When Southern states started succeeding from the Union, members who supported slavery succeeded from the church and started a second Presbyterian church in town. A bitter Civil War tore our nation and state apart.

According to Wikipedia: "The U.S. has engaged in nearly 400 military interventions between 1776 and 2023, with half of these operations occurring since 1950"

In the years since this congregation began the nation has experienced several major meltdowns of the economy. There was the Panic of 1857, the Long depression of 1873 to 1897, the Great Depression 1929 to 1939, and the Great Recession of 2007 to 2009.

John Anglin Directs the ECC Summer Musical Starring Patty Kellmann

Our own John Anglin, who was the director of theatre productions at East Central College for 31 years, retired in 2004. But almost every summer since then he has directed a musical at the John Edson Anglin Performing Arts Center on campus. This summer's production is *Once Upon a Mattress*, which runs July 24 through 27 (see below for ticket information).

Once Upon a Mattress, loosely based on a Hans Christian Anderson fairy tale, opened off-Broadway in 1959, then moved to Broadway and launched the career of cast member Carol Burnett. It was nominated for Best Musical in the 1960 Tony season, but lost—in a tie—to *Sound of Music* and *Fiorello*. Mary Rodgers, daughter of the famous musician Richard Rodgers, wrote the music for *Mattress*.



One cast member of the ECC production is Patty Kellmann, a member of our choir, and a very seasoned actress in ECC productions. “Once Upon a Mattress is the 52nd musical or play I’ve performed in at ECC,” said Patty. “I started about 30 years ago when John cast our daughter Leigh in his production of *Oliver*. John asked if any parents were interested in auditioning for future roles...and that got me started!”

Patty has also helped John with costuming for four summer shows at ECC, and she has appeared in three productions with the Riverside Players in Washington. “John’s summer shows are always so much fun for the actors as well as the audience,” Patty added. 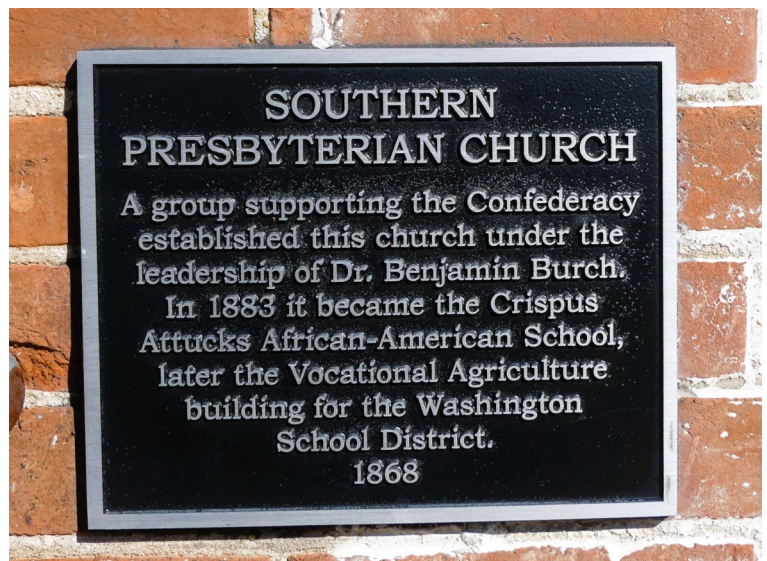

The birth of the Presbyterian Church in Washington, Missouri, began on June 24, 1850, when three men—Rev. H.W. Robertson, Rev. Joseph Fenton, and Dr. Benjamin F. Burch—met and organized our church. Two years later, a brick building was constructed at the corner of Fourth and Market Streets. It no longer exists. The deed for that lot was signed by Martha North, Masters Campbell, Benjamin Burch, and Elijah McLean.

Between 1868 and 1870, the Presbyterian Church split. Members who were loyal to the North continued to worship at Fourth and Market. Members who supported the Confederacy met in the building pictured here. It is now used as a warehouse, and has been largely stripped of architectural elements that once symbolized its purpose as a house of worship.



Church Session Wields Significant Power on Member Behavior During the Church's Early Years in Washington

“The records of the Church for the eighteen years [1850-1868] following its organization are interesting chronicles. During several stormy years, the Session exercised its prerogative as a court, and tried and suspended members of the congregation for various offenses. The action of the Session was also "published from the pulpit." Members were excommunicated for attending public balls and dancing; using ardent spirits and intoxicants; playing at billiards and games of chance; neglect of public worship; use of profane and impious language; common fame; and embezzlement of church funds. It is interesting to note that colored members were also tried and suspended, for at that time slaves belonged to the church. They were designated by their Christian name only, and marked, "(of color)." Most of them were later dismissed to the African Church.”

The text above was written by Harriett Cary Hull (1884-1959), who served on the Washington Centennial Committee on History. In 1939, the Committee published a softbound book, *The History of Washington, Missouri*. At the time the book was published Mrs. Hull's husband, Dr. G. Marion Hull, was the pastor of the Presbyterian Church of Washington. Dr. Hull and Harriett Hull both died in 1959 and are buried in Lexington, Kentucky.

The Presbyterian Church at Fourth and Market

The deed of this church lot was signed September 27, 1851, by Mary North, Masters Campbell, Benjamin Burch, and Elijah McLean, and the cornerstone was laid in 1916. During its construction (this building cost \$10,000), the congregation worshipped at Washington High School.

Future newsletters this year will contain more information about our church history.

In 1950 when our church observed its 100th Anniversary, it published the complete list of its current members and the year they joined. You might recognize some names in this bound book. See the next page for the conclusion.

Pat Brown In Our Congregation Shares Some Red Cross Volunteering Experiences

I have been a Red Cross Volunteer since 2017, working with Fire Response, Auditing, and Fraud Prevention. In January of this year I added “Sheltering in St. Louis” to my volunteer duties. As a member of the Red Cross National Response Team, I contact and process client assistance. I greatly appreciate the patience of my wife Julia, and the support of our daughter and son-in-law, Michelle and Craig Matzes, for helping the family while I have been deployed to various places in crisis.

The recent fires in Los Angeles, and the tornadoes and hurricanes across the country, have kept our seven-person National team busy. We all hope the six-day work weeks subside! The greatest gift is being able to balance sheltering and event support with work skills from my previous work life. The sheltering needs in St. Louis have been extreme since May 16!

The Red Cross has helped me transition from the retirement world to the volunteer world. The hours and/or days the Red Cross requires from volunteers can meet almost anyone’s schedule, and some volunteers work entirely from home. The experiences I have had with clients are vast. Some families had their tragic stories published in the *New York Times*. I worked with farmers rounding up cattle due to storm-damaged fences, and helped people whose homes were destroyed by tornadoes. God’s grace was evident to me as I encountered those in disaster experiences.
