COALITION MINISTRIES

What are "Coalition Ministries?" A little history may help. For a number of years, JWUMC has been in a "coalition" with other area churches: Augsburg Lutheran Church, Pleasant Run Presbyterian Church and St. John Neumann Catholic Church. We have co-sponsored special service days in the community, such as Inasmuch Day. We have combined for Lenten Bible Studies and special services at Thanksgiving and Good Friday.

The Mission Team has decided to dedicate one of our collections to two very special ministries that serve our local community.

<u>Augsburg Lutheran</u> invites anyone to a <u>community meal</u> once a month. They even continued doing take-out meals during the pandemic. They recently added a small food pantry for those attending those meals. At a recent meal, they served 60 people from 20 families.

<u>Pleasant Run Presbyterian</u> has their <u>Practical Grace Non-Food Pantry</u> once a month. They supply the kinds of items people can't get with food stamps. These include paper goods, cleaning supplies and personal hygiene products.

Of course, these both require funding so this is another way we can help our neighbors. ! If you wish to donate, you can bring your "coins" to inperson service the first Sunday of the month. You can also bring a check to JWUMC and place it in the offering plate any time during the month. In the memo line, mark it as "Coins" for Coalition.

SHORT STORIES FROM JW'S HOUSE

Hi, this is Bobby Woodward from JWUMC social justice class. John Wesley's focus on social holiness during his lifetime is the reason that the UMC denomination has such a focus on social justice during current times. Some of us participated in the ORV district annual leadership training in February. The keynote address was "Finding the Courage to Try New Things" by Brad Aycock. Let's consider one set of questions from this presentation.

"In our country, only 20-30% of adults attend weekly worship services. Who will never experience the hope and love of Jesus if Sunday morning "church" is the only option? Given that 40% of the people work on Sundays, what are we offering them in our local churches?" – Brad Aycock

My wife and I grew up in a refinery town full of shift workers. Churches of all denominations and sizes had multiple Sunday morning services as well as Sunday and Wednesday evening worship. We frequently attended Friday evening worship as well. Some of my fondest memories in middle school were around singing with the men of the choir to present special music each Sunday at evening worship service.

In our own church, I remember the man who came to early worship so he could open his business later that morning. Then there are several who came to early worship between getting off graveyard shift and their daytime sleeping. I'm also thinking of nurses who could not be at worship because of working scheduled Sunday shifts. What about those who can't figure out how to come to church at all on Sunday morning? In worship service, I met a guy who lived a couple of blocks from our church. He came again a year later. Then he came again a year after that. At this point, I invited him to lunch to see what I could learn. This young man moved in with his grandparents to take care of them. He only made it to church once a year because he was working three jobs to pay their bills. Another time, Sam Shreve and I greeted a young lady in the parking lot after worship. I commented that we had not seen her in a while. She explained that she was a cook at the nearby hospital and had to work most Sundays.

In thinking about people who work on Sunday, I am reminded of a time in 2010 when I lived in a Jewish household for 6 months while away from home. I am grateful for the experience, but there were those rules to be followed around food. Every Sunday after worship service, I went to the same Chinese buffet where I could sample my favorite foods that were not allowed in the home. At one point the waiter asked if I had been to worship that morning. After my response, I asked about his worship experiences. He missed Sunday worship services because he had to work, waiting on people (like me) in order to pay his bills. This conversation was the moment that I realized that I had been taking people who work on Sunday for granted.

What are we offering them in our local church? We can take pride that our worship services are being recorded and saved on the internet to be viewed on demand. What else should we be offering "Sunday workers" in our local church? I believe the answers will be revealed to us over time as we keep our eyes and ears open while doing ministry in John's neighborhood.



We continue to be a financially healthy church due to so many faithful, generous people within our congregation. Our Ordinary Giving for March was \$40,947.21, and our Ordinary Expenses were \$38,951.80. Besides that, congregants gave over \$10,000 to mission causes both within and outside of our church walls.

For the year, after the first quarter, we stand at \$124,537.45 income of the \$491,982 budgeted which is right on target at 25% of our projected amount. Our Expenses stand at \$118,755.02 of the \$535.978 budgeted for just 22% of our projections. Our "Other Income and Expenses" stand at minus \$19,235.15 due to the Wesley Hall lighting and the front end HVAC replacement.

Devotions Along the Way by Gary Ward

No discipline is enjoyable while it is happening—it's painful! But afterward there will be a peaceful harvest of right living for those who are trained in this way. Hebrews 12:11

A lifetime ago, I served our nation as a member of the U.S. Air Force. I learned much in those four years, but perhaps the greatest lesson came in the first six-weeks. Anyone who's ever gone through Basic Training, also known as "Boot Camp," will understand. I arrived as a twenty-one-year-old C average college graduate, meandering through life with no specific goals. I left with the belief that I could march forward to accomplish far more than I ever imagined. Surviving Boot Camp fostered self-confidence and led to greater accomplishments in the years since.

The same can be said for our journey of faith. As an example, once God got the Israelites out of Egypt, He needed to get "Egypt" out of the Israelites. God did that through the desert. The wilderness experience was their spiritual "boot camp" where they eventually learned lessons of obedience and trust in God.

Another translation of Hebrews 12:11 reads this way: "For the moment all discipline seems painful rather than pleasant, but later it yields the peaceful fruit of righteousness to those who have been trained by it." Discipline comes through the circumstances of life, and sometimes God permits situations that are "painful rather than pleasant," like the Hebrew's wilderness journey. Perseverance through the crucible of discipline produces positive, personal change, stronger faith and more effective disciples and apostles for God.

Are you going through a time of testing and discipline? Hold tightly to your faith in a loving God. Seek to understand what God is teaching, painful though it may be. Trust that a promised land of spiritual intimacy awaits on the other side.

An old hymn, sung for many generations, says it well:

Trust and obey, for there's no other way to be happy in Jesus, but to trust and obey.
