To enter the parade - pre-register 9 AM-3PM at the Chamber of Commerce 347-3226 Last date to sign up for parade is 2:00 PM on Thursday, July 28th.

WASHAKIE COUNTY FAIR GENERAL RULES & REGULATIONS

- 1. THERE WILL BE NO GLASS BEVERAGE CONTAINERS ALLOWED IN THE COMMON AREAS OF THE FAIRGROUNDS.
- 2. Traffic: Except where necessary to avoid conflict with other traffic or in compliance with the directions of a police officer, no person shall stop, stand or park a vehicle:
 - a) in fire lanes
 - b) on the midway
 - c) in any place which unduly interferes with the free movement of traffic or parking for the welfare of the general public or for proper use of the Fairgrounds.
- 3. The charge for admission to the grandstand during Fair Week shall be set by the Fair Board.
- 4. Alcohol: PLEASE read drug and alcohol policy on page 10.
- 5. Offensive Conduct:
 - a) No person shall possess while on the Fairgrounds or bring into the Fairgrounds any gun, knife having a blade longer than three (3) inches, numchucks, or any other lethal weapon.



- b) No person shall engage in fighting or use obscene and abusive language or conduct themselves in a disorderly manner while on the Fairgrounds.
- c) Ropes shall not be used except in the care of livestock, as part of an exhibit or in direct competition.
- 6. Sound: That all sound, such as any kind of music, broadcasting, demonstration of equipment or vocal invitation to see or buy, must be controlled and create no disturbance to others. If complaints are made and are valid, booth buyer will be asked to cease the disturbance. If not stopped, they will be asked to leave immediately.
- 7. Dissemination of information and material:

authorized by the Fair Board upon application hereto.

- a) No concessionaire with the exception of announcers in the grandstand area, workers of the carnival and hired acts for the free stage shall use any voice projection sound control device.
 b) Distribution of advertising material or matter of any kind, nature, or description, including specifically, but not exclusively, political campaign cards, dodgers, flyers, political "newspapers", hand bills, buttons, pins, caps, banners, display cards, ribbons or any and all other forms of media or political advertising of any political party or group by concessionaires, exhibitors, patrons attending annual exhibitions on the Fairgrounds, political parties or by any other person or persons whomsoever, shall be and the same here is PROHIBITED on the Fairgrounds unless such distribution shall be within and from the assigned and designated space as shall have been first duly
- c) Advertising material or matter of any kind, nature or description shall be on the counters or display areas in designated space as shall have been first duly authorized by the Fair Board upon application hereto.
- d) The distribution in any manner of advertising material having a gummed or adhesive backing such as labels, lapel badges, car bumper or window stickers, etc., whether such distribution shall be from a contracted or concession space or not, shall be prohibited upon the Fairgrounds. Persons or organizations found distributing such materials may immediately forfeit all space rights and, in addition, may be held financially responsible for any and all damages, to include cleanup, done as a result of these materials being affixed to Fairgrounds property.
- 8. Animals: No dogs, cats or other **pets** of any type whatsoever are permitted on the Fairgrounds (except at owner's campsite with vaccination records turned in to Fair Office) unless such animal is there for exhibit purposes or involved in the lawful competition (excluding documented service animals). No animals will be allowed in the Concession area.
- 9. The Washakie County Fair Board will assume no liability for injury, loss or damage sustained by person, property or livestock of any exhibitor, concessionaire or spectator. Every animal and article on the grounds shall be under the control of the Fair Board and every precaution will be exercised for the safety and well being of same. The Fair Board has authority to excuse, dismiss or remove any animal from Fairgrounds for any reason.



EXHIBIT INFORMATION

- 1. **Each exhibitor is required to complete entry online.** See back of book for entry information. (Entry sheet is in this book is to keep entries organized; not to be submitted.) Pre-entry does not mean that an exhibitor cannot edit entries. All items must be entered and arrive at the Fair per times listed on the Fair Schedule.
- 2. Extra divisions and classes may be made in any OPEN CLASS DEPARTMENT by the Superintendent in charge. Premiums may not be awarded to inferior exhibits even if there is no competition, and judges shall decide what premium, if any, the exhibit deserves. If worthy, all entries will receive a ribbon and premium (Danish system). Extra classes may be added by the Department Superintendent.
- 3. If a judge gives more placings than shown in the Premium List, extra placings will receive the same premium if a tie, additional placing will receive ribbon only. (Examples: placing of 4th where only 3 are listed, receives ribbon only; two placings in 3rd place, both receive the premium as listed.)
- 4. PURPLE RIBBONS receive the same premium as blue or first.
- 5. ALL ENTRIES must be at the County Fair by the time indicated on the current fair schedule.
- 6. **EXHIBITS MUST BE PICKED UP BETWEEN 8:00 AM AND 2:00 PM ON SUNDAY.** Open Class Exhibitors may pick up cash premiums at that time. <u>Premiums will no longer be paid</u> after the Fair Office closes on Sunday at 2:00 PM, of Fair.
- 7. ALL EXHIBITS must be properly tagged and tags prominently attached to exhibits before they are eligible to be judged.
- 8. The Washakie County Fair Board, upon recommendation of the department Superintendent, reserves the right to reject unworthy entries of any nature by refusing them exhibit space.
- 9. CHECK EACH DEPARTMENT FOR ANY SPECIAL RULES OR REGULATIONS.
- 10. The exhibit building may be closed during open class judging.
- 11. All premiums will be paid upon project completion for youth exhibits. Cash for open class premiums will be available at the Fair Office from 8 AM-2 PM Sunday.
- 12. Perishable items not picked up by 2:00 PM on Sunday will be thrown out. The Washakie Fair Board accepts no responsibility for items left after 2:00 PM on Sunday.
- 13. 4-H Rules are found at the beginning of the 4-H Department.
- 14. Only members from Washakie County youth organizations will be allowed to exhibit at the Washakie County Fair in youth departments.

ABSOLUTELY NO CRUELTY TO ANIMALS WILL BE TOLERATED!

A committee comprised of at least three members of the Fair Board, 4-H leader or FFA advisors will review any reports of animal abuse or cruelty. Consequences may include, but are not limited to the following: First offense - Premiums and awards will be withheld; Second offense - Exhibitor will not be allowed to sell at Junior Liestock Sale this year and/or potentially future years; Third offense - Exhibitor will not be allowed to show at any future Washakie County Fairs.

