

# Dennis O'Connell Honored with Street Naming

Longtime City Islander Dennis O'Connell passed away in October 2008. In remembrance of his 37 years of service to the FDNY as a fire dispatcher, 180th Street between Devoe Avenue and Bronx Boulevard was renamed in his honor at a ceremony on March 3, 2011.

The honor was a fitting dedication to a man who lived and worked in the Bronx all his life and knew the borough inside and out, according to those who paid tribute to him.

Dennis was born on March 6, 1952, the son of Irish immigrants Peter and Mary. He lived with his parents; his older sister, Nora; and his younger brother, Peter, in the Fordham section of the Bronx.

It was the proximity of his childhood home to FDNY Engine 88 that gave him his introduction to the fire department. In 1963 Dennis took his first ride on Engine 88 and at the age of 11 became president of the FDNY Explorer Post 588 through the Boy Scouts. After graduating from high school, Dennis fulfilled his childhood dream and joined the FDNY in 1972 as a fire dispatcher. He was stationed in the Bronx Communications Office on 180th Street near Engine 88's fire house. He worked at that location for 37 years and was promoted along the way to Supervising and Chief Fire Alarm Dispatcher. Along the way, he also found City Island and made it his home. He met Patricia Rubbo in 1974 through her college roommate, who was dating a friend of Dennis's. They were married in 1978 and he suggested they move to City Island. Dennis had become familiar with the Island through longtime residents and firemen Bill McDaniel and Bob Delaney, both of whom worked at Engine 88. Pat was skeptical ("Who would want to live there?"), but she agreed to visit. She quickly realized the attraction and they



moved into a bungalow on Cross Street. Eventually they settled on Pilot Street, where Pat and their children, Sean and Tara, reside today. Dennis contributed to the City Island community by becoming a den leader for Cub Scout Troop 211 and joining the Leonard Hawkins American Legion Post 156. Pat, who is a licensed social worker, got involved at



practices to learn how to play the bagpipes, an instrument he had never played. The members of the band trained him and in 1977 let him march and play in his first St. Patrick's Day parade on Fifth Avenue.

Dennis played with the Emerald Pipes and Drums for 33 years, participating in hundreds of parades, weddings and funerals. It was especially emotional for him to play at many of the firefighter funerals after 9/11.

Dennis passed away in October 2008 after suffering a stroke. His funeral was held at St. Mary, Star of the Sea church, and the Emerald Society band played "When Irish Eyes are Smiling," the perfect serenade to their former member.

Meanwhile, his career with the FDNY progressed. Dennis worked dispatch before computers really did much of the work. According to his wife, he memorized the location of every fire alarm box in the Bronx and knew immediately where a call was coming from. His knowledge of Bronx geography was critical, especially in the early years, to the routing of firefighters to the scene of an alarm as fast as possible.

Dennis's dedication led one of his coworkers, James Raftery, to suggest to Community Board 6 that the section of 180th Street in front of the communications center be named in his honor. The cause was championed by members of Board 6 and City Councilman Joel Rivera, and it was finally approved by Mayor Bloomberg. The dedication took place under sunny skies and the "Supervising Fire Alarm Dispatcher Dennis P. O'Connell Place" sign was unveiled.

But Dennis was more than a dispatcher. He also became the first non-uniformed bagpiper to be admitted to the FDNY Emerald Pipes and Drums! In 1974 he started going to



Police provided details on the following incidents for the period from March 1 to 18, 2011.

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# FORECLOSURE PROPERTY CLEANED UP

Alerted by Island resident Sal Caruso to an abandoned house on Carroll Street, State Senator Jeff Klein was able to get the mortgage holder of the foreclosed home to clean up the property, which was in disrepair with a fallen fence and broken windows.

Senator Klein's office learned that the owner had not lived in the house for over a year, and Con Edison reported that the electricity and water had been shut off. The Department of Buildings inspected the property and issued violations for the fence that had fallen onto Mr. Caruso's property. The mortgage holder, American Home Mortgage Servicing, Inc., sent out a crew to repair the fence and windows and to clean up the yard.

