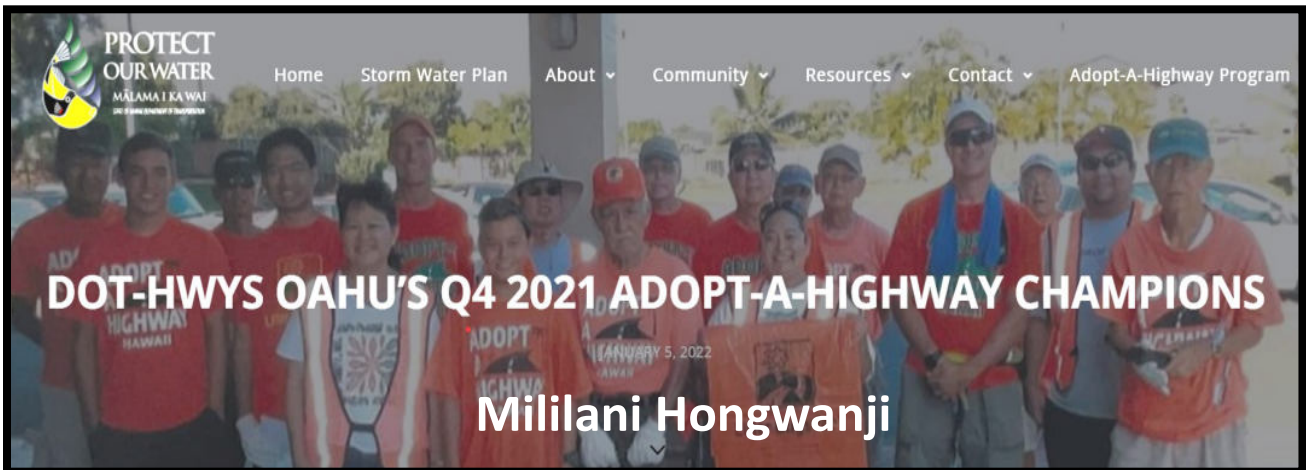

Minister's Message



Trust In Amida's Promise

“Have you ever noticed the attitude of the Issei people when they worshiped in gasshō? They express sincere, wholehearted trust in Amida Buddha's promise. They may not be aware of themselves, but in their honesty and acceptance of Amida Buddha really stands up beautifully in their form of gasshō. It seems to be the most beautiful figure of mankind.”

I was called upon one day to come and visit with a client in a skilled facility. The staff didn't know what kind of a Buddhist this person was; however, I was called in to offer some pastoral and spiritual care. When I got there, the client was in her bed watching television. I identified myself and she was more than happy to receive me.

After spending some time with her, and getting to know her better, I asked her what I could do for her. She didn't want me to chant, as she had mentioned that it really didn't have any meaning for her, so we just continued to talk. She brought up about her past, her present feelings on her life and some concerns she had. I shared with her my thoughts and addressed her concerns and she put her hands together and said, “Oh thank you! I feel so happy now!”

Rev. Kondo's view, as stated above, made sense to me, as I provided care for this lady. We may not be truly aware of ourselves, however the embrace of Amida Buddha always seems to find its place in our hearts. That acceptance of Amida Buddha was so beautiful and her hands came together in gasshō. Though wrinkled, frail, and she struggled, it was her way of appreciation and gratitude not to me, but to Amida Buddha, for this proclamation of “no worry, I will always accept you in to the Pure Land.”

In our everyday lives, though we may take for granted so many things, at the end of the day, we need to reflect and identify just all the karmic conditions that played out and how fortunate we are able to benefit from it.

The Issei generation faced so much struggle in a new land, and yet at the end of the day, put their hands together, recited the Nembutsu in appreciation for that assurance of our salvation and for the karmic conditions that played out in their lives.

Rev. Kondo reminds us that the Nembutsu comes from the heart. As he says, “recite the Nembutsu naturally, just as water flows from a higher to lower place.” When you really think about it, that natural flow, flows naturally, and we just allow it to happen, and in its own way, never forced, never coerce. As we come to the Obon season, let us recite the Nembutsu and remember all those who are in our lives and those who have gone before us.

Aloha Mililani Hongwanji members and friends!

I hope you are well and staying safe. At the Board of Directors meeting on May 11th, I was officially elected as the temple president for 2022. I have been serving as the acting president for 2022 and I had not expected to be in this role when my term ended in December 2021. I was thinking that as time goes by, I would be called the “pandemic” president as my time serving in 2020 and 2021 has been predominantly when the temple went through many adjustments in reaction to the often uncertainties of COVID-19. After further reflection and considerations of where we are now at (almost mid-year), I felt that it was important for the temple to have an official president and not someone serving in an acting capacity for the rest of this year and that continuity is important during this challenging time.

I am fortunate that I can lean on our dedicated members for assistance. Every member is a valued member and if you are able to volunteer some time to help the temple, your assistance is appreciated. I am planning to address the Sangha on a Sunday in June to discuss where we are now and what to expect over the next several years leading up to our 50th anniversary. Normally the president would address the Sangha at the beginning of the year, but we were not having in-person services and I thought that it was best to wait till we gather again at the temple.

