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Former Clarion-Limestone Boys Basketball Coach Joe Ferguson Named 2024 Sportsmanship 1 "Sportsperson of the Year"

Former Clarion-Limestone Lions Boys basketball coach Joe Ferguson was recently named the 2024 "Western Pennsylvania Sportsperson of the Year" by Sportsmanship 1/Fun With Fundamentals Basketball Camp. The award has been given out for over twenty years.

Coach Ferguson, who retired as head coach of Clarion-Limestone Boys basketball at the end of the 2022-23 season, after 17 seasons at the Lions' helm, is the winningest coach in school history, with 284 wins. His Lions won 7 Keystone Shortway Conference titles in 9 appearances, made 16 District 9 playoff appearances, winning two titles and had 20 or more wins 7 times.

Clarion Travel Plaza Nearing Completion Begins Hiring Process

New travel center at the junction of Interstate 80 and State Route 68 seeks employees for its convenience store, food court, and refueling station, signaling imminent opening.

Construction of the Clarion Travel Plaza in Monroe Township is nearing completion. The plaza will be located at Trinity Point along State Route 68, just off Interstate 80 Exit 62.

While an exact opening date has not been set, workers onsite confirmed that the plaza is in its final stages of construction.

Additionally, job postings have appeared online seeking employees for the convenience store, food court, and refueling station. Employment website Indeed.com listed a Store Associate job posting for the Clarion Travel Plaza, with an offer of \$15 to \$17 for part-time and full-time employees. "The Clarion Travel Plaza is looking for convenience store and food court convenience store attendants," says the posting.

The job posting confirms four of the five food franchises previously reported by exploreClarion.com — Fatburger, Dunkin, Jimmy John's, and Tikka Shack. Another franchise, Sbarro, is also listed.

It's unclear whether the plaza will include the previously planned Buffalo's Cafe, a restaurant chain known for its Buffalo-style chicken wings. Buffalo's Cafe is operated by FAT Brands-the parent company of Fatburger.

In addition to the online postings, the plaza was accepting applications at the Clarion Chamber's Job Fair at the Clarion Mall on April 24th.

GJAMS Clarion Holdings, LLC began construction of the plaza the week of December 26th, 2022. The main building has been constructed and is in the final stages of build-out. Most of the flooring is in. An enormous wall of refrigerators has been installed.

We are all judgmental. Yes, even you. I certainly am, many times I think it's human nature and yet while it is in our nature to be judgmental, I don't think it's ever useful to us. Do you look down on others, as if you are so much better? Do you realize this creates division between people? Think about it for a second, we see someone, and based on their looks or actions, we pass judgement on them. Normally not good judgment, either. Usually without even knowing the person. This will take all of us a great effort to do. The first step is to think about your thoughts for a few days, try to notice when you're being judgmental. This can be difficult at first, but once you keep reminding yourself to do it, it will get easier each day. Once we are more aware can we stop ourselves from being judgmental? Take this to heart. So many of us judge without having a clue what that person is going through. We look on the outside, maybe their clothes, house, cars, jewelry, I could go on and on. This month stop and take the time and think of once simple scripture. Do not judge for you shall be judge, pretty simple right?

"This award is mostly about

character, not wins and losses, and that is what I appreciate most, since that is what I hoped to instill as a leader to my players. Most importantly, I hoped to direct the athletes to honor Christ in all they do, and to represent themselves, their parents, and the community with integrity and solid character.

"I want to thank Norb Baschnagel, the Sportsmanship committee that voted for me to receive this award, and to all those that supported me and the C-L basketball program through the years.

"It is very special!"

Forgive me for the cliche, but Coach Ferguson is more than a "One-Trick Pony."

He was very active in Clarion Little League for a number of years as a board member, coach, longtime All-Star coach (think "Three Amigos," Coach Ferguson, Coach Dan Shofestall and Coach Jim Campbell),and more

He was softball player for various teams, church league and men's league. He played in a local men's basketball league and was one of the driving forces, along with Coach Baschnagel and others) in the early days of the YMCA, with funding, field procurement etc.

As he mentioned he is a Christian, putting Jesus Christ first in his life and is always wearing his Christian faith on his sleeve. Coach Ferguson's order of priority has been 1) Jesus Christ, 2) Family, 3) Lions' Basketball.

Joe's record in Boys basketball at Clarion-Limestone High is the best in school history and he always did it with first class and dignity.

