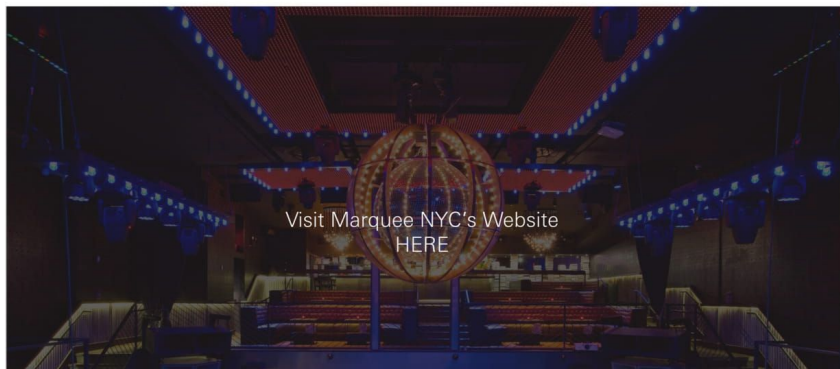
What goes on here?

Open on Wednesday, Friday and Saturday between 11 PM and 4 AM, Marquee New York offers plenty of events happening throughout the year. DJs often drop in and out over the year and mix up the music playing in the house. Speaking of music, when DJs aren't in the house, it rotates throughout the week, with Wednesdays playing open format, on Fridays Underground House is playing, and on Saturdays, the club is blasting Commercial House music. The combination of the music and venue make it very lively at the high times of the night.



What's it about?

Located at 289 10th Avenue in Chelsea, Marquee New York is an upscale venue located in one of the most artistic parts of the city. It's lively, bright and colorful just like its locale. The dress code is at the door-man's discretion, but is a little strict and dressing down not an option (no shorts or baseball caps, guys). When it comes to guest lists, the venue doesn't provide them on their website, but promoters for certain parties/events can add you to their personal guest lists. The good news is that there is usually no wait for tickets! Also, if you arrive before 12:30 AM you don't have to worry about capacity restraints, because you'll be given expedited entry!

