Worship Notes Lent to Easter 2025 "About To Do A New Thing"

Overall Theme: Lent literally means "spring". Spring comes after what can seem like the long winter season. It is a season that focuses on new growth. Isaiah 43 speaks to the people of Israel with words of hope. The prophet is conveying to the people who had waited, that God's new action was immenant. God was about to do a new thing. During this journey of lent, we are going to mine the scripture for God's word of immenant hope and encouragement for this congregation. As God calls us out of the long winter, how do we receive the spring that God is sending. We will first remember that this new spring is still planted on the foundation of many generations. It will be nourished and grow out of the same soil. This new thing is also Spirit led. We are reminded that this new thing requires solid roots in order to stand firm. There are things that may test us beyond our strength, but God is the one who provides the way through and will bring about what God proposes. It is important to recognize that this new thing is a new creation. We are to look upon this new creation with new perspective. We do this by not focusing on our memory of former things, but instead, stay attuned to this new thing God is doing. "God is about to do a new thing. Do you perceive it?" This Lent as we enter into spring, let us get ready for the surprising new life God has set before us.

And he sanctified Jesse and his sons and invited them to the sacrifice. When they came, he looked on Eliab and thought, "Surely the Lord's anointed is before the Lord, but the Lord said to Samuel, "Do not look on his appearance or on the height of his stature, because I have rejected him; for the Lord does not see as mortals see; they look on the outward appearance, but the Lord looks on the heart. (1 Samuel 16:5b-7)

God Does Not See The Way We See: St. Luke's is entering the Call Process and beginning the search for not only the next pastor but also the person who will lead the new entity known as the Encouragement Center. It is essential that the process seek God's vision. Many have participated either as a candidate for a job or as the one in search. What makes this call process different than simply filling a position. We have seen what can happen when we view this process as simply hiring. The Committee and congregation may get what we think we want, but we end up without what we ultimately need. We need God's call to be discerned, not simply a position filled. How then do we discern God's vision and not our own?

Looking From a Human Perspective: Left to our own vision, we will search for what we want. Generally, what humans want is what they already know and are familiar with. They look from the outside based upon experience and opinion. They view criteria that is visible but never search below the surface. In terms of searching for a pastor, this often means falling back on the way it was done before. The past is always 2020. The future, however, requires inquiry into deeper things. Looking from a human perspective is easy but can often put us out of step with God's will and vision.

Discerning Is Searching for God's Vision: It takes longer and involves deeper inquiry. It depends on prayer and conversation with God and with others. It requires laying aside personal agenda and genuinely inquiring as to God's. Samuel waited to anoint the one until God made it clear that David was the one. David was not the obvious choice, but he was God's choice, and that is key.

The Lord's Anointed Is Before The Lord: The task of the Call Process is to find what God has already appointed. To do this, the Call Committee was carefully and prayerfully chosen. They have all agreed to serve. In preparation for this discernment, they will spend significant time in prayer together. Each will come with their own view, but together they will be able to see God's view.

The congregation and the leadership of the church needs to trust this team in their discernment and pray for them as well.

Let us pray....God of all wisdom and insight, you can see far more than we can perceive or even imagine. You have guided St. Luke's to this time and you have already provided the next leader. With open hearts and minds, we pray for the Call Committee. Help them to truly discern your will and direction. Bind them together and then lead them by your Spirit to choose as you would have them to do. Then Lord, open the eyes of the Council and Congregation, that they also may see through your eyes and receive your anointed future. In Jesus name we pray. Amen!!!!

CONGREGATIONAL MEETING SUMMARY

Thank you to all who participated in the very full and fruitful congregational meeting. The conversation was full and the decisions were monumental. Below is a summary of what was accomplished:

- Received Annual Reports
- Approved the Constitution and Bylaws through a 2nd Vote
- Elected Representatives to NC Synod Assembly
- Introduced the Call Committee
- Approved the Position Description Pastor/Director Encouragement Center
- Received Architectural Drawings for the Jan McCoy Welcome Center Project, approved the Scope and established the Funds for Gifts
- Approved the Memorandum of Use between the NFP Encouragement Center and the Congregation
- Requested to be Included in the ELCA Group Exception in order to establish the Not for Profit Encouragement Center.
- Approved the CPI Security Proposal, entering a lease for the equipment and putting the monitoring under the Encouragement Center

With these decisions made, the congregation can now move forward toward the future God is laying out before us.