Joe Ferguson is a giver. who has helped the Clarion Community greatly to develop the Clarion County YMCA over many years of his support and leadership.

He is also very involved with his church and has been a major sponsor of the Clarion Area Chamber of Commerce Golf Scramble for many years.

Coach Ferguson's players speak very highly of him on his impact on their basketball career and life skills they learned.

Ferguson would rather be noted as one who mentored his players to be men of integrity and character, and to understand that 'life is about relationships.' His relationship with Jesus Christ is his foundation to all other relationships and he knows that is what ultimately made the basketball program successful. Coach Ferguson is most appreciative of having the opportunity to mentor young men as well as have good relationships with the coaches, AD's, officials, players, and most importantly his family, throughout the years."

BROOKVILLE to Rehabilitate Mobile Lounge and Plane Mate Prototype Vehicles for Metropolitan **Washington Airports Authority**

Plane Mate and Mobile Lounge Prototype Vehicles have arrived onsite at **Brookville Equipment Corporation**

Brookville Equipment (BROOKVILLE) Corporation was given Notice to Proceed (NTP) on a \$16.4 million contract by Metropolitan Washington Airports Authority (MWAA) on November 2, 2023, for the rehabilitation and upgrade of the existing plane mate and mobile lounge vehicles at Washington Dulles International Airport (Dulles International).

BROOKVÍLLE's rehabilitation will include one prototype of each vehicle type. When the work is complete, MWAA will have the option of revamping the rest of the fleet for an estimated \$143 million, not to exceed \$160 million, over six years. "We are so excited to have the opportunity to rehabilitate these vehicles and bring them back to life, after being a critical part of the operations at Dulles International. We plan to reimagine the functionality of these vehicles, with anticipation they will be in operation for decades into the future," said Joel McNeil, Executive Vice President of Brookville Equipment Corporation.

The vehicles are used to transport passengers from the main terminal area to Concourse D. which is not connected to the AeroTrain. In the 1960s, Washington Dulles came up with the concept of the mobile lounge, in the peak of the jet age, by saving passengers time by eliminating walking long distances from the ticketing gate to the jet ramp. Currently, the vehicles are used to disembark passengers from most international flights arriving at Dulles International.

The fleet in its entirety consists of 19 mobile lounges and 30 plane mates. The mobile lounges have been an essential part of Dulles International since opening in 1962 and are considered a historic element. The plane mates were an evolution of the concept and produced in Pennsylvania in the 1970's and 80's. The vehicles remain a critical part of the airport's passenger transfer operations. "Mobile lounges and plane mates are important parts of Dulles International Airport's

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3rd Annual Rail 66 Time Tria



The Clarion Summer Fest committee invites cyclists to participate in the 3rd Annual Rail 66 Time Trial. Cyclists must be 16 years of age and older, in good physical condition, and can register to compete in an 11.5-mile point-to-point timetrial bike race. The race begins at the Farmington Township Community Park in Leeper, PA, travels north along the Rail 66 bike corridor and finishes next to Northwest Hardwoods, which is located about 1 mile south of the village of Marienville, PA. Racers will leave the starting line in 30 second intervals.

The race is scheduled for Saturday, June 8, 2024. Checkin opens at 7:15 a.m. and the first rider will start the race at 8:30 a.m. Online registration is available at rail66tt.com. Janney Montgomery Scott, LLC (Clarion office), the race sponsor, will provide refreshments at the finish line.

Rail 66 is an asphalt-paved bike trail that begins on Rt. 322 just west of Clarion and ends in the village of Marienville. The 11.5-mile bike time-trial course does not cross any major highways, but it does cross 19 township roads, driveways and lanes along this ride. The race committee will provide traffic control at these intersections to ensure a safe crossing.

All proceeds go towards trail maintenance and T-shirts are guaranteed to racers who register by May 31, 2024.

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


Spotlight

One of the five food court counters is in.

Outside, the main frame of the fill station canopies is erected. Plumbing and electrical work for the fuel pumps is in progress.

At a planning commission held in June of 2022, GJAMS Clarion Holdings, LLC Operations and Project Manager, Ang Sandoo, told exploreClarion.com in January of 2023 that the plaza will need approximately 40 employees, half of which would be full-time.

Initial operating hours will be 4:00 a.m. to midnight and hours could eventually increase to 24/7, Sandoo said.

