### **Clergy Corner: Sharing a Holy Meal**

It will be a while before we actually gather together. As is noted elsewhere in this issue, we are working toward when and how that can happen. But it will be a while before we can actually gather together.

In this time of social distancing and online church, one of the things many people tell me they miss most is communion. I think this is both communion with other people—sharing the praise of God together in community—and the bread and wine of the Eucharist.

This got me to thinking about our holy meal. It is, of course, a symbol of our unity with God in Christ, and also with one another—the whole communion of saints throughout time and space. When we share the bread and wine we are offered a glimpse of kairos time—God's time. We are blessed to be with each other, with all the people of God, and in God's presence. When we approach the altar in this way, it is truly a holy meal.

The gift of this meal exists for us in the symbolic acts...

#### bread taken, blessed, broken and shared

and also in the physical aspects of feeding us...

#### food that is necessary for life

It is food for both the life of the spirit and the life of the flesh.



We continue to eat, of course, in this time of apartness. Quick meals of sustenance. Hearty meals flavored with time and love. Family meals shared with our small circle of closest associates. Perhaps we can see in these moments that all our meals are meals of grace. Meals that come from the abundance of God. Blessings that we are given.

Our sacramental Eucharist may have to wait. But these holy meals continue. I hope that in each and every meal you give thanks (that's the meaning of "eucharist" you know!) and welcome the presence of Christ at your table. It's communion.

Here's a brief prayer for these meals of communion.

Be present, be present, O Jesus, as you were present with your disciples, and be known to us in this holy meal.


## Your voice counts!

This space is larger than our grass and also provides firmer footing for chairs and walking. This in-person service will also be livestreamed online for those who do not want to or are unable to attend in person. Services for the other Sundays will continue to be livestreamed on our Facebook page.


