

WORSHIP NOTES THROUGH AUGUST

As The Father Has Sent Me

Overall Theme: Jesus appeared to the disciples who were hiding behind locked doors for fear of the world outside those doors. Jesus gave them peace. This peace was not as the world gives peace. Then Jesus breathed on them. He told them, "As the Father has sent me, so I send you." We discover Jesus' mission not just in the "what" of his actions but the "how" of his life. It is found in the depth of his character. Jesus was sent into the world to represent the character of God through his life, death, and resurrection. Likewise, he sent the disciples and now sends

us by virtue of our baptism into Christ to embody that character in our lives and time. Pentecost is considered the Birthday of the Church as we celebrate the gift of the Holy Spirit. In these next several months we are going to mine the scripture for the Character of God. In doing so, we will reflect on how this should impact our character we put out into the world. Using the categories identified by Dr. James Merritt in his book "Character Still Counts," we will seek to align our character so that as the Father sent Jesus into the world, we will now go in the same way.

COPELAND'S CORNER

For everything there is a season, and a time for every matter under heaven: (Ecclesiastes 3:1)

Ecclesiastes reminds us that seasons were built into the creation. We are now in the season of Summer. This season provides us time for matters we might not have time to attend to in other seasons. It is a time we might find for vacations and travel. It is a time many can experience rest and renewal. It is a time for connecting with family often disconnected by the busyness of the other seasons. I pray this summer provides opportunity and time for things you may not have had time for in other seasons.

In this summer season, I invite you to **consider taking time to also connect with God in a closer and more intimate way**. I invite you to consider using this time for personal reflection on who you are and what you would like to do differently when activity and demands pick up. This is also a season for the church to explore things we might not have the time to do during the busy programmatic demands of the other seasons. During this season we will be **working on administration and recordkeeping** that includes ongoing work of changing our church management and financial management systems. We will also begin membership review.

Summer is an important season for reflecting on where we have been but also planning for where we are going in the upcoming seasons. The Transition Team is working on developing an opportunity with our young families to engage and listen regarding their hopes and dreams for the future of St. Luke's Lutheran. In August plans are being made for a celebration of the journey (Heritage and History) of this congregation to this point. In September there will be aprocess designed to identify the verb (action) and noun (focus) of SLLC.

There is a lot of work also taking place during the summer to**explore the future direction of the congregation and facility** in a way that leads to not only sustainability but also renewed energy and mission. God is providing options and resources not previously known in this search. Watch for more of these exciting developments. All of this is leading to recommendations for the congregation to prayerfully consider and decide sometime in the late fall.

Your continued prayer and support for the congregation is still needed as we engage this season and prepare for the seasons yet to come. Let us pray together:

God of all seasons, we give you thanks for this season of summer. We dedicate this season and all seasons to you. Use this season to draw us closer in relationship to you and to those with whom we are blessed to share this journey. Renew us and make us ready for the seasons yet before us. During the event, attendees were provided valuable information about Synod core values, the many outstanding ministries led by the synod staff, as well as providing the setting for budget proposals, voting for several Synod positions and resolutions.

St. Luke's Lutheran Church was represented by Jan Brauer, Terri Wells and Pastor Keith Copeland.

FLOWER CHART IN THE NARTHEX



NEXT STEP IN TRANSISTION PROCESS

As things kick up in the fall, so will we on this transition journey.

Here are some things to look for:

August Celebration of Heritage: Plans are in process to make August a celebration of the journey and stories of SLLC throughout the years. It is important to remember and celebrate all that has brought us this far. We give thanks for the saints that have led the way. It is the same God that began this good work who will continue to bring it forward.

September – "Finding the Verb Process": Rob Bell in his book **"Love Wins"** stated that "everything around us is a noun. It takes a verb to make a noun dance." We are going to discover the action of this congregation and the noun we would seek to dance with.

The statement is:

The Mission of St. Luke's Lutheran Church is to _____ God's ____.

The fun will be filling the blanks together.

We will do this by:

- Future Story Home Gatherings: There will be six gatherings at different times and in different homes during September to share imagination for the future.
- Finding the Verb Congregational Event: Following worship we will gather to identify the Verb and Noun of the congregation followed by lunch together.
- **Council Elements Meeting:** The council will take some time to identify three elements that guide the dance between the verb and noun.

All of this is included in the Ministry Site Profile which describes the congregation to the synod and potential pastoral candidates.