The plaza is one of two being constructed off Interstate 80 Exit 62. A second plaza, on the northern side of Interstate 80 at the site of the former Ramada Inn, will feature a Sheetz and two proposed chain restaurants. That project is in the early development stages with demolition beginning on Tuesday.



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


Other competitors for the Wolves were Anthony Bartley in the long jump and triple jump and Michael Swanson, in the high jump.

Their matchup, the last of four, which had a two-hour time limit, began at approximately 6:00pm and ended in a 3 -all tie, for the



Head Coach Keith Ferraro Brings Stability and Success to Clarion Wrestling

Ferraro explained, "Looking back on the moment the program was in, the assessment was right. We needed stability. That was a time when the program needed someone they could count on, and I appreciated the opportunity."

In 2014 Clarion University's goal for their Division l wrestling program was to find a head coach who could bring stability to the team.

"We needed to get some stability in the program," Dave Katis, f o r m e r

Clarion University athletic director, told exploreClarion. com, "So, I went to the table with a high school resume (for) assistant coach Keith Ferraro."

Ferraro explained, "Looking back on the moment the program was in, the assessment was right. We needed stability. That was a Lenny, coached wrestling at Brookville, Johnsonburg, and Ridgway and was a physical education coach who naturally got his son into the sport.

"I don't know if there was even

"I don't know if there was even a conversation," Ferraro said. "I guess we just always knew that I would wrestle. I started when I was five and did it my whole life like everybody does... When you grow up in a house like that, I guess it is natural to do what they want to do."

After the passing of his father during his junior year of high school, Ferraro followed in his footsteps in the sport of wrestling, and later, teaching. He got a teaching degree in physical education at Lock Haven University and started coaching wrestling at Brookville just like his father did.

"I ended up marrying my high school sweetheart, and Lock Haven was a great fit for both of us as we wanted to go to school together," Ferraro added. "It was important for me to be around home." When Ferraro's name was being considered as the next head coach of Clarion University wrestling, he certainly had some merit but was still looked at as a "dark horse" candidate.

Ferraro—who has been with the program for over a decade—came with stability and success. He took a 1-16 team over in 2014-15 and has turned the program around, producing multiple NCAA D1 qualifiers such as four in 2017-18.

Most recently, Will Feldkamp took seventh at the national championships in 2022-23, the same year Ferraro won MAC coach of the year.

"I feel strongly that it is an

Your primary care provider may recommend a multiphasic blood test, which is one test that can check for early warning signs of conditions such as coronary heart disease, liver disease, kidney disease, diabetes and others. In addition, here are some general preventive health screening guidelines for adults:

Age 18-39

- Blood pressure annually



PFBC Sets 2024 Daily Creel Limits for Lake Erie Yellow Perch and Walleye

The Pennsylvania Fish and Boat Commission (PFBC) announced that the 2024 creel limit for Lake Erie Yellow Perch will remain at 30 per day and the creel limit for Walleye will remain at six per day.

The PFBC Lake Erie Research Unit evaluates the populations of Yellow Perch and Walleye in Lake Erie annually. If populations reach critically low levels, processes are in place to reduce harvest and rebuild the numbers of Yellow Perch and Walleye in the Lake. All jurisdictions on Lake Erie adhere to this system.

"The 2023 assessment showed that both Yellow Perch and Walleye populations in Pennsylvania waters of Lake Erie remain at levels that don't necessitate regulation changes," said Mark Haffley, PFBC Lake Erie Research Unit Leader. "Based on this, the 2024 creel limits are being maintained at the standard limits."

At its March 22, 2024, meeting, the Lake Erie Committee allotted to Pennsylvania a Yellow Perch total allowable catch (TAC) of 457,000 pounds, a 14% decrease from 2023, and 16%

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How is Parkinson's **Disease Treated?**

According to the Parkinson's Foundation, nearly 60,000 Americans are diagnosed each year with Parkinson's disease, a brain disorder that causes shakiness, stiffness and problems with balance and coordination. While there is no cure for Parkinson's, treatment is available to help reduce symptoms.

What causes Parkinson's?

"The main symptoms of Parkinson's occur when nerve cells in the basal ganglia, which is the part of the brain that controls movement, become impaired or die," said James Pacelli, MD, a neurologist with Penn Highlands Neurology in DuBois, Pennsylvania. "Unfortunately, we still do not know what causes the nerve cells to die."