ANIMAL HEALTH RULES

- 1. All animals presented for exhibition at the Washakie County Fair will be considered under quarantine and not eligible for exhibit until the official health screening is done by the veterinarian **prior** to arrival on grounds before entry. This includes Rabbits and Poultry.
- 2. No animals will be allowed to exhibit at the Washakie County Fair without a current health certificate. **Health Certificates are required to be turned in at Check-In.** A licensed Washakie County veterinarian may implement any special inspection procedures that he believes necessary to prevent the spread of contagious diseases to humans or other animals. An animal showing symptoms of a contagious disease shall be placed in quarantine or removed from the Fairgrounds at the discretion of a licensed Washakie County veterinarian. The professional judgment of the specified veterinarian shall be the deciding factor in all animal health concerns.

- 3. The Washakie County Fair Board reserves the right to develop, employ, and enforce individual animal inspections at any time. The Washakie County Fair Board, or their advisors will make this decision if they feel it is necessary for the health and/or well being of the animals, public health, or other specified health concerns.
- 4. EXHIBITS OF WYOMING ORIGIN. All animal entries of bonafide Wyoming origin must be accompanied by an official health certificate issued at the point of origin by an accredited veterinarian, except horses. All exhibits must have been presented to the issuing veterinarian at the point of origin for adequate inspection prior to loading. HEALTH CERTIFICATES ARE VALID ONLY 30 DAYS WITH THE EXCEPTION OF RABBITS, WHICH MUST BE ISSUED WITHIN 48 HOURS OF THE SHOW.
- 5. Out-of-State Origin Animal Import Requirements: Import requirement information for out-of-state animals and entry permits may be obtained by calling Wyoming Livestoke Board at (307) 777-7515; http://wlsb.state.wy.us. Entry permits are required on bison, cattle, sheep, and swine. A bill of sale or similar statement from the seller if purchased from a Wyoming source must be presented with the current certificate of veterinary inspection issued for entry to the Washakie County Fair before unloading at the Washakie County Fairgrounds.
- 6. No tests for Brucellosis, tuberculosis, pseudorabies, or EIA (Coggins test) are required on bonafide Wyoming origin exhibits.
- 7. No exhibit from a herd under quarantine for any contagious or infectious disease will be allowed on the Washakie County Fair premises.
- 8. If any restricted drug is used within the labeled restricted time period, then the animal cannot be sold at the Washakie County Fair Junior Livestock Sale.
- 9. Sheep: All exhibition sheep must be identified with USDA/APHIS Scrapie identification tags in the ear prior to arrival. All market lambs are required to be slick shorn prior to arrival at the Fairgrounds. Lambs/sheep with active ringworm lesions and/or with active lesions of trichophyton (club lamb fungus) will not be allowed on the grounds.
- **10. PROTESTS:** All formal protests must be submitted in writing, be signed, and be accompanied by \$50 cash or certified check. (Refundable if protest is sustained.) The protest must plainly state the cause of the complaint or appeal and must be delivered to the Fair Office immediately after the occasion for the protest. Judging procedures shall not be interrupted for protest investigation. If protest is not valid, protester will pay all investigation costs and forfeit the \$50 protest fee. No complaint or appeal that a judge overlooked an entry will be considered.

CONCESSION INFORMATION

- 1. Reservations for display space and booth space may be made to Box 451, Worland, WY 82401.
- 2. Food Booths may obtain Health Permits from the Department of Public Health.
- 3. Reservations for concession food items by organizations for the same items as in the past must be in by July 15th. If not reserved by that date, other groups requesting concessions will be given the opportunity of having that concession item.


CAMPER INFORMATION

ALL campers must be registered with the Washakie County Fair Board Office. A campsite number will be assigned at this time. Preference will be given to those living more than 20 miles from the Fairgrounds. A fee of \$100 will be charged for fair week - this is for one day or for all week. Campers must display a camper permit, this permit may be obtained from the Fair Office. Campers are to use only 30 Amp service. Larger units are limited to only one (1) A/C unit at all times. If breakers are blown, larger units with two (2) A/C units will be asked to leave.

ALL campers will have at least one parent in charge and present after curfew hour. Curfew is 11:00 PM or one hour after all scheduled events are over. A list of exhibitors staying in each camper will be registered with the Fair Office. NO CAMPING IS ALLOWED EXCEPT IN ASSIGNED CAMPING SITES. THIS INCLUDES HORSE STALLS AND LIVESTOCK AREAS.

DRUG AND ALCOHOL POLICY

NO illegal drugs will be tolerated anywhere on the Washakie County Fairgrounds. NO alcohol will be allowed anywhere on the Washakie County Fairgrounds except where designated by the Washakie County Fair Board. Anyone, underage, caught using illegal drugs or alcohol will relinquish all rights to exhibit or participate in any Fair event. All premiums, awards, fees, etc. will be forfeited. If a minor is caught using illegal drugs or alcohol,local law enforcement will be notified and that person and their exhibits will immediately be removed from the Fairgrounds.







DEPARTMENT B — OPEN CLASS POULTRY

ALL EXHIBITORS will abide by all applicable rules and regulations of the WASHAKIE COUNTY FAIR. Please see general rules at the beginning of the Premium List, as well as specific department rules. Please note the Animal Health Rules at the beginning of the Fair Book, all poultry requires either the health screening or a current health certificate!

<u>Open Class Poultry - will be judged in their cages as in the past, and will not be brought to the judge and shown individually, unless the exhibitor requests this option. Exhibitor must make arrangements with the superintendent.</u>

Exhibitors must furnish their own feed and feeding equipment. Prize money will be paid only for exhibits properly entered. Premiums may not be awarded to inferior exhibits, even if there is no competition, the judge shall decide what premium, if any, the exhibit deserves. If worthy, all entries will receive a ribbon and premium (Danish System). Extra classes may be added by the Department Superintendent. Premiums for purple ribbons shall be the same as for first (Champion ribbons receive no additional premium.)

There will be a limit of 50 chickens per individual. **Entries must be brought to the Fairgrounds on Tuesday.** Exhibits must remain at the Fair until 8 AM Sunday.




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VEGETABLES

The following information will aid exhibitors in preparing vegetables for exhibit. ASPARAGUS - Should be fresh, tender and firm, with close compact tips. The stalks should be green for almost it's entire length, taper uniformly, the same at the butt, and be the same length.

