PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

October 2024

I'm not sure why it is, but every fall seems to come abruptly and our return to the usual hustle and bustle of everyday life always catches me by surprise.

I'm happy to report that your Executive Team here at the Alumni is already at work finalizing fall plans and getting ready for 2025. This fall, the Member Engagement Committee will be following up with trends that we heard during our check-in conversations over the summer, as well as presenting two different Alumni Virtual Gatherings.

In September, a number of Alumni members and former YMCA staff and volunteers celebrating the Fellowship of Honour investiture in Ottawa on September 25. Twelve individuals, including myself, were recognized for their leadership and impact in strengthening the YMCA in their communities. This was my first time attending a Fellowship of Honour event. It was a very humbling experience to receive this honour. I had heard how special these events were from past attendees, and I must say it certainly met my expectations. It was a GREAT time, connecting with so many YMCA staff and volunteers and YMCA Alumni members that I hadn't seen (other than in little ZOOM boxes) for many years. It felt like a great homecoming event. I smiled when I heard several of the recipients talk about making sure the YMCA "secret sauce" is passed on to future YMCA leaders and that we shouldn't dismiss how important that sauce is to the future of the YMCA. Those comments reinforced for me that our strategy with our history project is very important.

Currently, we are getting ready to recognize Truth and Reconciliation efforts across the country. I admit that for most of my life I have been ignorant of government policies and actions and how those polices severely impacted the abilities of Indigenous peoples to thrive throughout the centuries. This summer, on my quest to educate myself, I read a book that was very eye-opening and educating. Valley of the Birdtail, written by Andrew Stobo Sniderman and Douglass Sanderson (Amo Binashii), is the story of two Manitoba communities — Waywayseecappo Indian reserve and the town of Rossburn. These communities were and continue to be separated by much more than just a valley. The story centers around two families over several generations and describes the impact of government policies and actions on their lives and futures. During a recent interview with the authors, they talked about how long they had worked on the book and how the families named in the book came to want their stories to be told. It may be a difficult read in places — but it is worth it if we are going to move forward together in Canada. It will give you much to think about as we travel on this journey towards reconciliation.

About the YMCA Fellowship of Honour

The YMCA Fellowship of Honour was established in 1978 as the highest recognition for YMCA volunteers and staff. It is presented every three to four years by its patron, the Governor General of Canada. Today's appointees join a long list of 111 volunteers and staff whose exceptional contributions have been honoured in one of two Fellowship of Honour categories: as a Companion, for outstanding national and international leadership, or as an Officer, for local or regional leadership contributions.

Appointments to the YMCA Fellowship of Honour are governed by a selection process established by the YMCA Fellowship of Honour Constitution and directed by an Advisory Council composed of a Canadian YMCA leader as Chair, at least three Canadians who have served the YMCA with distinction, the Chair of the YMCA National Board and the national President and Chief Executive Officer. The Council considers nominations received from throughout the Canadian YMCA movement and recommends appointments to the National Board for approval.

About the YMCA in Canada

The YMCA is a charity that ignites the potential in over 2 million people annually, helping them grow, lead, and give back to their communities. Across Canada, the YMCA delivers a wide variety of programs and services that empower people of all ages and life stages to overcome barriers and rise to their full potential. Programs include child care, health and wellness, aquatics, employment services, immigrant settlement, camps, mental wellness, and many other community initiatives that respond to local needs. Foundational to all this is the YMCA's commitment to creating spaces and experiences where everyone feels safe, welcome, and a sense of belonging.

I suspect many of you know that I spend most of my summer sailing, (swimming, stand up paddling, hiking and riding my bike) on Heart of Gold (no, not a Neil Young reference but Hitchhiker's Guide to the Galaxy). For over 30 years, Graham and I sailed Lake Ontario and all its ports with a trip to the beautiful Thousand Islands each summer along with a few trips to the Caribbean and B.C.

With our permanent move to our chalet in the Horseshoe Valley area in 2022, we decided to move our boat from Lake Ontario to the Georgian Bay area. An incredible six week adventure travelling 910 nautical miles (1,700 kilometres) though the Welland Canal — Lake Erie — Lake St. Claire — Lake Huron, the North Channel and then into Georgian Bay.



Fast forward to summer 2024 — we determined we wanted to explore more of Georgian Bay and the North Channel. Many have said that it is even more beautiful than the Caribbean and we heartily agree. Full disclosure: this is the reason we did not have an August issue of TieLines as it is near impossible to have any wifi connection in these waters.




We started our season this year enjoying the sights and sounds of YMCA camps on Beausoleil Island, just north of Midland. This is one of Canada's National Parks — full of Indigenous history and beauty. Watching as Camp Kitchikewani (YMCA of Simcoe/Muskoka), conducted early season staff training and hearing the chants of the counselors as they welcomed first session campers to Camp Queen Elizabeth (CQE - YMCA of Southwestern Ontario). While I don't have a good picture of CQE, I do have a photo of one their friends on Beautsoleil!

We began our six-week journey by venturing off to the west side of Georgian Bay, anchoring off an Island north of Christian Island, then on to Owen Sound where we enjoyed the company of none other than Alumni Executive member, Gayle Graham, and her husband, John.



A few photos to tell our story... and yes, Graham is wearing a YMCA t-shirt! Sometimes it's warm and sometimes we need winter gear. But hey, this is Canada - we need to be ready for all kinds of weather! And some beautiful sunsets.



Many more adventures and nautical miles later, we anchored in Moyles Harbour where, of course, we find John Island Camp (YMCA of Northeastern Ontario). This is where I finally had the opportunity to meet Alumni Executive member, Gary Gray IN PERSON! Gary provided us with an extensive tour of this wonderful camp and filled us with all its history of the storied Moyles brothers and how they stole a sawmill in the late 1800's from Detour, Michigan and started up again in the North Channel. Of course, we signed in at the camp office showing our ID prior to our great tour. It was a treat for us to be at a YMCA overnight camp watching the kids have soooo much fun. Most importantly, to meet Gary in person after working together for so many ZOOM years! Thanks again, Gary!