ADMINISTRATION UNDER CONSTRUCTION

During the summer months, there is work on making our administration clearer and more efficient. There have been some changes in our staffing model as well.

Here are a few of the things being addressed in our administration:

Change from Realm Church Management to Breeze (Tithely All Access)

- Much cheaper and easier to use for current church situation.
- Online Giving Platform is much easier to learn and use.
- Volunteer Management and Engagement is much more helpful.
- All Access Package Special Pricing with many products to help the church and

special pricing for ELCA on package and fees

Change from Realm Accounting to QuickBooks Online By End of the Year

- Much cheaper
- Industry Standard making it easier to find potential staff in future
- Makes it easier to work remotely.
- Direct connect with Breeze online giving (no double entry)

Counting Process and Recording of Giving

- Offering will be counted by Teams on Sunday Morning (Began in June)
- Ami will input the records in Breeze

These changes in management are being rolled out in a way that we hope will cause the least amount of disruption. We are building the new system, making sure it matches with Realm and operates efficiently before moving out of Realm. It will require double entry for a short period of time but is important to make sure things go smoothly. Watch for more information coming about Online Giving and other benefits from the changeover.

SLLC FACILITY & FUTURE PLANS

At the beginning of the year, the council made a promise to the congregation to return with estimates on two proposals being considered to sell all or part of the facility. Since that time, there has been a new opportunity being discussed with the potential for the church to retain ownership of the property but place it under management of a not for profit. This not for profit would manage the facility for use by a cooperative of not for profits as well as other community activities. This opportunity is being explored in three focus areas:

Focus One: What and How to Develop the Not-for-Profit Management?

- Working with UNC Greensboro Classes
- Feasibility Study and Business Plan Development
- Manage a Cooperative of Not for Profit and Community Activities

Focus Two: What needs to be done to prepare for this?

- Building Needs
- Salary for Executive Director
- Other Costs

Focus Three: Consolidating the presence of St. Luke's in the building.

- Move offices closer to the sanctuary.
- Clarify needs of congregation for space now and for growth.

Lots of research and conversation is going into these three focus areas. As we do, there are resources we did not anticipate prepared to help. God is leading this! Our task is simply to be prepared to step forward with God's plan. We are not standing still but we are also on God's timeline.

No decisions will be made without the consent of the congregation. Please pray for this season of discovery and then get ready to prayerfully discern together.

MEMBERSHIP REVIEW

The Church Rolls are more than names on a page. They represent a relationship and responsibility. The process of review is more than taking names off the rolls. It is an opportunity for clearly defining that relationship and responsibility of the congregation to each other. It is important in the call process for anyone coming to have a clear idea of who SLLC is. This process will be done transparently.

We will be asking for the help of the congregation in this review.

FROM TOM AINSWORTH

I'm confused. When I was in law school we were taught in both Evidence and Trial Procedure classes never to ask a question of a witness you don't already know the answer to. Sage advice since you don't want some unexpected answer to come back and bite you in the ass! Example #1 -- Lawyer's question to his client in a divorce decree proceeding: "Mrs. Client, after you and your husband separated from each other, when was the last time you had sexual relations?" Client's answer to her lawyer: "Why Mr. Lawyer, don't you remember? It was an hour ago in your office before we came here to court!" On the other hand, we're constantly being told in countless classroom discussions, work meetings and instructional seminars, "Don't be afraid to ask questions, that's how you learn-- there are no stupid questions!" Hmmmmm, I'm not so sure about that. Example #2 -- An American tourist is driving his rental car, hopelessly lost in the middle of rural Ireland, with a road map of the country in his lap, trying to figure out how to get to Dublin. He arrives at a small village and spies an elderly man sipping his ale at a table outside of a local pub, and figures that this guy should be able to tell him. He pulls up, gets out, approaches the gentleman and asks "Excuse me sir, can you tell me the fastest way to get to Dublin?" The old man thinks for a while and then asks the American "Are you walking or driving?" The tourist looks puzzled, and says "Driving of course!" The old man replies "Well, that IS the fastest way." Obviously these two situations are different, but each bears the same lesson -- make sure the question you're asking is phrased in a way to get the answer you are looking for. Don't get angry or frustrated with the wrong answer, since you asked the question and in both examples the answers are actually correct. Learning to ask a question in the right way ends confusion.

2023 SUMMER READING PLAN


Join folks all across the synod as we read the Bible together—individuals, congregations, small groups— using the 2023 Summer Bible Reading Plan: Genesis Generations!
