Svalbard Global Seed Bank, Spitsbergen Island,on the remote Arctic Svalbard archipelago Sons of Norway presentation March 22, 2025, by Lucy Edwards Hochstein

What it is:

Svalbard Global Seed Bank is a secure backup facility for the world's crop diversity. It provides long term storage of duplicates of seeds from around the world conserved in gene banks in other countries. The seed vault only stores duplicate seeds. Primary seed holdings are kept by the seed owners in their own facilities.

Seed Vault Foundation laws:

The Seed Vault is managed under terms of an agreement among the Norwegian government, the Global Crop Diversity Trust of Bonn, Germany, and the Nordic Genetic Resource Center, (NordGen), that is a cooperation among Nordic countries on genetic resource conservation.

Funding:

The Norwegian government entirely funded the 2008 \$8.8 million construction cost. Norway and the Global Crop Diversity Trust pay for operational costs of \$282,000 annually. Storing seeds in the vault is free.



Location:

Spitsbergen Island was considered ideal because there is no tectonic activity, and it has permafrost, which aids preservation if power is lost. It lies 430 feet above sea level, so it will stay dry even if ice caps melt. Locally mined coal powers refrigeration units that further cool the seeds to -0.4 degrees Fahrenheit. If power is lost, the facility will take several weeks to reach the temperature of the surrounding bedrock: 27 degrees Fahrenheit. It is estimated that it would take two centuries to warm to 32 degrees. It is believed that these temperatures will preserve most major food crop seeds for hundreds of years and some grain seeds for thousands of years.

Genetically modified seeds:

Norwegian law forbids the storage of any genetically modified seeds in the vault.

Seed storage:

Seeds are stored in air-tight three-ply aluminum foil packages, then placed in plastic tote containers on metal shelves. Each foil package contains about 500 seeds, depending on the size of the seeds.

Seed Vault Staff:

The Seed Vault has no staff. Personnel come at prearranged times to receive seed deposits. The seed vault does no research, so it has no labs, no seed multiplication, or investigation activities and does no seed distribution.

Who can access the seed deposits:

Only seed depositors may access their own seed deposits. Researchers, plant breeders, and others may not access any seeds in the vault. They must request samples from the depositing genebanks.

How the Seed Vault works:

The Seed Vault functions like a bank safety deposit box. Norway owns the seed vault, and the depositors own the seeds they send. There is not a legal transfer of genetic resources. No depositor has access to any other depositors' seeds.

Number of deposits:

As of May 2024 there were 1,280,677 seed sample deposits. These represent 13,000 years of agricultural history. The Seed Vault has the capacity to store 4.5 million seed samples. When the current building is full, there are plans to build another nearby.

Who are the depositors:

Depositors include international genebanks and national and regional gene banks. Deposits are not limited to genebanks. 1.Seed saving organizations can make deposits.

2. Some indigenous communities have also deposited seeds. In 2020 the United States Cherokee Nation deposited nine samples of their heirloom crops that predate European colonization.

Seed Vault art work and structure:

The art work above the entrance is called *Perpetual Repercussion* by Norwegian artist **Dyveke Sanne.** It also runs the length of the roof. Norway requires that public buildings costing over a certain amount incorporate original artwork. The roof and entrance are filled with highly reflective stainless steel, mirrors, and prisms to reflect the polar light in the summer.



Seed Vault mission:

The Seed Vault's mission is to provide backup against accidental loss of diversity in traditional genebanks throughout the world. Although available for major regional or global catastrophe, it has most often been accessed when genebanks lose samples due to mismanagement, accident, equipment failures, funding cuts, and natural disasters.

Examples of use of the Seed Vault:

- 1. in 2015, due to civil war in Syria, the International Center for Agricultural Research in Dry Areas couldn't maintain its genebank in Syria, so it withdrew some of its seeds from the Seed Vault, so it could regenerate those seeds.
- 2. African countries have lately been making deposits of their traditional crops for fear that climate change will destroy their traditional food crops.
- 3. This month Sudan made its first deposit amid its country's ongoing civil war. 2,000 seeds samples were rescued from Sudan's national gene bank, along with 1,200 other seed samples from 22 other Sudanese seed banks. These were not duplicates but allowed to be the primary deposits of their seeds due to the civil war.
- The Sudan samples contain essential varieties of sorghum and pearl millet that had nearly been destroyed in the fighting. Sorghum has been grown for thousands of years in Sudan. Sudan's genebanks were raided and looted by militants who destroyed their freezers and scattered the seeds. The few saved are now in the Seed Vault.
- 3. Mexico has been depositing corn seeds that have not been contaminated by genetically modified corn. 10,000 years ago Mexico was the origin of corn and is striving to maintain gene diversity in their corn crops, so they can maintain native corn varieties, which are at risk from American genetically modified corn.

