The Liturgy of the Word

The Lessons

First Lesson: Exodus 14:19-31

The angel of God who was going before the Israelite army moved and went behind them; and the pillar of cloud moved from in front of them and took its place behind them. It came between the army of Egypt and the army of Israel. And so the cloud was there with the darkness, and it lit up the night; one did not come near the other all night. Then Moses stretched out his hand over the sea. The Lord drove the sea back by a strong east wind all night, and turned the sea into dry land; and the waters were divided. The Israelites went into the sea on dry ground, the waters forming a wall for them on their right and on their left. The Egyptians pursued, and went into the sea after them, all of Pharaoh's horses, chariots, and chariot drivers. At the morning watch the Lord in the pillar of fire and cloud looked down upon the Egyptian army, and threw the Egyptian army into panic. He clogged their chariot wheels so that they turned with difficulty. The Egyptians said, "Let us flee from the Israelites, for the Lord is fighting for them against Egypt." Then the Lord said to Moses, "Stretch out your hand over the sea, so that the water may come back upon the Egyptians, upon their chariots and chariot drivers." So Moses stretched out his hand over the sea, and at dawn the sea returned to its normal depth. As the Egyptians fled before it, the Lord tossed the Egyptians into the sea. The waters returned and covered the chariots and the chariot drivers, the entire army of Pharaoh that had followed them into the sea; not one of them remained. But the Israelites walked on dry ground through the sea, the waters forming a wall for them on their right and on their left. Thus the Lord saved Israel that day from the Egyptians; and Israel saw the Egyptians dead on the seashore. Israel saw the great work that the

LORD did against the Egyptians. So the people feared the Lord and believed in the Lord and in his servant Moses.

Second Lesson: Romans 14:1-12

Welcome those who are weak in faith, but not for the purpose of quarreling over opinions. Some believe in eating anything, while the weak eat only vegetables. Those who eat must not despise those who abstain, and those who abstain must not pass judgment on those who eat; for God has welcomed them. Who are you to pass judgment on servants of another? It is before their own lord that they stand or fall. And they will be upheld, for the Lord is able to make them stand. Some judge one day to be better than another, while others judge all days to be alike. Let all be fully convinced in their own minds. Those who observe the day, observe it in honor of the Lord. Also those who eat, eat in honor of the Lord, since they give thanks to God; while those who abstain, abstain in honor of the Lord and give thanks to God. We do not live to ourselves, and we do not die to ourselves. If we live, we live to the Lord, and if we die, we die to the Lord; so then, whether we live or whether we die, we are the Lord's. For to this end Christ died and lived again, so that he might be Lord of both the dead and the living. Why do you pass judgment on your brother or sister? Or you, why do you despise your brother or sister? For we will all stand before the judgment seat of God. For it is written, "As I live, says the Lord, every knee shall bow to me, and every tongue shall give praise to God." So then, each of us will be accountable to God.

For in these last days you sent him to be incarnate from the Virgin Mary, to be the Savior and Redeemer of the world. In him, you have delivered us from evil, and made us worthy to stand before you. In him, you have brought us out of error into truth, out of sin into righteousness, out of death into life.

On the night before he died for us, our Lord Jesus Christ took bread; and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, and said, “Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me.”

We are so excited to announce that a new version of Sunday School will return in September. We've designed three programs that will nurture your child's faith while keeping everyone safe.

Godly Play: Preschool –2nd grade

Our youngest parishioners start building a strong faith foundation with the sacred stories and language of our faith. We've recorded in-house Godly Play story videos that we'll email to you weekly with parent pages to guide you. In addition, we created a Godly Play Story Library. You can borrow full sets of the Godly Play story materials so your children can work with the stories at home.

Living the Good News: 3rd grade - 6th grade

Older elementary age children are ready to build upon their faith foundation and expand their knowledge of our faith. This group is planning fellowship and fun – safe, outdoor gatherings to stay connected. Advent also provides *Bridges to the Good News* which follows the lectionary so it helps kids understand the week's readings and sermon. This weekly guide also gives suggestions for prayers, discussions and activities that families can do together.

God, Church, and Me: Youth 6th-12th

Covenant for Outdoor In-Person Services during Covid Pandemic

It is not fair to ask our ushers to be enforcers of these guidelines. **Everyone** must work to lower the risk of catching or spreading this infection. PLEASE, adhere to these guidelines. The following guidelines will be strictly enforced:

-) To ensure physical distancing, eight-foot diameter circles will be provided for parishioners to sit in. Each circle will be separated from the other “seating circles” by at least six feet.
-) All parishioners over the age of two must wear a mask, fully covering their mouth & nose, at all times while on church property, even when in your own “seating circle”.
-) Only parishioners from the same family may be seated together in a “seating circle”.
-) Parishioners should not sing during the service. However, humming is allowed.
-) Parishioners must bring their own chair. If you bring an umbrella, for sun or rain, it must be limited to a personal size.
-) Physical distancing must be maintained the entire time you are on church property.
-) The church will not be open to the congregation. Only musicians, ushers and clergy will be allowed into the building.
-) Please remember to use a restroom before arriving at church.
