

Spring 2016: Indonesia, Pacific Islands and Singapore

The 30th "Asia Today" Series took place on May 7, 14, and 21, 2016, with talks focusing on the increasingly endangered languages of the Pacific Islands, as well as the histories and modern circumstances of the nations of Indonesia and Singapore.

On May 7, in a lecture titled "Oceanic Tongues: Assessing and Documenting Language Vitality in the Contemporary Pacific," Dr. Alexander Mawyer addressed the story of language shift and change in Pacific Island history. He used poetic language and the language of local ecological knowledge to illustrate modern issues of identity, mobility, politics, and globalization. The audience responded positively to this talk, appreciating the "rich information" and "nice illustrations."

In the following two lectures, Dr. Ehito Kimura spent one morning delivering the lecture "Unity in Diversity," talking about Indonesia. Explaining that it is one of the world's most diverse countries, he described how the government and the nation's politics have affected everyday Indonesians. On the final day of the Series, in "Singapore: Development vs. Democracy," Dr. Kimura spent the morning discussing the trade-offs Singapore has made between politics and business in its search for wealth and freedom. His talks were well received, with audience members commenting on the in-depth information and interesting perspectives.

luncheon meeting was hosted by Dr. AJai-Ho Yoo, CAPE President, on April 13, 2016, at Xingkai Chinese Restaurant in Seoul, Korea, to thank the members of CAPE Friends/Korea for their support over the past three decades. The lunch this year was especially meaningful as it marked the close of the chapter of the past 30 years, and sought to open a new chapter for a new generation of CAPE friends to come.

CAPE Friends/Korea bid Mahalo to the members of the original chapter and welcomed the new members who will carry it on, perhaps for another 30 years. Nearly 35 years ago, in 1982, Dr. Mo-Im Kim began her term as the first president and paved a solid foundation of CAPE Friends/Korea. Mr. Young-Tae Kim took over in 1987, and has served as its second president to this day. His ceaseless energy and support played a vital role in raising funds for the CAPE Home, and he continued in his support regardless of his own business challenges.

Following a lunch and warm exchange of aloha and fond memories of CAPE's development, the program began with remarks by CAPE President Jai-Ho Yoo welcoming and thanking the guests for their warm support of CAPE, both financially and morally, since its inception. He expressed his deep gratitude to the members, who helped CAPE become what it is today, and whose support never wavered even during adverse economic times such as the IMF crisis in the late 20th century.

Dr. Yoo's remarks preceded a talk by Mr. Young-Tae Kim, Chairman of Daesung Group, who spoke of his long personal friendship with Dr. Yoo, starting in the early 1970s. His connection with CAPE began in the early 1980s, and came about because he admired CAPE's goals of cross-cultural exchange between people in Asia and the Pacific regions via professional and academic collaboration, interchange and cooperative study and research. Mr. Kim enjoyed being a part of the CAPE community because it greatly assisted participants in achieving their academic goals. He closed with a few words on his friendship with Dr. Yoo and other members, and the hope that his contributions helped pave the way for the next era of CAPE.

Although this is a time of celebration for CAPE, we would like to take this opportunity to remember our wonderful friend and member of CAPE Friends/Korea, the Honorable Speaker Mansup Lee, who passed away on December 14, 2015.

A Thread Which Passes Through All

oday is the second day in Hawaii. I went to Waikiki Beach where I had a surfing lesson for one hour, then practiced by myself for another hour. The surfing instructor was quite old and looked bored when he taught us the very basic techniques. I understood his attitude because he might have conquered the wave when he was young. I guessed that teaching how to surf to beginners seemed to undermine his pride. His tanned face reminded me of Santiago in Ernest Hemingway's The Old Man and the Sea. Anyway, I had a hard time balancing myself on the surfboard at first. The instructor grabbed my board and pushed me to the shore. No sooner had he pushed me to the shore than I bent on my knees and plunged into the salty water. The water was so salty that I thought that I could eat a whole cow without any seasoning. I was quite disappointed but paddled toward him again as if I were an eaglet that failed to fly from a nest. He said, "Grab the wave and balance," when he pushed me back again. His voice suddenly sounded spiritual, reason of which I didn't know. I stood up and

could go all the way to the shore. I went back to him, smiling with high spirits. He told me that I did a really great job. His compliment made me do it again. After I finished my first surfing lesson, I went to Ward Center with other surf challengers: Juhyun and Boyoung. We went to an Italian restaurant to eat some pizza and salad with beer. The man who waited our table seemed quite energetic but nervous because it was his fifth day of work in that restaurant. He didn't know how much a cup of beer was and asked the manager beside him. We finally succeeded in ordering our food and ate them all. When I paid for our bill, I complimented him on his kindness and enthusiasm in front of his manager. I saw his face turning bright in response to my unexpected praise. As I was leaving the restaurant, he said that he was really thankful for my comment and it really helped him. Every challenge is so hard for beginners to go through. However, there is one thread that can make even an elephant pass through the eye of a needle. It is a compliment with a sincere hope for others' success.