BEANS, SNAP - Green and wax beans should be clean, firm, crisp, and free from blemishes. Long, straight pods of the same length and color should be selected. The ends of the pods should not be broken off, and the seed should be about one-half grown.

BEANS, LIMA - Lima bean pods should be well filled, clean, fresh and of a dark green color. They should be uniform in color, shape and size.

BEETS, TABLE - Diameter should be 2 to 2½ inches. Side rootlets should be removed, but tap root should not be removed. All specimens should be uniform in color, shape and size. Tops trimmed, leaving 1 inch of leaf stock above crown.

BROCCOLI - Heads should be uniform in dark green color, condition and size. Should be compact, not less than 3 inches in diameter, and free from damage by disease, insects, worms or wilting. Cut the stems squarely above the first whorl of leaves to give an overall length of 5 inches.

BRUSSEL SPROUTS - All the heads should be firm, compact, fresh, a good green color, and uniform in shape and size. Heads not less than 1 inch in diameter are desired. Stems should be smoothly trimmed to ½ inch.

CABBAGE - Heads should be the same variety, uniform in color, shape and size. Should be firm, heavy in comparison to size, free from damage by freezing, diseases, or insects. Midribs should not be large, and the leaves should not be trimmed too closely. Leave stem 1/4 inch long to hold leaves firmly.

CARROTS - Select carrots that are smooth, straight, firm, deep orange in color, and free from greening at the top. Specimens should be typical of their variety. Avoid oversize. Should be free from side roots, cracks or other damage. Cut off tops to 1 inch.

CAULIFLOWER - Heads should be pure white, solid, uniform and close flowered. Should not have leaves appearing through the head. Trim the green outer leaves to 1 inch above the head. Trim the butt or stem to allow 4 to 6 leaves to remain.

CELERY - Should be uniform in color and size. Trim off outside stalks until color is uniform. The heart, which is made up of stocky inner branches should be well developed. The outer leaves should be crisp, free from prominent ribs, splits, and damage by disease and insects. Wash the plant until it is clean. Trim the root to a triangle shape not over 1 inch long. Exhibit should be commercially prepared.

CITRON MELON - Uniform in color, shape and size. Rind healthy, clean without blemishes, as judging is based nearly entirely on the condition of the rind and not the flesh. Trim stem to 1 inch.

CORN, SWEET - Ears should be well formed and filled out to tip, free from any kind of injury. Kernels should be soft, tender and filled with thick opaque milky juice. Uniform in size. Should be husked and trimmed for judging. Free of silks. The shank should be trimmed to 1/4 inch from the base of the cob. The tip of the ear may be neatly clipped, although only a small portion of the cob should be removed, not over ½ inch.

CUCUMBERS, PICKLING - Avoid oversize. Same variety, uniform in color, shape and size, not more than 1 1/4 inches in diameter and not more than 4 inches long. Fairly straight, with blunt ends. Clean by gently brushing with a soft brush to avoid removing the spines. Trim stems to 1/4 inch.

CUCUMBERS, SLICING - Straight, firm, uniform in color, shape and size, same variety. Not overgrown, but should be uniformly medium or dark green 6 to 9 inches long. Clean by gently brushing with a soft brush to avoid reducing the natural bloom. Cut the stem off to 1/4 inch.

EGGPLANT - Specimens should be smooth, firm, heavy but not too large, uniform in shape and size, and free from blemishes, are desired. Select for uniform purple coloring, free from bronzing and greening. Wipe with a soft cloth, but do not wash. Trim stem to 1 inch.

ENDIVE - Uniform in color, shape and size. Have a creamy-white heart formation with a spread of not less than 4 inches, when the head is open as far as possible without breaking the leaves. Leaves should be fresh, tender, crisp, and free from blemishes. Trim roots 1/4 inch from the outer leaf stems.

GARLIC - Select garlic that is uniform in color, shape and size. Garlic should be firm, without any sprouts. Trim roots to less than 0.25 inches and clean by removing outer skin and brushing off dirt.

GHERKIN, WEST INDIAN - Separated from cucumbers, as the gherkin and cucumbers are different species. Avoid oversize, not more than 1 ½ inches in diameter and not more than 3 inches long. Trim stem to 1/4 inch.

KOHLRABI - Specimens should not be hard, woody or pithy. They should be 2 to 3 inches in diameter and very smooth. Skin should be easily punctured by thumb nail. Clean but do not wash. Remove all leaves by trimming the stems to 1 inch long. Cut off the stem portion just below the ball.

LETTUCE, HEAD - All specimens should be uniform in color, shape and size. Should be crisp, firm, clean and free from damage. Cut off the stem 1/4 inch from the bottom lead. Remove loose and damaged outer leaves.

MUSKMELON (CANTALOUPE) - All specimens should be the same variety, free from decay, cracks and any damage caused by insects, diseases, hail or other means. Should be fully ripe, picked "full slip". If several days elapse between picking date and exhibit, they may be picked on "half slip" and permitted to ripen with stems attached.

ONIONS - All the same variety, uniform in color, shape and size. Should be clean and free from damage of any kind. Avoid large sizes, but should not be less than 2 inches in diameter. The bulbs should have most of their thin papery skin intact. Do not peel so as to give slick appearance. The tops (neck) should be small and trimmed to 1 inch.

PEAS - Pods should be fresh, bright green and well filled with tender peas. Uniform in color, shape and size, with green calyxes attached. Free from any kind of injury, such as insects, diseases, or hail.

PEPPERS - All specimens should be the same variety and must be the same color. Should be uniform in shape and size. Sweet green peppers should be a healthy green with no reddish blush or other discoloration. Sweet red or yellow peppers should have healthy, clear red or yellow color with no greenish tinge. All peppers should be free from sun scald or damages caused by insects and diseases. Leave stem on and trim to 1 inch long.

PARSLEY - Uniform in color and about the same size. Free from dirt, yellowing or discolored leaves. Should be fresh, bright green in color. Each bunch should be 2 to 3 inches at butt. Trim stems neatly to have an overall length of 8 to 10 inches.

PARSNIPS - Roots firm, smooth, tapering evenly, small in diameter 1 ½ to 2 ¼ inches, without side roots. Should be light creamy color, with tap root left on. Trim top to 1 inch.

