A Tale of Two Cities

The last weekend in January, I was invited to Minnesota to tour the Rochester Y. When I worked on the Camp Olson YMCA staff in the 80's our winter office was in that building. On January 31, 2022, the Rochester Y would be closing its doors for good, and so four of us who used to work there gathered for one last walk-through (photo #1 courtesy of the Rochester Post Bulletin). While it was great seeing former

From Rochester, we drove 45 miles to the east to Winona, Minnesota, to spend a couple days with our son Chris. He was pleased to show us the new YMCA which opened in January 2021. Winona is less than a third the size of Rochester, but the people there teamed up with Winona Health to build a beautiful, shared facility costing over \$20 million. On the Saturday morning Marty and I visited, the new YMCA was packed with youth basketball, fitness classes and exercise machines going full tilt (photo #2). The community is rightfully proud of the new building. And, seeing it, my faith in the Y was restored.


