On another subject "BE THE ONE" let's get a "BE THE ONE" outing like Post 36 in Fort Bridger. I'll be participating in their "BE THE ONE" walk in May. It doesn't have to be gigantic by any means but maybe a spaghetti feed with "BE THE ONE" as the main ingredient for the evening. As a last note I would like to remind everyone about my Commanders Project. Let's have a Blood Drive at our Posts so we can maybe save

a Veterans life sometime this spring.

And one last issue that all Posts need to be aware of. National announced at the National Convention in August that they were raising their membership dues by \$5.00 beginning with the 2025 membership year (July 1, 2024). This means that Departments have to raise their dues in order to pay National. A vote went out to the DEC members, and it was determined that Department would raise their dues \$5.00 as well. This means that when you transmit a member, you need to send Department \$49.00 instead of \$39.00. Your Posts need to be made aware of this at your next meeting and Adjutant Gina will be sending out a form that requires you to fill out with your new Post dues amount so that the renewal notices can be sent out correctly.

February 2024 News from Jackson Hole American Legion Post 43

Our Jackson Hole American Legion Post 43 has continued to hold our monthly meetings in-person and on Zoom, and has continued to participate in our support of the veterans and members in Jackson and our surrounding communities. Our Post membership is currently 132 TAL members, and 22 SAL members. Our renewals for 2024 have exceeded our state goal of 130 members, and our Post was the first one in our District to reach 100% of our goal. We also were the first Post in Wyoming to reach 100% of our SAL Squadron goal.

Assistance for a Post member in need: In January, our Post became aware that one of our long-time members was under severe financial pressure. Upon identification of this need, several Post members offered gifts to be donated to this member. Shortly after the meeting, we were also informed that this individual had been in a serious car accident on January 15. A GO-FUND-ME account was set up by his daughter-inlaw to raise money to help with his medical bills and other expenses. If anyone wishes to make a donation, please contact our Post.

Presentation by Ray Pilgrim and Joe Burke: At our monthly Post meeting in November, Post members, Ray Pilgrim and Joe Burke took turns describing their backgrounds and experiences as members of the U.S. Coast Guard. After initial training on a cutter, Ray was trained to handle ships' boilers. On a buoy tender, they serviced light ships, light houses, and buoys. One of the lighthouses could only be ac cessed by a winch. Joe discussed his own training and later assignment to as a hospital corpsman at the USCG Air Station in Mobile, Alabama. He later served in an air detachment that deployed to the USCG Cutter Glacier out of Long Beach. CA in 1969-1970. His trip to the Antarctic was highlighted, including a well-documented experience when his ship, the Glacier, was frozen in the ice for almost two weeks

Presentation by Erich Wilbrecht: Our Post was honored to have Erich as a speaker in January. Erich, whose father is a Post 43 member, is a former Olympic Biathlete and local Ski Club Hall of Fame member. He grew up in Jackson from age 16. when his dad became the manager

of the National Elk Refuge. During college, he was a member of the Dartmouth Nordic ski team, and also became exposed to biathlon competition. After college, he made the U.S. National biathlon team. He spent the next eight years training and went on to make five World Cup Teams and the 1992 US Olympic Team.

Army-Navy Game at the Post: The annual Army-Navy Game took place on December 9, and our Post was open for lunch and for everyone to enjoy the exciting game, won by the Army team. A large gathering of members and guests attended.

Honor Guard and Color Guard Activities: On December 2, our Post presented the colors for the opening ceremony of the Annual Rylee Mc-Collum Wrestling Tournament at the Jackson Hole High School. Following that event, Post members gathered at a large bonfire site on the nearby Hereford Ranch. After a brief ceremony, the bonfire was lit and all of the worn out flags that had been collected by the Post were consumed by the huge fire with the help of a strong wind.