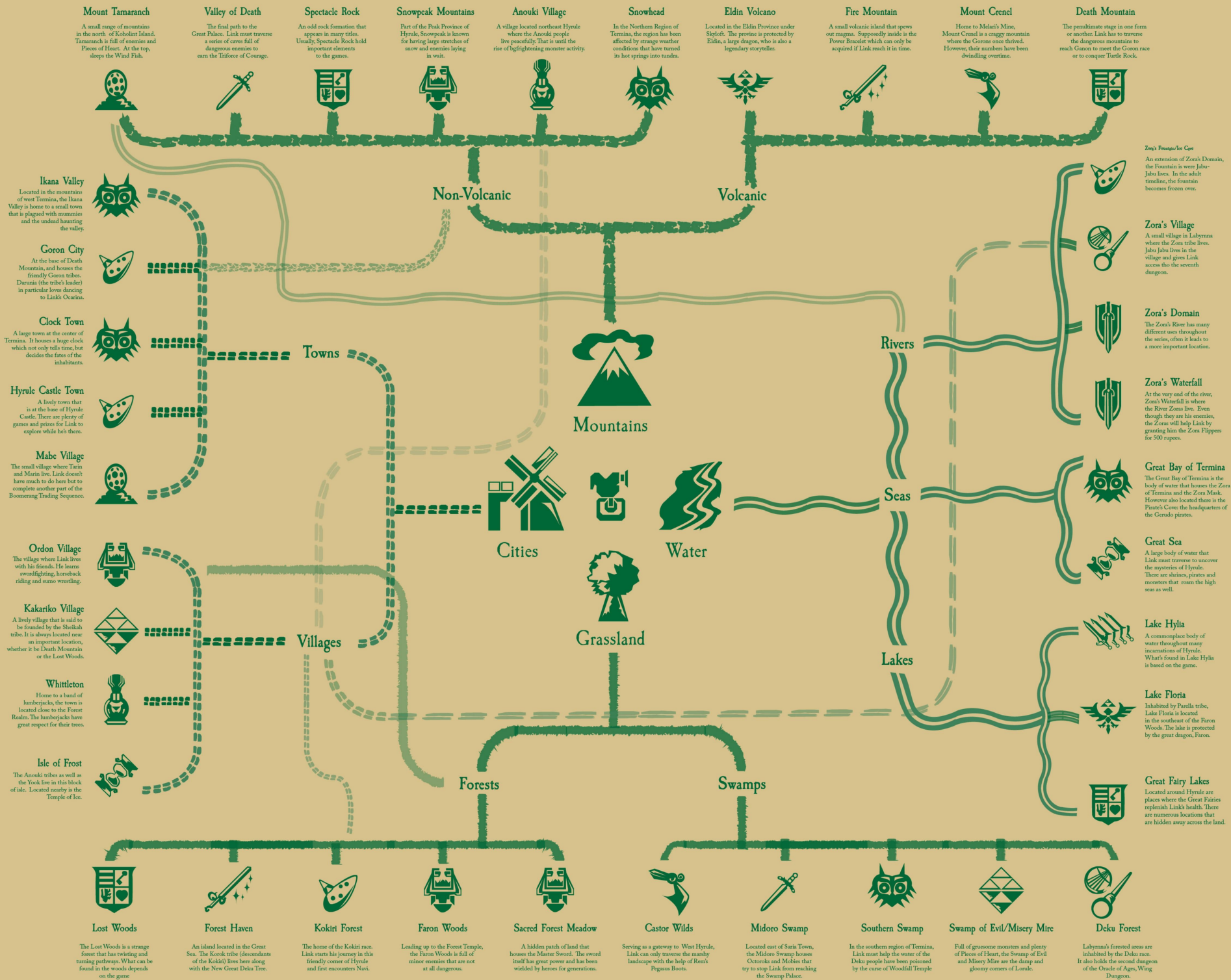

Mount Tamaranch

A small range of mountains in the north of Koholint Island. Tamaranch is full of enemies and Pieces of Heart. At the top, sleeps the Wind Fish.

Valley of Death

The final path to the Great Palace. Link must traverse a series of cores full of dangerous enemies to earn the Triforce of Courage.

Spectacle Rock

An odd rock formation that appears in many titles. Usually, Spectacle Rock holds important elements to the games.

Snowpeak Mountains

Part of the Peak Province of Hyrule, Snowpeak is known for having large stretches of snow and enemies laying in wait.

Anouki Village

A village located northeast Hyrule where the Anouki people live peacefully. That is until the rise of brightfrightening monster activity.

Snowhead

In the Northern Region of Termina, the region has been affected by strange weather conditions that have turned its hot springs into tundra.

Eldin Volcano

Located in the Eldin Province under Skyloft. The province is protected by Eldin, a large dragon, who is also a legendary storyteller.

Fire Mountain

A small volcanic island that spews out magma. Supposedly inside is the Power Bracelet which can only be acquired if Link reach it in time.

Mount Crenel

Home to Mdarri's Mine, Mount Crenel is a craggy mountain where the Gorons once thrived. However, their numbers have been dwindling overtime.

Death Mountain

The penultimate stage in one form or another. Link has to traverse the dangerous mountains to reach Ganon to meet the Goron race or to conquer Turtle Rock.

Ikana Valley
Located in the mountains of west Termina, the Ikana Valley is home to a small town that is plagued with mummies and the undead haunting the valley.

Goron City
At the base of Death Mountain, and houses the friendly Goron tribes. Darunia (the tribe's leader) in particular loves dancing to Link's Ocarina.

Clock Town
A large town at the center of Termina. It houses a huge clock which not only tells time, but decides the fates of the inhabitants.

Hyrule Castle Town
A lively town that is at the base of Hyrule Castle. There are plenty of games and prizes for Link to explore while he's there.

Mabe Village
The small village where Lirin and Martin live. Link doesn't have much to do here but to complete another part of the Boomerang Trading Sequence.

Ordon Village
The village where Link lives with his friends. He learns swordfighting, horseback riding and sumo wrestling.

Kakariko Village
A lively village that is said to be founded by the Sheikah tribe. It is always located near an important location, whether it be Death Mountain or the Lost Woods.

Whittleton
Home to a band of lumberjacks, the town is located close to the Forest Realm. The lumberjacks have great respect for their trees.

Isle of Frost
The Anouki tribes as well as the Yoiki live in this block of ice. Located nearby is the Temple of Ice.

Zora's Fountain/ice Core
An extension of Zora's Domain, the Fountain is where Jabu-Jabu lives. In the adult timeline, the fountain becomes frozen over.

Zora's Village
A small village in Labyrinthia where the Zora tribe lives. Jabu Jabu lives in the village and gives Link access to the seventh dungeon.

Zora's Domain
The Zora's River has many different uses throughout the series, often it leads to a more important location.

Zora's Waterfall
At the very end of the river, Zora's Waterfall is where the River Zoras live. Even though they are his enemies, the Zoras will help Link by granting him the Zora Flippers for 500 rupees.