POTATOES - Select potatoes that are uniform in color, shape and size. Potatoes should be firm and free of greening, cracks, scabs, or other blemishes. Clean by removing dirt but do not wash

PUMPKIN, PIE - Specimens should be uniform in color, shape and size, free from insect and mechanical injury. Do not wash, may be brushed clean. Leave stem attached and trim to 1 inch.

RADISHES, WINTER - Uniform in color, shape and size. Flesh should be crisp and tender, not pithy. Free from injury caused by disease, insects, growth cracks, or mechanical damage. Trim leaf tops to 1 inch.

RHUBARB - All stalks should be uniform in color, shape, size and texture. Length after trimming should be at least 10 inches. Stalks should be tender, crisp, fresh, not pithy, limp or wilted. Neatly trim the tops leaving 1 inch of leaves and prongs. The stalks should be pulled when harvested, not cut off. The basal husks should be removed from the bottom of the stalk. Each stalk should measure ½" to 3/4" across its flat face at the center.

SALSIFY (OYSTER PLANT) - Small to medium size, 1 to 1 ½ inches in diameter at the thickest part. Length should be 6 inches or more. Roots should be straight and smooth, evenly tapered. Rootlets and side roots should be removed. Brush off dirt, do not wash. Trim top to 1 inch.

SQUASH, SUMMER - Select squash that are 4 to 8 inches in length and uniform in color, shape, and size. Squash should be free of blemishes, cracks, or other damage. Trim stems to 0.5 inches in length.

SQUASH, WINTER - Pick when mature, when shells are hardened. Uniform in color, shape, and size, free from insect injury or mechanical damage. Brush to clean but do not wash. Trim stem to 1 inch long.

SWISS CHARD - Must be fresh, crisp, with bright green leaves and clear white stems. Specimens uniform in color and size. Clean by washing if necessary. Trim off roots and trim butt to a triangle shape. Exhibit should be uniform in color and size and commercially prepared.

TOMATOES - Specimens uniform in color, shape and size. Free from cracks, sun scald and blemishes. Ripe, solid and without stems, (leave stems on the pickling or preserving types.)

TURNIPS - Uniform in size, shape and color. Medium size 1 3/4 to 2 3/4 inches in diameter. Flesh should be crisp, fine grained, and not pithy. Free of damage. Should be clean and bright in color, but not washed. Smooth, firm, with secondary rootlets removed but with 2 or 3 inches of tap root remaining. Trim tops to 1 inch.

WATERMELONS - Specimens of the same variety and uniform in color, shape and size. Should be mature, but not overripe. Free from decay or damage from sun scald, hail, insects or disease. Wipe off dirt, but do not wash. Leave stem 1 inch long.





ALL EXHIBITORS WILL ABIDE BY ALL APPLICABLE RULES AND REGULATIONS OF THE WASHAKIE COUNTY FAIR. PLEASE SEE GENERAL RULES AT THE BEGINNING OF THE PREMIUM LIST, AS WELL AS SPECIFIC DEPARTMENT RULES.

Anyone in the County is invited to exhibit flowers they have grown.

Entries must arrive between 5 PM and 7 PM on Tuesday or 9 AM to Noon on Wednesday. All entries must be in place by Noon on Wednesday. Exhibits must remain at the Fair until 8 AM Sunday. Any items left after 2 PM will be removed from the building. Refer to EXHIBIT INFORMATION in the front of this book.

CONTAINERS WILL BE SUPPLIED FOR ALL CUT FLOWERS.

The superintendent in charge of this department shall have the right to remove from the display, at any time, exhibits or parts of exhibits which become unsightly.

Unless otherwise specified, all flowers exhibited must be grown by the exhibitor. Potted plants must be in the possession of the exhibitors for at least 90 days prior to the Fair exhibit. Cut flowers must be shown with foliage, if naturally attached to specimen. Remove leaves that would be under water. No leaf dressing of any kind is acceptable.

IMPORTANT INSTRUCTIONS TO EXHIBITORS: Select flowers that are coming into full bloom - NOT flowers that are already in full bloom.

If a flower is to remain fresh throughout the exhibit period, it should be cut no sooner than the day before it is to be exhibited. It is generally recognized that afternoon - especially cutting in the late afternoon, when the greatest amount of sugar has ascended into the leaves and bloom - as well as "hardening off" process will help ensure a winning entry.

Flower stems should be cut cleanly at an angle with a sharp knife or pruning shears and plunged into deep hot water: 110 degrees Fahrenheit is ideal. It is a good practice to carry a bucket of water to the garden and to place each cut specimen in the water at once. For Dahlias, Sunflowers and Hollyhocks it is suggested that immediately after picking, dip the stem in boiling water or sear over gas flame, this will keep the dahlia, sunflower or hollyhock from wilting.

Following cutting and hot water treatment, specimens should be placed in a cool, darkened room. After several hours, when the water has come to room temperature, add ice to the water and leave the flower material undisturbed overnight. Flowers prepared in this way improve their substance and will hold their freshness longer. Check for and remove insects.

DEFINITIONS: CUT FLOWERS, ROSES, DAHLIAS and GLADIOLUS

Bloom: one individual flower

Spike: several flowers on a long stem (example: Gladiolus)

Spray: single stem with terminal buds or flowers and two or more auxiliary buds, flowers or foliage.

Stem: main ascending part of a plant - not over 18 inches.

NOTE: some kinds of flowers have several blossoms on one stem, others only one. The idea of limiting the number of stems has been inaugurated so that the exhibits will not be too crowded. Do not crowd flowers so that some of the foliage cannot be seen. Use your own judgement, but try to conform to the rules to help the committee in charge of the show. NO FOREIGN FOLIAGE SHOULD APPEAR IN SINGLE VARIETY DISPLAYS.

Exhibitors may make only ONE (1) entry in a class except where noted *, **limited to 3**. If worthy, all entries will receive a ribbon and premium (Danish System) . Department Superintendent may make additional classes.

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
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ELIGIBILITY OF EXHIBITS AND EXHIBITORS

- 1. Only bona fide 4-H and FFA Club Members of Washakie County are eligible to compete for prizes offered in this department at the Washakie County Fair. They must have been properly enrolled before project deadlines are set for the current year.
- 2. A club member must be enrolled in the project for which he or she exhibits.
- 3. The exhibits must be the result of the 4-H/FFA Member's project during the current club year.
- 4. 4-H/FFA exhibits are placed as judged using the Danish system of recognition (purple, blue, red, white). Additional awards or recognition are available pending donor support.

