Minister's Message

The Golden Rule

"Do unto others what you want others to do unto you" Or stating it in the negative way: "Don't do unto others what you don't want others to do unto you"

Most people are familiar with this saying as the "Golden Rule", a concept that describes a reciprocal or two way relationship between one's self and others that involves both sides equally and in a mutual fashion. The golden rule, with roots in a wide range of world cultures, is well suited to be a standard that different cultures can appeal to in resolving conflicts or misunderstanding and it is endorsed by all the great world religions, including Buddhism. It is often regarded as the most direct and general principle of ethics. All the world's major religions have quotations that state the golden rule, in different words, but nevertheless the meaning is the same. Buddhism has several versions of this ethical statement, among which are: "Hurt not others in ways that you yourself would find hurtful" "Comparing oneself to others in such terms as 'Just as I am so are they, just as they are so am I,' he should neither kill nor cause others to kill." And, a direct quotation from Shakyamuni Buddha Himself: "One should seek for others the happiness one desires for himself."

Perhaps its simplicity is what gives the Golden Rule its universal appeal and acceptance. Unfortunately, due to our blind passions and imperfection as unenlightened beings, the Golden Rule is as often violated as it is practiced. Due to greed, anger, ignorance, pride, jealousy and other forms of poisonous passions, it is an unfortunate reality that the base of human behavior is centered upon the gratification of the self or the ego. Religion or education in ethics and morality may help curb excessive self centered desires but when the right causes and conditions are present, we are capable of inflicting pain and suffering, both physical and emotional, on others to meet the demands of our ego self. The golden rule here doesn't apply, we will do as we please without consideration for the feelings of others.

It is always wise to reflect on the fundamental Buddhist teaching of the law of cause and effect, that we reap the consequences of our actions, wholesome or unwholesome, in one way or another in a future time. The Golden Rule in both its positive and negative affirmation, serves as a useful guide in our actions towards our fellow human beings. To apply it requires us to know what effects our actions have on the lives of others, to be able to imagine ourselves accurately on the other person's place on the receiving end of the acts we do. We like to be respected by others, to be treated with kindness and consideration, so we should do the same. We dislike to be hurt, to be judged unfairly, to be manipulated or controlled maliciously, or our privacy intruded upon, therefore we should strive never to do the same to others. To violate the Golden Rule is going against fairness and concern that lie at the heart of morality.

Welcome to our new minister, Reverend Joshin Kamuro and Family – effective August 1, 2024!

Rev. Joshin Kamuro is from Aso, Kumamoto in southern Japan. He is from a temple family. After graduating from Ryukoku University in Kyoto with the Bachelor's Degree in Shin Buddhist Studies in 2001, he worked at the EKÖ-House of Japanese Culture, a division of BUKKYŌ DENDŌ KYŌKAI (Society for the Promotion of Buddhism) in Düsseldorf, Germany from 2001 to 2006. He returned to Japan in 2007 to further his study at Ryukoku University and completed his Doctoral Program in Shin Buddhist Studies in 2014. He also studied at the Institute of Buddhist Studies in Berkley, California for 11 months in 2009 as an exchange student of Ryukoku University. He participated in the IMOP (International Ministerial Orientation Program) in Berkley, California in 2014. He received *gakkai hokyō* (Nishi Hongwanji's Rank of Shin Buddhist Studies) in 2015 and a *Fukyōshi* (Ministers learn about how to convey the Jōdo Shinshū teachings accurately at the *Dendō-in* consists of 100 days of training) in 2019 from Nishi Hongwanji. He came to Hawaii in October 2015. He worked at the Hawaii Betsuin in Honolulu for about four years. He has worked at the Hilo Betsuin since November 2019, total of 9 years in Hawaii! He and his wife, Minako, who teaches Japanese Language Classes and Calligraphy in Hilo, have their sixteen-year-old son, Yuma, a classical violinist, who will be attending Mililani High School as a Junior, and five-month-old daughter, Nanami. We are blessed to receive the Kamuro Family! We hope they enjoy their fully furnished parsonage prepared with lots of love!

- VP Programs (Ann) Written report submitted, for Religious Services Committee, Dharma School and Education Committee
- BWA (Lani) Written report submitted, Nora and Aileen requesting donations for the parsonage and in need of lunches for the men and women who are repairing and restoring the parsonage. Sharon Kaneko's committee delivered toiletries to the Waianae Coast Comprehensive Health Center. 3 dates: Oct. 26 at Mililani Hongwanji United Annual Conference, Mar. 28-29, 2026, State BWA Conference at Ala Moana Hotel, Sept. 11-12, 2027, World BWA Convention at Hawaii Convention Center.


50th Anniversary Updates and Proposals


<u>Coffee Hour Meet and Greet</u> to Get Your Ideas for the






