with Love and Hope: YMCA World Service

"Lord, send out your Spirit and renew the face of the earth" - Psalm 104

At Pentecost, Jesus fulfills his promise to be with us always by sending His Holy Spirit so His disciples can share the good news with the whole world, speaking in many languages. It marks the official beginning of the church and spreads the fruits of the Spirit: patience, kindness, joy, love, faithfulness, peace and goodness. What a beautiful reminder!

Thank you for spreading the fruits of the Spirit to strengthen youth worldwide through YMCA World Service. Covid-19 is impacting us here and it is impacting our world. The pandemic continues to impact the operations, grant income and partnership support of many YMCAs. As a result, many are facing difficult financial challenges related to maintaining their staffing, programs, buildings and properties. Your support goes far to address the needs caused by the challenges of our time and help YMCAs stay active in serving those in greatest need.

As you know, YMCA World Service is the annual campaign of the U.S. YMCA Movement to raise awareness of and support for the powerful work of YMCAs around the world. We would like to share a few examples of the extraordinary spirit of love and hope through the YMCA today:

In most of the developing countries where the YMCA has a presence, **less than 1% are vaccinated**. The **YMCA in Peru** is hosting a vaccination site for their community.

1 billion youth live in multi-dimensional poverty (lacking at least 2 basic needs including access to clean water, food and safe shelter). The Ethiopia YMCA (photo) is providing safe shelter and caring support for 1,200 people as their country

struggies with civil war.

- 75% of mental illness begins before age 24. The East Jerusalem YMCA offers
 counseling and rehabilitation programs to help their communities affected by longstanding conflict and violence.
- 25% of youth worldwide are not in education or employment. The San Pablo YMCA in the Philippines is providing safe housing, food, school supplies, education and internet access for five teens from an extremely poor community as well as creating a YMCA community garden with the teens.
- 32% of all global migrants are youth. In 2020, the Mexico YMCA Homes for Migrant Youth served 1,525 youth who were deported from the U.S. Through the challenges of the pandemic, 80% of the youth were successfully reunited with their families so far.



How We Can Help!

Our Chambers Chapter 2021 World Service Goal is \$6,000 and 45 donors. Last year, we successfully raised \$5,380 from 34 gifts. Thank you! YMCA Alumni contributed more than \$240,000 for 2020 World Service. 100% of every gift helps the youth of the world. As of now, we have already contributed \$1,800.00 from 12 members and 189 YMCA Alumni nationwide have given \$73,033. We are on our way to another successful year!

If I am like most Y Alumni (and I think I am), I HAD NO IDEA of the disparities impacting the youth of our world today. If young people are truly the future, something has to change. Real, everyday people - like my fellow Y Alumni - need to take action. We need to go back to our YMCA roots and remember why we "enlisted" in the YMCA movement in the first place. At our core, I think all of us had one overarching reason why we chose to work for the Y: We wanted to make a difference by serving others. Today, more than ever, YMCA Alumni can continue to make a difference. We can do this through our support and leadership of YMCA World Service. Why the Y? Because the youth of our world are depending on us.

My Dad by Dave Patterson



When I was growing up, I wanted to be my Dad. He inspired me to do my best and act my best. Some of my fondest memories of growing up are with my Dad in Y Indian Guides. He was *Straight Arrow*, and I was *Broken Arrow*. That legendary YMCA program, not only taught me to respect Native Americans, but also to respect my Dad. And it was the beginning of a journey, that I would take in his footsteps, through a 35-year career with the YMCA.

I lost my Dad yesterday but we will always be *Pals Forever!* I would like to tell you about him through his own words, which he wrote for the Chambers Chapter *Book of Memories:*

I was born in Lima, Ohio and lived over 20 years in the same neighborhood block as the YMCA. I set pins in the Y bowling alley. Physical Director was Roy "Armie" Armstrong. I worked as a waiter at Camp Nelson Dodd under Carl May. Mother worked as the Lima Y bookkeeper. At least eight Y directors, that I know of, grew up in that Lima YMCA.

Then I worked as Downtown Physical Director from 1959-62 at the Canton, Ohio YMCA with John Sessions and Myron Lewis. I started an aggressive fitness and testing program. The swim team finished second in Y Nationals.

Frank Kiehne called me to Reading, Pennsylvania as Central Physical Director to start up a fitness program. While there in 1962-65, I served as Executive Director of an 800-member Industrial Management Club.