Veterans Day Ceremony: On November 11, our Post celebrated Veterans Day with a ceremony attended by a large crowd on the Jackson Town Square. The Jackson Community Band provided a warm up of patriotic music, which was followed by an opening prayer, reading

At Tom Whitmore Post 28, we have had the great honor of working with our community to help build one of the most successful and profitable veteran fundraisers in the nation. Our Legion, Auxiliary, and Son's members have been instrumental in building success with many of our programs.

Nine years ago, we were approached by the members of Zamtrip, a local rock band. They decided helping veterans was a cause close to their hearts and were interested in holding their 2nd fundraising concert at our Green River, WY post. Only they knew the incredible event this would become. Last year was the 10th Annual Music for Vets concert. We have been fortunate to work alongside Zamtrip, and their families, as they have seen great success in their music careers and in helping our community. Through the combined efforts of the band, our post, local businesses, and community members, Music for Vets raised over \$66k for veterans in Wyoming, just this year alone. We are grateful for Zamtrip's dedication.

Post 28 is fortunate in many ways. We have dedicated members who make things happen, from concerts and comedy shows that bring people together, to keeping our post running. Through intelligent financing, our building was paid off this year, several months early. And most weekends you will find our post bustling with energy. Entertainers pass the word along to others in their field that we are welcoming and the perfect little

venue in the pretty little town.

Our Auxiliary is always making things happen. From ensuring every interested female high school junior makes it to Girls State, donating gift cards at the holidays, hosting an Angel Tree, and collecting cookies year-round to send to the Sheridan VA, Post 28 Auxiliary is always finding new ways to improve our community and to help others. Members discovered a need at the elderly care home for bath supplies, better than just the bulk body wash that dries out our parents and grandparents' skin. They decided our families could use a little more love and held a Bath Products drive. We collected shampoo, conditioner, body wash, and lotion that keeps our elders squeaky clean but also oh so comfortable. All because our Auxiliary realized our older community members deserve more than just the bare minimum.

We tragically lost one of our Legion Family members a few years ago, but our post didn't just say goodbye. Our Auxiliary created a beautiful memorial program called Brenda's Closet. We collect formal dresses, inventory them, and make them available to our community. While open all year, we hold events just before school proms to help young ladies find the perfect dress for the big occasion. Always finding ways to go above and beyond, our Aux members reach out to local businesses to put together goodie bags to give the girls to make the day even more exciting.

We also have a highly successful Ladies Paint

Night. Beginning last year with a few attendees, last month we had over 40 people painting canvases to their hearts content. Our Aux members held a free pancake breakfast on Veterans Day with the help of the Boy Scouts, teaching our young men humility and service.

Because of the success of our outreach programs, a community member asked to bring her homeless veteran care package program to our post this year. Roberts, a previous oil field worker, was informed veterans were living under a bridge, in the next town over. It was winter in Wyoming, always a brutal time. According to Roberts, she had more money than she knew what do with, so she decided to help. This one person chose to make a difference. The first year, she raided friends and relatives' closets for supplies. 15 years later, she outgrew her work space and reached out to us to help her in her project. The first year, Roberts threw together 24 care packages. This year we were able to provide Roberts with donations, funding, volunteers, and the bottom half of our building. We are proud to help an incredible community member build almost 200 care projects, through her Wyo Hawk Campaign.

Even more shining examples of how our Legion families work together to make our post successful and useful to our town and our veterans. Every program held at our post is another way we reach out to let our veterans know we are here, with open doors and open hearts.







In watching some of the Facebook pages of Auxiliaries around the state, it appears you are all doing a great job assisting our veterans. Several units participated in the Wreaths Across America program either through their own sponsorship or by purchasing wreaths through other organizations. Also, several units provided Christmas gifts and money to veterans at the Cheyenne and Sheri-

dan VA hospitals. These kindnesses are very much appreciated. Now is the time to report all those hours and dollars spent both in your year-end reports (including by individual) and on your Impact Reports. 