Some cases appear to be hereditary. However, while genetics is thought to play a role, most cases of the disease do not seem to run in families. Rather, many researchers believe that Parkinson's occurs from a combination of genetics and environmental factors.

What are the symptoms?

Parkinson's develops slowly over years, and symptoms generally begin on one side of the body. As the disease progresses, symptoms often affect both sides. Symptoms can include:

- · Involuntary shakiness in the hands, arms, legs, jaw and face
- · Stiffness or tightness in the arms or legs
 - Slowness of movement
 - Poor balance and coordination
 - Quiet or slow speech
- Dementia (in advanced stages)

How is Parkinson's disease diagnosed?

"There is no blood or imaging test that can check for Parkinson's," said Dr. Pacelli. "Instead, your physician will ask about your medical history and the symptoms you are experiencing. They will also perform a physical and neurological exam, which may include checking your hearing, vision, reflexes, balance, strength, memory and concentration."

Because the symptoms of Parkinson's disease are similar to other neurological conditions, your physician may order blood tests or scans to rule out other causes. They may also prescribe Parkinson's disease medication to see if it helps reduce your symptoms. If it does, that would likely indicate your symptoms are caused by Parkinson's.

How is Parkinson's treated?

At this time, there is no cure for Parkinson's disease. There are treatments, however, that can be effective at controlling symptoms and slowing the progression of the disease. Medication is typically very effective, especially if started in the early stages of the disease. If medication stops controlling your symptoms as the disease progresses, your physician may recommend a surgical procedure called deep brain stimulation, in which electrodes are implanted in the brain and emit electrical impulses to stimulate cells and chemicals.

Lifestyle changes also can help manage symptoms. Your doctor may recommend ongoing aerobic exercise, outpatient physical therapy that concentrates on balance training and stretching, speech therapy and occupational therapy.

Other lifestyle changes that may help reduce symptoms include:

- A balanced diet that includes foods high in fiber (to help prevent constipation that is common in Parkinson's disease) and omega-3 fatty acids
- Exercise, which can increase your muscle strength, flexibility and balance
- · Massage therapy to reduce tension
- · Yoga and tai chi to increase stretching and flexibility

Your physician will work with you to develop a treatment plan that offers the greatest relief from your symptoms.

below the long-term average of 546,768 pounds. The 2024 level includes a Yellow Perch TAC for Pennsylvania's commercial trap net fishery of 100,000 pounds. Currently, Pennsylvania is a very small part of the total Yellow Perch harvest in Lake Erie. Yellow Perch harvest has averaged about 36,000 pounds over the last five years. In 2023, Pennsylvania harvested only 53,209 pounds (1.24%) of the 4.3 million pounds harvested lake wide.

The Yellow Perch and Walleye populations in Lake Erie are maintained strictly by natural reproduction. Good "hatches" and survival of young fish are necessary to provide fish for sport and commercial fisheries. The Lake Erie Walleve hatches have been record-setting over the last five years while the Yellow Perch hatches have been poor over the last five years. Both fisheries reflect these trends. Walleye fishing is excellent and Yellow







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Perch fishing remains below average. Sport fishing is very self-regulating. Anglers tend to fish for species based on the quality of the fishery. In 2023, 86% of Lake Erie boat anglers targeted Walleye, while only about 1% targeted Yellow Perch.

Based on a 2024 abundance estimate of 72.07 million Walleyes age two or older, the Walleye population has decreased approximately 20% from 2023. It typically takes three years for Walleye within Lake Erie Walleye to fully grow to the 15" minimum size limit.

The PFBC's objective is to keep harvest limits at conservative levels without being too restrictive to fisheries, but also be able to act promptly if Walleye or perch populations reach critically low levels. The PFBC adopted

a regulation in 2012 which established flexible creel limits for Walleyes and Yellow Perch based on the annual quotas established by the Lake Erie Committee, which consists of fisheries managers from Pennsylvania; Ohio; New York; Michigan; and Ontario, Canada.

Under the regulation, the PFBC sets daily creel limits for these species by April 15 each year.

