Spiritual Journey Sermon Series - On the Journey

How many of us have been on some sort of journey?

A journey is travelling from one place to another, usually taking a rather long time. A journey has a starting point and eventually an end point. A journey is passage or progress from one stage to another. Many of us can say that spiritual life is a journey. Everyone goes from one stage of life to another! But sometimes we forget about how God is involved in our spiritual journey!

Friends, we are on a journey with Christ. Along the way on this journey, he will call us again and again into a deeper relationship and remind us that He is with us. We are called to a deeper knowledge, trust and love of the Lord. Throughout the month of August, the word of God will stretch us. At the same time, we will be challenged by following sacred texts and reminded that "All things are possible with God."

You see, God knows our potential, and God is ever calling us to live into that potential. For as we walk with our Lord, and we learn from him.

Sunday, August 7th – The Scriptures tell us of the journey of a man named Elijah, who was a strong prophet of God. Elijah's journey was not simply going from place to place but running to save his life. God made sure he remembered his spiritual walk and calling! 1 Kings 19:1-10, "Get up and eat".

Sunday, August 14th – Three times in His commissioning of Joshua, God admonished him to have courage: necessary courage to complete the task of conquering the land and dividing it among the tribes, the courage required to keep the Law of Moses, disregarding all the pressures to compromise, and courage as the remedy for fear. Joshua 1:6-9, "Be strong and courageous."

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Sunday, August 21st – The Psalmist was traveling to Jerusalem to celebrate a religious feast. Devout Jews traveled to Jerusalem three times a year to keep the Lord's feasts. The journey took a few days. Like today, travel wasn't safe in the Middle East. The Psalmist was looking for help on his journey. Where would help come from? From the Lord. Psalm 121:1-2, "God is our helper".

Sunday, August 28th – Along the way on this journey, we will hear the Lord calling us, saying, "Follow me." What an exciting invitation to a way of life, to an adventure as we travel with our Lord to new and unknown places. John 10:1-5, "Jesus knows the way."





Another new name to get used to! Interfaith Housing Network is now called FOUND HOUSE. Their ministry is still to provide temporary housing for homeless families while helping them find a permanent home with other supports. During the pandemic, they began using temporary housing in an extended-stay hotel. They are now starting to return to congregation-based overnight stays. If you haven't confirmed your meeting through me, then it's not on the calendar and another group might end up getting that spot or date. If you are setting up a special event on a Sunday during worship (selling cookies, setting up a registration table. providing cake or treats) you also need to contact me to get that on the calendar.

We're officially half way through our financial and calendar year, and we are doing well. Our income through June 30 is at 56% of our budgeted projections; some of this is due to many of our retired folks using their required RMD funds for their alreadv pledges, those funds SO contributed may represent their entire yearly giving. Our expenses stand at only 44% of our budgeted projections, but we do have several projects looming on our horizon that might cut into that excess of funds.

We have collected over \$18,000 to date for mission causes outside our walls, so we continue to follow our Vision of reaching, touching, and serving. Thank you letters we've received acknowledge how grateful so many of those we've touched are.

Our capital expenses so far this year include new lighting in Wesley Hall, a new HVAC system for the front of the building, and new computers for the offices as well since those were well beyond the life expectancy for technology. Our server is now up to date and can receive and install the updates to keep our records safe and running smoothly.

Ordinary income for June was \$36,848.57, and our ordinary expenses were \$37,839.55.




"Fearless—Imagine Your Life Without Fear" by Max Lucado

SHORT STORIES FROM JW'S HOUSE

Hi, this is Bobby Woodward from JWUMC social justice class. John Wesley's focus on social holiness during his lifetime is the reason that the UMC denomination has such a focus on social justice during current times. In the previous story about my family being homeless, I suggested that at 8 years old I was able to get myself into plenty of trouble.

Mom's Uncle Joe Z Tower was on the board of directors for Lakeview Methodist Assembly in the Texas Conference of the Methodist Church in 1962. He helped my folks get their temporary jobs that summer as well as a roof over our heads and food for our bodies. My sister, Marie Nannette Woodward, was old enough to attend church camp activities every week all summer long. Perhaps, Nan's experience that summer influenced her decision to become a teacher of young children. She later settled in the nearby town of Palestine, Texas working as an organist in the church and a teacher in the school.

As for me, I had great adventures exploring Lakeview each day. One of those adventures took place at the lake. One day, I decided to get into a boat that was tied to the end of the pier. It was kind of peaceful at first with the gentle swaying of the boat in the water. After a few minutes, I realized that the pier was getting further and further away. It was too late to do anything as the boat had already drifted beyond reach. I didn't exactly come prepared for this adventure as I had no oars, no life preserver, no food, and no water. One other little detail was that I didn't know how to swim... I felt all alone as it was pretty much just me and the clothes on my body.

Out in the middle of the lake, the only thing I had left was to pray that God would rescue me. After several hours of praying, I could see a boat coming towards me from another part of the lake. He had oars and was pulling an empty boat. When he got to me, he simply said "It's time to take the boats back, now!" I shook my head in agreement with him. This man was a lifeguard who lived in the cabin next to mine. Part of the lifeguard's job each day was to round up all the boats in the lake that were adrift or abandoned. Looking back, it feels like the story of Jesus rounding up the lost sheep.

There was a worn path around the lake. I could see the path from the middle of the lake, but I could not see how to get back onto the path without some help. God didn't make me step off the path. I did that on my own. I have wandered off God's path too many times into a wilderness, desert, or lake. In these situations, I felt lost, alone, turned around, and disoriented. This story illustrates that when I am not on God's path, I am vulnerable to harm. I got myself into trouble plenty of times that summer, but there was always someone from the camp to help guide me back on the path if I lost my way.

Even though it was hard in that moment, today I realize that I am a different person, a different kind of child of God as a result of that experience. God has a purpose and a plan for each of my steps, every day, and every place that he leads me. Faith in God means that I can be confident in every situation. The lamp at my feet will never go out. With God, I don't have to worry about not finding the path because His light endures forever. Imagine the possibilities when we trust in God and His plan rather than focusing on our own circumstances!


