Virtual story-times are taking place every Saturday during February in celebration of Black History Month. And of course, your local libraries are still open for what many of us love best about libraries—checking out books! Feel free to stop in and visit, and take a look at all the new books rolling onto the shelves every day.

The new Lincoln Park downtown officially opens this month, and it feels refreshing here at the Billie Jean King Main Library to have the fencing down. I highly recommend a visit to Main Library, followed by a stroll in the park!

President's Message

Greetings to one and all! I hope you had a safe and happy holiday, and that you and your family all began the new year vaccinated, boosted, and well.

Like all non-profit organizations, and the city departments as well, 2021 was a challenging year for the LB Public Library and the Friends. And it ended with a surprise when we said good-bye to our great friend, Library Services Director Glenda Williams. No one deserves a happy retirement more than Glenda, and I know she is settling into her new life with joy.

She was a great director to work with, and we will all miss her. However, we are working closely with interim director Christine Hertzel, who is filling in until a successor to Glenda is found. (See her introductory message in this newsletter)

Donations to the Friends reached a new high this year, in both materials – books and media – and funds. At times our Bookshop storage room at BJK Main was overflowing! As a result, we held our first DVD and CD sale at the Los Altos Neighborhood Library in December, and earned \$400 in 2 days. New Senior Librarian Eric Cardoso and his staff were especially welcoming. We are still getting lots of media donations, and hope to have another sale sometime this spring.

Unfortunately, we have had to suspend our donation pick-up process – please bring your books and media to your neighborhood library, one or two boxes at a time, during open hours. (DO NOT put donations in the return bin.)

Each year, we give a portion of dues and donations directly to the library; discretionary funds that are

disbursed among the neighborhood libraries and departments at BJK Main, and used to fund training and special programming. We call this the library's "wish list". This year we were able to give the library \$15,000, a 30 percent increase from last year's amount. This increase was a direct result of your generosity.

Our new website is coming! As you know, our current website is only available under the LBPL website – go to Connect, then Friends of the Library. We are currently working on an independent website which we hope will make it easier to find things like donation policies, processes, and eventually purchase memberships and renewals online.

We are optimistically planning to hold our annual meeting and luncheon this May, our first one since 2019. There will be some changes – this year we'll gather at the Grand on Willow, instead of the Reef, which we hope will be more convenient for everyone. Keep an eye out for more announcements!

Thank you again for your support and generosity. As we begin the budget process and an election year, we'll be researching the candidates and their positions regarding the library. We will also advocate for an increase in funding for the library system, something that hasn't happened for 10 years. The Friends will be out and about at town halls, meetings, and forums, and may ask for your help to show up and talk or write to a candidate.

Library Bookshop News

Although the city libraries have now been open for several months, volunteers have not yet been allowed to return, including those who tended the Bookshop. Anticipating this, the Friends Board was faced with two options: close the shop ... it is composed of four rows of shelves on tracks that can slide each segment forward to form a cube ... or leave it locked open, with no attendants. The decision was to keep the shop opened and provide a drop box for payment ... an honesty box.

There were concerns about possible thefts and damages, of course, but these were outweighed by the fact that the shop can now be open during all hours that the library is open, a goal that was never reached while depending on availability of volunteers.

So how has the change worked out? So far very well. There has been no damage, nor perceptible theft. In fact, some customers drop in more money than they owe, as an additional donation. Since the Bookshop reopened last summer, patrons have paid almost \$2000 for books and media - \$1933.62, to be exact. This total includes the \$400 we made at the Los Altos DVD/CD sale.

Keeping the shop open mandates that it be maintained and restocked by the Friends. A small cadre of Board members hold work parties in our basement storage room ... the Cave ...to process donated books, box those eligible to ship to ThriftBooks for online sale, or categorize and shelve the rest. The shop is inspected for housekeeping needs and restocked where needed.

Soooo... the beginning of the new year is proceeding in a positive direction. Here's to 2022 and lots of pleasurable reading.

DVD and CD Sale at Los Altos

Los Altos Neighborhood Library hosted the first Friends DVD/CD Sale for two days in December that ultimately netted \$400 for the Library's Special Project Fund.

Friends volunteers brought boxes of donated DVDs and music CDs of all genres and categories from the storage area at BJK Main to the Los Altos Community Room.

Tables were set up, and for two days, library patrons browsed the offerings and filled new Friends of the Library book bags with their purchases. DVDs were sold 3 for \$2 and CDs went for 50¢ each or 3 for \$1.

"When everyone decluttered during the pandemic, they donated many DVDs and CDs to the library," said Barbara Sosa, President of the Friends of the Library. "Due to the construction around BJK Main Library, many patrons are not visiting our Bookshop. We thought this was the best way to offer these treasures for sale. And as always, the proceeds go directly to the Library for books and special projects."

Some patrons collected favorites to augment their own collections; others bought gifts. One patron told the Friends she was a music teacher, and her entire CD collection had been burned in a fire. She purchased many of the classical and jazz CDs to rebuild her collection at a discounted price.

The sale was so successful that we plan to hold another sometime this spring. The Friends just received a donation of 800 music CDs from a patron. Keep an eye on your email for the announcement of the next sale!
