## In Memoriam



**M. John (“Jack”) Martin**

le 16 mai 1929–le 29 mars 2024

Jack Martin, a faithful member of the Alliance Française du North Shore for more than 25 years, fell in love with France when he was a Fulbright student in Rennes in 1952, after graduating from Kenyon College. After spending a year in France, he learned to appreciate all things French—wine, salad after the entrée—and enjoyed traveling all over France almost every year after that.

A psychologist by education and career, his passion was painting. Always a talented artist, he learned watercolors later in life and painted mostly landscapes, the majority of which were scenes of Paris, the villages of Normandy, Provence and the Côte d’Azur. He loved reflections in the water and especially the Pont Neuf in Paris over the Seine. He was thrilled to have his paintings featured on *Connexions* covers. He exhibited in Chicago and Evanston, winning prizes several times. He was also so proud of telling everyone that “Martin” was the most popular name in France. He shared this love with his wife Linda, his family and friends.

Jack wrote about what inspired him in the [2020-2021 issue of Connexions](#). We appreciate the artwork he so generously offered for the covers of *Connexions*. We will miss him.

## À Vous la parole

### “Voyage to France” at Cantigny Park, by Barbara Pearce

A friend and I attended the *Voyage en France* festival at [Cantigny Park](#) in Wheaton, held July 16 to commemorate the 105th anniversary of the Cantigny Battle in France with American and French soldiers fighting German soldiers during the First World War.

Outdoors, Bensidoun hosted a French market with cheeses, jams and baguettes. There were also food stands where one could order savory crepes.

The most extraordinary event was a performance by three dancers from the I Can Can Dance group. They began the show by engaging children in dancing with streamers, after which the dancers performed the cancan with vim and vitality in very colorful costumes.

The cancan was initially danced as a quadrille or galop in 2/4 time. Jacques Offenbach composed

“Galop Infernal” (from his 1858 opera *Orphée aux enfers*) in which the bass rhythm continues as the tempo speeds up. Other compositions to which the cancan was danced appear in *The Merry Widow* by Franz Lehár (1905), the musical comedy *Can-Can* (music and lyrics by Cole Porter, 1953) and the film *Moulin Rouge* (1952).

The cancan features high kicks above the shoulders, feet in buttoned black boots and leaps in the air, landing in splits on the floor.

French artist Henri de Toulouse-Lautrec designed posters for professional theater in the late 19th century. He portrayed two stars, Jane Avril and La Goulue, who performed at the Moulin Rouge in Montmartre.

They danced the *quadrille naturaliste* and may have borrowed the concept of the American chorus line.

## A Vous la parole

### Hermès in the Making, by Darlene Brill

Pass me a drill, a hammer and a screwdriver and the materials to apply them to, and I'm a happy camper. Ever since childhood, I've enjoyed taking things apart to understand how they work and how they were made and, ~~always frequently~~ from time to time, reassembled them successfully.

So, you can imagine my delight when I got word of "Hermès in the Making" (thank you, Barbara Pearce), an exposition on how Hermès's artisans design and craft their products.




The three-day event was held in Chicago Union Station's Great Hall, one of my favorite places in the city. Thrilled that I wouldn't have to leave Union Station to contend with chilly temperatures, I took the Metra train from Wheeling, a five-minute drive from home. We left the station 48 minutes late because the Canadian Pacific computers didn't recognize our train. As a result, they had to implement safety protocols and drive at only 20 miles per hour. After several miles, the switch was made to Metra's computer and the train regained normal speed.

Finally arriving at my destination, I entered the Great Hall and did a circuit of the room. French artisans were demonstrating how they make scarves, saddles, purses, gloves, dinnerware, watches and jewelry. Of course, each francophone artisan had an English interpreter to translate for the onlookers.

Hermès was founded in 1837 when it began making saddles. (Had my mother bought me the pony I always wanted, I could be competing in dressage on a Hermès saddle today. Come to think

of it, my horseback riding lessons in France didn't end so well. The horses and I finally agreed to maintain a respectful distance from each other.)

Hermès is known for its saddle stitch (*le point sellier*), also used on purses and other leather goods, using one thread and two needles to simultaneously pass through the same seam. This is the strongest type of stitching. [Watch here.](#)



One exhibit particularly appealed to my creative side: *petit h*. Using materials discarded by the other crafts, *l'atelier petit h* combines these materials in imaginative and fanciful ways. A tie becomes a handle for a tote bag. Scarves are turned into sleep masks, buttons into salt shakers.



Two of my favorite *petit h* creations: a platter transformed into a skateboard and a porcelain cup converted to a clock.





## À Vous la parole

Before boarding my train home, I watched the demonstration by Frédéric of silk screening scarves *à la lyonnaise*, the technique named for the region where it was perfected.



Using mesh screens attached to metal frames on wheels, paint colors are applied to the white silk one at a time, from light to dark and from large to small patterns. Each screen comprises a blue part (*négatif*) and one or more white parts (*positif*).