ENTRIES OF EXHIBITS IN THE 4-H CLUB DEPARTMENT

Information regarding specific entries for exhibit will be found under specific division headings.

ALL EXHIBITORS WILL ABIDE BY ALL APPLICABLE RULES AND REGULATIONS OF THE WASHAKIE COUNTY FAIR. PLEASE SEE GENERAL RULES AT THE BEGINNING OF THE PREMIUM LIST, AS WELL AS SPECIFIC DEPARTMENT RULES.

GENERAL INFORMATION

4-H/FFA members must pre enter their exhibits online. Enties are due before midnight, Monday, July 11. **NO LATE ENTRIES WILL BE ACCEPTED.**

Entries to be completed online at http://washakiecountyfair.fairentry.com

All entries should have a Learning Statement attached to your entry. Points to consider may include: process, tools used, skills learned, goals achieved, additional help from others. If exhibit is sent to State Fair, the Learning Statement may help the judge when assigning a ribbon placing.

Posters, pictures, artwork and photography should come with a method for hanging them on hooks attached to pegboards. If items cannot be hung, they will be displayed on the floor or a table. Display boards or poster boards must be able to stand on their own on a table or floor.

Fair management is not responsible for missing or broken items.

Exhibits must be in place by 4 PM on Entry Day, unless otherwise designated. Exhibits must be left until Release Time. See Schedule of Events at the beginning of this book for release times.

4-H/FFA Premiums will be paid ONLY on completion of projects, including completion of record books. This means a completed project page for each project entered in the county fair.

Any exhibitor wishing early release for any exhibit must send a written request to the Washakie County Fair Board to have such a request considered. (Send to Box 451 or bring to the Fair office prior to Friday, July 15.)

LIVESTOCK EXHIBITS - SPECIAL RULES

Please see "ANIMAL HEALTH RULES" at the front of this book (white pages) under General Rules. Club members must have had their beef animals by February 1, their market sheep, swine and goats by May 15, their horses and dogs by June 1, and all other animals by June 1 of the current year.

CRUELTY TO ANIMALS WILL NOT BE TOLERATED ON THE WASHAKIE COUNTY FAIRGROUNDS. NO DOGS WILL BE ALLOWED IN THE LIVESTOCK AREA.

All market animals shown must be properly tagged with designated Wyoming State Fair ear tags. Market animals not having the proper tags in place will not be eligible to show. Sheep and Goats must have USDA/APHIS Scrapie Tags.

If youth are in 4-H and FFA, animals must be designated which organization each specific animal will be shown in. The same animal may not be shown in both organizations.

YOUTH ANIMAL CARE/FITTING POLICY: Youth exhibitors must accompany, care for and exhibit their own livestock at the Washakie County Fair. A youth member is expected to take care of and groom/ fit their own animal at the Washakie County Fair. However, in the interest of safety and education, a

youth member may be assisted by immediate family, Washakie County 4-H and FFA leaders, past or current Washakie County 4-H and FFA Members

Assistance is defined as a learning situation where the person assisting is demonstrating the youth member a technique, in fitting or showing. This person is allowed <u>show</u> the youth member the proper skill or techniques, but the youth member is expected to perform the majority of each technique or skill required.

Violations of this rule must be reported to the Show Superintendent before the animal enters the ring. A decision by the superintendent/fairboard will be made before the animal is allowed to enter the ring.

If the youth member is found to be in violation of the fitting policy, he or she may be disqualified from competition in any youth division at the Washakie County Fair, including showmanship. During official class judging, only the exhibitor will be allowed in the show ring. In Showmanship Classes, exhibitors must show their own animal, with no substitution of an animal or exhibitor. In case of sickness or other emergency, an animal may be shown by a substitute exhibitor, providing the substitute is a bona-fide Wyoming 4-H or FFA member and the Show Superintendent grants permission in writing and is recorded in advance of the show.

Each youth member having livestock for show is required to keep their display area clean and have stalls and pens orderly at all times.

No muzzles of any type will be allowed on the livestock unless approved by the Superintendents.

Only animals underweight may be re-weighed at the designated time.

Unsportsmanlike conduct will not be tolerated and offending exhibitors could forfeit premiums and may be dismissed from the fairgrounds.

Members may exhibit not more than TWO animals in a class in any livestock division. Any animal may be shown in ONLY ONE CLASS.

All 4-H/FFA Livestock will be exhibited at the Washakie County Fairgrounds. Livestock must be preentered online as stipulated under General Information pre-entry dates. Livestock stalls, pens and tie outs are assigned by the Superintendents. These are not to be changed unless approved by the superintendent.

NOTE: All market animals to be sold at the Junior Livestock Sale must be exhibited and cared for by the owners. All other animals, regardless of breed, type or species must be cared for and exhibited by the owner.

FAMILY ANIMAL RULING – The purpose of the family animal is for hardship cases. Each family (same mailing address) may designated one animal, per species, as a family animal during official tagging dates. The animal may be tagged and designated for all members of the family and must follow county fair deadlines. At weigh-in during county fair the family can designate which child that animal is to be assigned to permanently (animal may be assigned as 4-H or FFA at that time). This animal is eligible to sell at the Junior Livestock Sale, however NOT eligible for state fair. All other rules still apply to the family animal (tagging dates, weights, ownership, etc).

LIVESTOCK SCHEDULE

Horses are to be in place and ready to show by 8 AM on Saturday. All other livestock is to be at the Fairgrounds by the scheduled weigh-in times.

- b. All animals must be bred, born, raised and fed within the boundaries of Washakie County.
- c. All animals must be owned by a Washakie County 4-H or FFA member and must be properly entered in the market livestock class in the Washakie County Fair.
- d. Proof of eligibility will be provided by completion of the entry form for the class.
- e. Animals must show in market classes within the weight limits indicated for Beef, Sheep and Swine market animals.

JUNIOR LIVESTOCK SALE

The minimum and maximum weights for market animals in each species are listed in the various divisions. The scales at the Fairgrounds are certified scales, weight for show animals will be determined at entry. Animals may not sell at the Junior Livestock Sale if they have not been shown as market animals in the Washakie County Fair. Animals sold at the Junior Livestock Sale must be presented for sale by their exhibiting owner. Members selling animals must have a bill of sale from the person they purchased their animal from to present to the brand inspector. This bill of sale must be turned in at the time the animal is entered and weighed in.