Great Bay of Termina
The Great Bay of Termina is the body of water that houses the Zora of Termina and the Zora Mask. However also located there is the Pirate's Cove; the headquarters of the Gerudo pirates.

Great Sea
A large body of water that Link must traverse to uncover the mysteries of Hyrule. There are shrines, pirates and monsters that roam the high seas as well.

Lake Hylia
A commonplace body of water throughout many incarnations of Hyrule. What's found in Lake Hylia is based on the game.

Lake Floria
Inhabited by Pateila tribe, Lake Floria is located in the southeast of the Faron Woods. The lake is protected by the great dragon, Faron.

Great Fairy Lakes
Located around Hyrule are places where the Great Fairies replenish Link's health. There are numerous locations that are hidden away across the land.

Lost Woods

The Lost Woods is a strange forest that has twisting and turning pathways. What can be found in the woods depends on the game.

Forest Haven

An island located in the Great Sea. The Korok tribe (descendants of the Kokiri) lives here along with the 'New Great Deku' Tree.

Kokiri Forest

The home of the Kokiri race. Link starts his journey in this friendly corner of Hyrule and first encounters Navi.

Faron Woods

Leading up to the Forest Temple, the Faron Woods is full of minor enemies that are not at all dangerous.

Sacred Forest Meadow

A hidden patch of land that houses the Master Sword. The sword itself has great power and has been wielded by heroes for generations.

Castor Wilds

Serving as a gateway to West Hyrule, Link can only traverse the marshy landscape with the help of Ren's Pegasus Boots.

Midoro Swamp

Located east of Saris Town, the Midoro Swamp houses Octoroks and Moblins that try to stop Link from reaching the Swamp Palace.

Southern Swamp

In the southern region of Termina, Link must help the water of the Deku people have been poisoned by the curse of Woodfall Temple.

Swamp of Evil/Misery Mire

Full of gussome monsters and plenty of Pieces of Heart, the Swamp of Evil and Misery Mire are the damp and gloomy corners of Lorule.

Deku Forest

Labyrinthia's forested areas are inhabited by the Deku race. It also holds the second dungeon of the Oracle of Ages, Wing Dungeon.

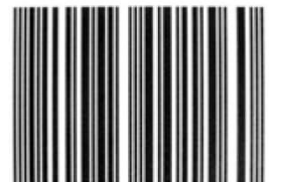

Visit Philadelphia

The City of Brotherly Love

Famous as the birthplace of life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness, Philadelphia delivers one destination, five counties and countless things to do: fascinating museums, vibrant parks, national historic sites and famous (and delicious) food.

Yo, welcome to Philly!

There's never a shortage of awesome things to do in Philadelphia — but there are some things you just can't miss while you're here.

Whether it's running like Rocky, refueling with a cheesesteak and then wandering along Boathouse Row, or touring Independence Hall, devouring a roast pork sandwich at Reading Terminal Market and then visiting an amazing museum on the Benjamin Franklin Parkway, these are the experiences that make our city stand out among the rest.

History

The country's first World Heritage City, Philadelphia is also the birthplace of the United States, where our Founding Fathers met, discussed, debated and formed a new country.

Lucky for 21st-century visitors, so much of Philadelphia's history has been preserved. That includes, of course, two of the city's most important attractions: Independence Hall (one of the only World Heritage sites in the country and where the Declaration of Independence and U.S. Constitution were drafted and signed) and the Liberty Bell (a symbol of abolitionist movement).

It also includes the historic houses, government buildings, museums,

churches and cemeteries that make up Independence National Historical Park, the "most historic square mile in America" run by the National Parks Service that sees millions of visitors every year.

Elsewhere, visitors soak up the region's history in the quaint, explorable alleyways of Old City and Society Hill, at the city's excellent history museums (Museum of the American Revolution, National Museum of American Jewish History, the African American Museum) and throughout the Greater Philadelphia region at sites made famous by the American Revolution (Valley Forge National Historical Park).



Philadelphia's iconic John F. Kennedy Plaza — better known as LOVE Park — brings people together with green areas, walking paths and seating, as well as open paved areas that play host to festivals and events.

Explore Philadelphia Neighborhoods

It's said that Philadelphia is a city of neighborhoods, and there's no better way to get a taste of the City of Brotherly Love than to explore one of Philly's many distinct areas.

Reading Market Terminal

Established in 1892, the historic Reading Terminal Market remains the go-to place for professional and home cooks looking for farm-fresh produce, meats, cheeses, herbs and more. Merchants sell everything from apples to Amish baked goods. Tours are available, and the market often hosts special events.

The Philadelphia Flower Show, Mummers Fancy Brigade and Philadelphia Auto Show attract large crowds annually to the Convention Center.

