## God Is Our Peace Giver

Life is often challenging, but we can always find solace in God's unwavering goodness.

Many of us long for a bit of "peace and quiet." With everything happening in the world today, we can wholeheartedly echo that sentiment. However, I want to take a moment to reflect on the true essence of "peace."

We sometimes mistakenly believe that peace is merely the absence of conflict. Yet, we overlook that Jesus came into a world rife with political and moral turmoil. Despite this, He is the Prince of Peace, then and now.

As Jesus traveled the dusty roads with His disciples, His presence brought peace to every situation He encountered.

Political and religious leaders often struggled with peace because Jesus restored hope and dignity to the downtrodden and forgotten. This threatened the religious leaders' control over the people.

Jesus knew that a day would come when He would leave this world, entrusting His mission to His disciples. He offered them comforting words, which still resonate with us today:

John 14:27 (NKJV) - *"Peace I leave with you, My peace I give to you; not as the world gives do I give to you. Let not your heart be troubled, neither let it be afraid."*

Worldly peace is fleeting, influenced by our surroundings, but the peace from the Lord comes from within, nourished by His presence.

Consider this beautiful story that illustrates Christ's peace:

Two painters were tasked with creating a picture of peace. The first depicted a tranquil evening by a calm lake, surrounded by trees and meadows with cattle grazing peacefully, a cottage in the foreground, and a setting sun—everything signifying perfect rest.

The second painter portrayed a wild, stormy scene with heavy black clouds and a roaring waterfall. Amidst the chaos, a small bird nestled safely in a rock cleft, singing joyfully. This second image captures the peace that surpasses all understanding—the peace of the Lord Jesus Christ, the wisdom of God in the heart of the redeemed. True peace with oneself comes from peace with God.

Remember, the circumstances around you should not dictate your peace. HE is our peace!

## 2024 West Ohio Annual Conference

The 2024 West Ohio Annual Conference was held at Capital University in Bexley, Ohio, from May 29 – June 1. We experienced the conference theme, “God is Able” even before the first worship service. There was a slight snafu with our hotel reservations and we had to change hotels. As Dave and I entered the hotel where Pastor Kalamba was staying, Dave said this brief prayer: Dear Lord, please have two rooms available. And, we were both able to get a room at that hotel which made it easy for us to carpool to Capital University each day. Indeed, God is Able.

After moving our things into the hotel, we headed into Bexley for the opening worship service. Upon entering our new venue at Capital University, we found a very different set-up than what we were used to at Hoover Auditorium at Lakeside. Instead of auditorium seating, we sat in folding chairs at round tables. It was a pleasant arrangement for the meetings; however, the plastic folding chairs were not going to work for my back pain. That’s when I met my own angel, Sheila, who again showed that “God is Able.” I immediately went to an usher and explained my situation. I asked if there were any supportive chairs in the building. And, lo and behold, within minutes she had provided me with a chair that would support my back (with my extra cushions). And not only that, she placed a sign saying “Reserved for Kimberly H.” on the chair to ensure I would get it each day. Again, God is Able.

Thursday morning, we started the day with the Missional Worship Service. At this time, they announced that 271 Home Care Kits were donated by the entire conference, 54 of which came from the Great Miami River District (our district). John Wesley UMC donated seven of the 54 Home Care Kits.

There were six planned pieces of legislation to be addressed during the business sessions. All six were adopted. Recommendation #1 referred to changes to structure, procedure, and rules. Recommendation #2 was the 2025 budget. This budget slightly reduced our apportionments for next year. Recommendation #3 was from the Board of Pension and Health and Recommendation #4 was from the Commission on Equitable Compensation.

Recommendation #5 regarded Regionalization which came about due to decisions made at General Conference. It encourages all WOC boards, committees, ministry teams and the General Conference delegation to provide educational opportunities throughout the conference so we are fully informed and prepared to vote on the constitutional amendments that will be presented at the 2025 Annual Conference. Recommendation #6 was presented by the Committee for Responding to Palestinian Christians, recommending steps for the UMC to fund the study of Israeli treatment of Palestinians in Israel and the West Bank. This includes engaging in Bible Study on the region's history and sending a delegation to the Holy Land to report their findings next year.

Two other pieces of legislation were presented after suspending the rules. The West Ohio Annual Conference supported the approval of Senate Bill 3910 (Yes in God's Backyard Act) regarding affordable housing. The second additional recommendation was concerned with financially prioritizing children, youth, and young adults in the 2026 budget. This recommendation was referred to the Council on Finance and Administration.

Bishop Palmer is retiring August 31, 2024. In July, a new Bishop will be assigned to serve both the West Ohio Conference and the East Ohio Conference.

Finally, in case you were wondering, we are fortunate to have Pastor Kalamba staying with us for another year!

