Clergy Corner: St. Michael



The name of our church is "St. Michael the Archangel," and you can find him in almost every corner of the church. He's in the great window behind the organ, of course. And he shows up on a plaque near the back door and as the statue in our Memorials Chapel. He's also rendered in fabric on our banner—it hangs in the hallway between Yeaton Hall and the church office. At St. Michael's, St. Michaels are everywhere!

While he (a pronoun used for convenience, since angels are considered without gender) is a "saint," he's not like his human counterparts. We know the life and history of these human saints, but Michael is much less knowable. He is called a "saint" in the sense of "holy" because he is one of God's holy archangels—ranking among the highest of the heavenly host. He is one of only four angels who are called by name in scripture.*

He shows up in the book of *Daniel* as the "great angel Michael, who guards your people"—the patron angel of Israel. And he appears in the

book of *Revelation* leading the angels of God in casting out

"the great dragon...the deceiver of the whole world." This is why the image of St. Michael usually includes a bound dragon at his feet. And it is why Michael is called the guardian of the people—he stands between "the great Satan" and God's people. To quote, "He is a powerful agent of God who wards off evil from God's people and delivers peace to them at the end of this life's mortal struggle."*

I have heard that when our community began, the Sunday School youth were given the privilege of naming the new community and chose the name St. Michael the Archangel. I'll bet they really liked the story of the angel who led the charge and cast Satan out of heaven! So we claimed the name St. Michael. And so we will celebrate our patron archangel on October 3rd—it's the Sunday after the day the church sets aside to honor St. Michael and All Angels, September 29th. I hope you will join us!

Sponsor a Window



When our stained glass windows were installed at St. Michael's in the 1960s each window was sponsored by a family or member of the church. The details of who sponsored which window are lost in the mists of history—but we are grateful for their generosity in providing the beautiful windows that grace our sanctuary.

It's been a few years since the 1960s. And we are very fortunate that our windows have passed the test of time (so far, at least) in great shape. The one concern that the vestry has about our windows is protecting them against damage. The windows are by far the most expensive asset we have—and an errant baseball could be a real problem! So, over the last few months we have investigated craftsmen and companies that specialize in protecting stained glass. We have narrowed our search and would like to start work on protecting the windows this fall.

This work is not a typical part of our budget. So, reaching back to that earlier tradition, you are invited to "sponsor" a window. You can sponsor an entire window at \$500. Or be a partial sponsor at the amount you choose. And you can select which window you want to sponsor. I hear tell that when the windows were first sponsored no one wanted to sponsor the one with Jesus in the Wilderness—presumably because that window includes that wizened purple devil! You can sponsor that one... or any other. We'll keep you posted on which windows are the favorites! Thanks!

Our outreach spotlight for September is Rise Against Hunger "Hunger doesn't have to exist—Let's end it together"



The Rise Against Hunger meal packing events are a blast! Do you remember?

On a couple of previous occasions, we joined with the El Segundo Methodist Church and El Segundo Rotary for a great morning of good work. There was music and laughter and *lots* of rice as we packaged *ten thousand meals* for families in the developing world. What an accomplishment!

Rise Against Hunger works to keep kids in school (by distributing meals through the schools) and thus providing a better basis for the children's success, health and future. They recognize that parents are more likely to allow their children to continue in school if they can still help the family by bringing meals home. So Rise Against Hunger works toward increasing education while decreasing hunger. A real win-win!

The rice and soy base of the meal lends itself to many world cuisines, so the recipients can spice it up to "taste like home." That way, the meals fit right in with what they are accustomed to eating. We are not trying to change what they like to eat, just making sure they get nourishing meals for the whole family.

Unfortunately, we had to cancel the event last year due to the pandemic restrictions. But the Rise Against Hunger team has figured out how we can do it safely and replenish their diminishing stock of meals so that the work can go on. So we're planning to do it! We are coordinating with the Methodist Church and Rotary for an event on Saturday October 23rd. We hope you'll be part of the action!
