MOTHER'S DAY

In just a couple of weeks, we will be observing Mother's Day. Following are some thoughts/observations on this holiday.

More phone calls are made on this day than any other day of the year.

I recently read Jewish cemeteries will not schedule burials on

Mother's Day because the cemeteries are so crowded with people leaving flowers at their Mother's graves.

The first official Mother's Day came about in 1908, when a woman named Ann Jarvis, who remained unmarried and childless all her life, wished to honor her own mother. She attained financial backing from John Wanamaker to hold an event attended by thousands of people at a Wanamaker's Department Store. In 1914 President Woodrow Wilson signed a measure officially establishing the second Sunday in May as Mother's Day. Eventually Ann Jarvis came to renounce the commercialization of a day she had hoped would be set apart for honor, not commercialization.

The mother, especially for the women in the early decades of the twentieth century, was the most influential person in a child's life. In the 1950's—80% of mom's were stay at home. By the late 60's it was 49% and in 2022 it was almost 20 percent.

We inherit more than genes from our mothers. Much of the value system children learn comes from their parents, especially the mother. Children today have more freedom and independence than children of previous decades, but they still learn basic values from their parents. One of the most important things a mother can impart to her child is the feeling that the child is worthy, lovable and valued. I used to tell patients "no one gets to adulthood without some complaint about their mothers." Hopefully the good far outweighs the bad and when the adult child thinks about the mom, the predominant feeling is "thanks, Mom."

Voices from the Vestry

In February my husband, Randy and I left LA for a fifteen day Hawaiian cruise. We've done this cruise before and enjoy it because there are lots of "at sea" days. This trip did not turn out as expected. Randy started feeling crummy on the 6th day of the cruise. He stayed in bed most of the seventh day and I suggested he take a shower and he might feel better. Unfortunately Randy fell in the shower and was unable to pull himself back up. We called for help and several men came and helped him up. They took him directly to the ship's hospital. He was in distress. Randy tested positive for Covid and so did I.

Randy got sicker and more distressed while in the hospital. The next morning when we landed in Kauai Randy was taken by ambulance to a small hospital. Because I also had Covid I could not see him. He was put in isolation and they started monitoring his heart and lungs. He was much sicker than I knew. That late evening Randy was airlifted to Oahu. I flew over later that day. He ended up with congestive heart failure and spent seven days in ICU.

While all of this was going on, I was stuck in a hotel room by myself, not able to see Randy but he was also unable to speak to me for several days. I prayed a lot!

One day, I got a call from a Rotary friend, who wanted to talk about another Rotary friend who had just died. We cried together as he was a very dear friend. I then told my friend where I was a what was happening. She was shocked and asked if there was anything she could do. I told her to pray for Randy's recovery. About an hour later, I got a call from the front desk that they had a delivery for me. They brought it up and much to my surprise my friend had sent a "care package" to me. It had a fuzzy blanket, Tylenol and soothing tea. She told me that since she couldn't be there she sent the blanket to feel like a hug from her.

My family and several friends, called everyday for updates. Half of my family offered to fly out to help. After many discussions, my daughter, Nicole flew out a few days later and another friend used her airplane miles to pay for Nicole's ticket.

Even though I was alone most of the time, I was surrounded by family and friends. So many people texted, called, and emailed me during this time. Each and everyone said they were praying for us.

On Good Friday, I was asked to read an inspirational message for the community breakfast. Here is an excerpt from that message.

When we're looking for answers, sometimes God sends us wise friends. When He doesn't tell us which way to go, He'll bring people to go with us instead. It's important to know what to look for when we feel like we're falling apart, because God doesn't often send what we think we need. He sends us what He knows we need.

Who's hurting around you? Is it possible God could send you to love them without you having say a word or make a suggestion? Who has been there for you during an uncertain time? Drop

them a note. Let them know it mattered. Next time your world is turned upside down, look for friends instead of answers. God's lifeboats usually come in the form of people. Live in Grace* Walk in Love by Bob Goff