CALL COMMITTEE

Call Committee Introductions: After prayerful and careful consideration, the council made contacts to extend the call to serve on this important committee that will search for the next spiritual leader of the congregation and develop the new mission of the Encouragement Center. By God's grace we have six members who have agreed to serve. They are:

Each week during Lent, there will be a spotlight on one of these members. A picture, bio and short answers will be sent in an email.

Organizational Meeting March 2nd: The Call Committee will gather after worship to organize for the work of discernment before them. They will elect leadership that consists of:

- Chair: This leader will help to ensure the process is done well. They will
 work closely with the NC Synod Call Process Coordinator. The chair will
 call the meetings and facilitate the conversation.
- **Secretary:** The Secretary is responsible for all communication between the Call Committee members. The conversation is confidential and not recorded. Once the Call Committee chooses a primary candidate, the secretary makes sure all documents are filled out appropriately.
- Chaplain: As this is a discernment process to discover the will of God, being prayerful and spiritually centered is essential. The Chaplain will make sure God is central in the conversation.

Group Building and Preparation: The weeks leading up to installation of the Call Committee on Easter will be spent building relationship and unity as a team in preparation for the search. While this is taking place the Ministry Site Profile will be developed, engaged and ultimately approved.

Ministry Site Profile: Writing will begin on the Ministry Site Profile (The Resume of the Church). This will utilize what was gathered in the earlier transitional process work and that which is being presented at the Congregational Meeting. Once drafted it will be shared with the Synod and Congregation for feedback. A final draft will be presented to the council for approval. A team of 4 made up of Call Committee and Transition Team Members will shepherd this conversation through to presentation.

Installation of Call Committee on Easter Sunday: The Call Committee will be installed on Easter Sunday.

Much of what the training involves will be done by the time the committee is installed. The only other activity being discussed is having a mock interview prior to engaging candidate conversation.

VOTING MEMBERS NC SYNOD ASSEMBLY

We often speak of the Synod as them. Synod, however, means "walking together". We are the synod. Sending voting members is our participation in the larger church in helping make key decisions. This year is a big one as to the importance of the decisions. In this assembly, the following are being considered:

- Election of a Bishop
- Election of Vice President
- Decisions that Guide the Work of the Synod

Please pray our Synod Assembly, our Voting Members and all gathered for these important decisions. As we have prayed for discernment with regard to call, we pray the same for the larger church.

Pray Also For ELCA National Church Assembly This Summer: As we are electing a Bishop for the NC Synod Assembly, we also will be electing a new Bishop for the ELCA. Please pray for this gathering and all getting ready to engage all that will be considered.

CONVERSION PEWS TO CHAIRS INVITATION TO CONVERSATION

All of the movements we are exploring, including renovations to the sanctuary entry and seating are not for our past needs or even our present. The changes being explored are in anticipation and hope of future church. We are getting it ready for the next generation of St. Luke's to live, worship and grow in faith and community. To that end, there have been two key factors that have been central to the plans being developed. **Those key factors are Accessibility and Flexibility.**

Pews have been an important part of worship for generations before. Pews, however, are bolted to the floor and are immovable fixtures. As accessibility and flexibility are key factors, a conversation has begun regarding the wisdom of converting our sanctuary from pews to chairs. Here is the rationale:

- Pews already Removed in Front Space: The purpose was to create flexibility. In our current setting, however, it has put distance between the people and the worship leadership. Moving the congregation closer will bring a closer sense of community that is very important in this time.
- Pew Cushions Need Replacing: No matter what, the pew cushions need being replaced. Before we put money into that, it is good to consider the alternatives of chairs.
- Flooring Will Need Replacement: The Current flooring will need to replaced when the space is moved forward. Chairs do not need to be bolted to the new flooring, where pews would.
- Flexibility of Space: The area that would become the Welcome Center could be easily opened up to expand space for large events. The area can be easily expanded or tightened up with chairs rather than pews.