March 15. 2025 Meeting



It's a pleasure to write to the members of the "Bla Fjell Lodge" of the Sons of Norway (SON) and provide a short introduction of myself. Thank you for welcoming me and supporting the satellite lodge currently forming in Charlottesville....Hadrada Lodge.

I am the oldest son of Knut and Geraldine Aaslestad, a first generation Norwegian-American, raised in New Orleans, Louisiana. My father was from Arendal, Norway, a naturalized US citizen who was a life- long ship's captain and did indeed sail the world's oceans. He was the only one of his large family, mostly located in Oslo, to immigrate to the US and I have enjoyed many visits to Norway to see my uncles, aunts and many cousins. Way back, my family came from a farmstead in Telemark and we have treasured records of the origin of our name. 
Karen and I are very pleased to have the opportunity to work with Katie. She has been a tremendous help already, always willing to step up to the plate and lend a hand.

What's New About Norway Travel In 2025

From tax hikes to public transit disruption, anyone planning Norway travel in 2025 should be prepared. Here's what you need to know before setting off for Scandinavia.

The ongoing peak time for northern lights viewing seems set to bring many more travelers to Norway in 2025. With growing interest in the Northern Lights and ongoing interest in 'coolcations,' Norway travel is poised for yet another recordbreaking year in 2025. However, upcoming taxes and potential travel disruptions mean savvy travelers should plan carefully to make the most of their trip.

Two Trends To Dominate

In 2024, two major travel trends took center stage in Norway, with every indication they will continue to shape the tourism landscape in 2025. The allure of the Northern Lights has always been a draw for Norway, but 2024 saw unprecedented interest, fueled by the solar maximum—an 11-year peak in solar activity that intensifies aurora displays. This led to a surge in Northern Lights cruises and travel packages, with sensational displays reported across the country. While the exact duration of the solar maximum is uncertain, experts anticipate it will continue into 2025, keeping Norway at the top of winter travel wish lists.

Meanwhile, the 'coolcation' trend emerged strongly in 2024 as European travelers increasingly opted for cooler, northern destinations like Norway over traditional Mediterranean summer spots. This shift reflects growing concerns about climate change, with travelers seeking relief from extreme heatwaves and prioritizing sustainable, nature-focused experiences. From fjord hikes to coastal road trips, Norway's pristine landscapes offer a refreshing alternative. If these trends persist, travelers should brace for high demand, particularly during peak times for Northern Lights viewing and summer vacations. Accommodation in popular destinations is expected to fill up quickly, and prices are likely to reflect the growing interest. Planning well in advance, being flexible with dates, and considering off-the-beaten-path destinations will be key strategies for travelers hoping to secure the best experiences. Tourist Tax

Norway finally plans to introduce its long discussed framework for local tourist taxes by summer 2025. This would allow local municipalities to charge up to 5% on accommodation costs, including hotels, campsites, Airbnb rentals, and cruise ships. Rural areas with popular hiking trails but few local residents, such as the municipalities in the Lofoten Islands, have

long called for such a tax to help them pay for improvements. Any revenue raised by the tourist tax, managed by local authorities, must fund tourism-related infrastructure and services like hiking trails, public restrooms, and environmental conservation. While aimed at addressing tourism impacts, some local authorities question its effectiveness, citing issues caused by day visitors rather than overnight guests. As the proposal is under consultation until January 2025, it may be revised before a parliamentary vote.

Norway Travel Disruption In 2025

To the disappointment of many international road trippers, Norway's iconic Trollstigen mountain pass was closed at short-notice for all but two weeks during the 2024 season. The famous road known for its 11 hairpin turns is unlikely to reopen before mid-July 2025. Travelers planning road trips should consider scheduling visits a few weeks after this tentative date to account for potential delays.

Meanwhile, visitors to Oslo in 2025 should prepare for significant metro disruptions, particularly on lines passing through the west of the city. These disruptions may also complicate travel to popular tourist attractions and the national stadium during major events, with replacement buses in operation on affected routes. Higher Costs For Flights

Norway's government plans to raise the taxes airlines pay to Avinor, its state-owned airport operator, to address financial challenges. Avinor operates most major airports in Norway, including Oslo and Bergen. Airlines warn this could lead to higher ticket prices, fewer routes, and reduced travel options. Major airlines Norwegian and SAS have expressed concerns about cutting routes, potentially making travel to and from Norway more expensive Although the government will slightly reduce the air passenger tax, this is unlikely to offset rising costs. The Ministry of Transport will decide on the tax increase by the end of 2024.
