Dear Rev. David Fujimoto and members of the Mililani Hongwanji Mission,



I have been keeping up to date on the lively activities of all of the members through the newsletter. Looking back on the past, I am sure that each of us would recall variety of different events.

Although it was more than 45 years ago, to me it seems like just yesterday that I served at Mililani Hongwanji, working together with all of the other members to achieve our ideal mission. I never forget how everyone cooperated together to ensure the success of one big event after another, or how happy everyone looked once those events were finished and holding small celebrations in the temple hall or in the garage at the ministers' residence. I remember those days with nostalgia as I recall how young and energetic everyone was at the time.

Summary of November 9, 2022 Kyodan Board Meeting

- The Mililani Hongwanji Board of Directors met via ZOOM with a quorum. Reverend David Fujimoto conducted the meeting.
- Treasurer's Report presented for the month ending October 31, 2022. Overall income and expenses are in line with annual budget ending December 31, 2022. Income from ADC and Bon Dance are above budget, however pledges are slightly behind but it is anticipated to increase at year end when pledges for 2023 are received. HHMH Combined Investment Fund has decreased in value since the beginning of the year and hopeful that it will rebound in 2023.
- The Board approved a CIP request to power spray wash the Ed Building & carport roofs on Dec. 1.
- Mililani Hale Adult Day Care lease has been extended that includes Saturday mornings.
- A special meeting of newly elected Board members will be held on December 11th, following the General Membership meeting.
- 111th (2023) Legislative Assembly (Giseikai) will be on Feb 10-11, 2023. It will be a hybrid meeting followed by the Living Treasures Luncheon on Saturday. Members are encouraged to attend.
- Diane Yoza: BWA will be having a dinner meeting on 12/9/22, Zippy's Fundraiser in ongoing,
 Ehime Maru cleanup on Nov. 5, 2022.
- Rev. Fujimoto: Visitation by Rev. Fujisawa from Zenkoji Temple in Hiroshima, received congratulatory message and gift from Rev. Suehira, meeting with Bishop regarding Bon Dance concerns, December 25th Service at 9:00 am, New Year's Open House is planned.

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BWA members will be celebrating the end of the year with their annual membership meeting and potluck dinner on Dec. 9. This will be a special gathering since we could not have it the past two year due to the pandemic. If you are interested in joining this very vibrant, world-wide organization, please contact President Diane Yoza or Membership Chair, Joyce Ogawa. With 2023 quickly approaching, we are already scheduling the making of zenzai on January 15, 2023, in observance of Hoonko, a memorial service in memory of Shinran Shonin. Joyce Ogawa will chair the


We'll be taking the rest of December off to enjoy the holidays. However, we encourage our Dharma School families to take part in the annual temple clean up on December 18th if you are able.

June Miyasaki Asato, born on June 5, 1942, to parents Hisao and Shigeyo Muramaru Miyasaki, grew up in Honokaa, on the Big Island of Hawaii. June has 5 sisters and 1 brother.

One of June's first memory growing up around the age of 3 or 4 were the blackouts and bunny masks that they had in their home during the war. Lights had to be turned off and black curtains and paper were hung on windows to prevent any enemy attacks. The oldest relative that June could remember was her greatgrandmother who lived in Hilo who she visited with her mother during trips to Hilo going to the dentist, movies, and celebrations.

June's parents met at a beach restaurant in Kawaihae where her mother worked with her parents. June's father, a teacher in Pa'auilo would drive 50 miles after school to deliver groceries to the restaurant several times a week and then back home to prepare for school teaching the next day!

June's childhood home was on the Miyasaki property near their family store. Their family was so large, they had to renovate by adding the old storehouse as a big dorm-like bedroom. They went out in pairs at night to the outhouse and did not have indoor plumbing until June was in the second grade. Bathing was done in the laundry wash house and a bath house was set up when June was in the fifth grade. June also lived in a teacher's cottage in Pepe'ekeo when her father taught there. June remembers running away from her mom with her sister to go across the playing field when the students came out for recess. Her dad then had to have some students bring them home!

