# Plaid Hex Saturday, October 12, 9am to 4pm Gravel Hill Church Palmyra, PA

Guild member Mary Morgan will be teaching this versatile basket. The Plaid Hex (I & II) features an 8-inch hexagon base custom crafted from a variety of furniture grade hardwoods. The sides are woven using a variety of colors and widths to achieve a unique plaid. The rim will be finished with a waxed linen lasher. Bring your usual tools as well as a darning/tapestry needle for the lasher (there will be some available to borrow during class).

Please select one (Plaid Hex I or Plaid Hex II) to be woven in class. Extra kits are available for pre-order.



**Plaid Hex I:** has a Cherry hexagon base with a Walnut and Maple Race Car Stripe down the center. A random plaid is woven using three colors, Cranberry Red, Black, and Khaki, along with natural reed.



**Plaid Hex II:** has a Cherry hexagon base with Maple and Walnut Pinstripes. A symmetrical plaid is woven using three colors, Rust, Brown, and Khaki, along with natural reed.

# Central Pennsylvania Basket Weavers Guild & Lehigh Valley Basket Weavers Service Project 2024: Turning Point Lehigh Valley



For the past several years CPBWG has invited its members to participate in a Service Project that provides gift baskets that the members make which are then filled with needed items. Usually these are toiletries, socks or hats and gloves etc. These baskets are then given to organizations in the Central PA service area or to an agency that a member is familiar with. For 2024, LVBW will also participate in the project, and baskets will be given to *Turning Point Lehigh Valley*.

**Turning Point Lehigh Valley** is a safe place where ALL survivors of domestic and intimate partner abuse and their children can find refuge. They need items such as shampoo, conditioner, body wash, loofahs, deodorant, toothbrushes, tooth paste, brush/comb, lotion, hair ties and chap stick for the clients. Our job is make the baskets, collect the various items and deliver them to the agency in October 2024. If we are able to make some prior to October 2024, Turning Point would be grateful for the donations.

CPBWG and LVBW members will make the Friendship Basket by Deborah Blair. In addition, the both guilds will assist in collecting items for them. This is done at A Weaving Odyssey held in September. The basket has a built-in handle and uses 1/4", 3/8", 1/2" flat, natural, 1/4", 3/8" flat, dyed, #2 round reed, and seagrass. It only takes a couple of hours to make and is a great beginner basket

CPBWG will make their baskets at their **July** meeting and LVBW at their **August** open weave. If you can't make either meeting, we can provide materials for you to weave on your own. If you would like to make some now in time for the 2023 holidays, let us know and we can make sure they get to Turning Point.

### Friendship Basket

### by Deborah Blair

Deborah wrote this pattern in 1991, and she graciously made it free for all weavers. It is an excellent beginner basket that incorporates a built-in handle. The basket is  $8" L \times 6" W \times 5 \ 1/2" H$ . The embellishment is optional. It makes a great hostess gift when filled with cookies, candies or wine! It also is an easy basket for gift baskets that are filled with toiletries as a service project.



### **Materials:**

3/8", 1/2" flat, natural and dyed stakes and weaver's 1/4" flat or flat oval dyed weaver

3/16" or 11/64" natural for lashing and handle wrapping #2 round reed twining seagrass one 2 1/4" ceramic heart, with two holes (optional)

Cut: 11 spokes from 1/2" flat - 22" long and 1 spoke from 1/2" flat - 48" long for the handle

**Base:** Dampen the reed and lay out the base: lay 5 pieces at 22" horizontally; weave in the side 7 pieces by placing the handle piece (48") in the center and weave it under the first horizontal stake. Check your measurements; the base should measure about 7" by 4 1/2."

Twine 2 rows around the base, using #2 round reed. Upsett the stakes.

### Weave:

6 rows 3/8" natural. The first row is woven OVER the handle.

1 row 3/8" dyed

1 row 1/4" dyed, attaching the ceramic heart by weaving through the holes of the heart

1 row 3/8" dyed

3 rows 3/8" natural (the last row is the rim keeper row).

### Cut and Tuck the stakes:

Do not cut or fold the handles at this point. Fold and tuck outside spokes. Cut off inside spokes.

Fold over the handle spokes and weave them into the opposite side of the basket. Add two pieces of  $\frac{1}{2}$ " cut to the size of the folded handle, in between the handle pieces to support the handle.

Wrap the handle with 1/4" flat oval or smaller, adding a piece of 1/4" dyed reed for accent.