Buyers - please note that there will be a special paper passed to you during the sale in order for you to denote the destination of the animal purchased - you will not be asked publicly the destination of the animal. This is to enable more recognition for the buyer and the generous participation of those involved and less emphasis on the final destination of the animal.

Any youth with grand and reserve champion animals at the Washakie County Fair will have the privilege to sell. Youth must sell that animal if they are planning to sell an animal in that species. The youth will not be allowed to sell a lower placing animal in that particular species. If the youth has Grand and Reserve Champion in the same species, the youth may choose which of those to sell. If the member chooses not to sell their grand or reserve champion animal, they forfeit their right to sell a replacement species, regardless if in the 4-H or FFA program. Those youth with grand and reserve animals will also have the privilege to choose their lot number in the sale order within the first round of exhibitors. If the exhibitor fails to notify the sale committee by Friday at 9am (week of county fair) they will be assigned a lot number by the sale committee.

Any youth planning to sell livestock at the Junior Livestock Sale must complete a quality assurance requirement and sign (along with a parent) the Junior Livestock Sale Rules and Agreement (copy located in back of fair book) by the fair online entry day deadline.



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HERDSMANSHIP

Each member is expected to clean his/her own pen or stall during the fair and prior to being released. (Premium checks will be withheld from members whose pens or stalls are left uncleaned.) A Fair Board member or Superintendent will be available to sign off that you have cleaned the area. Stall cards are to be completed and on display during the duration of the fair. Initial bedding is supplied by the Fair, additional bedding is available for purchase (information at the Fair Office.)

Herdsmanship is an important feature of youth shows and involves ones pride in being at the fair with ones animals. A committee will be selected to evaluate and select a "Golden Broom" and a "Silver Broom" recipient in the following animal species: Beef, Sheep, Swine, Goats, Rabbits, Poultry, Alpacas.

Golden Broom Award: \$50.00 Silver Broom Award: \$25.00

- A Purebred cat is one belonging to a recognized breed with characteristics maintained through generations of unmixed descent, may be registered with a recognized registry.
- 3. Kittens must be at least 4 months old and not older than 8 months of age. Adult cats are older than 8 months of age. Because of susceptibility to disease, no kitten under 4 months of age will be accepted for competition.
- 4. No pregnant or nursing cats may be entered.
- 5. All cats and kittens must have their claws clipped. Declawed cats may enter the show and will not be counted down for declawing.
- 6. Do not enter cat if you feel it will not be easily handled by the judge.
- 7. Each cat or kitten must be wearing a harness or collar (not a safety collar) and a leash. The exhibitor must always wear the leash on their wrist for safety reasons.
- 8. Exhibitors must furnish their own carpet square during judging. Exhibitors must provide a proper cage or carrier for their cats/kittens. Exhibitors must bring their own litter and litter box.
- 9. All exhibitors should wear long sleeve shirts or blouses with trousers or skirts. No shorts

Health Requirements: All cat entries must include completed Wyoming State Cat ID forms and proof of vaccinations. These need to be turned in to the Washakie County Extension 4-H office prior to the Cat show. It is strongly suggested, but not mandatory, that all entries have the combination vaccinations, plus feline leukemia. Vaccinations should not be received within three weeks prior to the show. All cats may be examined by a veterinarian. Cats found to be ill or with parasites (fleas, ear mites, etc.) will not be allowed to show and will be dismissed from the grounds. No cat or kitten may enter the show if there is any (feline) infectious or contagious disease in the household within three weeks prior to the show date.

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DIVISION H15 — 4-H DOG SHOW

General Rules and Regulations

All rules and expectations for WSF and other Junior and 4-H Show animal exhibitors will be applicable to the 4-H Dog Show.

- 1. All dogs must be at least 6 months of age by May 1st to compete at the dog show and 1 year of age by May 1st for agility classes.
- 2. All dog entries must include a completed Wyoming State Dog ID forms and proof of vaccinations. These need to be turned in to the Washakie County Extension 4-H office prior to the Dog show. No animals will be allowed at the Washakie County Fair without a valid Animal Health Certificate.
- 3. All dogs must be on leash and under control at all times. Dogs are prohibited on the fair grounds except at the dog show. Dogs must not be taken near livestock. Once the 4-H Dog Show is complete, all dogs must be removed from the fairgrounds.
- 4. Vicious dogs will be dismissed from the ring and must be removed from the premises.
- 5. Females in season will be allowed in classes, however they will go through at the end of all classes.
- 6. Spayed, monorchid and neutered dogs may be shown without judging discrimination.
- 7. Dogs must be clean and well groomed.
- 8. The show committee reserves the right to ask anyone violating these rules to leave.
- 9. Entries for rally classes and agility classes will need current Wyoming 4-H jump height card at check-in to verify correct class entries.

Section 2 - Obedience

- 1. A 4-H member may compete in only one obedience class per dog.
- 2. A 4-H member may enter a maximum of two dogs in obedience classes. For class entries, the first dog is referred to as the "A" dog. The other dog is referred to as the "B" dog. An exhibitor competes in an "A" class with their first dog and in a "B" class with their second.
- 3. The first year beginner novice class is for members who are in their first year in the dog project, not the first year with a new dog and is designed as a training class for members who do not feel competent to start in the On Leash class. Members may compete in the first-year class only once.
- 4. 4-H members with an obedience dog shown previously by another 4-H handler must show the dog by these guidelines:
 - a. Junior or Intermediate 4-Hers may move back or down one level.
 - b. Senior 4-Hers must show the dog at the highest level the dog has achieved.
- 5. A dog having a qualifying score of 170 points at the county show may advance the following year to the next higher class but must advance after receiving 3 qualifying scores. Once the higher level of obedience is selected for the dog, the member may not drop back to the lower level with the same dog.
- 6. High in trial will be calculated on the basis of raw score plus 5 additional points with each increase in level of difficulty.



