Minister's Message

The Path of the Samurai & The Path of Nembutsu

On October 18, our Mililani Hongwanji Jūdō Club had their promotion celebration, and Sensei Chad Yasumura announced that he turned over the Jūdō Club to Sensei Kevin Funasaki as the new head instructor. Our temple president Ms. Rene Mansho, former president Ms. June Asato, and I participated in the celebration. We gave leis made by Ms. Claire Matsumoto to all of the students and instructors. Then, on behalf of the Mililani Hongwanji, Ms. Mansho offered a congratulatory message to the students receiving promotions and expressed our gratitude to Sensei Chad for his guidance of our Jūdō Club over the years.

During the celebration, I was impressed with the new head instructor, Sensei Kevin. He tried to teach each student how to bow. Japanese martial arts begin and end with bowing. Through bowing, they can show their respect towards their sensei and team mates as well as their opponents. Students can learn not only techniques but also the spirt of martial arts.

Recently I have been really enjoying watching Major League Baseball games because of Shohei Ohtani of the Los Angeles Dodgers. I look forward to the World Series games of the Los Angeles Dodgers versus the New York Yankees. I was surprised to hear that Shohei Ohtani set a goal to win the World Series when he was a high school student in Japan 12 years ago. Amazingly, he is about to make it happen.

Besides baseball, I love karate very much. I have practiced karate since I was in high school. When I lived outside of Japan, I realized that samurai culture still attracts a large number of western people, including people here in Hawaii. Many westerners know about Japanese martial arts. Karatedō, jūdō, aikidō, and kendō are the way of the samurai, which are forms of Zen Buddhism rather than sports. The kanji "dō" means the path of the samurai, which is called Bushidō in Japanese.

A samurai had to always be prepared to die. If a samurai met some opponents, he would kill or be killed by the sword. For this reason, samurai needed to be mentally prepared through Zen Buddhism. One of the reasons why Zen and Bushidō are connected is that samurai could achieve mental concentration with Zen practices. Also, samurai could obtain proper breathing techniques in the practice of Zen meditation: Zazen. Contemplation and meditation are important to mastering the way of the samurai. Zen masters and samurai alike use *mushin* in meditation so that all thoughts and emotions are forgotten, allowing for complete relaxation and peace to arise. Most people walk, read, write, ride a bicycle, and drive a car without conscious thought. Though they may not realize it, this is a state of *mushin*: no-mind.

Then, what is the path of the Nembutsu? What is the difference between the path of the Nembutsu and Zen Buddhism? Compared to Zen Buddhism, the Nembutsu path is open to everyone and everyone can walk together. Therefore, it is called "daidō," meaning "great path." We are all in Amida's embrace and walking on the great path of the Nembutsu under Amida's guidance. Amida Buddha is always by our side, transforming into the calling voice of "Namo Amida Butsu," and working untiringly to save us all. Everyone is included.

As you know, the gateway to the Olympic games is extremely narrow. The gateway to the Major League Baseball World Series is also very narrow. It is not open to ordinary people like me. If the gateway to the Nembutsu were like the gateway to the Olympic games or the Major League Baseball World Series, the path of the Nembutsu would only be for elite people. Amida Buddha gave us the Nembutsu, which is easy for us to follow in our daily life. We are equally liberated by Amida Buddha through the call of Amida in the Nembutsu. Of course, we admire Shohei Ohtani, athletes who participate in the Olympic games, and monks who walk the path of sages requiring self-power practices. But I feel gratitude for the Primal Vow, in which Amida resolves to save me. Other Power, Amida's liberation, is for everyone. So, let us continue to walk together on the Nembutsu path, which is the great path of Amida's Vow. The

Nembutsu teaching is the consummation of Mahayana Buddhism.

I would like to close my message with a poem (wassan) by Shinran Shōnin.

"Having turned from the little road

Of a myriad practices and good acts

And entered the great path of the Primal Vow, which is true reality, We will quickly attain the enlightenment of nirvana."


Summary of October 9, 2024 Mililani Hongwanji Board Meeting

- The Mililani Hongwanji Board of Directors met via ZOOM with a quorum. President Rene Mansho presided.
- Treasurer's Report: (Cliff T) The September 30, 2024 Financial Report was presented. HHMH Kyodan 3rd Qtr Assessment paid. Slight increase in utilities due to Bon Dance activities, Building Committee higher with repairs/maintenance contracts to facilities, & replenishing supplies. Paid partial reimbursement of Triple Celebration registration fees for paid attendees. Will be sending out HHMH Social Concerns Fund Drive and 2025 Mililani Hongwanji Gojikai (membership) Pledge letters simultaneously in November. Pre-addressed stamped envelopes will be provided for convenience.
- Minister's Report: (Rev. Kamuro) Written report received showing various meetings, services, and other activities for current and future months. Received tentative approval from Bishop Umitani to hold Mililani Hongwanji's 50th Anniversary activities from March 12-14, 2027. An Affirmative Rites Ceremony (Keishiki) is tentatively planned for March 14, 2027.
 Oahu District Ministers have been invited and asked to support in this celebration. Rev. Kamuro is the 2025 Oahu District Ministers Association Vice President and Minister Advisor for the Jr. YBA, Oahu District.
- President's Report: (Rene M) "Ring Your Bell for Peace" via ZOOM on Sept. 20 was live at Mililani Hongwanji. Over 1,700 people participated worldwide. Mr. Hideaki Yagi will donate Bonsai Plants to temple members as he plan to relocate from his residence. Mahalo to Cliff Togo and Stan Sasaki who co-chaired the 2024 Bon Dance. Funds raised were comparable to last year. Cliff & Warren Hahn will co-chair the 2025 Bon Dance. Rene and Rev. Kamuro attended the Quarterly Mililani High School Lunch Meeting. Rene thanked the group for their support of the temple's Bon Dance and introduced new resident minister Rev. Kamuro. BWA Report: (Lani Y-excused) AED/CPR class was attended by over 20 BWA and Kyodan members, instructor was excellent with hands-on practice on "RALPH". All set for upcoming OUHHBWA Conference hosted by MH on the 26th of this month. Ehime Maru project on Nov 2. Holiday Dinner scheduled for Dec. 6.
- VP Operations: (Kevin A-excused) Approved Boy Scouts to temporarily use the temple building on Mondays, 7:00pm to
 hold their meetings. An agreement will be drafted by Dean. Hurricane insurance provided by agent being reviewed for continued coverage as premiums are very costly.
- VP Facilities: (Steve K) Honey bee colony removed immediately from front yard, temple door latches repaired, waxing of Ed Bldg will need to be done when time permits, reserve parking signs made for ADC. Modifying the Yagura roof replacing the pop up tent. Mahalo to those who provide monthly lunch for the Thursday Gang, much appreciated.
- VP Religious & Temple Activities: (Ann I-excused) Distributed updated DS calendar. Amy Nakamura shared a touching dharma talk and showed a Kauai Bon Dance video. Keirokai activity will be on November 3. Approximately 6 members will be honored. Diane Y coordinating a light lunch. Provided names of possible guest speakers to Rev. Kamuro. Dharma School has 24 students, 5 teachers, 2 parent volunteers. Honolulu-Oahu District Nembutsu Seminar—Kagirinaki Ai to Jihi, Infinite Love and Compassion on Oct. 25., Dharma Centered Living 101 on Nov. 10. Dharma Store, good stock of onenjus for sale.