Senator Klein said: "Abandoned properties can be a cause for concern in any neighborhood. For more than two years I fought for laws, now in effect, that protect neighborhoods from exactly this issue. If you are living with a property like this on your street, I encourage you to contact my office so that we can find out who owns the property and ensure that it is properly maintained in the future."

"I would like to thank Senator Klein and his staff for their help in getting this property on Carroll Street cleaned up," Mr. Caruso said. "A new section of the fence has been installed. The ripped window screens and shades have all been repaired, and the trash has been removed from the front of the house. I feel it is now safe again to have my grandchildren in the backyard and the block looks presentable again."

Senator Klein's property-maintenance legislation, signed into law in 2009 by Governor Paterson, helps protect neighboring property values and prevent health hazards that surround an unkempt foreclosed home. The law requires lending institutions to maintain foreclosed properties and make sure they are safe and habitable when occupied by tenants.

# Pelham Bay Park Restoration Project

The New York City Parks Department has begun a large-scale restoration project, part of the MillionTreesNYC program, in the 40-acre part of Rodman's Neck between



the firing range and the baseball ballfields on City Island Road. The area is overrun with invasive species, such as porcelainberry, mugwort and oriental bittersweet, which prevent native species from growing and supporting wildlife. The project will restore native forest to improve the ecosystem in the park

The first phase of the restoration project involves clearing about eight acres in the area, applying herbicide to invasive plants, especially vines; this phase will continue for about two years, concluding with the planting of native trees and shrubs. Existing native vegetation will not be removed and invasive cutting will not take place during nesting season in order to encourage birds to breed and establish nests in more protected habitat.

The second and third phases of the project will continue after the completion of phase I and will follow the same procedures. Expected completion is about six years after the project begins.

# Islander Named Among Influential Bronx Women

The Bronx Times Reporter newspaper's second annual salute to 25 influential Bronx women included City Island's own Barbara Burn Dolensek. She was hailed as a "unique person dedicated to a unique community" in the Feb. 24, 2011, issue.

Ms. Dolensek joined 24 other Bronx residents who, according to the publisher, have "far-reaching impact in their lifetime passions. Each has made the Bronx a better place to live." The group will be honored at a ceremony on June 2 in the Great Room at the Bronx Zoo.

How nostalgically appropriate! Ms. Dolensek moved to City Island in 1976 with her late husband, Emil, who was then chief veterinarian at the Bronx Zoo, and in 1977 they purchased a home on Tier Street. The house was built in 1900 (older Islanders still know it as the "Larry Delmour house" or the location for the 1962 film "Long Day's Journey into Night"), and they began the painstaking process of restoring it to its original Victorian charm. The house was designated a New York City landmark in 2000.

Emil and Barbara raised their son, Philip, on City Island and gave him an appreciation for the unique nautical history of the community. He told *The Current*: "I was very proud, although not surprised, to hear that my mother was named one of the Bronx's 25 most influential women."

Ms. Dolensek has become so involved in the community that it is difficult to count all the hats she wears. She has been an officer of the City Island Civic Association for 20 years and is currently the second vice president. On behalf of the Civic Association, she successfully led the fight to save Ladder Company 53 in the City Island firehouse at least twice. And she's not done; the fight is ongoing as the mayor has once again threatened to close the fire company in light of the city's latest budget woes. City Councilmember James Vacca told The Current: "Under constant threat from the city, I have been able to secure City Council money to keep our City Island firehouse open. Each and every time I have turned to Barbara Dolensek to alert and mobilize City Island residents. She has always come through, not only as an effective leader but as someone whose credibility and commitment are beyond question. At all times, she has City Island's back!" Ms. Dolensek has been a trustee of the City Island Historical Society since 1995 and serves as administrator of the Nautical Museum. Ms. Dolensek can be found many Saturdays and Sundays volunteering at the museum on Fordham Street hosting talks, giving tours, creating new exhibits, planning events and working hard alongside Tom Nye and Ed Sadler to preserve the Island's important history.

