Janet Sharma's Meeting notes

<u>Office of the Long-Term (LTC) Care Ombudsman:</u> Elizabeth Speidel, Director of Community Engagement

- Focus is to reach those most impacted residents of LTC facilities, and amplify their voices to guide policy
- Janet's observations:
 - o How can we create a sense of belonging among LTC residents?
 - Age-friendly often relates to the people who work within systems rather than the services they provide
 - We need to expand definition of aging because everyone is aging and everyone needs to realize the importance of planning for, acquiring, and transitioning to long term care.

Age-Friendly Healthcare Systems

- 4 M's: principles that can be incorporated into existing models of care; a framework that can be overlaid to guide care for older adults wherever they touch the healthcare system
 - 1) What Matters to patients and caregivers is what matters to you today
 - 2) Medication that doesn't interfere with the other 3 principles
 - 3) Mentation: Address dementia and other mental health concerns across settings of care
 - **4) Mobility:** Ensure that older adults can move safely every day to maintain care and do "what matters"
- **Institute for Health Care Improvement** has programs to develop A-F Health Systems in which everyone who is involved in the care of older adults understands what is important to you as an individual; recognizing that each individual has different needs and responding to those needs.
- Several in NJ have committed to this work: Hackensack Meridian Health, St. Joseph's Paterson has a Geriatric ER
- Green House (Small House) model: Everyone on the staff is responsible for the care of the patients. Staff eat meals with patients.

Updates

- Office of State Planning is developing Age-Friendly Land Use policies. Goal is to reflect AF policies and practices in all offices of state government

 - Response: Deadline for the DHS/DoAS to present the Blueprint is September 2023. Next Advisory Council meetings will be specifically about the blueprint.