My first executive role was at the Wooster, Ohio YMCA, 1965-71, where I worked with Phil Grady, Fred Cooper and Don Painter. There I started an IMC program, which is still going today, in 1995, under my son, Dave, who serves as the Wooster YMCA Executive Director.

In 1971 I took on a strange assignment as Executive Director of a YWCA Community Center, still retaining my YMCA affiliation, in Neenah, Wisconsin. After four successful years, that YWCA was emerging from debt and soon thereafter became a YMCA affiliate, under the leadership of Walt Madsen.

After Wisconsin, I moved on to Marion, Ohio in 1975 and took on a struggling Y with a dinosaur building and dormitory. I decided that after 25 years, I had fulfilled my dreams and service to the YMCA, so, I retired to start a second career.

I feel fortunate to have worked with the likes of C. Carl May, Gene Cornwell, John Sessions, Myron Lewis, Bill Cumler, Frank Kiehne, Frank Minnerly, Tom Patton and a host of others, not to mention the thousands of participants that I enjoyed and who hopefully enjoyed me.

I returned to Wooster and looked for another career.
I almost bought a hardware store, but instead worked for 11 years as a men's clothing buyer and manager in a family-owned department store.
Later, I worked for three years as a realtor.
At about the same time, I was elected as a City Councilman, then Council President.
In 1995, I finished up 16 years of civic service as Mayor of Wooster and Chairman of the Hospital Board for two years.

Now it's time to retire and smell the roses and enjoy my four grandchildren and my sons:

Dave, Y Executive; Greg, attorney; and Todd, high school science teacher.

We spend winters in our retreat in Florida and visit with friends at Chambers Chapter meetings.

Wow! What a career! What a life! Thank God! What a life!

Although most of his colleagues are long gone, I left the names in his Bio because they were his mentors and part of his legacy. He always said, "I don't know many in the Chambers Chapter anymore.

It's all you young guys".

Thank you for getting to know him a little better. He was a great Dad and a great Y Guy.

Boy Scouts/Christian Citizenship Training Program

Edgar M. Robinson, the first YMCA National Director of Boy's Work, is perhaps best remembered for his involvement in establishing the Boy Scouts of America as a separate organization from the YMCA. He organized the first boy's work assembly in Culver, Indiana, in 1913. Most of the 289 delegates had never heard of "boy's work" as a career path for YMCA secretaries.

At the Culver Assembly, Robinson played off the Boy Scout's organizational structure and incentive program to encourage participation and formed the Christian Citizenship Training Program (CCTP) which included standardized manuals and achievement awards much like the Scout badges.

The CCPT never came together because, despite a call for uniformity, each YMCA still wanted to develop its own standards. However, the CCPT was influential in improving YMCA youth work when it appointed Adel J Gregg as director. in 1924 he wrote a book called "Group Leaders and Boy Character" which set the tone for future programming for boys and girls. There would be 13 assemblies between 1913 and 1965 and their significance in the mid-1940s cannot be overstated. In 1944 assembly action gave national approval to four existing programs and the highly successful YMCA Four Fronts Program was established.

The Old Rugged Cross

Do you remember the hymn, "The Old Rugged Cross"? I was surprised to learn that it has an Ohio connection. The hymnas written in 1912 by evangelist and song-leader George Bennard, a native of Youngstown, Ohio. Special thanks to fellow Y Alumni Dick Bennett, also of Youngstown, for sharing this bit of Ohio history with us.

The Old Rugged Cross became a national favorite ever since it was sung in Ernest Tubb's 1952 gospel album. This country gospel song enjoyed many subsequent recordings by notable artists of the 20th century. If you are ever in the Youngstown area, you can check out the original Old Rugged Cross on the east side of the lake of Lake Park Cemetery.

Fall Reunion Three Day Event

Wednesday September 15th

DAY ONE For those of you who are early arrivals the fun and fellowship begins with a delicious lunch at Twin Oast Brewery.

Then it is off for a choice of afternoon activities. It may be golfing at the Catawba Island Club, an Arthur Hills designed golf course kept in pristine condition.

Or it may prefer a guided tour of the North Coast including the Marblehead Lighthouse, the oldest operating lighthouse on the Great Lakes, the Port Clinton restored lighthouse, a short beach walk, and a chance to explore Port Clinton downtown.

Check-in to your room at the historic Island House and make your way to the oldest winery on Catawba Island Gideon Owen Winery/formally Mon Ami. (No need for a ferry since there is a land bridge to the island about 10 minutes from the hotel)

Enjoy a delightful dinner and program followed by a social fellowship gathering.