She continues to fight for important City Island structures, including the City Island Bridge and Grace Episcopal Church (where she serves on the Vestry). "City Island has some unique architectural features," she says, "and it hurts when I see them deteriorating, torn down or remuddled. Luckily, there are many other people here who appreciate the Island's unique character and help fight overdevelopment. As to the bridge, it needs to be completely rehabilitated or replaced by a bridge that is appropriate to our small community, something that the city seems so far unwilling to do."

Volunteering is not all she does. Ms. Dolensek, professionally known as Barbara Burn, is also an accomplished author and art book editor. From 1983 to 1998 she was the executive editor for the Metropolitan Museum of Art after 17 years at the Viking Press, and when she retired from the Met, she worked for Harry N. Abrams, an illustrated book publisher. She has edited countless books and written 13 books of her own, including "The Horseless Rider," "Metropolitan Children" and a series of nature books for the National Audubon Society. And she still works as a free-lance editor for several museums. As the old adage puts it: "If you want something done, give it to a busy person."

Her skills as a writer and editor have made her an invaluable member of the staff of this newspaper. She has been copy editor for *The Current* for over 20 years. "As we enter our 40th year of publication, we couldn't have done it without her," said longtime business manager Judy Rauh.

Ms. Dolensek's indefatigable energy is also put to good use for the City Island Theater Group, where she is on the board and serves as prop master after a short stint as a cast member. Her debut in 2006 was hailed a success by The Current's theater critic. She much prefers gardening and horseback riding to acting, however, and does a good deal of both when she has time. How does she do it all? Her affable personality is known to many Islanders and is one of the keys to her ability to rally people around a cause. Paul Nani, who works with her on the Civic Association, told The Current, "She leads by example, and you are inspired to help out, lend a hand and never give up." She has developed a great interest in City Island history, as evidenced by her tireless dedication to the City Island Historical Society and Museum. In March she gave a talk at the City Island Library as part of its 2011 centennial celebration, and she had Islanders intrigued by tales of the clam diggers (see story this issue).

#### Looking for Relatives

To the Editor:

My story goes way back into City Island history to Moses C. Bell, a blue pottery maker who lived on the island during the first half of the 19th century. His son George married Sarah Price Bell, and one of their sons, Leonard Tice Bell, married Frieda Wollensak. They lived on Carroll Street and had three daughters, Louise, who died young, Frieda and Sarah, known as Sadie. William French eloped with Sadie and they had six children, three boys and three girls, one of them me. Sadie died at the age of 33 in 1939 and my father walked out on us, so we were all sent to an orphanage in Yonkers.

I am now 78 years old, living in Anchorage, Alaska, and I never knew much about my family's connection to City Island and the Bell family until quite recently when my sister died and left me her papers. In 1964 I did meet my great uncle Aaron Bell on City Island at Pelham Cemetery, and he told us where my mother was buried, down near the water. He told us that he was a brother of my grandfather, Leonard Tice Bell. My grandmother, Frieda Bell, never told us anything about the family, but apparently we are related to many other Islanders, including Jeannette Cullen, Riley Jenkins and many others.

I spoke with Captain Ed Sadler recently and he knew my uncle Aaron, who was the telegraph man. But I would love to have more information about any other members of the Bell family or their relatives. Please write to me at 5603 Chilkoot Court, J-102, Anchorage AK 99504.





# CI LIBRARY KICKS OFF CENTENNIAL CELEBRATION

Barbara Dolensek of the City Island Nautical Museum helped kick off the centennial celebration of the City Island Library on March 5, 2011 with a lecture on the Island's history, including myths and legends.

The City Island branch of the New York Public Library is celebrating its 100th anniversary in 2011. Festivities marking the anniversary began with special presentations on the American Revolution and the history of City Island.

The City Island celebration coincides with the centennial anniversary of the main branch of the New York Public Library in the building on 42nd Street, which officially opened in May 1911. Although City Island had had a circulating library since at least the 1890s, 1911 marks the first year that the New York Public Library set up a branch on City Island, thanks to the efforts of a trustee whose sister-in-law lived here.