- 7. Score Sheets: The Wyoming 4-H dog score sheets were designed for the benefit of 4-H members. They are intended as guides for judges. A judge uses their discretion in deciding the seriousness of errors.
- 8. All dogs must enter/leave the show ring and compete with a six-foot leash.
- 9. Dogs soiling or urinating in the ring during judging will be disqualified.
- 10. Males and females will be shown in the same class. Females in heat will be shown last and must be kept away from the obedience ring until call time.
- 11. Bait is not allowed in obedience competition

Section 3 - Conformation

- 1. All dogs must enter and leave the ring on leash.
- 2. Classes will be subdivided by breeds within a class, if numbers warrant. First place winners in classes 12-21 will compete for Best of Show award in conformation.
- 3. Exhibitors entering more than one dog in any class may be assisted only by another 4-H member (from the same county), if the dogs must be shown at the same time.
- 4. Classes 12-19 will be judged according to AKC standards, but it is not necessary that dogs be registered; they must be purebred (both animal parents of the same breed).
- 5. Classes 20-21 are for crossbred dogs parents of different breeds and will be judged according to the predominant breed characteristics and/or soundness, gait, condition, and grooming.
- 6. Before entering your dog, check the list of breeds that are eligible for each group. It can be found online at http://Wyoming4H.org under the dog link of the projects tab.

- 3. A dog receiving a qualifying score of at least 75 points at county fair may advance the following year to the next higher class but must advance after receiving 3 qualifying scores. Once the higher level in agility is selected for the dog, the member may not drop back to the lower level with the same dog.
- 4. Youth, with a dog shown in previous years by another 4-H handler or in shows sponsored by other dog organizations, must show the dog under these guidelines:
 - a. Junior and Intermediate aged 4-H youth may move "back" or "down" one level.

- 6. Level 1 dogs will run on a leash. Level 2 dogs must run off leash, or a 6 inch tab for quick corrections. Collars must be of a flat, buckle variety with nothing hanging from it such as tags.
- 7. Bait is not allowed in agility competition.
- 8. Dogs in season will run at the end of each class.
- 9. A time for all handlers (only) to familiarize themselves with the course they are competing in will be established and announced.
- 10. Fastest times will be used to break ties on scores at all levels.

Any violation of the following rules will result in immediate disqualification of the exhibitor in the Youth Beef Show. Further forfeiture of privileges and disciplinary action may be taken.

- a. No use of any grooming material, on an entry, that when rubbed with a glove or cloth shows evidence of artificial color.
- b. No showing of livestock of any ineligible age or showing unethically fitted livestock. Unethical fitting is deemed to consist of any method which alters the natural conformation of any part of the animal's body, or any animal having been operated on or tampered with for the purpose of concealing faults or with the intent to deceive.
- c. The attempted surgical or non-surgical alteration of conformation of an animal is prohibited, except for dehorning. Cattle are to be shown in their natural conformation.
- d. The use of false tailheads, or adding hair, or other material to any part of the animal's body is prohibited.
- e. The dying or artificial changing of the existing color pattern and/or color is prohibited.

Animals will be stalled in assigned stalls and assigned tie-outs only. Tie-outs must be in the barn by 8 AM and remain in the assigned stalls until 7 PM.





MARKET GOATS

- 1. Possession date for Market Goats is May 15 of current year.
- 2. Exhibitors are to abide by Animal Health Requirements. All market goats must have USDA/APHIS scrapie identification tags in place prior to arrival. All market goats must have Wyoming State Fair designated ear tags and/or tattoos at processing.
- 2. Market goats must be uniformly slick shorn with 3/8 inch of hair or less at the time of arrival on the fairgrounds. Legs may have hair up to the hock and knee only.
- 3. Market goats may have horns. If horns are present, the horns must be blunted and not exceed two inches in length. No fresh dehorning wounds will be allowed.
- 4. Market goats may be either non-bred does or wethers.
- 5. Market goats are to have milk teeth or may have lost one or both of their milk teeth, but there shall be no evidence of breaking skin or eruption of the two permanent front teeth.
- 6. Market goats must weigh a minimum of 50 pounds, no set upper weight limit. Goats need to be of a marketable weight and size.

YOUTH HORSE SHOW — DIVISIONS J7-8 GENERAL RULES — JUNIOR HORSE SHOW

- 1. All rules of the Current Wyoming 4-H Horse Rule Book apply unless superseded by specific rules herein.
- 2. Health: The Washakie County Fair reserves the right to develop, employ and enforce individual anmal inspections at any time. The Management, or their advisors will make the decision if they feel it is necessary for the health and/or well-being of animals, public health, or other specific healthy concerns. Any horse suspected of ill health may be dismissed from the Fairgrounds.
- 3. Unsportsmanlike conduct will not be tolerated and the offending exhibitor will forfeit premiums and may immediately be dismissed from Fairgrounds.
- 4. For both halter and performance classes, no more than two horses in a class may be exhibited by any one exhibitor.
- 5. Horses are not required to be registered but should be typical of the class and of high quality.
- 6. There will be NO STALLIONS allowed in the Youth (4-H/FFA) Horse Show.
- 7. Horses are not required to remain stalled at the fairgrounds. Horses may stay in the stalls if the member chooses, superintendent to be notified.
- 8. 4-H Safety Certification is required for each horse that a 4-H member plans to compete with in the Youth Horse Show.
- 9. FFA Safety Test is required for an FFA member to participate in the State Fair Youth Horse Show.
- 10. Working Cow horse entries should have completed some training in this class to be eligible to compete at the State Fair.
- 11. SAFETY: Safe Horsemanship guidelines must be followed during the Youth Horse Show to protect exhibitors and spectators. Unsafe practices will be prohibited (eg. Riding double, riding bareback, riding with halters only, riding at a speed greater than a walk outside the arenas, etc.) All animals must be under control at the Junior Horse Show. Unruly animals may be excused.
- 12. The Horse Project is a youth project designed to promote responsibility and leadership within the 4-H/FFA group. For this reason, the individual 4-H/FFA member shall care for, clean, water, feed, bathe, prepare for show and exhibit his or her own animal as stated in the general policies.

YOUTH SHEEP SHOW — DIVISIONS J10 & J11 GENERAL RULES

- 1. Breeding sheep must be purebred or registered, except for Breed H which will be for commercial, crossbred, or wether type sheep. Each animal entered in Breed H must be individually identified.
- 2. All sheep exhibited must be owned in the name of the individual member by May 15, of the current year.

Sheep determined to lack visible tail length may be evaluated by palpitation for the presence of tail vertebrae. If no tail vertebrae are found, it is cause for disqualification. Any lamb not meeting this criteria will be disqualified from any competition at the Washakie County Fair. Any lamb showing signs of rectal prolapse may be disqualified. All sheep should be docked in a manner that does not compromise the animal's health and well being.
- 9. Breeding Sheep Showmanship is not offered at the Wyoming State Fair. This will be a Washakie County class only.

