NAPS Submit Mitigation Factors for 2021 NPA

In a correspondence to postal headquarters dated December 13, 2021, NAPS HQs made a request that the Postal Service change its current National NPA rating due to numerous mitigating factors. The current rating results in a 2.5% salary increase for EAS employees. NAPS contends that due to the mitigating factors outlined in the notice, the rating should be changed and thereby giving EAS a 3% increase for calendar year 2022.
