

SHORT STORIES FROM JW'S HOUSE


Hi, this is Bobby Woodward with a social justice message. At this time, I'll share more about God calling me to lead a LGBT diversity network in the workplace in 1999. As I shared previously, all members of this group participated anonymously except for the Diversity Committee Representative (me). Some folks like to frame the issue as people making a decision to adopt 'a gay lifestyle'. I came to understand that the decision has more to do with the struggle around keeping their gayness a secret to avoid persecution, versus coming out of the closet to embrace the world in their authentic identity as God created them to be.

One day, we had our network meeting offsite at a bar. It was at this bar that I facilitated a discussion about God, religion, and being a part of a church community. As it turns out, every one of them was raised in a church community as a child. As adults, none of them felt welcomed in churches. At that moment, I realized that I could not invite my friends to my local United Methodist Church. My church had taken a stand in writing and sent to the Bishop a declaration that they welcome LGBT people and would walk alongside them as they repent of their 'wicked ways' in seeking the path to righteousness through Jesus Christ. As it turns out, this declaration is not all that inviting or welcoming when applied to real people. I was too embarrassed and troubled by the declaration to invite them to my church.

From my Delaware office, I received a phone call from Philadelphia asking if I would consider leading their LGBT group temporarily as their leader had transferred to another part of the country. After getting approvals from my site, I rode Amtrak into Center City Philadelphia once a month to lead the meetings. It was only a few months before they found a permanent leader. During this time the Philly group invited the Delaware group to participate with them in the annual Philadelphia Gay Pride Parade. We began this outing at a restaurant near the parade route for breakfast. At breakfast, there was a similar discussion with both groups about God, religion, and church. The results were similar with most individuals raised as Christians but not feeling welcome in churches. After breakfast, we went a couple of blocks to the parade route where everyone was encouraged to join the parade. We walked in the parade for a few blocks before heading back to our car. It was a lot of fun for Susan and I; an experience we will never forget!

Some members left our church because they didn't believe the local church declaration was condemning enough. Susan and I left that church because we felt like hypocrites after getting to know our new friends and realizing they would not really be welcomed. God had opened our eyes! We transferred our membership to another UM Church near University of Delaware that was much more accepting and welcoming of all individuals. After these diversity network experiences, I was deeply touched by an infant baptism one Sunday in our new church home. The two moms and their children came forward with their new infant to be baptized. One of the moms was in charge of children's ministry at this church. The pastors, moms, brothers and sisters all placed hands on the infant. The congregation also extended hands from where they were standing as we joined in the congregational pledge (Page 44, United Methodist Hymnal):

"With God's help we will so order our lives after the example of Christ, that this child, surrounded by steadfast love, may be established in the faith, and confirmed and strengthened in the way that leads to life eternal."



When Jesus was asked what was the greatest commandment he replied, "Love the Lord your God with all your soul and with all your mind. This is the first and greatest commandment. And the second is like it: "Love your neighbor as yourself." Matthew 22:36-39. Our JWUMC vision calls us to "reach, touch, and serve" our neighbors and we do it throughout the year in many ways. At Christmas, there are some special ways we "love our neighbors."

1. Christmas Offering. We will be restocking the <u>Pastor's Emergency Fund</u>. These are some of the urgent needs that "neighbors" request: assistance with rent payments, utility bills (electricity and water), food (especially around Thanksgiving and Christmas), gas, and education fees (such as for books). Our members of our congregation or follow who live pearly. You can put

neighbors might be members of our congregation or folks who live nearby. You can put cash or a check in one of the special offering envelopes or send it to the church office. For a check, please write "Christmas Offering" on the subject line.

2. Angel Wishes. Now in its 14th year, the Angel Wishes program will be assisting 35 families, including 142 people. These are clients of Tri-County S.O.U.L. Ministries who have applied for and been accepted into our Caring Center. These families have a strong Christian faith and are working to become more self-sufficient. We are asking you to make a cash donation to "Angel Wishes" so we can help these families with something significant. These are not your typical Christmas gifts; the wishes granted are very practical and necessary. Here are a few "Angel Wishes" that have been granted in the past: Duke or water bill, car repairs, doctor or dental work, rent, car loan payment, tires or gift cards for groceries.