Frédéric rolled the first screen along the work table to position it over the silk, carefully matching the

pattern on the screen to that on the silk. He poured a line of paint on the screen. Attaching metal arms to a squeegee, he spread the paint over the screen, front to back. The white parts allowed the paint to penetrate the screen and transfer color to the silk. This first screen laid down the pattern outline.

Each color requires its own screen. The process I watched involved 11 colors, thus 11 screens. The average scarf uses 25 to 30 colors; more complex Hermès designs can use up to 48 colors.

He repeated this 11 times, with a stunning result. I marveled at his craftsmanship, patience and attention to detail. Watch the entire process here: [youtube.com/watch?v=nm0VwtBoGXU](https://youtube.com/watch?v=nm0VwtBoGXU). To finish the scarf, the edges are rolled and sewn, all by hand.

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# **Historique de l'Alliance Française du North Shore, Inc.**

## **Fondée sous le nom du « Club Français d'Evanston » en 1912**

Pendant le cours de l'année 1911, à l'initiative de M. Marc Petiot, professeur de français qui offrait des leçons et des classes privées, quelques dames se rendirent chez Mme John Glenn, 1131 Forest Avenue, Evanston, pour parler de créer un cercle français. L'idée leur parut excellente, mais ce projet ne se réalisa pas.

Plusieurs mois plus tard, en été 1912, M. Édouard Paul Baillot (professeur à Northwestern University), Mme Kenneth (Fannie) Barnhart, Mme C. H. (Della) Bosworth, Mlle Mary Fabian, Mme Charles G. (Caro) Dawes, Mlle Flora Gardner, Mme John (Jennie) Glenn, Mme William (Maria A.) Holabird, Mme Lenora Truman Long, Mme George (Cornelia H.) Ludlow, Mme J. C. (Virginia) Shaffer, Mme Frank (Estelle) Starkweather, Mme Charles (Grace) Whitney et Mlle Nina Winans, entre autres, se réunirent chez Mme Dawes, 225 Greenwood Boulevard, Evanston, pour reprendre ce projet et fonder un cercle de ce genre. Mme Walter S. (Kathleen) Primley, nouvellement arrivée à Evanston, fut choisie comme présidente. C'est ce jour-là que le Club Français d'Evanston est né.

La première réunion du Club eut lieu chez les beaux-parents de la présidente, M. et Mme (Jonathan Philip) Primley, 1331 Forest Avenue, le lundi après-midi 14 octobre 1912. A cette réunion, M. Henri David, professeur de français à l'University of Chicago, fut invité à donner une conférence intitulée « Victor Hugo et les enfants ». M. David revint tous les ans pour donner d'autres conférences et assista aux célébrations des 20<sup>e</sup> et 30<sup>e</sup> anniversaires chez Madame Dawes. Les adhésions de la première année atteignirent 60 membres.

Jusqu'en 1946, les membres se réunirent les uns chez les autres, mais après la guerre, il fut de plus en plus difficile de trouver des maisons assez grandes et avec une aide domestique suffisante pour accueillir jusqu'à 150 adhérents. Par conséquent, le Club tint ses réunions deux fois par mois dans des endroits tels que le Levere Memorial Temple, l'Evanston Art Center, le Ridgeville Community House, l'Evanston Community Center, l'Evanston Public Library et le Woman's Club of Evanston. Pendant les travaux de rénovation de la bibliothèque de Wilmette en 2009-2010 les réunions

eurent lieu à Mallinckrodt Community Center et en 2015-2016, à la bibliothèque de Glenview.

Le nom du Club Français d'Evanston évolua et le Club se nomma parfois le « Club Français d'Evanston et du North Shore » pour refléter l'adhésion des membres assez nombreux des alentours d'Evanston. Pendant la présidence de Mme Lucy Crowder en 1990, afin de mieux établir son affiliation à la Fédération des Alliances Françaises, qui date d'environ 1947 selon les archives, le Club adopta le nom « Alliance Française d'Evanston », qui devint en 1999 « Alliance Française du North Shore » pendant la présidence de Mme Marie-Simone Pavlovich. Le 11 septembre 2015 l'Alliance Française du North Shore, Inc., fut déclarée par l'Etat d'Illinois une corporation à but non lucratif. En 2016, l'Internal Revenue Service a déterminé que l'Alliance serait désormais exempte des impôts fédéraux sous la Section 501(c)(3) de l'Internal Revenue Code.

Le 14 octobre 2012 l'AFduNS accueillit une centaine d'invités pour fêter le centenaire de la fondation du Club Français d'Evanston. L'Alliance donna un thé élégant au Woman's Club of Evanston au cours duquel furent entendus les discours de M. Graham Paul, consul général de France à Chicago ; Mme Elizabeth Tisdahl, maire d'Evanston ; Mme Marie-Simone Pavlovich, ancienne présidente ; et Mme Margot Steinhart, présidente. En 2014 sept de nos membres racontèrent en français leurs expériences de jeunesse pendant la Deuxième Guerre mondiale à partir desquelles fut réalisée une vidéo intitulée *Souvenirs de guerre, 1939-1945 : World War II Remembered*. De plus, 18 membres contribuèrent également à un recueil bilingue de leurs souvenirs de guerre.