Kicking off the centennial events was a talk on Jan. 8, 2011, by Island resident Jeremy McCue on the American Revolution, focusing on the great accomplishments of George Washington, without whom, Mr. McCue believes, the revolution would have been lost. He also described several battles, including the one at Pell's Point led by Col. John Glover, and described how Benedict Arnold would have been a hero if he hadn't become a turncoat.

On March 5, an overflow crowd came to hear Islander Barbara Dolensek of the City Island Historical Society and Nautical Museum give an extensively researched presentation on the history of City Island, including a thorough review of facts versus myths about the island, which has been known over the years as Minnewits, Minneford, Great Mulberry Island, and the Isle of Man.

Ms. Dolensek delighted the crowd with tales of the many clam diggers and mussel suckers who have inhabited City Island, including both upstanding and disreputable citizens. (She also explained the derivation of the aforementioned names for those born on City Island and those who move here.)

Rather than reviewing City Island's illustrious boat-building history, which is a topic requiring one or more presentations of its own, Ms. Dolensek focused on the founding groups who colonized the island and influenced its development, including the Siwanoy Indians, the Dutch, British settlers, Revolutionary War soldiers, Benjamin Palmer, August Belmont and J. P. Morgan. She gave histories of the many families whose names are memorialized on street signs—Pell, Fordham, Rodman, Horton, Schofield and Belden—and recounted their contributions to City Island as oystermen, pilots, farmers and real-estate developers.

Librarian Vershell Wigfall, assisted by Gary Makufka, is leading the centennial celebration of the library. "This will be an exciting year at the City Island Branch Library," Mr. Makufka told *The Current*. "We plan to add new events in the coming months, such as weekly children's programs and a teen lounge."

The library staff has some ambitious plans, including the first Bronx screening of the movie "City Island." Many residents were surprised that the award-winning 2009 film, shot on Horton Street and at other Island locations, was never shown at a theater in the Bronx. Islanders had to go to Westchester, Queens or Manhattan to see it.

Mr. Makufka would also like to start a book-discussion group concerning the unsolved Fioretti murder that occurred on City Island in 1986 and was the subject of "Till Murder Do Us Part," a book by John Cummings and Ernest Volkman about the case.

So if you haven't visited the library lately, this year would be a good time to

#### Selected Filmography of Colin Firth

This year's Academy Award-winner for Best Actor, Colin Firth, is someone whose career I have been following for many years. In the romantic comedy ensemble film Love Actually (2003), Firth plays a writer named Jamie who runs away to the countryside when he finds his wife has cheated on him with his brother. There Jamie falls in love with his Portuguese housekeeper. The stellar cast also includes Hugh Grant as the British Prime Minister at odds with the President of the United States (Billy Bob Thornton). Emma Thompson is the Prime Minister's sister who is married to Alan Rickman, a man contemplating an affair with his secretary. Emma's best friend is recently widowed Liam Neeson, whose grade school stepson is suffering the pangs of first love, and newlywed Keira Knightly is idolized by her husband's best friend. Bill Nighy steals every scene as a has-been vulgar rock star, trying to make a comeback by turning a former hit into a Christmas song.

Firth really shines in the comedy **Bridget Jones's Diary** (2001) as rich barrister Mark Darcy (Colin Firth), who meets Bridget (Renee Zellweger) at a Christmas party. Unmarried at age 32, Bridget is having an affair with her self-impressed, smarmy boss Daniel Cleaver (Hugh Grant) although she is peripherally interested in Darcy. It eventually becomes apparent that Darcy appreciates Bridget "just as she is."

Firth first became well known playing another man named Darcy in the BBC production of Jane Austen's **Pride and Prejudice** (1995). Darcy is both intrigued and repelled by Elizabeth Bennett (Jennifer Ehle), one of five sisters living with their parents in a small town in England in the 1800s. This book has been made into films several times, but it is Firth's brooding Darcy who gives among the very best interpretations in this five-part miniseries.