For instructions, find the "Wooden Angel" in Dunlap Hall and take a reminder note and Angel Wishes envelope. Any amount is welcome and helpful. Checks can be made payable to John Wesley with "Angel Wishes" in the memo line. If you choose to contribute, please get your donation to the church by Sunday, 12/15. You can mail it or put it in the offering plate.


When Stephen Ministers meet with a care receiver, they don't come alone. Stephen Ministers carry with them the promise Jesus made in Matthew 18:20.


Anyone can send a request to the prayer chain. Also, feel free to call the office and we can write down your prayer request and send it out for you.

SHARING OUR BLESSINGS IN DECEMBER

For over 30 years, Found House IHN has provided a number of services to families who are homeless or at risk of homelessness, mostly using temporary housing in churches. For folks in temporary housing, they operate a day center to provide child care and further assistance to the families. While they still use overnight stays in churches, they opened an exciting new program last year. With the support of many community organizations, churches, grants, etc. they opened Melrose Place, an apartment building which provides housing for 26 families, pets included.

In addition to basic housing needs, they also have a number of specific programs targeted to special needs. One example is the Child Enrichment program to combat the negative effects of homelessness on children. To quote their website, "All Found House programs take a holistic, community based approach, by connecting families to tools and resources, to move families out of homelessness rapidly while helping them retain their housing and achieve success in the long-term."

Devotions Along the Way

"Behold, the virgin shall be with child, and bear a Son, and they shall call His name Immanuel," which is translated, "God with us." Matthew 1:23 NKJV

For in Christ lives all the fullness of God in a human body. Colossians 2:9 NLT

Think about it. God the Father came to live *with* us in the form *of* us. Let's consider how the human eyes, hands, heart, and feet of Jesus, connect us to God's love and grace.

Jesus' eyes looked upon a woman caught in the sin of adultery (John 8). Moses' Law was clear: She must be stoned to death. But Jesus' eyes saw more than her sin. He saw a precious soul in need of grace. Instead of stones, Jesus offered forgiveness – and a new beginning. His eyes see our sin, and He offers the same to us through relationship with Him.

Jesus' hands were unique, as they alone bore the fingerprints of God. Whatever Jesus touched was changed forever: Blind eyes regained sight (Mark 8, Matthew 20); Diseases were healed (Matthew 8); Limbs and lives were restored (Luke 22); The dead returned to life (Luke 7); Little, miraculously became much (Matthew 14). As in biblical times, Jesus can still touch our sick bodies, broken finances, and troubled lives through relationship with Him.

Jesus' "heart" was on full display during His divine appointment with the woman at the well (John 4). She was a sinner, an outcast, and a Samaritan woman. Any of those descriptors would have kept a self-righteous, first century Rabbi at a respectable distance. Their encounter allowed Jesus' heart to show compassion and caring to one who desperately needed both. She was forever changed. In what ways are you an outcast? Jesus' heart is waiting to shower you with compassion and caring through relationship with Him.

Aside from a short donkey ride into Jerusalem, Jesus walked everywhere he went. It's estimated His feet traveled more than 3,000 miles during His adult ministry. The important point is Jesus' feet walked as far as needed to share the truth of God's love for *everyone*. Not just the righteous. Not only the "church goers." Not just those acceptable to society. Jesus intentionally sought out sinners, tax collectors, drunkards, the marginalized, and the hopeless. How far did His feet walk to find you and me? All the way to the cross...

What began in Bethlehem was completed on Calvary. Jesus' finished work made a way for us to have a reconciled relationship with God the Father. Today, His eyes still see us. His hands still touch us. His heart still cares for us. His feet still finds us. Thanks be to God.
