You Stand Beautifully Above the Muddy Water

A friend and I recently visited a craft fair to which alongside the walking path, was a small little tub with a beautiful purple lotus blossom was growing. It was little, and just sticking out of the water. I was reminded of a meditation verse in which the ending goes something like this.

Your lotus bud begins to grow on top of your stem. It expands and grows larger and larger, finally bursting into full bloom. A lotus flower. You stand beautifully above the muddy water, not dirtied by the mud from which you grow. You are fragrant and beautiful.

Everyone who saw you marveled at your beauty! Your determination to grow out of the muddy pond reminds them of the Buddha and his journey towards Enlightenment. The Buddha, like a lotus, is determined to grow out of the muddy surroundings, that is the defilements and sufferings of life. He has



done all that is to be done and he is showing us that we can all do it too. We may have defilements, but we all have the potential of growing out of our defilements and achieving wisdom, like the Buddha. You are a beautiful lotus flower, and your role is to remind people to rise above their defilements

and sufferings, just as you are arising above the muddy water and not dirtied by the mud from which you grow.

In December, we observe Bodhi Day, the day Prince *Siddhārtha Gautama* became enlightened and became known as *Śākyamuni* Buddha. When I think of the life of *Śākyamuni* Buddha, I often think of a lotus blossom. The Buddha was able to overcome the muddy waters of the defiled mind and achieve enlightenment, this beautiful flower that has its foundations in the muddy water.

In our lives, we are constantly embattled with the muddy waters of our mind. I want this, I want that, me, me, me. However, the Nembutsu Teachings remind us that out of that muddy water, we can rise above and blossom into a beautiful flower.

As we head to the end of the year, let us remember all that we overcame and how much we have risen above the muddy waters. We are several years out of the pandemic now and still getting use to a new "norm". Buddhism teaches us that nothing lasts forever, and we need to change with the times. Next year, we will be celebrating the 800th Anniversary of the Establishment of the *Jōdo Shinshū* Teachings. Here in Hawai'i, we will be having a celebration as a part of our triple celebration, as we celebrate the 800th Birthday of Shinran *Shōnin*, the 800th Anniversary of the Establishment of the *Jōdo Shinshū* Teachings, and the 135th Anniversary of the Honpa Hongwanji Mission of Hawai'i. As we head into this momentous year, let us continue to rise above the muddy waters and be that beautiful lotus blossom.

Twila Castellucci born on November 12, 1941 in San Francisco, California. The only child of Marie and Henry Meyer, Twila grew up with two cousins on her Father's side and 6 cousins on her mother's side. Twila is of German and English-Canadian descent.

Twila lived in a neighborhood that consisted of older adults and for most of her childhood, she had no one to play games with. The only game that Twila played regularly was Solitaire and spent many hours reading!

The most vivid memory of Twila growing up was when Twila's mother took her to visit her family in London, Ontario, Canada. She remembers riding on the train and looking out the window at the sagebrush and distant mountains and also going over the Great Salt Lake. Twila loved being able to meet her aunts, uncles, and cousins! London was very pretty with streets lined with maple trees. The evenings were very warm, so they used to sit out on a veranda and socialize. Over the years, Twila's holidays were especially enjoyed at her father's sister's beautiful home in Burlingame, California where she was able to play with her cousins Ed and Pat.

- 90s and Twila would often visit her when she lived in San Francisco and Burlingame. Her grandmother would tell her about what life was like when she lived in other areas before San Francisco, such as Mountain View, Los Angeles, Tucson, and Silicon Valley which was farmland where they grew apricots and walnuts.

Twila's parents met when they were working in San Francisco. Twila lived on the border of the Sunset and Parkside Districts in San Francisco. Her house was a typical San Francisco house, with a basement, garage on the street level, 2 bedrooms, a living, dining, breakfast room, kitchen, and one bathroom above the ground floor. This area of San Francisco is cold and foggy most of the year, so Twila spent most of her time in her room reading and drawing!

Twila attended Parkside Elementary School, Aptos Junior High School, AP Giannini Junior High School, Lincoln High School, City College of San Francisco, San Francisco State University, and Golden Gate University where she received her Master's degree in Taxation and attended Law School receiving a Doctor of Jurisprudence degree. Twila is also a Certified Public Accountant!

Twila met her husband, Pasquale (Par) while working at the Bank of America working part-time while attending San Francisco State University. They eloped and were married in Carson City Nevada. They have a son named John and a grandson Lewis who visited our temple and also joined us for several activities. Lewis Castellucci was awarded the 2022 BWA Scholarship and sent us a video of him playing "Arigato".

Twila's great-grandfather, Henry Meyer came to Brooklyn in 1848 and opened a grocery store selling Christmas Trees and groceries. Twila's favorite subject was art. This may be where Twila picked up her talents and passion for the arts as her mother's father also an artist, worked at McClary's Foundry, painting pictures on metal plates.

Most of Twila's teachers were grouchy, but her kindergarten teacher Mrs. Mackerty was nice! Twila keeps in touch with one of her best friends living near Sacramento and also has a good friend, JoAnn Shibata who lives in Novato, CA who she worked with at Marin County. They traveled together on the recent BCA Japan tour. JoAnn invited Twila to the Buddhist Temple of Marin where Twila was introduced to Shinran Shonin's teaching and especially likes the Golden Chain of Love. Elaine Weston another good friend of Twila's visits our temple when she comes to Oahu.

Twila's career took her to another bank, First Western Bank where she was held up by a bank robber! She also loved working for Haddon N. Salt (the Fish & Chips man) on his horse farm. A wonderful man with a great family where his father taught Twila music theory and his mother taught her how to play classical guitar. Twila eventually retired from the County of Marin. 
