MEMBER'S REPORT

The Clovis Botanical Garden's water-wise plant sale on Oct. 16 and Oct. 17 drew similar attendance to that of previous sales, despite Covid. CNPS Sequoia normally partners with the garden to sell native plants at this event. In keeping with a CNPS statewide ban on in-person plant sales due to Covid. the Sequoia Chapter's native plant sale was online-only this year. Nonetheless, the garden kindly allowed CNPS Sequoia volunteers to promote our virtual sale during the event, and many customers expressed interest in gardening with natives. The garden nearly sold out of the natives it offered during the two-day sale.



The CNPS Sequoia virtual plant sale began on Oct. 28 and ended on Nov. 5. CNPS staff at the Sacramento headquarters helped guide us through the process and launched the sale website through the CNPS site. In addition to offering plants from Intermountain Nursery and member-grown plants, we



sourced native varieties from Thicket and Vine nursery in Coarsegold.

Pickup is scheduled for Nov. 8 at the Clovis Botanical Garden. Proceeds from the sale help to fund our restoration project at China Creek Park.
