink were superb and the service was outstanding. Due to the previous pandemic restrictions, this was the first Hall of Fame Dinner since 2019.

After the cocktail hour, the festivities were kicked off by PMAAA president Chick Pisani with his welcoming remarks, followed by the traditional singing of the National Anthem and the Power Memorial Academy Alma Mater, which was enthusiastically vocalized by all the attendees. The Opening Prayer and Invocation was led by Bro. Lawrence P. Murphy, CFC. The induction of the faculty HOF candidates followed which included: Bro. Peter Costa, CFC, Mr. Anthony Costa and Mr. Edward "Jack" Kuhnert. One of the more touching moments of the evening was the acceptance speech given by Mr. Kuhnert's wife, Lorretta Kuhnert, who expressed appreciation to the Association for honoring her late husband. She went on to say that Mr. Kuhnert was always proud to be associated with the Power Memorial family.

Two championship track teams, which included the 1970-71 Varsity Cross Country Team and the 1970 Distance Medley Relay Team, were also inducted. John Jakimetz – '70, a member of the 1970 Distance Medley Team represented both teams and accepted the award on their behalf.

Following the dinner, the Hall of Fame inductions continued with the honoring of the alumni, including Luis Santos – '65, Major General George Alexander –



PMA CLASS OF 62 HERO REMEMBERED BY PMA ALUMNUS

On the Memorial Day weekend, for the last 10 years, Norm Jardine, Class of 65, has paid his respects to his classmate, Roy Keonig. Roy was killed in action in Vietnam in October of 1968. Norm served in the US Army from 1969 to 1971. He is active with

his local American Legion Post. Annually, the American Legion arranges to place flags at an assigned section in the Long Island National Cemetery, they also visit the grave site of members buried in other cemeteries. After performing his American Legion duties at the National Cemetery, he finds time to flag, say a prayer and render a hand salute to his classmate.

He takes a picture of the flagged grave and shares it with his Power alums. Power alums appreciate the energy Norm exhibits but wonders if there are other PMA classmates who deserve similar honor. The class of '65 has around 40 members who served in the military. Ed Kelly, class of '65, attended the US Military Academy at West Point and retired as an Army Brigadier General, is the ranking officer among Class of 65 grads. He thought one PMA graduate clearly deserves recognition.

Ed admired Patrick J Gallagher, class of 1962. Pat was captain of the track team while Ed was on the freshman track

team. Pat was clearly of an outstanding leader, as he was the President of the first Student Council, which was established for the 1961-1962 school year. Ed followed this path, as later was a member of the Student Council.

Pat earned a scholarship to Providence College. While there, he was active in several extra curricula activities, such as student government, track and The Carolan Club. It was essentially a residential student club – they helped plan events and programs for students on campus but also participated in some of the residential/dorm governance. He was also active in the Met Club/Metropolitan Club I believe was one of the alumni clubs for NY.

Upon graduating from Providence in 1966, he joined the Marines and was commissioned a 2nd lieutenant. Stationed in Viet Nam, Pat endured the ultimate sacrifice. Ed spoke to Norm about honoring Pat. They agreed the first step was finding more information. Norm agreed to research on the Internet.

All GIs killed in Vietnam are listed on the Wall in Washington DC and there is plenty of information available on the net. He found Pat and sent the appropriate link to Ed. Ed

indicated all this seemed correct, but that was not Pat's picture and the internet says he was a corporal, while his Pat was an officer.

Norm did more research and as unbelievable as it seems, there were two (2) Marine Patrick J Gallaghers, killed in Vietnam in September of 1967. The write up on Power alum Pat follows:

Patrick arrived in Vietnam and was assigned to 1st Platoon, Echo Company, 2nd Battalion, 3rd Marine Regiment, 3rd Marine Division. 2nd Lt Gallagher was leading his platoon on route to reinforce the Marine base at Con Thien. He died of a gunshot wound to the right upper chest from enemy rifle fire, during a firefight near an NVA fortification, about 5 kilometers South of Con Thien (Hill 158) during Operation Fortress Sentry. Patrick was single and served his country for 9 months and 13 days.

He was buried in Queens County at Calvary Cemetery, section 60, in a family plot with his grandparents.

Ed, who lives in Connecticut, says how can we get there? In his American Legion duties, Norm has flagged fellow American Legionnaire Martin McLoughlin in

section 59 plot 60 grave 11, very close to Pat. He found the grave very quickly where Pat was now joined by his parents. He followed the same procedure rendered to American Legion members.