This is only initial conversation but the team working with the Architect would love your feedback, questions and suggestions.

ST. LUKE'S WOMEN'S CIRCLES

No description of our church would be complete without including the activities and service projects of our women's circles. We have two circles presently active at St. Luke's: the Katharina Circle and the Anna Vee Circle. Both meet on the first Tuesday of the month. The Anna Vee Circle meets at noon at the church, and the Katharina Circle meets in the evenings at members' homes. Both groups provide encouragement and support for their members, as well as service to our church and community. For example, these two groups make up the Bereavement Committees that provide receptions for all of the funerals at St. Luke's for our members. We also are sometimes requested to serve refreshments at special events, workshops, etc. Each circle plans its own activities and ways that we can achieve St. Luke's mission to share God's love. Here's a description of each group's projects for the year 2024.

KATHARINA CIRCLE

Our Circle strives to do a service project every month, in addition to sharing the prayers and praises of our members in order to support each other. We began the year by acting as the Host Team for Room in the Inn and cooking and serving a delicious dinner and breakfast to our homeless neighbors. Later, at the end of the season, our members washed all of the blankets and pillow covers used this year for the RITI program. We sent Valentine's cards to our shut-in members, cooked a total of 45 meals for the Hospitality House (2) meetings), hosted St. Luke's potluck breakfast on Easter Sunday, and had two meetings to design and make jewelry to donate to the Assistance League Thrift Shop to provide funds for their outreach. We cleaned the greenway near Sharon Road West, made plans for St. Luke's annual Fall Women's Retreat at LutherRock (cancelled because of Helene), and donated \$250 to Lutheran Disaster Relief. In the fall, we donated school supplies to Classroom Central, made bookmarks for Promising Pages (a group donating books to children to encourage literacy), created 42 fall baskets for senior citizens in Elder Orphan Care, Concord, and donated \$100 to LutherRock for their recovery efforts. In the Christmas season we put up the St. Luke's Minis-tree to collect monetary gifts for 3 of our ministries (RITI, Pastor's Discretionary Fund, and Mission Possible (prison ministry). Thanks to the wonderful support of the congregation, we raised \$630 for these ministries. We donated 36 books, plus sleeping bags, and socks to the YWCA Youth Program for their Winter celebration and helped facilitate the Christmas Pageant program at Circle of Friends (an organization for disabled adults) to remind us of the true meaning of Christmas. In addition to these service projects, we also took a spring beach trip, a family pool party, two dinners out together, and a Christmas Party. A combination of work and play makes us a close and happy group! Now we're planning for another active year in 2025.

ANNA VEE CIRCLE

The ladies of the Anna Vee Circle (mostly retired, empty nesters) enjoy getting together for lunch in the church conference room at noon on the first Tuesday each month from September through May. Our December meeting was a Christmas celebration at Trio's restaurant.

Besides the encouragement and support we give each other our meetings include a devotion/Bible Study for spiritual growth.

We support our church and community in various ways.

An offering is collected each month and passed on to different charities. In 2024, we collected \$1,751.00. \$1,000 was sent to Nourish Up (formerly Loaves & Fishes); \$800 went to Lutheran Disaster Relief. And ten percent of our annual contributions goes to the NC Synod. We donated 6 Stanley water bottles to the collection that St. Luke's gave to Grace Lutheran in Boone after the devastation caused by Hurricane Helene.

Each month the ladies collect specific items which are donated to a ministry (e.g. canned goods for Nourish Up; socks, paper goods, toiletries for a group home or RITI, etc.)

And each month that we meet we send personalized greeting/birthday/holiday cards to our homebound members and those on our prayer list.

