The annual "Asia Today" Series this year took place over four weekends instead of the usual three. These lectures were very well-received, and the audience gave glowing reviews of the talks. This





On May 2, Dr. Deane Neubauer talked about how higher education especially is undergoing a period of great change in all of Asia. He also addressed the kinds of challenges ASEAN—the Association of South East Asian Nations—countries face in their quest for economic and political development. The audience enjoyed his articulate and informed lecture, and commented on how much they learned from him.

The session on May 9 featured ethno-

musicologist Dr. R. Anderson Sutton discussing the history of his field and the kinds of issues it deals with. Dr. Sutton also gave an intriguing lecture on his specialty, Korean musical traditions, which include modern fusion music. His audience, some of whom had never heard of this field before, followed his comments with great interest and a great sense of learning.

Finally, on May 16, Dr. Karl Kim spoke to a deeply interested audience about disaster response planning, using recent

events in Hawaii and the Asia-Pacific region to illustrate best practices of such work. He was followed by Dr. James Dator analyzing the South Korean economic miracle and its future, and how other nations might emulate it in their own search for economic prosperity without suffering political collapse.

teach a few important expressions such as greetings and introductions, while also explaining various cultural practices and linguistic features of Korean.

On the second Saturday (November 7), Dr. Cynthia Ning will lead the discussion on the cultural setting of Mandarin Chinese. Using edited video footage, she will teach some greetings and polite language, and end with longer clips focusing on Chinese martial arts, and on Islam in China.

The final session on November 14 will cover the language and culture of Japan. The speaker, Dr. Mitsue Tabata-Sandom, will teach a few essential elements of Japanese language, and provide a glimpse of Japanese culture by giving participants hands-on experiences of bowing, playing a chopsticks game, and trying their hand at the art of calligraphy.

# Classroom Observation

have observed a special education class today and last Friday. The class on Friday was a chorus class. They learned how to read lyrics and sing a song. There were four students and two educational assistants. One girl could not move without an assistant's help. They seemed to show their feelings, but I could not tell whether they understood or not. The class I observed today was a language arts class. They did a fishbowl discussion, which is one of my favorite in-class activities that I have seen here. I think it is a student-centered activity and very active. They were shy but did their best. It seems like they do reading and keep Cornell notes just as other ordinary students do. I was curious about evaluating their progress. Even though what they can do falls behind what other ordinary students do, it is still meaningful that they make achievement. I was impressed by the fact that special education is treated as important as regular education here in Hawaii. Even though more human resources are required for special education, people seem to accept it. In Korea, investing budget to elite groups is considered efficient because they produce the best result. People have a consensus that minorities sometimes have to sacrifice for majorities. I am used to this efficiency-oriented way of thinking. However, I try to think in a different way. What if my son or daughter is disabled, and never gets an opportunity for quality education? It is tragic. I think Americans strongly believe that every citizen has the right to be educated no matter what, which I admire.