### Prepare the rims:

Prepare the inner and outer rims using the  $\frac{1}{4}$ " flat. Insert the seagrass for filler. Lash the rim with  $\frac{1}{4}$ " flat oval or smaller reed.

Shape corners as desired. Groom the basket to remove any stray hairs.

### **Directions to Venues**

# DIRECTIONS TO GRAVEL HILL UNITED METHODIST CHURCH, 131 GRAVEL HILL ROAD, PALMYRA, PA 17078

**FROM INTERSTATE 81:** Exit 80 (Grantville), take 743 South to Route 22 (about 1 mile). Turn left (east) onto Route 22, proceed for approximately 1 mile to Gravel Hill Road (green sign that reads: Palmyra 6 miles), turn right (south) onto Gravel Hill Road. Follow for 4.5 miles to white church on right - Gravel Hill United Methodist Church.

**FROM Route 422:** Go to the "square" in Palmyra, turn north onto North Railroad Street, continue approximately 1.5 miles to white church on left.

### Directions to East Berlin Area Community Center (EBACC): 405North Ave. East Berlin, PA 17316

From Route 15—if coming from north or south take route 234 to East Berlin. (Heidlerberg/East Berlin exit), PA 234 East, go 8.2 miles. Turn left onto Fourth St., then left onto North St.

From PA turnpike, take the Gettysburg/ Route 15 exit, follow 15 South and directions above.

From Route 83 and points east or north, take Exit 35 then...

Head southeast on PA-177 S; turn right to stay on PA-177 (9.6 miles); Continue onto PA-74 N/Carlisle Rd (1.5 mile); Continue onto York St. (0.2 miles); Continue onto Wellsville Rd. (0.9 miles); Slight right to stay on Wellsville Rd. (1.9 miles); Turn left onto Kralltown Rd. (2.1 miles); Turn left onto Davidsburg Rd (0.4 miles);

Turn right onto Red Run Church Rd. (1.5 miles); Turn left onto PA-194 S (2.8 miles); Turn right onto North Ave. (0.3 miles) destination will be on the right. East Berlin Area Community Center 405 North Ave. East Berlin, PA 17316

### Directions to Giant Grocery store (community room), 3301 Trindle Road, Camp Hill, PA 17011

FROM ROUTE 581: Take exit 5 to Camp Hill; merge onto 11/15 North. The Camp Hill shopping mall will be on your left. Giant Grocery store is located at the end of the Mall. You can turn left at Trindle Road, then left into the parking lot at Giant.

FROM ROUTE 15 (south of Harrisburg):

Take route 15 North to Camp Hill. In Camp Hill, turn left on Trindle Road, and then left into the parking lot at Giant.

FROM York and south: Route 83 North to 581 Interchange, follow 581 West to exit 5 (Camp Hill), follow directions above.

FROM Interstate 81 (Harrisburg and East): Near Harrisburg, follow 83 South. After crossing the Susquehanna River, continue straight onto Route 581. Take exit 5 to Camp Hill, merge onto 11/15 North. The Camp Hill shopping mall will be on your left. Giant Grocery store is located at the end of the mall. You can turn left at Trindle Road, then left into the parking lot at Giant.

FROM PA. TURNPIKE: Either exit Harrisburg West and take 83 (directions above.) Or exit Mechanicsburg, and follow15 North (directions above).

### Directions to Trone Memorial Library: 105 Locust St. East Berlin, PA 17316

From Route 15—if coming from south take route 234 to East Berlin. (Heidlerberg/East Berlin exit), PA 234 East. At the traffic light in East Berlin, turn right onto Rte. 194 south. Take the second right onto Locust St. (Rutter's is on the corner) The library is 1½ blocks on your right. There is a parking lot as well as on-street parking.

From PA turnpike, take the Gettysburg/ Route 15 exit, follow 15 South to Dillsburg. Turn left onto Rte. 74 and go through Dillsburg. Right past the Northern School District campus, continue straight onto rte. 194 south to East Berlin. Go straight through the traffic light in East Berlin. Take the second right onto Locust St. (Rutter's is on the corner.) The library is 1 ½ blocks on your right.

From route 30 turn north onto rte. 194 at the Abbottstown traffic circle. Stay on 194 until you see the Rutter's on your left. (Past Weis and Cashman's Hardware). Turn left onto Locust St. The library is 1 ½ blocks on your right. There is a parking lot as well as onstreet parking.
