The Dancing for Joy is in the End Result

Have you ever asked yourself, "Why do I dance during Bon Dance?" It seems like a weird question to ask oneself but go ahead and reflect on that. Is it because you grew up doing it? Is it because your friends do it? Perhaps it's a "cool" thing to do. Or "I JUST WANT TO DANCE!"

Before starting the service up on the yagura on bon dance night, I look out at everyone around the yagura and all around me. I wonder "Why are you guys here?" Bon, from the religious perspective has an interesting background that often times is unknown to those who come to the Bon Dances, so it is a wonder that there is an attitude of "Hurry up and get off, so that we can dance!"

The story of one of the Buddha's closest disciples, Moggallāna is one that we hear time after time this time of year, at Bon. One of Moggallāna's power was to be able to speak to the spirits in the unhappy destinations and explain to their loved ones why they were there and how to help them. It all came too personal for Moggallāna, as he saw his mother in one of those unhappy destinations, however, was unable to help his mother. With the help of the Buddha, Moggallāna was able to help save his mother, and with that he danced for joy. What if that was YOUR mother?



Wouldn't you do anything to save her from spending the rest of eternity in an unhappy destination?

Many of the songs that we dance to, immortalizes the achievements, perseverance, and hardships that our ancestors went through, as many songs are written and have dance movements portraying working in the plantation or in the coal mines, such as the beloved Tanko Bushi, Ashimiji Bushi, and, Fukushima Ondo.

So the end result really is, the dancing for joy is a result of those who

have come before us, and acknowledges their contribution to our lives through their hardships, pain and suffering, and their perseverance and more importantly, the karmic conditions that led to their birth into this world.

So when you enter the ring, ask yourself that question once again, "Why do I dance during Bon Dance?" Remember those who have come before you and think about all the things they did in their lives so that we have the opportunity to live life today. Then and only then does it give meaning and purpose to the "Dance of Joy."

Summary of July 12, 2023 Kyodan Board Meeting

- The Mililani Hongwanji Board of Directors met via ZOOM with a quorum. President June Asato presided.
- Treasurer's Report: (Cliff) Distributed the monthly financial report as of June 30, 2023. At midyear, Actual Expenditures were 44% of Budget and Actual Income was 60% of Budget. Judo Club tuition received. Income from Kumon and ADC continues to provides a major source of funding for the Kyodan. The Bon Dance is expected to bring in additional revenues in August. Premium for Temple Insurance in process for payment.
- Minister's Report: (Rev. Fujimoto) Don't forget to turn off AC, set alarm and lock doors upon leaving. During absence, Rev. Matsumoto will be available. Also attended MHS Gala and Bishop's Aloha Luncheon.
- President's Report: (June) Attended MHS Gala event and Bishop Matsumoto's Aloha Luncheon. Need to start planning (chair needed) for 2024 Sangha Day as Mililani will be host. Green Hongwanji initiatives need to be pursued, more people should bring reusable ware for refreshments. Let June know if you are interested in attending the State Lay Convention in Kona, everyone is encouraged to attend.
- Facilities: (Steven) AED supplies on replacement schedule online, need to have AED placed in strategic location for Bon Dance, good to have more people familiar with use of AED, RING office security system in place, will look into problem with door handle/lock condition.
- Operations: (Kevin) Insurance payment for roof damages still pending, Nominations Committee will start search for potential Board members.
- Religious Activities & Programs: (Brandon) PA speakers delivered and tested by Brandon. OK. Cost charged to CIP funds. Big Dharma School Rally Day planned on August 27. MCs in line for future services. Keirokai planning in progress.
- BWA: (Diane) Requested & got approval to hold a Bazaar in March 2024 after many years of not having one. Warren and Nora Hahn will co-chair the event. Arynn will spearhead another Zippy's Fundraiser beginning September. Members are busy preparing for Bon Country Store and helping with other temple setup for the big event.
- Jr. YBA: (Ty) Successful Jr YBA State Convention hosted by Oahu United. Membership has grown quite a bit since last year. Helping with various temple Bon Dances, will be selling soft drinks at Mililani's Bon Dance.
- Bon Dance: (Cliff) Various committees are progressing well and will be having a general meeting on Wedneday, August 2, 7:00 to tie up any lose ends. Donations to Silent Auction and Country Store are welcome. No facilities use during the week of Bon. Yagura to be painted for added protection. Help needed on July 29th 8:00am to set up Yagura and electrical wiring.
- Approved Actions: To review Mililani/Ewa shared cost for Reverend's salary & benefits package. Next Board ZOOM meeting on August 9, 7:00 pm.