We are fortunate that we now have Sunday services in-person and our Dharma School, BWA, and other groups have been meeting in-person after we fully opened. Our 45th anniversary will be celebrated throughout the month of November and this celebration has been delayed (originally planned for March) due to COVID-19. As Buddhist, we know that the future is unpredictable, but we remain optimistic and energized that we will be able to gather as a Sangha and celebrate as we reflect upon the past. Things have changed and will continue to change, and I ask for your patience and understanding as we do our best to serve the Sangha and the community.

Summary of May 11, 2022 Kyodan Board Meeting



- The Mililani Hongwanji Board of Directors met via ZOOM with a quorum. Immediate Past President Dean Sakamoto conducted the meeting.
- Treasurer's Report presented for the month ending April 30, 2022. Facility users continue to provide a good source of revenue along with gojikai pledges, and donations. Replacement cost of the parsonage's washer and dryer from CIP funds were reflected.
- As part of the 45th Anniversary (November 2022), the temple is planning to replace the wooden sign with something more sturdy and modern.
- The 50th Anniversary (2027) celebration will be kicking off soon with letters going out to members.
- The Board elected Dean Sakamoto as the President effective immediately. He will vacate his position as Immediate Past President. Let's give him our support for the rest of his term.
- An assistant treasurer was discussed to alleviate some of the workload currently being done by the Treasurer and Finance Committee chair. Anyone willing to volunteer a few hours a week to help out in this area should see Dean or Cliff. No experience required and training will be provided for those who like to work behind the scenes.
- Bon Dance - A general planning meeting was held on May 4, with about 30 people in attendance. Volunteers provided updates to their function/tasks. The ongoing Yagura issue is currently being addressed with 2 options being reviewed. The string lights are also being discussed and might be replaced with several flood lights instead. Workload and safety are the driving factors for these changes. Affiliated organizations are currently planning their part in the festivities. See Bon Dance Flyer insert for more information.

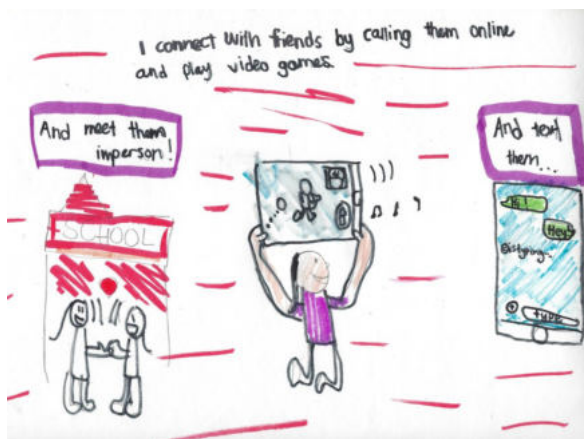

JŌDO SHINSHŪ AND THE MAKING OF AMERICAN BUDDHISM

Shin Buddhism, Modern Buddhism

OAHU DISTRICT SATELLITE SESSION

In this presentation, Dr. Mitchell will discuss the history of Jodo Shinshū missionaries to the mainland US and their interactions with Western scholarship on Buddhism. He will discuss the ways in which these missionaries self-consciously promoted Buddhism outside the immigrant group, and how the contributions of Shin Buddhism have been neglected in scholarship on Buddhist modernism.

• About Dr. Scott Mitchell

Scott Mitchell is a scholar of Buddhism in the West, Pure Land Buddhism, and Buddhist modernism and is currently the Dean of the Institute of Buddhist Studies in Berkeley, California, where he has taught classes on American Buddhism and Buddhism and popular culture for the past fifteen years. He is the author or co-editor of a number of books including *Buddhism in America: Global Religion, Local Contexts* (2016); *Buddhism Beyond Borders*, co-edited with Natalie Quli (2015); and the forthcoming *Oxford Handbook on American Buddhism*, co-edited with Ann Gleig. His next book, *Mid-Century Modern Buddhism*, focuses on the Berkeley Bussei and the origins of American Buddhism in the Japanese American Jodo Shinshū community. It will be published by Oxford University Press in 2023.

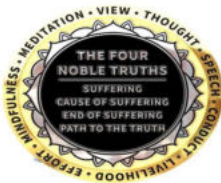
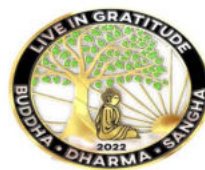
A big "Mahalo" to all who attended

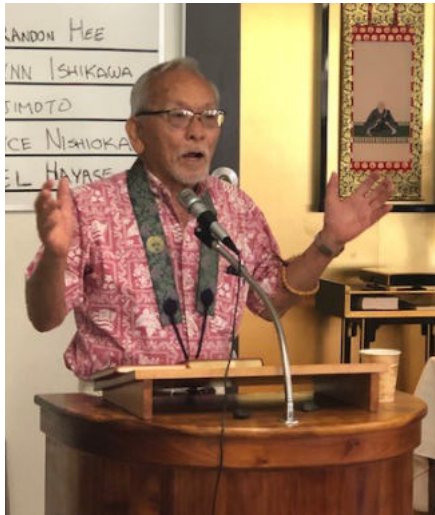