In December we organized, prepared, and served a spaghetti dinner to our Room in the Inn guests and volunteers. We also furnished breakfast and a bag lunch for our guests.

They were assisted by St. Luke's Ryan McCall and Sofia Merritt. We are so thankful that Unity has chosen to partner with us in this important mission.

After the meal our guests had showers, assisted by Julie Bartlett and Phil Brooks, and settled in for the evening. Our overnight hosts were Vanessa Infanzon and Tracy Moore. They handled the evening needs until "lights out." The next morning they had a busy schedule getting our guests up, storing the cots and tv, stripping the cots, providing breakfast, and escorting our guests to the van. On their way out they were given lunches provided by Fancita Lorimer. After our guests left, Vanessa and Tracy returned all the drink equipment to storage, locked all cabinets and closets, and took the laundry upstairs for pick up. It's a big job, and we appreciate their dedication.

It was another successful RITI event, and we are so grateful to the large group of people who work to make it possible. It is a wonderful way to welcome and share God's love and has such a positive impact on the lives of the people we serve. Our last RITI for the season will be March 23rd. Please put it on your calendar. There will be no host team providing food items and serving. It is open to all members of St. Luke's and Unity to volunteer. Please support our last day of service.

In addition we would like to thank all members of St. Luke's who generously donated clothing items and supplies for our inventory. A special thanks to the Anna Vee Circle for using us as one of their monthly projects. We presently have no more needs . Thank you St. Luke's for your giving hearts and for your support of Room in the Inn. Phil & Diana Brooks

I may be alienating some people when I write that the mindless carnage in Washington of government agencies by the firing of their employees by this present Administration, and the access to private citizen information by an unelected, uncaring and thoughtless billionaire and his teenage hacking entourage getting access to those government records by the unmonitored scrutiny of their databases, makes me actually despair of decent humanity. Yet aside from the political decimation of our Constitutional rights as I see it, I have indeed found surprising evidence of decent humanity in my life. As many of you know, I have been on crutches for the last several months awaiting the scheduling of right hip replacement surgery which I need badly. I went through the same process four years ago with the left hip with wonderful results after the procedure. Now the right hip has decided that IT wants the same treatment (typical joint jealousy)! Just walking on crutches is hard enough, but obstacles like doors, stairs and crowds make it truly exasperating sometimes. But I have been amazed at the number of times recently that random strangers have kindly opened doors for me, helped me up stairs and opened paths for me in crowded places. They ask me if they can help get my grocery bags to my car after trips to the supermarket; they offered in my apartment elevator to carry my bundles to my door for me; they have offered to help me on with my jacket; and have assisted in getting packages to my car from my office. I have even been kindly offered meals to help me after my operation when it actually happens. At those times when I really don't need their help they offer it anyway, and I feel badly that I didn't let them help me somehow! Their patience is also overwhelming because several kind people have held a door open for me at the top of some stairs when I haven't even scaled them yet, which process can take minutes. Their unsolicited kindness by their willingness to help out a stranger they deem "in distress" is truly inspiring. These actions genuinely validate my idea that most people are essentially, and sincerely, good in character (like dogs, only with opposable thumbs). Their basic nature is to try and help to assist others they have never met when they believe that their help is needed. I think that this is a basic human instinct which is ingrained in us all and hard to suppress. You need look no further than considering the enormous number of people from outside the area who are helping the citizens of western North Carolina recover from the destruction of Hurricane Helene, or the countless strangers volunteering to aid the victims of the Los Angeles wildfires. The kindness shown to me on a much smaller scale reinforces that belief. Some people may have apparently lost that instinct but the vast majority who haven't give me optimism for the general decency of humanity. Individuals who don't exhibit these empathetic traits should justly be scorned in my opinion, or at least avoided. I love the sweatshirt which Linus has worn in the Peanuts[™] comic strip which says "I love humanity; it's people I can't stand!" That validly sums up at least to me the idea that the vast majority of us still have common decency and will help others to the best of our ability even when the events we encounter in the news seem to imply otherwise.





















