Christmas was spent with her large family enjoying the resources that came from their grandparent's farm such as their Christmas tree, fruits, vegetables, flowers, and meat from cattle raised. Cleaning the house and then enjoying the special foods for New Year was a tradition along with visiting their older relatives. Living close to the school, June vividly remembers rushing home from school on Girl's Day to the smell of frying yeast donuts, warm and sugary! Every Fourth of July, they would pile into their car and go to Honokaa for the big parade.

June attended Pa'auilo Elementary and Intermediate school until the ninth grade and attended Honoka'a High School. June then attended the University of Hawaii Hilo Branch for two years and graduated from the University of Hawaii at Manoa.

June met the love of her life, Bob! After returning home from Chicago to work, Bob was asked to chaperone at a year-end Science Club banquet by his old UH buddy to take some of the single teachers home after the dance, and the rest is history! June and Bob married at the Honpa Hongwanji Betsuin main temple, the reception was held at the newly built Annex Social Hall officiated by Reverend Yoshiaki Fujitani. They then ran off to Kauai for their honeymoon, leaving the cleanup to the family!

June and Bob's children are Susan and Kevin. A coincidental story on June's first child's birth. June and Bob met their best man and his wife at Kapiolani Hospital, both giving birth to a girl, they share the same birthdate! The best man was June's Department Head and Co-Advisor and Bob's buddy who asked Bob to chaperone at the banquet!

June's favorite subjects were reading and writing in elementary school, mathematics in intermediate, and math and science in high school. Not having algebra in ninth grade, they had to double up to catch up. With good foundations and good teachers, they all did great!

One of June's favorite teachers was her sixth-grade teacher from Oklahoma who introduced her to musical Oklahoma and brought in a real author to help them critique the short stories they wrote. She read aloud from classic books Like Tom Sawyer and Huckleberry Finn.

June's siblings and children were and are her best friends as well as many others whom she met over the years attending the University of Hawaii. In addition, her dharma friends from Mililani Hongwanji are among her best buddies these days.

June's first paying job was as a babysitter for some of the staff at Pa'auilo school during her intermediate school years and grew up working at the family store and farm, and working part-time through her college years. June's first real job as a school teacher helped her to pay the rent for herself and her two siblings as they attended UH Manoa and started working. It was a great feeling to tell her parents that they did not have to send rent money anymore. June eventually purchased a car for \$2700 and kept the car until 1986!

June loved classroom teaching the most! Working with students on projects and student council activities. It was very rewarding when the students would come back to show their appreciation!

June's heroes are her parents and grandparents who lived through tough times and helped her become the person she is. Another hero is her husband Bob. June's favorite foods include crab and steak and all kinds of fruits and vegetables. June makes spare ribs, shira-ae, healthy salads, and sandwiches and loves to share her recipes with family and friends!

June was introduced to the Jodo Shinshu teachings when her parents and grandparents took her and her siblings to Dharma School, then called Sunday school. Attending Sunday school classes was required in order to participate in fun activities like field trips to other temples and performing in plays and programs. Throughout June's childhood years, she went to Sunday school and also became active in the Jr. YBA and YBA at Hilo College. It was at the University of Hawaii at Manoa Rainbow YBA where June met some of Mililani Hongwanji members like Mel Hayase.

A founding member, June along with Mel Hayase and other members, is fortunate to have had the opportunity to open our temple in Mililani and celebrate our Anniversary of 45 years!

Thelma's grandfather and some of his family lived at Camp One, a plantation camp in the Spreckelsville area of Paia. In Thelma's younger days, this is where she spent New Year's with her family pounding mochi with her grandfather, and their family would eat mochi every day for breakfast until it ran out!

Christmas was one of Thelma's favorite holidays. Thelma's mother made Christmas really special by decorating the Christmas tree and hanging their stockings on the eve.

Thelma Kushimi attended Paia Elementary School until the eighth grade. Her family eventually moved to Kahului and Thelma then attended Baldwin High School from the ninth grade until graduating from Baldwin High School. It is at Baldwin High School where Thelma met some of her close friends, Martha Ishii and Frances Saito among many other friends.