The 2025 Annual Conference will, again, be held at Capital University from May 28 – May 31, 2025. If you have ever wanted to learn more about how our denomination functions and be a part of the decision making process, please consider serving as a Lay Member to Annual Conference for the district.

It's time again for reminders about some procedures and processes in our financial area. With committee rosters changing and different people sometimes charged with making purchases, it's just "a good thing" (as Martha Stewart would say) to review these general guidelines.

If you're purchasing anything for the church, whether it's going to be billed to us or you'll pay up front and ask for reimbursement, be sure not to pay sales tax since we're a nonprofit and exempt from that tax. Every little bit adds up in our costs, and avoiding this tax is your way to take that "one small step" for mankind! If the vendor you're purchasing from questions your status, be sure that you've planned ahead to get a Certificate of Tax Exemption from the church office or by contacting the treasurer. Many local vendors already have our information in their systems. If you cannot do that, you always have the option some people have followed and just not asked for reimbursement of the sales taxes they paid—but we would really rather that none of us are funding the State of Ohio when we are exempt.

If you're purchasing items or initiating a service call for repair or installation, be sure that your committee chair is aware and approves your actions ahead of time. Once the vendor has come to do the work, it's too late to cancel payments. Also, if the purchase or repair is going to be more than a couple hundred dollars, it would be a good idea to alert the treasurer so that she knows what that bill is about when it just shows up in the mail. Your committee chair should sign off on the bill if it's for more than \$200 so that our records show that the payment was approved.

Unfortunately, we're dealing with too many companies right now whose accounts receivable and billing departments do not seem to communicate with one another—so we often receive invoicing twice for a service that's already been paid on the first invoice. Returned items often are not credited to our accounts in any timely fashion, so alerting the treasurer of those returns is critical to avoid overpayments.

When you receive any item that includes a receipt or packing slip, please be sure to put that into the treasurer's mailbox in the church office since it provides a backup for the receipt of the material.

I didn't see it coming. Why does this fall to me? I had worked and planned for some "me time." Anger felt good. Worry consumed my energy. I wasn't sleeping. My stress was toxic. A loved one who justifiably could no longer suffer my questions and complaints blurted out, "You need someone to talk to!"

Yes, I did. I apologized, and asked God for the courage to reach out for a Stephen Minister. God helped me make the call and set in motion a faith centered, confidential partnership. God through my Stephen Minister joined me on my journey.

Having someone to talk to lifted a burden and helped me concentrate on the things I could control and let go to God things out of my control. It is a blessing to have a friend in Christ. My Stephen Minister could not remove any of the heartbreaks but helped me see God working for the good.

I look forward to our coffee on the porch where we talk, pray, choke up and laugh. The experience is truly a gift from God.

If you are flaying about, worn out and worried like I was, ask God for the courage to reach out. God knows what we need. Feel his Love through a confidential, caring partner who is a Stephen Minister.

## SHORT STORIES FROM JW'S HOUSE

Hi, this is Bobby Woodward with a message about judging people by first impressions. The first impression bias describes how we make quick judgements about others that are often subject to bias or error. The theory stems from the idea that humans will often rely on the first piece(s) of information they receive as part of their survival instinct. It takes just a quick glance, maybe three seconds, for someone to evaluate you when you meet for the first time. In this short time, the other person forms an opinion about you based on your appearance, your body language, your demeanor, your mannerisms, and how you are dressed. [I just googled this info...]

**First Impression:** Recently, we were driving home through West Virginia. Traffic got bogged down on the interstate highway due to bridge construction (summer road work). As we were creeping along in a single lane, guys on motorcycles started passing us on the right shoulder. They were a bunch of old men wearing "Wild Hogs" T shirts. I remember looking at them and thinking that I was NOT going to be the one to tell them that they could not pass on the right shoulder while WE sat in traffic. What they did was rude and the way they were dressed was a bit intimidating.

**Second Impression:** A little further down the road, the traffic had cleared and we resumed our trip at posted highway speed. Soon a popup shower was producing heavy rain. Wait, what was going on in the distance? As we got closer to the next overpass, we could see the motorcycles parked underneath and the guys huddled together to avoid getting wet. I'm thinking: you guys don't look so tough now. After the rain, the "Wild Hogs" passed us again, this time legally, in the left lane.

**Third Impression:** As we got to Washington, Pa., guess who we saw at our hotel. Yes, it was the "Wild Hogs" with their Harleys in the parking lot. They were spending the night in the same hotel as us. Up close and personal, these guys weren't scary at all. They actually seemed like pretty nice guys!

How would visitors feel, if no one welcomed them to our church or spoke to them? How would they feel if someone told them "you need to move because you are sitting in my pew"? Does their first impression of people in our church really matter? Of course it does if we are the hands and feet of Jesus. We are God's representatives inviting the lost and the broken people to come join us for worship. We want them to come back so they can get to know us as well as us getting to know them. God calls us to reach out to others to make a deeper connection. I have visited churches where no one spoke to me because I was a stranger. Fortunately, my first visit to this church was not like that!

