Clarion Kindness Project Launches New Program to Benefit Senior Citizens and Children

Clarion Kindness Project, a [501(c)(3)] nonprofit organization dedicated to serving residents of Clarion County, announced the launch of its new program, Love Boxes for Seniors and Children. This initiative aims to provide snack boxes for senior citizens and children during the summer months and will distribute boxes of snacks and food items during the months of June, July, and August.

"We are thrilled to introduce Love Boxes to the community," said Jacqueline Griebel, President of Clarion Kindness Project. "This program represents our commitment to the community and will allow us to help alleviate food insecurity."

Clarion Kindness Project received a \$1,000.00 grant in April from the Walmart Spark Good program presented by Rodney Ciecierski, Store Manager of the Clarion Walmart that will serve as seed money to start this new initiative. Every year the Spark Good program distributes grants funded by the Walmart foundation to nonprofits and organizations in communities where Walmart has stores.

Laurel Mountain Winery is celebrating 30 years of business in 2025. Established in 1995 by late wine enthusiast, John Nordberg. The winery is a refurbished barn that features a wine tasting bar with a unique gift shop. Additionally, the property has an Antique Tool Museum featuring historical

items from our generational family farm in Driftwood. Settled on 50 acres with a large pond out front, the beautiful country setting compliments the family friendly atmosphere.

Nordberg and his family enjoyed growing a small vineyard in Driftwood, but soon realized it was cheaper to buy juice for our wine from the Erie region. He inspired his family, and they continue to use the recipes he created. Now owned by daughter Victoria Tretick, and her wine-making husband, Michael Tretick, after the late passing of Barbara Nordberg, it is important to their family to keep his legacy flowing. Grandchildren Taylor Tretick, manager of the Benezette Wines location, and Myer Tretick, have plans to further the business; truly making it a small family business.

Their popular Sunset Events, where they host live music and food trucks in the summer months, have grown tremendously over the years. They have become a huge success and a whole lot of fun. They also bring out the family's 100-year-old apple press in the fall for a Cider Press Event. "We like to make sure we can include people of all ages at our events for the best family time" Vicki always says. This is Jefferson County's first and only cider pressing event.

Expanding the wine selection has proved to be a challenging but rewarding effort. Tretick has taken on the role of winemaker since 2014. "The winery used to produce 12,500 gallons of wine a year by hand, but since we introduced an updated assembly line for bottling, we have surpassed our goals" states Tretick. His favorite wine to make is Blackberry Port, a must-try.

Some of the more popular wines that have been around since the beginning are Laurel Blush, Rattlesnake Red, & Steel City Red. One favorite story was the creation of Rhuberry, a strawberry-rhubarb blended

wine. Nordberg had too much rhubarb in the garden one year and what does a wine maker do with an overstock of vegetables? Make wine with it of course! This sweet wine sits on the shelves now, perfect for spring and summer.

The family has been working hard to expand their business. Other satellite locations include

Cook Forest Wines, Benezette Wines, and more recently 50 Shades of Grapes in Emlenton, PA.

The expansion in Benezette opened in 2012. This location has been a grand success and even more fun. It is meaningful to the family to be right down the road from where it all started at the Nordberg Farm in Driftwood.




Spotlight

programming covers topics including patient assessment, cardiac arrest management, airway management, patient immobilization, diabetic emergencies, strokes and seizures, and information about the emergency response system.

Learners are required to attend all classes and lab sessions throughout the program to demonstrate their competency in numerous psychomotor skills, complete testing requirements, and prepare for the National Registry of Emergency Medical Technicians (NREMT) exam to be certified. Presently, NPRC has a passing rate for the NREMT exam that's well above the national average and is around 90 percent.

The Greenways Awards have been celebrated by the Council on Greenways and Trails (CGT) for 13 consecutive years (from the initial 2013 awards), throughout Crawford, Venango, and Clarion Counties. Items given to each award recipient were a framed certificate and a set of four ceramic coasters made by Vicki Kidder-Clark and Rick Clark, artists often participating in CGT's annual Nature Art Showcase each February in Franklin.

The James E. Holden Greenways Volunteer of the Year for 2025 was presented this week to Susan M. Hilton who resides in Franklin, as did the namesake for this program recognizing activities projects accomplished during the prior five-year period. In her acceptance remarks, Hilton pointed out that volunteering was encouraged and practiced by her parents and extended family for as long as she can remember. Since retiring from the faculty of Clarion University

Bickel exclaimed, "It's amazing to realize that the bowstring truss bridge that during the oil boom era carried nitrogen-laden wagons Messerall Road over Pine Creek today carries bicyclists across Linesville Creek as they glide along Spillway Trail within Pymatuning State Park!" The six agencies recognized as recipients of the 2025 Thomas J. Allen Greenways Partners Award are as follows: County of Crawford: PennDOT District #1, PA DCNR - Pymatuning State Park, Pa. Fish and Boat Commission, Pa, Game Commission, and Pine

Regional Rails -to-Trails Update

While more recent news updates to area rails-to-trails concentrate on sections of the Redbank Valley



Trail between
Brookville and New Bethlehem,
the Five Bridges Trail between
Brookville and Allen's Mills,
and the Rail 66 Trail between
Marianne/Clarion Junction and
Marienville, there's another trail
only an hour or less north of us
through the Allegheny National
Forest that has seen extensive
improvement of late.