"Meet me at the Eagle" derives from a longstanding tradition among locals who gather in front of the iconic statue in the Grand Court at Macy's Center City, formerly John Wanamaker Department Store. In addition to picking up the latest styles, shoppers marvel at the elaborate architecture and enjoy daily musical performances from its historic 28,500-pipe organ — the largest playable instrument in the world.



Visitors can enjoy eating a wide swath of different cuisines, from sublime soul food and exquisite Asian and Middle Eastern dishes to authentic Philly cheesesteaks and traditional Pennsylvania Dutch fare — all available from largely locally owned, family-run stands.

Chestnut Hill



Loaded with photo-worthy charm, Chestnut Hill is tucked in the northwest section of Philadelphia, just 25 minutes from Center City.

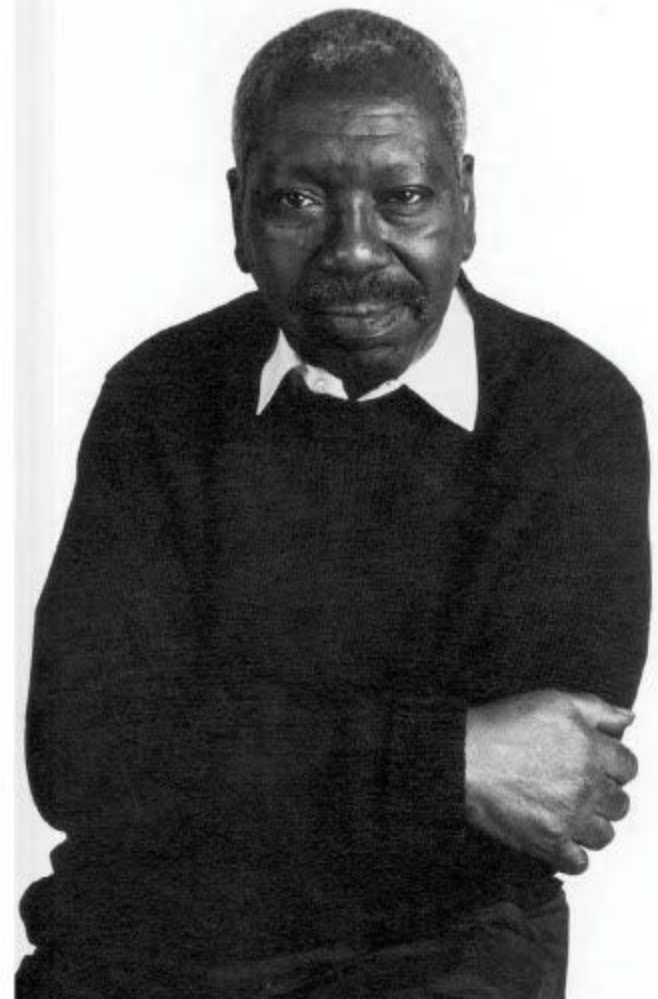
Loaded with photo-worthy charm, Chestnut Hill is tucked in the northwest section of Philadelphia, just 25 minutes from Center City. And thanks to its location near Wissahickon and Cresheim creeks and Fairmount Park, this National Register Historic District enjoys an abundance of greenery and open spaces.

Once a suburb where well-to-do Philadelphians escaped the city's summer heat, Chestnut Hill saw an influx of year-round residents with

the arrival of railroads in the 19th century.

Since then, it remains a relatively affluent community with an array of historic mansions and Victorian twin and row houses. Chestnut Hill's main street, Germantown Avenue, is a treasure trove of shops, galleries, boutiques, home furnishings stores and restaurants.

Stretching almost 10 blocks, the avenue boasts cobblestone streets and historic facades on many shops and businesses — all adding to the picturesque charm.

THE WAR SERIES

Jacob Lawrence was drafted into World War II.

When the second World War broke out, there was a huge draft in the United States. Among many of the young men drafted, Lawrence was immediately thrust into a war type situation after earning so recognition as an artist

in New York. He was originally drafted into the United States Coastal Guard and was stationed in Massachusetts and Florida before he was finally assigned on a troopship as a Coast Guard artist. As a Coast Guard artist, it was his job to document the effects of the war as well as many of his own personal experiences. However, many of the paintings that he did during this time were lost. As a result, when Lawrence returned from the war, the Guggenheim Museum commissioned him to do the "War Series". In this

series of paintings, Lawrence recaptured the qualities of the war and how it affected him as an African-American within the ranks of the military during the 1940s, where racism was running rampant through the ranks and across the United States. Its most identifying features include the strong use earth tones along with the occasional use of greens.
