WORSHIP NOTES ADVENT & CHRISTMAS 2024

"Prepare the Way"

Overall Theme: Advent is much more than the preparation for Christmas. Advent is the season of preparation for Christ and the advent of the Kingdom of God come into the world once and for all. As we approach 2025 how are we called to prepare the way of the Lord in this time and in this place. This Advent and Christmas, we will be mining the scriptures of the season for keys to preparing the way of the Lord in the coming year. This, we pray, will then lead us into Epiphany and the manifestation (appearance) of Christ to lead us into

the way. Our first Sunday of Advent, we will recognize the weariness we have had on the journey. We recognize the worries of this life that can weigh us down and keep us from moving forward, not to lean into them but rather to ensure they do not get in the way. The second Sunday of Advent we will focus on the importance of connections and how we are not to be solo travelers. The way includes God's desire to gather all people on and in the way. The third Sunday of Advent we will remember to approach the way with curiosity and amazement. The way of the Lord surpasses all understanding and takes us to places we can't even imagine. The fourth Sunday of Advent will lift up the importance of hope grounded in faith. Mary believed their would be a fulfillment and it was this hope that opened her heart to God's fulfillment in Jesus. Christmas Eve will remind us of the importance of place in preparing the way of the Lord. How do we make room in all of our plans and dreams of the coming year for Christ to be in it, or is there no room in the inn. How do we treasure God's Word and make room for it in us as Mary did. The first Sunday of Christmas will remind us of the importance of obedience (intently listening). Jesus listened to the leaders of the synagogue and asked questions. Jesus was rooted in his relationship with the Father and sought his presence in the house of the Lord. We are called to prepare the way of the Lord in 2025. Then, we are called to follow it into Epiphany (appearance) of Christ to lead us on and in the way.

2 ADULT SUNDAY BIBLE STUDIES

The Contemporary Bible Class will be led by Phil and Diana Brooks and Tracey Perez and will cover a variety of topics that include Bible studies as well as books and topics dealing with Christian living.

What do the Medieval saint and anchorite, Julian of Norwich, and contemporary queen of rap, Nicki Minaj, have in common? Join us for the new Contemporary Bible Class starting this Sunday at 9 a.m. to find out.

Facilitated by Tracey Perez, this series will dive into Amy Laura Hall's *Laughing at the Devil: Seeing the World with Julian of Norwich* (no need to purchase or read the book). Hall (Professor of Christian Ethics at Duke Divinity School) engages in personal reflection on the writings of Julian and the similarities between her times and our own. Hall says of Julian: "She wanted people to think, see, sorrow, and laugh at the Devil with her.

This is my invitation . . . to join in this vision."

The Adult Bible Study, led by Joy Cooper, will be a combination of the Ladies and Men's Bible Classes. Their Bible studies will be based on the "Augsburg Adult Bible Studies" series.

Their first topic will be God, Holy Spirit. The aim of these sessions is to examine what the New Testament says about the crucial role of the Spirit in creating the church of God and in nurturing the life of discipleship. The material is by Brian Peterson, who was a member of faculty in Lutheran Theological Southern Seminary in Columbia, SC at the time of this writing.

This class will meet in Room 106 near the sanctuary from 9:00-9:45am Sundays.

COPELAND'S CORNER

What then is Apollos? What is Paul? Servant through whom you came to believe, as the Lord assigned to each. I planted, Apollos watered, but God gave the growth. So neither the one who plants nor the one who waters is anything, but only God who give the growth.

(1 Corinthians 3:5-7)

The Purpose of the Grain is To Produce More Grain The grains purpose is not food, that is how we have repurposed the grain. The function of a grain of wheat is to produce more wheat. The grain of wheat is not meant to stand on its own. It is designed to bear much fruit. In using this analogy, Jesus is reminding us that we also are not designed to preserve ourselves. We also are not designed to stand on our own. We also are designed to bear much fruit by growing the numbers of those identified as children of God.

Falling into the Ground: The culmination of the life of the grain of wheat is its death. A grain of wheat must fall into the ground and die, or it can't fulfill its purpose. Our goal of survival is contrary to this message. Simple survival keeps us from dying, but it also keeps us from our purpose. The purpose is not to die. The purpose is to increase life through and beyond death. Jesus fulfilled his purpose through death to resurrection life, and we are called to do the same.

Losing Our Life To Keep It: Sounds strange, doesn't it? Jesus is saying that to keep our life we need to be willing to lose it. It goes against all our natural instincts of preservation and survival. Yet, that is exactly what Jesus is calling us to do. Faith in the death and resurrection of Christ calls us also to take up our cross. Faith calls us to go against our instincts, and instead of holding on, we are called to let go. By letting go, we die to ourselves and are opened up to the infinite possibilities of life in Christ.

