A Message from Fr. Mario

Dear Friends in Christ,

As part of worshiping during this pandemic, Holy Apostles has offered prayer services via our podcast channel. We started offering Morning Prayer, and later we moved to Evening Prayer. Compline has been our latest offering. In ancient Christian tradition, Compline (Night Prayer) was said after all work was done and before going to bed. It starts with the following words: The Lord Almighty grant us a peaceful night and a perfect end. In a few words, these opening words state the purpose of Compline; the 'perfect end' speaks to the completion of the day by the grace of God. This prayer also asks for a peaceful night and can be interpreted as: "If I die while I sleep, I hope I die in a state of salvation' and 'I hope I make it to tomorrow."

As we celebrate the birth of the holy child, it is possible that something similar was in Joseph and Mary's hearts and minds during all those nights of travel to Bethlehem. They would later face more difficult nights (this time with a baby) fleeing the reach of Herod's soldiers. However, Scripture tells us that one day they would finally stop running. We need to remember this fact because one day, we will also be able to cease running from COVID-19. The new vaccines will help us as long as we continue to wear our masks and take responsibility for each other's health. And yes, in the year 2022 and beyond, we may have to get a vaccine booster. However, many of us understand that if that will allow us to live a fuller life, it will be a small price.

In the meantime, we can also give a booster to our lives by listening to God; this critical task will be easier if we stop, reflect, stay for a moment in the light that allows us to see ourselves honestly see the world differently. We don't need to be inside our sanctuary to sing 'O come, let us adore him' and embrace the beauty of that adoration, that wondering gaze at the holy child in the manger right from our homes. We can continue to grow in faith that, as Martin Luther King Jr. said in his final Christmas sermon, we will be able to adjourn the councils of despair and bring new light into the dark chambers of pessimism. With this faith we will be able to speed up the day when there will be peace on earth and goodwill toward men. It will be a glorious day, the morning stars will sing together, and the sons of God will shout for joy.



Abuse and Neglect during COVID

With the COVID-19 crisis, we all must take an active role in monitoring child safety in their homes, neighborhoods and their communities. Inevitably, there will be children and young people, in the months to come, making disclosures of abuse, to trusted adults, once they feel safe, and when schools are back in session and churches are open. It's possible that the child may make the disclosure to you over your online communication, or that you may pick up on disturbing behavior or warning signs through that online communication. What you see, hear or observe may cause you to suspect one of the types of child abuse—physical abuse, neglect, emotional/psychological abuse or sexual abuse. If you need help or support:

The Church Geek Corner By Fr. Mario

In the year 2021, you may see me wearing a funny hat from time to time. I am talking about the biretta:





The *biretta* is the traditional liturgical hat for Western priests; it is worn at specific points during Low Mass (the equivalent of the Episcopal Holy Eucharist), including, for example, the processional and recessional. Some priests choose to wear it when preaching or giving absolution. A priest can also wear it outdoors for non-liturgical functions. Liturgical hats (along with other vestments) have a biblical precedent (Exodus 28), and the biretta is connected to the academic garb of the late middle-ages. You know the mortarboard caps and academic tams one sees at graduation ceremonies? Those hats are descendants of the same medieval cap. The most common *biretta* is stiff or collapsible, with three peaks and a pom, known as a Latin style biretta. According to the person's holy orders, priests and deacons wear black, and bishops wear purple. The Anglican Communion has canons and archdeacons, so they would wear black with trim or poms in red and purple, respectively. A priest can also wear a hat known as a *zucchetto*, but that's a story for another day.

These days you don't see many priests wearing them, and you can ask me: does it look silly? Ha ha, yes, it does. However, in particular visitors, I want people to ask why the priest is wearing it, as in, "Hey, what's that thing on your priest's head?" You can tell them it is a reminder of St. Paul's directions in regards to the need to study the Scriptures and the way we use words: Remind them of this, and warn them before God that they are to avoid wrangling over words, which does no good but only ruins those who are listening. Do your best to present yourself to God as one approved by him, a worker who has no need to be ashamed, rightly explaining the word of truth. (2 Timothy 14-15).

Graymoor Ecumenical & Interreligious Institute is a ministry of the Franciscan Friars of the Atonement, a Roman Catholic religious community of brothers and priests in the tradition of St. Francis of Assisi and the founder of the Society of the Atonement, Father Paul Wattson, SA. Paul Wattson was an early pioneer of the ecumenical movement in the United States. From his friary at Graymoor, in Garrison, NY, he contributed to the founding of what is now the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity and identified the primary work of the Friars of the Atonement to be that of Christian unity and promote Christian unity and interreligious dialogue in North America.





LARCUM (Lutheran, Anglican/Episcopalian, Roman Catholic, United Methodist)

Reflection of the 2020 Virginia State LARCUM Conference

The Annual LARCUM Conference was held via Zoom on, Friday evening, December 4, and Saturday morning, December 5. Our speaker was Dr. Phillip Cary, internationally acclaimed expert on Augustine, scholar in-residence at the Templeton Honors College, professor of Philosophy at Eastern University and Editor-in-Chief of Pro Ecclesia will present "Being Formed by the Gospel in a Post-Christian Age: A proposal for the Church Catholic."

He gave a unique insight into Augustine and Martin Luther's beliefs and how they interpreted the Gospel and how it might affect the church to hear the proposal today. In the 16th Century they had a very vivid fear of hell and that created much anxiety that would control your whole way of life. As an example Luther was destined to marry well and enter the law, but during a great storm he was so scared that he prayed to Saint Anne to spared his life and in return he would become a monk.



Open Table Ministry at Holy Apostles

In November of 2019, The OpenTable ministry got underway after many weeks of training. The Open Table, a United Methodist national program, trains people from community sectors such as business, education, faith communities, health care, and others to organize and invest in relationships with individuals who may have complex needs related to daily living. Individuals come highly recommended through local Social Services organizations. The individual selected is highly motivated and likely to succeed in a caring environment such as the Open Table. Open Table members assist in helping the person selected to become a better problem solver.

The Holy Apostles Table, under the leadership of Teresa Stanley as Director and Lynne Graham as Inside Director, became mentors and friends to Liz, a mother of five children. Some of you might remember meeting the family who were our guests at our Shrove Tuesday pancake supper.

We began weekly meetings with Liz and quickly developed a relationship of trust among ourselves and with Liz. We also became victims of the Pandemic shut-down, but we persisted and continued the weekly meetings from March through November via Zoom,

It has been a year of growth for the members of the table and for our Friend, as the mother is called. Liz has made great strides. She has become a more confident parent, a more assertive member in her employment environment, a recent graduate of a community financial program called Bank-On, explored new cooking challenges, and grown more hopeful as she plans for her family's future.

Holy Apostles members have also grown in many ways. We became better listeners, while sharing some wisdom and some laughter. This made it comfortable for our Friend to explore ideas with us.

We will continue the individual relationships with the family, but we will have completed the formal relationship as we end monthly meetings in February, 2021. Once we are able to meet again as a church family, we hope that Liz can visit Holy Apostles and give you an idea of what this experience has meant to her and her family.

Thank you to the members who prayed for The Open Table, who gave other gifts of kindness to the family, and to those who supported the table in other ways.
