Interim Inspirations

When Madeleine L'Engle talked about us being made of the same stuff as the stars, that spoke to me. She wrote this in the journals she wrote while living at her family farmhouse in Connecticut. It also touched me when that highly regarded author recalled that she was volunteer choir director for her village church.

I recommend her series of four journals, especially the first, <u>A Circle of Quiet (*Crosswicks Journals*)</u>. (Never mind the suggestion you all dispositioned to the round file. Please know I am appropriately besmirched and penitent for Advent.) The selection below gives a taste of her Chrisitan writing voice. It is from <u>Bright Evening Star</u>. May you be blessed and a blessing in the days of Advent and Christmastide.

I walk out onto the deck of my cottage, looking up at the great river of the Milky Way flowing across the sky. A

sliver of a moon hangs in the southwest, with the evening star gently in the curve. Evening of this day. Evening of my own life.

I look at the stars and wonder. How old is the universe? All kinds of estimates have been made and, far as we can tell, not one is accurate. All we know is that once upon a time, or rather, once before time, Christ called everything into being in a great breath of creativity—waters, land, green growing things, birds and beasts, and finally human creatures—the beginning, the genesis, not in ordinary Earth days; the Bible makes it quite clear that God's time is different from our time. A thousand years for us is no more than the blink of an eye to God. But in God's good time the universe came into being, opening up from a tiny flower of nothingness to great clouds of hydrogen gas to swirling galaxies. In God's good time came solar systems and planets and ultimately this planet on which I stand on this autumn evening as the Earth makes its graceful dance around the sun. It takes one Earth day, one Earth night, to make a full turn, part of the intricate pattern of the universe. And God called it good, very good.

A sky full of God's children! Each galaxy, each star, each living creature, every particle and subatomic particle of creation, we are all children of the Maker. From a subatomic particle with a life span of a few seconds, to a galaxy with a life span of billions of years, to us human creatures somewhere in the middle in size and age, we are made in God's image, male and female, and we are, as Christ promised us, God's children by adoption and grace.

Children of God, made in God's image. How? Genesis gives no explanations, but we do know instinctively that it is not a physical image. God's explanation is to send Jesus, the incarnate One, God enfleshed. Don't try to explain the incarnation to me! It is further from being explainable than the furthest star in the furthest galaxy. It is love, God's limitless love enfleshing that love into the form of a human being, Jesus, the Christ, fully human and fully divine.

Was there a moment, known only to God, when all the stars held their breath, when the galaxies paused in their dance for a fraction of a second, and the Word, who had called it all into being, went with all his love into the womb of a young girl, and the universe started to breathe again, and the ancient harmonies resumed their song, and the angels clapped their hands for joy?

Power. Greater power than we can imagine, abandoned, as the Word knew the powerlessness of the unborn child, still unformed, taking up almost no space in the great ocean of amniotic fluid, unseeing, unhearing, unknowing. Slowly growing, as any human embryo grows, arms and legs and a head, eyes, mouth, nose, slowly swimming into life until the ocean in the womb is no longer large enough, and it is time for birth.

Christ, the Second Person of the Trinity, Christ, the Maker of the universe or perhaps many universes, willingly and lovingly leaving all that power and coming to this poor, sin-filled planet to live with us for a few years to show us what we ought to be and could be. Christ came to us as Jesus of Nazareth, wholly human and wholly divine, to show us what it means to be made in God's image.

CHRISTMAS

December 25--Christmas is approaching again. Christmas officially became a Federal holiday in 1870. A much anticipated time of the year--one of the major religious holidays of the year--a reminder of our faith.

It is also a time when family and friends get together and focus on their love for each other. Christmas customs and events change with technology, but the original meaning remains constant.

Many people remember Christmases of decades ago and note differences in emphasis and methods. Some people remember when sending Christmas cards was a huge time consuming event that sometimes served as a reminder to keep address lists up to date. Often now, Christmas greetings are exchanged through email or perhaps a phone call. Phone calls also have changed over the years, from a big eventlong distance!!--to a non-event--something easy and inexpensive.

Many people also remember spending large amounts of time finding that "perfect gift" for someone-determining what their sports interests were, or their current size and/or favorite colors. Now they exchange gift cards. Certainly easier--hopefully still meaningful.

Some people struggle to keep up with technology. Just yesterday at a music rehearsal, someone was asking if everyone had a copy of "that round thing" he made last year--he couldn't remember what it was called, finally saying--"oh yes, a CD." He could only think of a current technological term and I have to admit, I don't remember what that term was!!

While the dynamics of Christmas celebrations change, the underlying themes remain the same. People still watch the same classic Christmas movies they saw decades ago because the themes are still moving and relevant.

Often to children, Christmas is too focused on gifts--but wise parents keep things in perspective, a season of gift giving, gifts originating with the first gifts to the infant Jesus--gold, frankincense and myrrh. Gifts too have changed dramatically over the past two thousand years, but probably there is no one who wouldn't appreciate a gift of gold now--even myrrh--perfume is still popular.

Customs of observance may change, but the underlying theme never will--the birth of the baby Jesus-the origins of faith.

One of the more recent treasures is the organ/keyboard enclosure. The hand hewn dramatic wooden shapes of the enclosure are magnificent. It's more than just an enclosure, it's a functioning piece of art. The wood artisan was a church member. His name is Niall McKeown. The family moved to his home country, Ireland. While Niall was here at St. Michael's he demonstrated his talent as a master woodworker. The church had just replaced the church organ with a new multi-voice keyboard which looked just like a standard piano. Niall was asked to design and build the enclosure for this wonderful new instrument. He designed and built the new enclosure we have today. This is not just a couple wooden walls. The new instrument has a wooden soundboard so the enclosure can allow sound to travel through it. Niall designed the front wall with sound material which allowed all the keyboard sound to pass through without any dampening.

Ever wonder what those circles on the wall mean? There's a story about them. When Niall was a boy, he remembered lying under the trees next to a lake when it was raining. The design represents the circles in the water dripping from the trees made in the lake. These circles are a representation of what these drops made. Take a look and you'll see what I'm talking about. Look around our lovely church. There's so much beauty to behold!
