1. Ecobee Smart Thermostat Premium (Best Overall)

Description: Ecobee's top-tier model outperformed all other thermostats, and it comes with the best remote sensor we've tested. It has an air-quality monitor, as well as a built-in microphone, speaker, and Alexa for voice control, but it also works with most smart-home platforms.

2. Google Nest Learning Thermostat (Runner-Up)

Description: Nest's most-advanced smart thermostat features a larger, crisper, and more useful display than its predecessors, as well as wide compatibility with HVAC systems.

3. Amazon Smart Thermostat (Budget Pick)

Description: Though Amazon's Smart Thermostat isn't as sophisticated as other picks, it works well, is widely compatible with HVAC systems, and is simply inexpensive.

4. Mysa Smart Thermostat (New York Times Best Pick)

Description: A pricey but practically perfect option for adding smart controls to electric baseboard heaters. The Mysa Smart Thermostat uses scheduling, geofencing, and a smart eco mode to save you money while imperceptibly using less energy.

There have been many issues with transportation in the St. Louis area in the recent months. Per the St. Louis Post Dispatch, Metro Call-A-Ride suffered from multiple cyber-attacks in October, leading to prolonged service interruptions and cancellations. Metro's IT team was forced to suspend services leaving passengers stranded. The cancellations renewed long standing criticisms of Call-A-Ride services from disability rights advocates, who questioned why Metro didn't have a backup plan to contact customers or offer alternative transport. Tubi: This is a streaming service that offers free content with audio descriptions.

IMDb TV/Freevee: This is another streaming service that offers free content with audio descriptions.

Metro Call-A-Ride service is available, with advance reservations, to individuals with disabilities that prevent them from using the accessible, fixed-route transit services (Metrolink and Metrobus). You'll share your ride with other passengers in modern, wheelchair-accessible vehicles.

PHONE APPLICATIONS

VoiceOver - VoiceOver is a screen reader that's integrated into iPhones that, as its name indicates, enunciates emails or other textual messages aloud. It's up to the user to choose the speaking rate and the volume.

TalkBack - TalkBack follows the same guideline as for iPhones: reading textual elements aloud, exploring the screen, using braille with BrailleBack... Everything is set for an optimal and smooth navigation!



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Siri - Siri is an easy-to-use vocal assistant. For blind or visually impaired people, for whom finding and clicking on the right button can be difficult, using a voice control enables them to save time!

Google Assistant - Google Assistant has the same functionality as Siri. The user totally controls their smartphone according to their needs: sending an email, setting up an alarm, managing their schedule. Available on both Android and iOS.

Google Maps - It's one of the most popular GPS navigation apps. Google Maps enables users to have access to all the real-time traffic information which is ideal when choosing the right means of public transportation! The app even provides a new feature called "Accessible Places" that enables users to even more apprehend their environment thanks to information concerning the seating plan of a restaurant, the exact location of a building entrance.

Moovit - For those who are used to taking public transportation, this app lists all the possible means of transportation, their itineraries, their timetables and other information on real-time traffic. The app even indicates the users the names of stops while on the bus, the tram or the subway.

Evelity - This app is the first indoor wayfinding solution for people with a visual impairment to navigate in complex venues such as museums or universities! Evelity works like a GPS. Compatible with VoiceOver and TalkBack, the app provides audio instructions to blind and visually impaired people to guide them step by step. People with disabilities can easily find the reception desk or the classroom without needing to know the premises in advance.

MyMoveo - This app enables blind or visually impaired users to activate connected Accessible Pedestrian Signals a Beacon to know when the pedestrian signal is green and thus safely cross the street.

Be My Eyes - An app with which users can ask the help of sighted users in order to match their clothes or to know the expiry date of a product. Thanks to an audio-video connection, users can easily get in touch.

Aira - Aira works in the same way as Be My Eyes since it connects non sighted people with sighted ones to help them in various tasks such as finding the gate of an airport. What sets this app apart is that the sighted users, called agents, are specifically trained to assist blind or visually impaired users referred to as Explorers.

Seeing AI - A multipurpose app that permits to read and describe all types of documents placed under the smartphone camera such as banknotes or product barcodes. Seeing AI even recognizes images, colors and faces and thus gives details on people's emotions.



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Lookout - Lookout is the equivalent app of Seeing AI on Android. The user just has to activate their smartphone camera so that Lookout can identify banknotes, objects.
