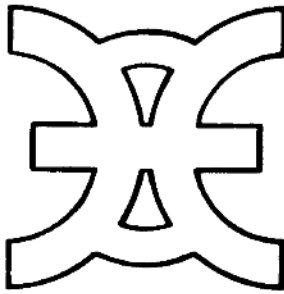

*Come Join us!*

CAPE'S annual Language and Culture Seminar will take place on the three consecutive Saturdays starting November 8, 2014. Please join us to hear experts invited from UH to speak on the topics of New Zealand's Maori culture; Australia's history of convict settlement and the effects of colonization on the indigenous people; and a comparison of the interactions of religion and government in Malaysia and Indonesia. The sessions will be held in Kuykendall Hall 210 on the UH campus (9:00 am – 12:00 noon)!

Te Raukura o Te Rangimarie Roa, currently an instructor of Maori language at UH, will speak on the November 8, will introduce Maori music and haka, a war chant used to raise fighters' spirits.

On November 15, Dr. Barbara Watson Andaya will deliver four short talks, covering a range of topics about Australia, including the pride many Australians take in tracing their family histories to a convict sent to Australia in the 19th century. She will also discuss race issues, and Australia's experience of the First World War and its remembrance of this on ANZAC Day.

On the last day, November 22, Dr. Leonard Andaya will con-

## The 28th Annual "Asia Today" Series

The 2014 "Asia Today" Series covered the current political hotspots of Afghanistan, Pakistan, India, and Myanmar. Delivered by expert speakers over three Saturdays in April and May, the talks were well attended and well-received.

On April 26 Dr. James Weir and Dr. Abdul-Karim Khan began, speaking about Pakistan and Afghanistan. Dr. Weir's lecture, "We Went to the Hills," focused on the role of honor and violence in the tribal cultures of Afghanistan and Pakistan, and he described his experiences as a teacher and an aid worker in the region. He came to know well some of his Afghani co-workers, students, and clients, and his talk included descriptions of what they considered to be a life honorably lived.

Dr. Khan addressed the progress of security and economic stability in Afghanistan, attained at a high cost of American, NATO, and Afghani lives and money, and what the future may be expected to hold. Participants found these lectures

gave them insight seldom provided in the news media, adding to their understanding of a very complicated region.

On May 3, the focused shifted to the economy and politics of India, Dr. Sankaran Krishna's double lecture session. First, he spoke about the persistence of deep poverty in India, despite huge economic growth of the last decades. His second lecture looked at the beneficiaries of this growth, India's middle class, and its interactions with those who have been left out of the modern wave of prosperity and liberty.

On the final day of lectures, Saturday,

May 10, Dr. Michael Aung-Thwin spoke about the linguistic, ethnic, and cultural history of Myanmar. In a talk described by audience members as "thorough, fascinating, objective" and "extremely understandable," Dr. Aung-Thwin demonstrated why he is considered one of the world's leading experts on Myanmar's history and culture.

mornings in classes led by ESL instructors and UH faculty discussing pedagogy and learning theory, as well as straight English lessons.

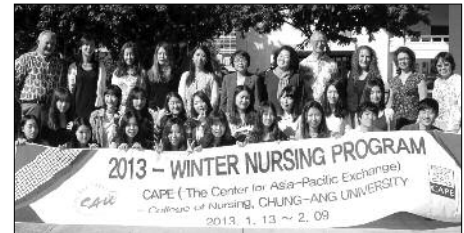
**The 62nd International Program for College Nursing Students (January 6 – 19, 2014)**