Aujourd'hui l'AFduNS offre un programme de conférences mensuelles en français, des cours de conversation, plusieurs cercles de lecture, trois cafés conversation, un ciné club, un magasine (*Connexions*), un Micro ouvert, une Soirée Trivia et un déjeuner de printemps. En 2016 pour compléter son site web, l'Alliance y a ajouté deux plateformes de réseaux sociaux : Meetup.com pour faciliter les rencontres et Facebook pour promouvoir les activités de l'Alliance.

# **History of the Alliance Française du North Shore, Inc.**

## **Founded as the "French Club of Evanston" in 1912**

In 1911, influenced by M. Marc Petiot, a teacher of private French lessons and classes, several Evanston women met at the home of Mrs. John Glenn, 1131 Forest Avenue, Evanston, to discuss forming a French club. Although the idea seemed excellent, the project was not realized.

It was not until the summer of 1912 that a French club was finally created at the home of Mrs. Charles G. (Caro) Dawes, 225 Greenwood Boulevard, Evanston. Professor Édouard Paul Baillot, Northwestern University; Mrs. Kenneth (Fannie) Barnhart; Mrs. C. H. (Della) Bosworth; Miss Mary Fabian; Mrs. Charles G. (Caro) Dawes; Miss Flora Gardner; Mrs. John (Jennie) Glenn; Mrs. William (Maria A.) Holabird; Mrs. Lenora Truman Long; Mrs. George (Cornelia H.) Ludlow; Mrs. J. C. (Virginia) Shaffer; Mrs. Frank (Estelle) Starkweather; Mrs. Charles (Grace) Whitney and Miss Nina Winans met to accomplish this goal. Mrs. Walter S. (Kathleen) Primley, recently arrived in Evanston, was chosen as president. On this day, the French Club of Evanston was born.

On Monday afternoon, October 14, 1912, the Club's first meeting was held at the home of the new president's in-laws, Mr. and Mrs. Jonathan Philip Primley, 1331 Forest Avenue, Evanston. M. Henri David, professor of French at the University of Chicago, was invited to give a lecture entitled "Victor Hugo et les enfants." Every year afterwards, M. David would return to lecture; he attended the celebration of the 20th and 30th anniversaries of the Club at the home of Mrs. Dawes. During the first year of the Club, membership rose to 60.

Until 1946, members met at each other's homes, but after the war, it became increasingly difficult to find homes with sufficient domestic help to entertain and with adequate space to accommodate the membership, which peaked at 150. As a result, the Club met twice a month in locations such as the Levere Memorial Temple, the Evanston Art Center, the Ridgeville Community House, the Evanston Community Center, the Evanston Public Library, and the Woman's Club of Evanston. During renovations of the Wilmette Public Library, the Alliance met in 2009-2010 at the

Mallinckrodt Community Center in Wilmette and at the Glenview Public Library in 2015-2016.

Periodically, the Club Français d'Evanston would identify itself as the "Club Français d'Evanston et du North Shore" to reflect its growing membership drawn from surrounding suburbs. In 1990, during the presidency of Mrs. Lucy Crowder, the Club adopted "Alliance Française d'Evanston" as its name to establish a closer affiliation with the Federation of the Alliances Françaises, an initiative that had begun about 1947, according to the archives. In 1999, during the presidency of Mrs. Marie-Simone Pavlovich, the name changed again to "Alliance Française du North Shore." On September 11, 2015, the Alliance Française du North Shore, Inc., was registered in the State of Illinois as a not-for-profit corporation. In 2016, the Internal Revenue Service determined that our Alliance Française chapter would be exempt from federal income tax according to Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code.

On October 14, 2012, the Alliance Française du North Shore welcomed 100 guests at the centennial celebration of the founding of the French Club of Evanston. The event, a formal tea at the Woman's Club of Evanston, featured speeches by Mr. Graham Paul, Consul General of France in Chicago; Mrs. Elizabeth Tisdahl, mayor of Evanston; Mrs. Marie-Simone Pavlovich, former president; and Mrs. Margot Steinhart, president. In 2014, seven of our members participated in recording a video, *Souvenirs de guerre, 1939-1945: World War II Remembered*, in which they recounted in French their experiences as young people during the Second World War. In addition, 18 members contributed written stories for a bilingual collection of their wartime memories.

Today, the AFduNS offers monthly lectures, French conversation classes, several literary groups, three cafés-conversation gatherings, a ciné club, a magazine (*Connexions*), a Micro ouvert, a Soirée Trivia and a spring luncheon. In 2016, to complement its website, the Alliance added two social networking sites: Meetup.com to facilitate event reservations and Facebook to promote chapter activities.

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
