Housing & Community

- Strengths: Several NGOs focus on accessible outdoor spaces sidewalks, intersections, benches, lighting accessible to public transportation as well
- Weaknesses: Disjoined system for who's responsible for sidewalks, lighting, timing
- Opportunities: Federal money, complete streets & "Vision Zero" models
- Threats: Lack of consideration for pedestrians and cyclists, lack of investment in maintaining pedestrian-safe features (benches)

Transportation

- S: Education & training are available to help older adults learn about travel & access public transportation
- W: Inconsistency from system to system
- O: For more and better marketing

Socialization

- S: COVID brought home-delivered meals or grab-and-go meals
- W: Costs of attending events is expensive, ageist language
- O: Peer-to-peer learning, employment
- T: COVID halted social life; isolation affected health negatively

Health & Well Being

- O: Collaborative opportunities for state and local NGOs to build a safety net around people; Raise awareness of aging issues
- T: Older adults are fearful of asking for help or of not having anyone to ask
- Increasing number of OAs is a threat as well as an opportunity for increased advocacy

Communication & Outreach

- W: Digital connectivity
- W: Division of Aging Services needs to better educate County AAAs about Federal programs distributed locally; also need to educate about restrictions
- T: Urgency around issues of equity as needs become more dire
