Outreach Committee Drives Our Desire To Inform the World About Our Church

Dr. Tom Farrell, a physician who first attended our church as a child and is now a grandfather, gets paid to diagnose health problems in his patients. He then recommends treatments or solutions. Tom uses some of those same skills in his volunteer position as the chairman of the PCW Outreach Committee.

Years before the Outreach Committee was founded, he had expressed the same concern to several church members. "We have a problem," he said. "The Presbyterian Church of Washington is one of the best-kept secrets in Franklin County. We need to change that!"

Three years ago, with the enthusiastic support of Pastor Patrick Gruber, our Session authorized that an Outreach Committee be established, and its first meeting was held on July 27, 2021. Charter members were Tom as chairman, Ed Bonney, Denise Brauer, Aneeta Brown, Katie Farrell, Ian McCracken, and Jolene Patterson. The new committee—which replaced the Social Media Task Force Committee—immediately agreed that Outreach should be a combination of marketing, evangelism, and promotion of activities and events in our church. "Through the power of technology, we want to welcome people to our church regardless of whether they ever enter our building or not," explained Tom during that first meeting.

Since then, the committee's chief goal has not changed, just expanded. One of its first accomplishments was the most complicated: live streaming our worship service via the Internet so that anyone with a computer could "attend" on Sundays. This benefit to our church has required highly skilled people to run the equipment in our sound booth. And while announce-

ments from the pulpit are standard fare before every worship service, Outreach knows that our church newsletters are necessary to convey detailed information. The "What's Up" weekly email newsletter and "Connect" monthly newsletter have both been refreshed in recent months, and help keep the congregation informed. Both newsletters were also renamed through a congregational survey conducted by the Outreach Committee.



When the Church Life Committee hosted a spring brunch in March, Vivian Marshall, Sarah Spear, Linda Booher and other committee members wore their PCW shirts to identify themselves as hostesses. See page 5 for more information about the shirt project. "From the beginning, our committee has focused on doing a few things well rather than taking on many things," commented Tom. "For example, there are literally hundreds of social media platforms. We have chosen to use Facebook, YouTube, and Instagram as our main platforms, knowing we can change in the future if necessary." Committee member Katie Farrell has expertise in all three platforms and is the administrator for Instagram, her favorite. Instagram, nationally launched in 2010, can be either a public or private account and is primarily used for postings of photos and videos. Persons without an Instagram account can see a portion of our site by typing *Presbyterian Church Washington Mo Instagram* in Google. Katie welcomes photos from church members for possible use on Instagram. For security and privacy reasons, she is the only member allowed to post photos. Account users can respond to photos. "I find honest and positive responses to be satisfying," added Katie.

The church doesn't know how many people read a paper version of the Connect newsletter, but if the newsletter is opened via our church website, our website administrator can view the metrics to see how many people opened the newsletter link. Such information can be useful to the Outreach Committee. "Many examples come to mind," commented Tom. "I can tell you that Facebook absolutely loves photos of David Brunworth and work he does in our church. One month last summer we had over 6,000 Facebook visitors. For one worship service this past May, the metrics revealed that 34 individual computers (with an average of 1.5 persons watching from the same computer) were tuned in. That means that 51 persons from all over the U.S. and abroad were watching us."



Following the worship service, the group enjoyed a free lunch and then attended a 2-hour workshop where they received personal instructions on how to access our church website, Facebook, and Instagram on their own devices. Managing our church's website is the committee's largest single media project, and everyone who's touched the keyboard agrees that the website is always a work in progress. One of the largest blocks of new material has been added by Steve Sebastian, co-chairman of the Cemetery Board. "Maintaining up-to-date information on the sale of cemetery plots and the rental fees for Fellowship Hall is a crucial tool for our members and non-members who need that information," noted Tom.

Non-tech committee projects have also broadened our church's presence. "For years, I heard comments about the awful yellow color of the knit shirts that had our old logo on them," recalled member Ian McCracken. "Replacing them took some time to find the right vendor and color, but we finally did it and sold several dozen to our members. Everyone seems to like the light blue shirts with our new logo. They make us visible in the community, especially when we attend an event and sit together as we did at the ECC POPS concert this year."

The Outreach Committee actively supports many church events that are organized by other Session committees, such as the annual Easter Egg Hunt, Community Book Sale, Vacation Bible School, and Chili Cook-Off. Members are also adept at asking for help to achieve one of Outreach's own goals. For the first two years of its existence, members dreamed about the possibility of building a church float for the annual Town and County Fair Parade. The Fair begins on the first Wednesday in August, with the parade preceding it on Sunday. But no member had the construction expertise for such a major project. The committee broadcast an SOS. Can anyone help us? John Bugele and David Brunworth answered the call, with Aaron Bounds, Steve Sebastian, and Marsha Stonerook also contributing. Our 2023 float was so well built, popular, and properly saved in storage that it's being used again this August 4th for

Our church retains the profit amount in our account and that really adds up each month.

Did you know our Scrip Program has already made a profit of \$1,500 in the first half of this 2024 year?! YES, every purchase counts and makes our non-profit church organization money. People use Scrip cards for every day purchases and gifts, it is fantastic what Scrip cards can do! We could have so many people, members, friends, family, purchase the gift cards and we could make so much more money for our church to use towards mission work. 
