Back in January, my nephew wanted to go to a local fast food joint for lunch. As we were on our way home, we went through the drive thru. After we ordered, we proceeded to the window to pay and receive our food.

At that time, the managers corralled everyone into a huddle, to which they expressed their appreciation and gratitude for their hard work during the past year and asked for their continued support in the new year. As we waited, one of the managers kept on apologizing to me, but I told her not to worry.

As I listened into the rousing speeches that the managers were giving, one of them mentioned something that at that time, was very profound to me. He had mentioned that he could not be successful unless everyone else was successful.

Okage Sama De expresses that very profound thought. "I am who I am because of you" and "You are who you are because of me." "I can only be successful, only because of you." When I think of that, it reminds me of the very existence of the Buddha. Buddha exists because of sentient being's pain and suffering. No pain and suffering, no need for the Buddha.





Legislative Assembly (Giseikai) Report and Reflections

Together with Rev. David Fujimoto, I was privileged to lead the Mililani Hongwanji Contigent to the 111th HHMH Legislative Assembly from February 9-11, 2023. Other delegates at the Giseikai were Clifford Togo and Rene Mansho. Observers were Kevin Asato and Dean Sakamoto. During that time the Reverend and I had the opportunity to plan out the year.

Rap Session: Takeaways from the Thursday, February 9 rap session with Rev. Bob and Patti Oshita of the Sacramento Buddhist Temple and Pieper Toyama of Jikoen Hongwanji:

- Jodo Shinshu must connect with the mainstream of the world.
 Example: The recognition of the Dalai Lama and the works of the popular late Thich Nhat Hahn.
 Jodo Shinshu is not a "kind of" Buddhism; It is Buddhism. What is Buddhism?
- Defined in these descriptors: Kindness, Gratitude, Impermanence, Interdependence, Compassion
- Use "regular" words when sharing the Dharma (teachings/practice) and define foreign terms that you use.

Plenary Sessions on Friday and Saturday

- The resounding voices of more than 100 voices in the beautiful hondo of the Hawaii Betsuin chanting and singing never ceases to awaken and inspire.
- Linda Nagai (formerly of Mililani Hongwanji and now of Kona Hongwanji and the State President of the BWA) gave an inspirational Welcome Address. Rev. Furusawa delivered the memorial sermon.
- Meeting chaired by President Warren Tamamoto proceeded and spirited discussion was handled efficiently. Reading up on issues and pending legislation showed that our delegation was well prepared.
 Reports are available for those who wish to read them.
- The position of Communications Coordinator to assist overburdened Headquarters Staff was adopted.
- Rev. Toshiyuki Umitani of Moiliili Hongwanji was confirmed to be the Bishop of the Honpa Hongwanji Mission of Hawaii. He gave an excellent acceptance message.
- The budget prepared by the Finance Committee was explained and adopted after spirited discussion.
 Over the past few years, the Hongwanjis have received several thousands of dollars of covid relief funds and the current budget is less than pre-covid budgets. The per capita spending is less than many of the years since 1996.
- Reports from PBA, the Jr. YBA, BWA, Buddhist Study Center, Ministerial Training Committee, Office of Buddhist Education/Commission on Buddhist Education and others were shared.
- The HHMH 2022 Annual Report has a lot of "Vital Statistics" statewide that you might find interesting.
- Retiring Ministers Rev. Richard Tennes and Rev. Arthur Kaufman and Hongwanji volunteer Alan Kubota were recognized for their service.

The Living Treasures Luncheon: Held at the Hilton Hawaiian Village was another elegant and magnificent event.

- The Living Treasures of Hawaii for 2023 are "Pohaku—The foundational element of Hawai'i' s Culture"—Peter T. Young, Frederick S. Nonaka, Hiromi Peterson, Fred K. Cachola Jr. More info on these outstanding individuals can be found at the HHMH website. https://hongwanjihawaii.com
- Rev. David Fujimoto delivered the words of Thanksgiving and his words received accolades among our tablemates who are not Hongwanji members.
- It was nice to mingle with other temple and community members.

Summary of February 8, 2023 Kyodan Board Meeting

- The Mililani Hongwanji Board of Directors met via ZOOM with a quorum. President June Asato presided.
- Treasurer's Report: Cliff Togo distributed first financial report for 2023. Pledge income amounts were large as many members paid their entire dues at the beginning of the year. The Budget & Finance Committee is currently preparing a Proposed Budget and will present it at the next Board meeting in March. Once approved, the Budget Allocation amounts will be inserted in the report. It is anticipated that the amounts for Minister's Salary/Fringe Benefits and HHMH Kyodan Assessments will be increased. Dennis Oshita, Cliff Togo and Stan Sasaki are diligently working on the budget as the HHMH Legislative Assembly (Giseikai) recently approved a new salary schedule for all ministers and formulated temple assessments based on membership. Acknowledged Dennis Oshita, Christine Sato, Aileen Sato, Diane Yoza for stepping up to help in fulfilling some of the office functions Gordon did for decades. Mahalo Gordon!
- Minister's Report: Rev. David Fujimoto attended State Minister's Meeting and Legislative Assembly, a log is now in place for ADC cleaning to meet DOH requirements, martial arts group experiencing increased infections, April & May's memorial service will be on April 2nd due to schedule conflicts. Hanamatsuri Service will be on April 9th.
- President's Report: June Asato continues outreach efforts to KOA Ridge residents, attended Giseikai, coordinated facility users via ZOOM to discuss concerns and issues. Acknowledged work by Baccalaureate and Sangha Day committees.
- VP Facilities: Steven Koito reported that the Business Office split ACs were repaired.
 May need to have all split systems put on a maintenance contract.
- VP Religious Prog: Brandon Hee looking into replacing the temple's PA system and rolling bulletin boards. Planning in process for baccalaureate service/program.
- VP Operations: Kevin Asato looking into temple insurance & columbarium matters
- BWA: Diane Yoza reported 50 members for this year, DANA Day and canned goods drive for Hawaii Foodbank, Spring Luncheon at Mango Grill on April 16, a new lawn mower for Thursday Gang being considered.
- Announcements: Cliff Bon Dance planning will get started soon. Please KOKUA as done
 in the past.
- Acknowledgements: Mahalo to Brandon Hee, Rene Mansho, Rev. David Fujimoto in fulfilling some of the functions done by Dennis Kawamoto on the newsletter mailout. Thank you Dennis!




We will be meeting twice in March--on Sunday, March 19^{th} and Sunday, March 26^{th} . We will share our lesson plans to all our Dharma School families via email.