# *Devotions Along the Way*

“The Big Picture” is a term used by the U. S. military. It refers to a “top-down” view of military actions and plans. For example, the big picture on D-Day in 1944, was to establish a European foothold to directly confront Nazi Germany. Within that big picture resided countless “little pictures.” Together, they served the overall mission of history’s greatest rescue.

The same can be said of God’s word – the Bible. All 66 books convey one, big picture: The story of how much God loves God’s children, and the events God used to redeem and rescue us from sin.

Step one was the Law, given through Moses, to show us how far we are from God’s standards. God knew we would not keep all of God’s laws all the time, so a sacrificial blood covenant provided temporary forgiveness of sins.

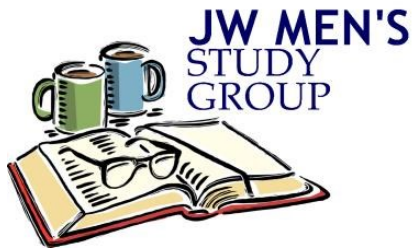
Step two was Jesus (God with skin on) and the New Covenant of Grace. Jesus came not to condemn the world, but to save the world through one, final and eternal blood sacrifice. Calvary was the greatest rescue mission of all time.

The question is, how do our small pictures fit within God’s Big Picture? They fit first when we accept the grace of the New Covenant, and enter a reconciled relationship with God. Secondly, they fit when we model and share God’s love with others so they too can experience God’s saving grace in their lives.

And who needs rescuing from sin? We all do! *All* of God’s children.

**For God so loved the world that He gave His only begotten Son, that whoever believes in Him should not perish but have everlasting life. For God did not send His Son into the world to condemn the world, but that the world through Him might be saved. John 3: 16-17**

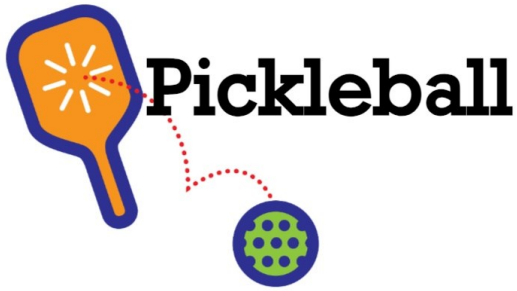

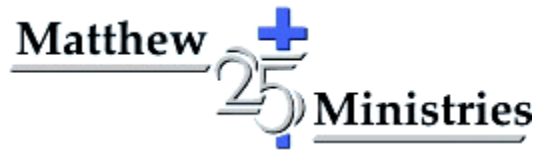

We work from 11:00 AM to 1:00 PM. We always ask for sit down work.

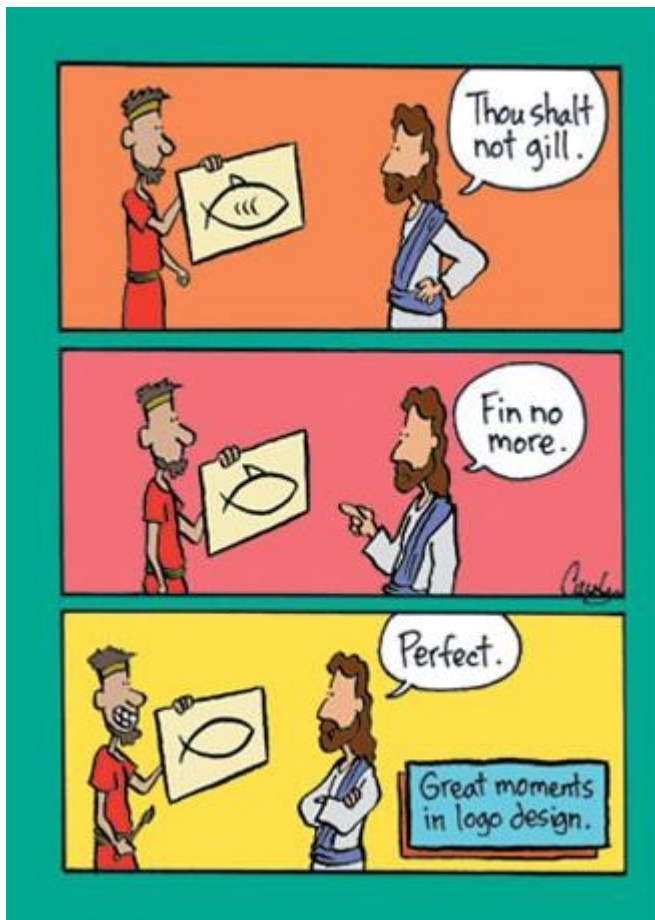
We will meet in Matthew 25 Ministries, either in the lobby or the work area.