Animals will be stalled in assigned stall only. The Lamb Project is a youth project designed to promote responsibility and leadership within the 4H/FFA group. For this reason, the individual 4H/FFA member shall care for, clean, water, feed, groom, bathe, clip, trim, prepare for show and exhibit his or her own animal as stated in the general policies.



Any lamb not meeting this criteria will be disqualified from any competition at the Washakie County Fair. Any lamb showing signs of rectal prolapse may be disqualified. All sheep should be docked in a manner that does not compromise the animal's health and well being.
- 8. Market lambs are not allowed to have any artificial color, paint or powders used on the animal.
- 9. Slapping or lifting of market lambs in the show ring will not be condoned. All lambs must have four feet on the ground during the judging. Lifting feet off the ground or placing on any support or altered ring surface is not acceptable. Exhibitors will receive one warning if found lifting or slapping lambs, second offense will result in automatic exhibitor and animal disqualification.
- 10. Speckled Face Lambs. See Wyoming State Fair Book, for further information.
- 11. All market lambs must have water containers with fresh water in the pens at all times. Drenching as a method to source nutrition for an animal is prohibited. Only in the case of a licensed veterinarian prescribing an animal health need to utilize drenching, in writing, is it to be considered acceptable.
- 12. Youth Show Market Lamb classes will be established by breed, and then weight within each breed division respectively following processing. Champions and Reserve Champions from each of the breed divisions will compete for Overall Grand and Reserve Champion Market Lamb.







- 2. All pocket pets are to be confined to an escape proof cage or container, suitable for that particular species, while they are on the fairgrounds. Exhibitors must provide their own cages. It is the total responsibility of the exhibitor to provide for the health and welfare of the animal while it is at the fair.
- 3. Exhibitors may be asked to discuss and have a knowledge of their pet and may be asked to handle their pet at the judge's discretion.
- 4. Any pet showing signs of illness will be removed from the grounds immediately at the discretion of the Superintendent.
- 5. Animals must be owned by the exhibitor by July 1 to show at the fair.
- 6. Junior exhibitor- ages 8 10 years; Intermediate exhibitor- ages 11-13 years; Senior exhibitor ages 14 years and older. Exhibits in classes 13, 14 and 15 cannot be the same as current 4-H static exhibits. PREMIUMS: 1st ~ \$6.00; 2nd ~ \$5.00; 3rd ~ \$4.00; 4th ~ \$3.00; 5th ~ \$2.00; 6th ~ \$1.00



(See 4-H Department for additional rules - the Livestock Rules listed in the 4-H Department apply to all livestock exhibited by Junior Exhibitors - 4-H and FFA members.) Please note that the Fair Board has changed to a Junior Show for livestock exhibits – there will not be separate 4-H and FFA classes, with the exception of Showmanship.

All static (inside) exhibits must be in place by 4 PM on Entry Day and must remain until Release Time on Final Day (see 4-H Department for livestock schedule).

Extra Classes may be made by the Superintendent. Each exhibitor may exhibit only one (1) item per class.



Washakie County Junior Livestock Sale Procedure and Rules – Seller's Responsibilities
☐ I will honor the sales contract and agree to fully indemnify the Washakie County Junior Live-
stock Sale Committee for any claims or losses.
☐ I understand that this activity has some inherent risk. I take responsibility for that risk. I release
the Washakie County Fair, Washakie County 4-H, Chief Washakie FFA, Ten Sleep FFA and the
Washakie County Junior Livestock Sale Committee from any and all liability from any injury to
person or damage to property that may occur.
Only 4-H and FFA members, that are in good standing and have met show requirements for their
respective animals are permitted to consign the exhibited market animal. There will be a limit of
one animal per species with a total limit of two species per member permitted in the sale.
Youth who wish to sell an animal at the Junior Livestock Sale must have completed the Live-
stock Quality Assurance appropriate level for their age by June 30 in order to sell.
No underweight animals will be sold. Overweight animals may be sold, but youth will only
receive payment for the posted maximum weight for that species. See market animal weights in the
Washakie County Fair Premium Book.
☐ I certify that my animal(s) has NOT been administered any non-approved biological agents as
per USDA regulations which state "all meat producing livestock must be withheld for the appropri-
ate withdrawal time after inoculation with any biological agent." (Including fly sprays and restrict-
ed feeds). Beef and sheep have not been fed any ruminant derived protein feeds.
☐ I understand that all Junior Livestock Sale animals are subject to random drug testing.
☐ I understand that ear tag numbers presented for delivery must match that of the animal sold in the
sale ring.
☐ I am responsible for the proper feeding and care of the animal(s) until delivery to the buyer or
designated processor. It is the youth's responsibility to make arrangements with the buyer's choice
of a processor for delivery. Upon delivering your animal to the processor, have them sign the sale

you note to the Washakie County Extension Office to receive your check.
Youth selling livestock will not receive payment on sale day. Sale animals bought for slaughter
must be taken home by the member and brought back to the processor. Make an appointment with
the processor for delivery.
☐ I understand insurance on my animals is optional but encouraged and that if my sale animal dies
before delivery to the buyer, I will forfeit funds from the sale of this animal, if an agreement cannot
be made with buyer for a replacement. I will notify the Junior Livestock Sale Committee immedi-

I have provided necessary forms to the Brand Inspector for beef and sheep.

has Grand and Reserve Champion in the same species, the youth may choose which of those to sell.
If the member chooses not to sell their grand or reserve champion animal, they forfeit their right
if the member encoses not to sen their grand of reserve champion annual, they fortest tilen right

to sell a replacement species, regardless if in the 4-H or FFA program. Those youth with grand and reserve animals will also have the privilege to choose their lot number in the sale order within the first round of exhibitors. If the exhibitor fails to notify the sale committee by Friday at 9am (week of county fair) they will be assigned a lot number by the sale committee. A record book must be completed and turned in by September 15 for each and every species of animals sold at the Junior Livestock Sale. Failure to do so will cause the member to lose all sale privileges for all species for the next year (for one year). Youth may regain sale privileges the following year. Failure to turn in record books again will result in permanent loss of sale privileges for all species (for all remaining years in 4-H/FFA). We would like to remind you that it is a PRIVILEGE to sell in the Washakie County Junior Livestock Sale, not a right.
