
Clergy Corner: God Is Already Present

Voices From The Vestry: Happy June Everyone

As we are about to enter summer, I find myself in a state of simultaneous sadness and metamorphosis. Of course, change is generally a good thing, but it is also hard. This month brings end of Mother Dina's tenure and our 11-year-old twins are "graduating" 5th grade from a school we have spent the last decade of our lives attending. It's just another reminder that time marches on. As we enter this month, it's also a very unsettling time in our country. I am sad at the state of the world, the world our children are



growing up in. As June is also "Pride Month," I am reflecting on our civil rights in this country—which also seem to be in a tenuous state of turmoil. But I am hopeful, too. As I'm writing this, I am sitting on my beautiful front porch, dog in my lap, coffee in hand, listening the sounds of birds chirping and watching butterflies glide by. I am reminded of the beauty in the simple things. It truly is a time we need to stop and smell the roses and remind ourselves that the little things really are the big things. But yet, we cannot stand idly by. It is up to us to stand up for what is right, to be the allies to our brothers and sisters who are still fighting for equality. I leave you with a quote by Bayard Rustin, a lesser-known figure in the Civil Rights Movement and friend of Martin Luther King Jr., who fought not only for the rights of African Americans but for the LGBTQ community as well. Rustin urged the disenfranchised to engage in civil disobedience to get their points across to the majority, encouraging those who wanted to fight for their rights to be unafraid to speak up and act out to demand them. Sacristy Update Update



"Sacristy" is another one of those words we inherited from the Church of England. Like many words, it's a way of saying in one word what would otherwise take a lot more. So, to define:

A "sacristy" is a room in a church where a priest prepares for a service, and where vestments and other things used in worship are kept.

For us it's the room next door to the side entrance of the church. You may see clergy and acolytes go in and out of that room and be marginally aware that the robes for clergy and acolytes are kept there. You may have peeked in once or twice, but not enough to know what it really includes and what goes on there. Let me tell you about just a bit of it!

The sacristy does store clergy and acolyte robes and vestments in a closet and chest of drawers. It also has all the different colored vestments—the stoles

and chasubles—that the priest wears during the various seasons of the church year, along with the hangings for the pulpit and the altar. This is the place where all those things are kept and cared for—by our faithful altar guild members. But it's a lot more...

Need a candle? Check the sacristy. Want the wine and wafers for the communion? They're in the sacristy. Oil for anointing the sick? In the sacristy. The book that keeps the record of all the services? On the counter in the sacristy. A place to clean up after services? The sacristy. The "other" cross*—for the altar wall? Yep. It's in the sacristy. It's a room that has many functions and honestly it would be very difficult to get along without it. And ours is showing its age!

Our sacristy was built as part of the original church building when the church was moved here** in 1948, and it has served us well. But it's small and crowded. The closet and chest of drawers are what were available at the time. And the sink and fixtures are definitely showing their age. We've been looking at making this space more functional for a long time—since before Mo. Dina came. But we knew it was a major task, and the time and opportunity never seemed to be right.

Well, now it is! Mo. Dina has asked in lieu of any gifts to honor her retirement that you designate a special donation to the "Sacristy Fund" at St. Michael's. As you might guess, refurbishing the sacristy will be costly. In addition to the room and fixtures, there are plumbing, electrical and heating systems to consider—all of which need updates to our current standards. As soon as there is sufficient funding to begin, the vestry and altar guild will begin conversations with an architect about plans. And then, as soon as practical given funding and budget, we will begin work with a contractor.

This is the first major project we have had at St. Michael's since the building of Yeaton Hall in the early 2000s. Just as the church was moved here, then the school was built, and then Yeaton Hall, remodeling the sacristy will indeed be a gift from us to future generations at St. Michael's. Thank you for helping to make this happen!

* Most of the year we have the Christ the King cross in the church on the altar wall, but in Lent we use the Crucifix.

The faithful Altar Guild members make sure the appropriate cross is on the wall and that the other cross is safely placed on the wall in the sacristy.

** Yes! As an interesting side note, our church building started out as a Lutheran chapel in Westchester. When that congregation wanted to build a new church, St. Michael's bought the building and had it moved to El Segundo. We added the side wing where the sacristy is located. And the windows are all ours—gifts from church members who have gone before us. They were trustees for us, just as we are trustees for those who will come after us.

The officers of the vestry are the senior warden, junior warden, clerk and treasurer—titles that, along with the name "vestry," have been handed down to us from our Church of England heritage. At St. Michael's, the vestry members who have the responsibility for making the decision about who to call as the new rector are:


