A Tribal Park is sometimes called an Indigenous Protected & Conserved Area (or IPCA). Both represent a Indigenous-led model for stewardship of lands and resources for the long term. Tribal Parks prioritize Indigenous rights and responsibilities by acknowledging the relationship between Indigenous peoples with land and waters.

In 2018 the Indigenous Circle of Experts defined Tribal Parks and IPCAs as *"initiatives to protect lands and waters where Indigenous governments have the primary role in protecting and conserving ecosystems through Indigenous laws, governance, and knowledge systems."* 

A Tribal Park would allow some economic activities aligned with conservation goals and objectives. These could include eco-tourism ventures, guardian programs, arts & culture activities, outdoor education, or a healing centre.

A Tribal Park could include partnerships that support Sc'ianew self-determination (for instance with Crown governments, non-profit organizations, philanthropic funders, etc.)