Becoming More Than a Single Grain: We also are not meant to do this by ourselves. All our plans regarding the Encouragement Center, moving the Church Footprint and the development of the Welcome Center require us to let go of St. Luke's as a single grain of wheat and let our own single plans of saving the church fall to the ground, that God can expand the reach and produce more fruit for the glory of the kingdom. We must lose our life in order to keep it for eternal life.

Lord of life, our natural inclination is to hold onto the life we have had. You showed us that this is not the way you intend. You modeled for us the way through death to new life and you call us to follow. Now we ask that you give us the faith to follow in that path. Lead us beyond a narrow vision of survival and preservation and into our true purpose and calling. As we do, take our life and expand it to reach and grow your presence in this time and in this place. Through Jesus Christ, the pioneer and perfecter of our faith we pray. Amen!!!



YWCA's Families Together Program

Latasha's Story - Putting one foot in front of the other

In May 2022, Latasha, a mother of five, had run out of options. After her relationship with the father of her five children ended, she was in need of a path forward. She had been living in a housing program with her family, but due to the breakup, she and her children, aged 4 through 21, had to move out. With nowhere else to go, she moved her family into her mother's living room. She knew she needed to find a path forward, but didn't know where to start. After doing some research, Latasha learned about YWCA's Families Together program. Through this program, YWCA provides safe, affordable housing and intensive support services for families with minor children facing homelessness. Immediately, Latasha knew it was a fit. She had her social worker write her a referral, and soon, she and her children were approved. Finally, there was a glimmer of light on their path forward. When Latasha and her four youngest children moved into one of YWCA's Families Together townhomes, she was overcome with gratitude. "I was grateful that we didn't just have a place to stay, but we had our own kitchen. I had my own bedroom. And YWCA provided everything we needed: bedding, washcloths, towels and more," shared Latasha. Although it had been a difficult period of transition, "It felt like a step in the right direction — a stepping stone," shared Latasha. Now with a safe roof over their heads, Latasha and her family had the time and energy to set and work towards goals with the help of YWCA's Families Together staff. Latasha wanted to achieve financial stability. She needed to save money, provide support and a stable home for her children. And most importantly, she needed to secure permanent housing — a safe place for her and her young children to grow together as a family. The journey to financial stability and permanent housing is not an easy one, but with the support of the Families Together program, Latasha kept putting one foot in front of the other by budgeting, taking classes, and navigating affordable housing waitlists. While seeing the finish line was difficult at first, she gained hope and knowledge by celebrating other families in the Families Together program who had graduated into permanent housing. It opened her mind to what was possible for her and her family, even though she had a long road ahead of her to achieving her goals. After nearly 18 months of hard work and perseverance, Latasha and her children got to experience that same excitement they witnessed in their Families Together neighbors. They were approved for Section 8 housing, thanks to YWCA's partnership with Inlivan, and moved out of Families Together this past January — graduating from the program into permanent housing. "This part felt really far away when I first started the program," shared Latasha, but thanks to the one-on-one support she received in the program, "I knew it was reachable." Now, a few months later, Latasha and her children have settled into their new home. Her children were able to stay in the same school district, able to avoid the uprooting that happens when young students transfer schools. And as Latasha reflects on her journey, she's looking forward to the future, too. Today, Latasha is working towards bigger goals — like improving her financial stability and her career. She wants to eventually become a social worker or work in the human services field, and to be able to give back and support others who have walked her same path. She was even able to take classes in human services and case management while in YWCA's program. "I've come so far from my first day when I moved into YWCA. I feel like a different person!" The future is bright for Latasha and her children, and YWCA is so proud to have played a role in their story.

PREPARING THE WAY 2025 ALIGNING TO THE WAY OF THE LORD

As was shared in the Congregational Meeting on November 17th, God is revealing a path forward for St. Luke's.

In the meeting, you heard:

Shared Leadership Encouragement Center and Congregation: Instead of searching for a full-time pastor for the congregation and a full time Director to develop the Encouragement Center, it was proposed we explore a shared pastoral position with clearly defined duties and focus. The Pastor called would be charged with developing the Encouragement Center part time and part time care for the congregation in terms of worship and pastoral care. The mission would be the Encouragement Center and the shared pastor position would create a connection to the existing congregation.

Synodical Guidance: Danielle DeNise, who is the Director of Evangelical

Mission for the NC Synod spoke with the council in November. She is the one who proposed the Shared Leadership vision based on experience she has had in the synod and connections throughout the ELCA. Danielle was very excited about this possibility and has offered to connect us with funding resources and guidance in developing the position clearly. When asked if she thought anyone would be interested, she indicated that something like this (well defined) would be appealing to her and anyone like her who love to build community and mission as well as serve a congregation.