Dropping to one knee, Norm planted an American flag. Standing, he uncovered (removed his Army baseball cap) and said a silent prayer. Covering, he braced to the position of attention and rendered a slow hand salute. Completing his task, he took one step back, took a picture and withdrew from the scene.


As a last step, he emailed Ed the picture, with the comment: Mission completed.

PMAAA PRESIDENT, CHICK PISANI, TO STEP DOWN

SERVED ALUMNI ASSOCIATION FOR 20 YEARS

After serving on the Power Memorial Academy Alumni Association Board of Directors for twenty years, Andrew "Chick" Pisani, has decided to step down from the Board of Directors.

Chick, who graduated from PMA in 1970, was one of the founding members of PMAAA that was formed in 2003. He served as vice president from 2003 to 2005 and he succeeded Art Kenney as president in 2005.

Since assuming the presidency in 2005, the Association has made many major advances. Several scholarships have been awarded to deserving inner-city young men as a result of the fund raising activities that was spearheaded by Chick. In keeping with the objectives of the Association, Chick has kept the Power Memorial Academy name in the forefront by convincing the leaders of New York City to rename West 61st Street to *Power Memorial Way*. In addition, he convinced Fordham University to allow the Association to erect a plaque on their building located on West 61st Street memorializing the school and its achievements. Chick has been instrumental in making available jackets, teeshirts, hats and other merchandise with the Power Memorial name to the alumni. The PMAAA Hall of Fame, honoring noteworthy alumni and faculty, was developed under Chick Pisani's leadership.

Of the many achievements that Chick has been responsible for, he is most proud of is having the school's front gates restored and erected at West Park Cemetery, where the Irish Christian Brothers are interned. According to Chick, it took two years from the time the gates became available to the dedication of the gates. The erecting of the gates was a fitting tribute to the Brothers who taught at Power and were inspirational to countless alumni.

Chick retired from the Union City Police Department in 2011 achieving the rank of Sergeant. As a way of giving back to the community and to the Police Department, Chick teaches at the Police Academy. He is also an avid clay shooter and he enjoys travelling around the clay shooting circuit with the NYPD Shotgun Team.



VICTOR LOPEZ '70 AUTHORS NEW BOOK

Victor Lopez, who graduated from PMA in 1970 authored a book entitled, *El Barrio Remembered* published by Page Publishing. The book is a is a collection of true stories about the son of Puerto Rican migrants growing up during the second-generation decade (1962–1972) in New York City's Spanish Harlem, He recounts a golden decade in the history of New York City and the lives of those teens growing up



during these much simpler times in a neighborhood called "El Barrio", which stretched from 96th Street to 125th Street and Fifth Avenue to the East River.

According to Victor, "these stories depict true occurrences reflecting how teenagers dealt with the changes arising during these crucial times in our nation's history. A new world was arising and we had a front-row seat to political changes as well as racial and gender issues. As we traversed these issues of family, culture, and racism, we were bolstered by such things as music and art as well as religion and trying desperately to hold on to our traditional values. We clung to one another and our families as we made our way in an ever-changing landscape; and we progressed, we innovated, we adapted, and succeeded in becoming part of the mosaic that became New York City."

Victor has enjoyed a successful career in education. He has worked as teacher, director of the Harbor School for Performing Arts and principal of PS 96 in Manhattan. Victor is also a founding member of the educational consulting group, Educators for Student Success, where he empowered New York City principals to bring their very best to their classrooms and strive to improve school effectiveness for all school stakeholders.



The award was presented by All Hallows' president Ron Schutte to the Association in appreciation for fostering the true spirit of Edmund Rice and in





POWERFUL THOUGHTS 16

In 1952 or 1953, my dad was contacted by Georgie Gallagher, a director of athletics for New York City. He supervised an indoor recreational facility in the Chelsea area of Manhattan on 28th Street between 9th and 10th Avenues. They were longtime friends and on this occasion, Georgie asked my dad if Jim and I would like to be ball boys for the New York Knickerbockers. Would we? What an absurd question!

We would receive a buck a game for retrieving stray balls and tossing them back to the ref or toweling up the sweat on the court before foul shots. At breaks, we could grab a hotdog, gratis. What a thrill for these two teenage Knick fans!