Thelma met her husband through a friend and got married at the Honpa Hongwanji Betsuin with a reception downstairs in the Social Hall. Reverend Fujitani was the officiating minister. Thelma remembers her wedding being a little hectic, however, everything went well!

Thelma gave birth to her son Lance in 1968. He arrived a little early around a month, and besides being a little underweight, he was okay! Thelma's family grew, with daughter Denise born in 1970 and daughter Kim born in 1975.

Thelma's first summer job was at the Kahului Cannery working as a packer at the conveyor belt. Something Thelma remembers is that she received scoldings from her supervisor and also remembers the acid from the pineapple, after continuous work, would hurt her skin.

Thelma's favorite subjects in school were the Business courses which led to Thelma attending Honolulu Business College after moving to Oahu. Thelma went on to pursue her first job as an Office Clerk at an Insurance company, worked for a while, and later stayed home to care for her young family. Thelma returned to the workforce and became an Office Clerk working at Kunia Elementary and later at Kipapa Elementary School where she retired.

Thelma found working at Kipapa Elementary most enjoyable. It was the experiences, the people, and the staff that made it special, and have made lifelong friends!

Martha's fond memories were of her Aunt Setsumi Fuke who lived with her family, like a second mother and helped her family tremendously. Martha being the eldest, grew up with her Aunt helping her mother with cooking, cleaning the house, and watching over her siblings.

From 1967-1978, Martha was employed at the REHAB Hospital as a Medical Secretary and eventually worked with Dr. Robert Bart, Jr. as an Administrative Medical Assistant from years 1978-2007.

Martha married Harley Ishii who was from Hilo in 1964 at the Honpa Hongwanji Betsuin. They both met at a gathering of Hilo boys and Honolulu and Maui girls!

The Ishii's lived in Kapahulu, Oahu, moved to Kaneohe, Oahu in 1971, and in 1975 moved to Mililani Town at their present address. They have two children, Jason and April. Their first child Jason was born on October 3, 1968, and their second child April was born on April 29, 1972, both born at Kapiolani Hospital. They have five grandchildren, Jarrick, Tyler, Jeff, Serenie, and Seth which keep them very busy!

Saito born on August 25, 1942, in Makawao, Maui has a son Ross, Daughter Karen, son-in-law Chad and a grandson, Troy. Around the age of

4 years old, Frances with

her father visited the KGMB Radio Station in Maui. Not knowing what occasion was being celebrated, it could have been Girl's Day, Frances ended up singing solo, "Otete Tsunaide", a little nervous, but she did fine!

Frances remembers her father fondly who passed away at the age of 49 years old. He had his own business selling kerosene for domestic use. He would always take her with him. One of her special memories of the time she spent with her father was that he whistled when he delivered the kerosene. Whistling became something Frances enjoyed!

Frances's father, a Japanese American, was imprisoned at the Honouliuli Internment Camp during World War II due to his credentials as a Japanese School Teacher. He eventually returned home. During this time, Frances's mother was separated from her father after Frances was born. Hardships experienced, Frances's mother was able to bring up Frances with the help and support of friends, neighbors, and the camp community.

Without any relatives on Maui, Frances's family of three would celebrate quietly during the holidays. Frances would envy friends going to their relative's homes and feasting, however, at times, she would be invited to join other families. Frances's neighbors became her family, too! The Kohama family second owner of the Maui Potato Chips Factory was their neighbor. This is where Frances began her love for everything 'potato'. Any leftover unsold potato chips, broken down to small sizes from the factory were shared by the Kohama family. Frances topped her rice with potato chip pieces, like furikake!

Frances attended preschool at Kahului Union Church, Kahului School, Baldwin High School, and Western New Mexico University.

Frances met her husband while residing at the Soto Mission Dormitory. Her future spouse and all of his friends would come over for many gatherings. Frances' wedding ceremony was officiated by Reverend Nagao at Honpa Hongwanji in March of 1966, Kuhio Day. The reception was at the Honpa Hongwanji Hall.