SO WHAT DOES THIS MEAN FOR THE TRANSITION? MOVING FROM TRANSITION TO SEARCH IN 2025

February Congregational Meeting: Work will be going on over the next couple of months with Danielle's guidance. We will be working to bring to the congregation:

- **Funding Sources for Encouragement Center:** Without this funding, the Encouragement Center will not have a runway long enough to get off the ground before the funding runs out of the congregation. These sources, especially loans, need congregational approval.
- **Clearly Defined Position Description for Shared Leadership:** Also with Danielle's guidance, we will be developing documents that clearly lay out the responsibilities of this shared position so that it is attractive but not overwhelming. This needs to be approved by the congregation before any search can take place. They also give clarity to the MSP (Ministry Site Profile) that will need to be developed. We need to be clear on what is needed and expected before the search.

Prayerful Process to Identify Call Committee: In January, we will send something out to the congregation requesting nominations for consideration to serve on the Call Committee. The council will meet in late January or early February in prayerful process to identify and contact those being considered. This Call Committee needs to be representative of the diverse voices of the congregation, spiritually centered and play well together. Watch for more information coming out.

Writing Process MSP (Ministry Site Profile): A Writing Team will be formed to take all that has been gathered in our original work and the defined description to draft the Resume of the Church. Once it is written by the team, it will be shared with the congregation and Synod for review and suggestions. The final draft will then be submitted to the council. Once approved, it is posted for search.

Training of Call Committee: The Synod is responsible for the training. Danielle has suggested that she might be able to have one of her Director of Evangelical Mission Colleagues to train the Call Committee to help them focus on the unique search they will be engaging.

Search Begins: Once the MSP is online and the Call Committee is trained, the search begins. ***This will probably be by or after Easter. This of course is when more candidates will start to become available and it is a good time***

to search (Easter – Summer).

Getting the Congregation Ready: The time between when the search begins and the issuing of a call is a time of aligning the congregation and preparing the way for the Encouragement Center.

WHAT ABOUT THE WELCOME CENTER PLANS?

The Welcome Center is made up of three different projects:

- The Driveway (Circular Drive and accessible entry)
- The Sanctuary (Handicap Access bathroom, JM Welcome Center, seating, etc)
- The Community Center (Room in the Inn showers and community space)

These projects will become more of a focus as the Encouragement Center takes the weight off the congregation and these other areas can be a focus for legacy and memorial giving along with fundraising and grants. The Welcome Center Fund is ready to receive any gifts toward this vision. ***You can give to a particular project or simply to the Welcome Center Fund and it will be used wherever needed as the projects move forward.***

CONVERSION PEWS TO CHAIRS INVITATION TO CONVERSATION

All of the movements we are exploring, including renovations to the sanctuary entry and seating are not for our past needs or even our present. The changes being explored are in anticipation and hope of future church. We are getting it ready for the next generation of St. Luke's to live, worship and grow in faith and community. To that end, there have been two key factors that have been central to the plans being developed. **Those key factors are Accessibility and Flexibility.**

Pews have been an important part of worship for generations before. Pews, however, are bolted to the floor and are immovable fixtures. As accessibility and flexibility are key factors, a conversation has begun regarding the wisdom of converting our sanctuary from pews to chairs. Here is the rationale:

- **Pews already Removed in Front Space:** The purpose was to create flexibility. In our current setting, however, it has put distance between the people and the worship leadership. Moving the congregation closer will bring a closer sense of community that is very important in this time.
- **Pew Cushions Need Replacing:** No matter what, the pew cushions need being replaced. Before we put money into that, it is good to consider the alternatives of chairs.
- **Flooring Will Need Replacement:** The Current flooring will need to be replaced when the space is moved forward. Chairs do not need to be bolted to the new flooring, where pews would.
- **Flexibility of Space:** The area that would become the Welcome Center could be easily opened up to expand space for large events. The area can be easily expanded or tightened up with chairs rather than pews.

This is only initial conversation but the team working with the Architect would love your feedback, questions and suggestions.

I can hardly believe that another year has come and gone already and it's almost Christmastime again! I was kindly reminded that Christmas was here by the Fresh Market guys who had little Christmas trees outside their store the week before Halloween! It's been an eventful Fall so far since I went through my cardiac ablation in late September which got my heart back in rhythm, but then I got stranded in the mountains in early October when hurricane Hellene came through while I attempted to recuperate from that, and then in early

November my arthritic right hip started acting up and so now I'm having to use a cane to get around with the great likelihood of another hip replacement in my near future.