Overnight at the Island House in Downtown Port Clinton

Thursday September 16th

Day Two Begins with breakfast and a short Chapter Business meeting at The Island House. Then we board the Jet Express to Put in Bay (located across the street from the hotel)

When we arrive at Put-In-Bay (the island where Commodore Perry defeated the British in

the war of 1612) well pick up the preamanged gon carts to traver the island.

Our first stop is the top of Perry's Victory and Peace Monument, 352 feet in the air. It is the tallest Doric column in the world. We'll learn more about it at the Perry's Victory Museum.

Then it is off to lunch and fellowship at the Boardwalk waterfront restaurant.

Our next tour after lunch is Heineman's Wineries founded in 1888 and still run by Heineman's fifth generation. On the property is Crystal Cave, the world's largest geode.

We'll tour both.

We'll golf cart drive to see the South Shore Lighthouse, then back downtown to check out the shops or Antique car museum, which is free. Also between South Shore Lighthouse and Put in Bay you can stop at a small park which sits beside the Benson Ford House an old Ford 630 ft. freighter made into a house. You see it from the Jet Express but you get a closer look from the park. For the story behind it see www.shiponthebay.com.

Friday September 17th

Day Three Starts with breakfast on you own downtown at a local restaurant or at the hotel restaurant.



In recognition of the dedication and commitment of F. William Stahl to the YMCA, the YMCA profession, and the art of written communications, the YMCA Alumni presents an award to an Alumni member in his memory: The F. William Stahl Award. The Award shall be presented every three years from a baseline from 2011, providing there is a suitable candidate as determined by the Award Committee.

LEADERSHIP BY EXAMPLE

F. William (Bill) Stahl, a prolific writer, was editor of several AOS (Association of Secretaries) publications, most notably the FORUM, the forerunner of Perspective, produced by APD (Association of Professional Directors). AYP (Association of YMCA)

Professionals). At one time Bill edited three AOS periodicals simultaneously while still serving on staff of the Baltimore YMCA in Maryland.
CRITERIA FOR THE AWARD A nominee must have made a significant contribution toward the advancement of professional knowledge and skills through written expression, the arena of Bill's greatest contributions. Examples of such written expression are communications, creative materials, public relations, management and historical research. The works should be primarily, though not necessarily exclusively, produced during service as an active or retired YMCA director. The recipient can be a living or deceased member of YMCA Alumni.
PRESENTATION OF AWARD The Award should be presented at a YMCA Alumni national, regional or chapter meeting. More recently, the Award has been made once every three years at the YMCA Alumni Reunion. Nominees not selected can be re-nominated for future consideration. Reviewed and approved by the 2011 Stahl Award Committee and reaffirmed by the 2022 Stahl Award Committee, John B. Coduri, Chair.

Tiny Home Village and Twig Program

On May 1st the National Service Project was unveiled - The Sioux YMCA Tiny Home Village and Twig Program.

Steve Gunn was selected to represent the William Chambers Chapter on the National Service Project Task Force (NSPTF). Steve has been serving on the NSPTF for nearly a year and has been involved in the selection process of the Sioux Y. Steve and the other task force members are very excited about the project and what it means for the National Y Alumni and the "Serve" component of our national charge as Y Alumni.

Steve will be going to Dupree, South Dakota from June 8 -13, 2021 to help open Camp Marrowbone (Sioux Y summer camp) and to begin the process of selecting the site(s) and finalizing the plans for the Tiny Home design during that time.

Steve wants to thank the chapter for their recent \$250.00 seed money investment and their confidence in him as their representative.

The 9-home Tiny House Community concept offers a sustainable living option for local community members, staff, and volunteers.

Designed to bring recycling to the forefront for the reservation community, the tiny houses may be built in a number of sustaining ways, hopefully with green roof systems to add more gardening space in this food desert, along with solar lighting and rainwater collection to keep the utility costs minimal.

Access to these homes will be managed through an equitable application process ensuring a mutually beneficial and impactful housing experience.

Further, the Sioux YMCA is committed to expanding the reach of their organization to as many remote communities on the reservation as possible. And we mean remote.

The biggest barrier for expanding the service area is the physical distance from the main facility in Dupree to outlying communities in critical need.

The Sioux YMCA has developed a strategic plan to build nine YMCA "Twigs." The Y can't support the construction of traditional branches, but they are well-equipped to support scaled down versions... twigs.

The Task Force envisions this as a multi-year project involving all 17 chapters of YMCA Alumni as active partners in service either as part of construction crews on the ground or providing much-needed support services from home.