He also appears in another costume production, the comical Shakespeare in Love (1998). It stars Joseph Fiennes as Will Shakespeare in love with Viola de Lesseps (Gwyneth Paltrow) who wants to act, which is forbidden to women at that time in history. Firth is Viola's fiancé Lord Wessex, who is marrying her for her fortune. The outstanding cast also includes Geoffrey Rush as the producer Philip Henslowe, Ben Affleck as the actor Ned Alleyn, Rupert Everett as Shakespeare's rival Christopher Marlowe, Tom Wilkinson as stage-struck financier Hugh Fennyman, and Judi Dench as Queen Elizabeth. Another period piece is The Girl with a Pearl Earring (2003), in which Firth portrays the Dutch painter Johannes Vermeer, who is obsessed with his muse, scullery maid Griet (Scarlett Johanssen). Vermeer's patron, van Ruijven (Tom Wilkinson), also has his eye on Griet. Every frame of this sumptuous film could be stopped and viewed as a painting.

In a change of pace, Firth is delightful as Mr. Brown, the widowed father of seven unruly children, in the fine family film **Nanny McPhee** (2006). Written by and starring Emma Thompson in the title role, this is the story of a funeral parlor director who faces financial ruin unless he complies with the edict of his wife's Aunt Adelaide (Angela Lansbury) to remarry within the month.

Firth is also a father in **What a Girl Wants** (2003) this time as Lord Henry Dashwood, who was tricked into separating from his American wife (Kelly Preston) before he knew she was pregnant with his daughter, Daphne (Amanda Bynes). When Daphne decides to meet her father, she has a rejuvenating effect on him.

The HBO film **Conspiracy** (2001) is an enactment of what might have gone on at the Wannsee conference in 1942, where 15 of Hitler's key men gathered to discuss the Jewish Question. Among the stellar cast is Kenneth Branagh as meeting coordinator Reinhard Heydrich and Stanley Tucci as Adolf Eichmann. Firth appears as legal expert Dr. Wilhelm Stuckart, who speaks to the group about the practical ramifications of their plans, in this disturbing thoughtprovoking film.

In 1987 Firth appeared in the post-WWI drama **A Month in the Country**. He and Kenneth Branagh star as Tom Birken and Charles Moon, young war-weary veterans who spend a summer month in a quiet Yorkshire town in order to escape the horrors of war. Birken has been hired to restore an historic painting at the church, while Moon is looking for an ancestor's grave. Birken is thunderstruck by the reverend's wife, Alice Keach (Natasha Richardson) and must come to terms with his passion as Moon faces his own dark desires.

Firth received an Oscar nomination for his portrayal of George, a grief-stricken gay college professor in 1962, who is mourning the death in a car crash of his partner of 16 years (Matthew Goode) in **A Single Man** (2009). He turns to his best friend, Charley (Julianne Moore), for comfort, but his loneliness is palpable. The haunting music underscores George's desire to end his life. When he is befriended by a tantalizing student, Kenny (Nicholas Hoult), George finds himself enticed back into life.

Truly the best picture of 2010, The King's Speech contains the Oscar-winning performance of a lifetime with Colin Firth as the tortured stutterer who would be king. In the 1930s, England's King Edward VIII (Guy Pearce) takes up with a much-married woman, Wallis Simpson (Eve Best), and the country is on the brink of war with Germany. Edward's younger brother, the Duke of York, who is called Bertie by his family, struggles with a bad stammer. Although the audience feels every agonizing moment of Bertie's attempts to overcome his impediment, there is humor provided by his unconventional speech therapist, Lionel Logue (the amazing Geoffrey Rush), found by Bertie's loving wife, Elizabeth (Helena Bonham Carter). It is difficult to capture in a review how ingratiating and inspiring the film is, so just see it!






#### **Public School 175**



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#### **REALITY BITES**

So much for our concern about the numbers of waterfowl. In last month's column, we expressed concern for the seemingly low numbers of duck-like birds in our area. Then a flock of greater scaup the size of Hart Island showed up and turned the water on either side of the bridge into a sea of black and white. Karen, who has been living near the water there for 27 years, has never seen anything like it. She and others were wondering why here, why now.