The Knox-Kane Rail Trail in Forest, Elk and McKean counties, has had additional miles of access improved over the last year.

The trail, which connects with the Rail 66 Trail in Clarion and Forest counties, now has 12 miles completed — 4.5 miles between Lamont, at the intersection of Routes 66 and 948, through Kane to Lantz Corners; and 7.5 miles from Mt. Jewett to the Kinzua Bridge State Park.

The section from Lamont to Lantz Corners is through some residential areas, as well as around the border of Kane Country Club. Bicyclists, joggers and walkers are asked to be courteous, especially near the golf course if people are hitting or putting.

Trailhead parking is across from the Country Fair along Route 6 near Kane, and Welsh Street near the old Kane train depot. There is also parking behind the Kane Area High School near the trail bridge over the active railroad line. This section of trail is maintained by TAMED — Trail Association of McKean & Elk Divide.

The Mt. Jewett to Kinzua Bridge Trail section was completed a few years ago under a federal grant through Headwaters Charitable Trust, who owns the trail. It was designated Pennsylvania Trail of the Year in 2024 by the PA Department of Conservation and

KNOX & KANE RAIL TRAIL Winding through the fields and forests of northwestern Pennsylvania Winding through the fields and forests of northwestern Penns the Knox & Kane Rail Trail follows the former Knox and Kane Raillroad (KKRR). The KKRR operated a scenic railroad from Marienville through the Allegheny National Forest and over the Kinzua Vladudt from 1987 until safety concerns closed the viaduct in 2002. Op. July 21, 2003 an F1 tomado brought down more than half of the viaduct. Before its collapse, the Kinzua Viaduct was ranked as the fourth-tallest railroad bridge in the United States. Once completed, the Knox & Kane Rail Trail will be 74-miles long. As of January 2025, 54 miles are developed and open for use. Trail mile "zero" starts in Marianne at PA 66. The trail ends at Kinzua Bridge State Park. For Your Safety and Enjoyment Respect adjacent landowners, stay within the trail corridor Trail partners are working to develop the rest of the trail. Stop at all road crossings, oncoming traffic does not stop Please use caution on unimproved trail sections. The trail may be blocked, or washed out, and bridges may be closed. Trailhead parking in Mt. Jewett is located at the intersection of Center Street and Peterson Street behind the borough office building. It features an information kiosk, bike rack and bicycle repair station.

The second trailhead is at the overflow parking lot at Kinzua Bridge State Park at 296 Viaduct Road in Mt. Jewett. This section of trail is maintained by the MJ2KB Trail Club — Mt. Jewett 2 Kinzua Bridge State Park.

The only section still needing

improvements is a segment just west of the Lantz Corners crossing.

Previous portions of the trail in Forest and Clarion counties have already been completed by Forest County and the Route 66 Trail Organization.

When fully completed, combined with the Rail 66 Trail in Clarion County, the Knox-Kane Trail will offer 73.8 miles of uninterrupted trail from Marianne/Clarion Junction to Kinzua Bridge State Park.





Wilson had two hits in the game and the RBI. Alicyn Burford collected two hits.


Emileigh Mahle, Ashlyn Clark and Karlee Mahle each singled.










JCHC Hosts Clarion-Limestone School at JCHS **Heritage Park** (aka "Scripture Rocks Park")



Wildcats' Kerr Shines in PFCA East/West Small School Game

Jimmy Kerr had a great game, as the starting right tackle on the West Offensive Line, in the team's 14-0 victory in the Pennsylvania Football Coaches Association (PSFCA) East/West Small School Game, which was held on Sunday, May 18th at

Cumberland Valley's Chapman Field, in Mechanicsburg.

There are two East/West Games, one for 1A-3A and another for 4A-6A. The East/West Games are the second most prestigious All-Star games in Pennsylvania, after the Big33 Classic, which currently pits Team Pennsylvania against Team Maryland. The three games are the only State-Wide All-Star Games. Both East/West Games were held on the 18th.

The 68th Big33 Game was held on Sunday, May 25th, at Chapman Field, with Maryland downing Pennsylvania 42-21. The win marked Maryland's first victory since 2018, when the game was played at Central Dauphin's Landis Field.

According to the PFSCA: The PSFCA East-West All-Star Game was created in 2001 to provide more athletes the chance to showcase their talents at a high level. It originally had one game including all classifications. The two-school format began in 2021. Originally inspired by the Big 33 Game, which pits Pennsylvania's

top players against Maryland's. The PSFCA East-West game offers a prestigious platform for athletes who might otherwise be overlooked due to the limited roster size of the Big 33 Game.