In 1956, Georgie asked me a question. I had turned 17 that November, so my answer to his query, sadly, had to be "No." I was too old to play basketball for his Junior Knicks team. He asked my younger Crusader teammate Alby instead.

All of this is back story for my junior year at PMA. Jim and I were on the Junior Varsity basketball team, the only year he played. Jim aided greatly to our Manhattan CHSAA championship team that beat St. Ann's JV at Cardinal Hayes High School that season. Remember Lou Carnesecca their Varsity coach who went on to coach St. John's and then the New York Nets of the former ABA?

Power opened its brand new gymnasium in 1953. During the 1955-56 basketball season, the New York Knicks would use our gym for workouts when Madison Square Garden was unavailable. One afternoon as I was headed to the gym for JV practice I saw this humongous hand "palm" the gym door and open it. The hand was attached to the arm of Ray Felix, one of two "7-footers" who were on the Knicks. Walter Dukes was the other.

After their workout, Knicks players stayed to play with our team. Jim and I went two-on-two against Gene Shue and Dick Atha. Shue went on to coach in the NBA for 22+ years after his tenure as a player. We also scrimmaged with Dick McGuire. His brother Al coached Marquette University for years after he left the NBA.

Yes, I am name-dropping and bragging. But when you live in New York, the Big Apple, you do rub elbows with the rich and famous. In my case it was the Knicks and other pro athletes. Sometimes I'll tell you about Kevin Loughery (Cardinal Hayes, NBA player, coach), York Larese (St. Ann's, player, coach New York Nets) and Al Ferrari (then St. Louis Hawks, NBA). As well, there is the former San Francisco Warriors in the mid-1960s and, lest I forget, there's Richie Guerin (former Knick and St. Louis Hawks' coach).

HOF MEMBER, STEVE DONOHUE, JOINS THE PMAAA BOARD OF DIRECTORS



On October 19th, 2022, Steve Donohue – PMA '70 became a member of the PMAAA Board of Directors. He was nominated by Board member Steven Lazarus and unanimously elected by the Board of Directors after receiving approval from the Nominating Committee. Steve, who was inducted into the PMAAA Hall of Fame in 2019, has a long history with Power.

During his time at the school, Steve played basketball all four years. He was a member of the 1967-68 JV City Championship team, the 1968-69 Varsity B team that won the NYC private school Championship and the 1969-70 Varsity team who went on to win the CHSAA City Championship and National Championship.

After graduating from Power in 1970, Steve entered St. Francis College in Maine where he earned a bachelor's degree in History in 1974. While at St. Francis college, Steve played on the Varsity

basketball team all four years. As a three year starter and co-captain for two years, he helped the team win two league championships. His senior year, he was recognized as the "Senior Athlete of the Year," team MVP and Naismith Conference "Scholar Athlete of the Year." He then attended Long Island University earning a master's degree in Guidance and Counseling in 1975. He later earned an advanced degree from LIU in School Administration and Leadership.

As an educator and coach, Steve held multiple positions during his long and successful career. Steve taught grades six through eight at St. Francis Xavier School before taking a position at PMA in 1976. While at Power, Steve served as the Sophomore guidance counselor, taught History, Health, Physical Education, Psychology, Criminology and Biology. He

coached basketball at the freshman, junior varsity and varsity levels. He also coached junior varsity baseball. As a basketball coach at Power, he took his teams to five league titles, four Bronx-Manhattan titles, one JV CHSAA City Championship, two varsity CHSAA finals and winning one Varsity CHSAA State Championship. He also enjoyed success as a baseball coach bringing his junior varsity team to the CHSAA finals. In 1984, he was chosen by the NY Daily News and the NY Post as the NYC private and parochial high school Coach of the Year. After PMA closed in 1984, Steve served as a school administrator on Long Island for 30 years, at the William Floyd, Rocky Point and Shoreham-Wading River School districts. As a school administrator, he was recognized as "Citizen of the Year" by the Rocky Point community and the Long Island "Principal of the Year" by the Council of Administrators and Supervisors. Steve ended his career in education after a fifteen year tenure as Principal of Wading River School located in Wading River, New York.

Steve has been married to Jean Donohue for forty three years. They have two daughters, Shannon and Kaitlin, and three grandchildren, Steve and Jean reside in Ocean View, Delaware and enjoy the winter months in Florida