As we have written in the past, the waterway below the bridge is technically a tidal strait. Currents in straits are notoriously fierce because a lot of water is being squeezed through narrow spaces at the same time. Think the East River, which is, in fact, a tidal strait, and the way the water moves through there at the turn of the tide.

All of this extra movement of the water churns up the bottom, loosening it and making it easier for animals to find food. Moreover, tiny plants tend to get caught up in strong currents, as in those of a tidal strait. These draw plant eaters to the area, which in turn draw meat eaters. Think mossbunker (plant eaters) and bluefish

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(meat eaters), which come together near the bridge every summer for their morning feeding frenzies. This is no coincidence.

Scaup are diving birds, and they eat mollusks and aquatic plants. We are guessing that they stopped and stayed where they did this year because the feeding was good. Why now and not anytime in the last 27 years (not in these numbers, anyway)? For that we would like to invite our readers to submit their own ideas. You can do so at *jdsstrat@msn.com*. While watching the scaup one drizzly morning, we noticed a variety of seagulls swooping down into the water, as if on the attack. After more observations, we concluded that what was happening was less attack than theft. It seemed that what the seagulls wanted was the food the scaup were bringing up to the surface after a dive.


This wasn't the case for the poor bufflehead off Fordham Street. There she was, minding her own business, when all of a sudden, like a rock, a great black-backed gull dropped from the sky atop her. It had her in its claws and proceeded to peck and pluck her mercilessly. We watched them going around and around in the water until the end. It was over in about 15 minutes

Needless to say, it was not a pretty sight or sound. It was a far cry from a depiction by Disney, too. Every so often raw nature reveals itself, reminding us of the struggle for survival that life can be. It is instructive to remember this from time to time, and then to reflect how it is that we have endeavored to ease that struggle, for ourselves and others.

#### Seven Secrets to Maintaining Weight Loss

People who successfully maintain weight loss, on the other hand, watch an average of 7 hours or less. TV watching encourages snacking and puts you in a sedentary position on the couch. Spend less time in front of the TV and enjoy longer lasting weight loss.

Secret #4: Keep it Simple. Although it is important to keep a variety of fruits and vegetables in your program, your diet should be fairly simple. Create a repertoire of basic whole foods: fruits, vegetables, lean meats, whole grains, beans and nuts. When you cut down on your options it becomes easier to stick to your plan, making weight loss guaranteed.

Secret #5: Track Yourself. Your biggest fear is gaining back every solitary lost pound, but don't be afraid of your scale. Weigh yourself at least once each week to monitor any gains. If the numbers begin to climb then reduce calories and increase your exercise.

Secret #6: Eat for the Right Reason. Emotional eating is one of the top reasons that people are overweight. It's very important that you view food as fuel, not as an answer to deeper emotional needs. Secret #7: Forget All-Or-Nothing. No one is perfect-not even you! There will be days when you eat more calories than you should. There will also be days when you miss a workout. Don't let small slipups send you into a tailspin of all-or-nothing sabotage. Simply get back to your healthy lifestyle rather than letting yourself backslide into your old habits.

Don't be one of the many who skip these seven secrets and instead return to life pre-weight loss. You worked hard to be where you are. You deserve to keep it.

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

We are always better off than someone else. Even when our condition in life seems to be at the bottom, there are others in greater need. Perspective is a valuable gift that can keep us from feeling "too big" or "too small"-what one psychiatrist calls the "grandiosity versus despair" continuum.

Giving of time and work is valuable in a different way from giving money. The opportunity to experience with body, mind and spirit the actual living environment of those we serve is what makes actual service in person a deeper experience. We were lucky enough to be working side by side with the family who would live in the house, and the bonds that formed between us and that family were quite remarkable.

Service is the best antidote to depression. Carl Roger, a pioneer in client-centered psychology, was once asked what to do when one felt profoundly depressed. His answer was quite telling: pack a bag, leave your home, find someone worse off than you are and be of service. While in El Salvador, we met with Sister Peggy O'Neill,




