



What is accessibility?

Accessibility in the context of multimedia learning

- Visual impairments
- Auditory impairments
- Cognitive impairments
- Motor impairments
- Learning styles and varied cognitive processes
- Neurodiversity
- Situational disabilities
- Age-related challenges

What is multimedia learning?

Mayer's 12 Principles

- Cognitive Load Principles:
 - Coherence, Signaling, Redundancy, and Contiguity
- Active Learning Principles:
 - Modality, Multimedia, Personalization, and Segmenting
- Transfer of Learning Principles:
 - Pre-training, Self-explanation
- Content Organization Principles:
 - Spatial Contiguity, Temporal Contiguity, Consistency



Why does it matter?

- Simplifying complex information
- Providing multiple ways to engage with content
- Ensuring clarity and consistency



In Summary

Mayer's 12 Principles

- Clear, concise, and engaging content
- Reduce cognitive load and facilitates learning

Web Content Accessibility Guidelines

Provide technical standards for accessibility