"Adaptive fishing regulations are based on the most recent fishery assessment results and are better aligned with the current status of the Yellow Perch and Walleye stocks," Haffley added. "This regulatory flexibility gave fisheries managers the ability to change daily harvest limits prior to the onset of the summer boat fishing season on Lake Erie."

high cholesterol

- Skin: full-body check for moles or other spots that could be skin cancer
- Women: clinical breast exam annually, pelvic exam annually with an HPV test and Pap smear every three years if results are normal (until age 65)
- Men: testicular exam to check for cancer

Age 40-64

Follow the guidelines for ages 18 to 39, plus talk with your primary care provider about these additional screenings:

- Fasting blood sugar (hemoglobin A1C) test every three years after age 44 to check for diabetes
 - Colonoscopy starting at age

50 and repeated every 10 years if results are normal. If you have a family history of colon cancer, talk with your primary care provider about earlier or more frequent testing.

- Annual vision screening
- PAD (peripheral artery disease) screening based on risk factors
- Stroke/carotid artery screening based on risk factors
- Low-dose CT lung cancer screening annually starting at age 50 if you are a current or former smoker
- Women: mammogram every one to two years starting between age 40 and 50, depending on your provider's advice. If you have a family history of breast cancer, talk with your provider about earlier or more frequent testing.
- * Men: prostate cancer screenings, including digital rectal exam and PSA (prostate specific antigen) blood test starting at age 50 or age 40 for high-risk individuals

Follow the guidelines for ages 40 to 65, plus talk with your primary care provider about these additional screenings:

• Bone density or DEXA

PFBC Encourages Anglers and Boaters to Enjoy Plentiful Opportunities During Spring and Summer

The Pennsylvania Fish and Boat Commission (PFBC) began its quarterly business meeting by thanking anglers,

agency staff, and volunteers for a safe and successful start to the 2024 trout season and promoting the plentiful fishing and boating opportunities that remain throughout the spring and summer months.

"The spring and summer seasons are special times of year in Pennsylvania, where the Opening Day of trout season is only the tip of the iceberg," said William Gibney, PFBC President and District 7 Commissioner. "We're grateful to the volunteers who assisted us with stocking trout in hundreds of waters so far and will continue to help us stock over the next several weeks right up until Memorial Day."

Gibney also encouraged anglers to explore new waters and seek out different types of fishing experiences beyond trout.

"When you combine the opportunities that our stocked trout program provides with our phenomenal wild trout streams, panfish and catfish action that really picks up this time of year, and the opening of Walleye season on May 4, you'll never run out of options," added

Gibney. "If you fish from a boat, please remember to always wear your life jacket."

Anglers and boaters are reminded that the PFBC's cold weather life jacket requirement remains in effect from November 1 through April 30. During this time, anyone aboard a boat less than 16 feet in length, including all canoes, kayaks, and paddleboards, is required to wear a life jacket. In addition, the PFBC and many other organizations throughout the Commonwealth will partner with the National Safe Boating Council to celebrate National Safe Boating Week from May 18-24, 2024.

Boating Facility Grants Awarded

The PFBC awarded several grants through the Boating Facility Grant Program. Funds for this program are derived primarily from boat registration fees, state motorboat fuels tax, and restricted revenue accounts,


if applicable. In certain instances, federal aid is also used, if appropriate.

In 2023, the PFBC was awarded a \$1,000,000 grant from the National Fish and Wildlife Foundation's Delaware Watershed Conservation Fund to improve access in the watershed and connect anglers, boaters, and others to the region's water resources. As a result of this funding, the PFBC gave special proposed consideration to projects within the Delaware River Watershed, resulting in over \$1,114,000 being dedicated for six impactful projects, including:

Boating

The Board approved the publication of a notice of proposed rulemaking pertaining to boat rental businesses, also known as liveries. Under this

proposal, customer safety and education at liveries would be improved through several changes to 58 Pa. Code § Chapter 117 (Boat Rental Businesses). Changes would include new responsibilities for operators to provide accurate business information to the PFBC, deliver safety orientation to all renters, possess a Boating Safety Education Certificate if conducting the required safety orientation for motorboat rentals, and properly display boat registration or use permits on rental boats for the access areas on which the rental boats will be used. In addition, livery operators would be required to document the names of renters who have been provided with boating safety orientation. If adopted on final rulemaking at a future meeting, this amendment will go into effect on January 1, 2025.

Fisheries

Commissioners approved the publication of a notice of proposed rulemaking pertaining to changes in fishing regulations at Glade Run Lake located in Middlesex Township, Butler County. Under this proposal, the 52-acre impoundment would be removed from Miscellaneous Special Regulations (58 Pa. Code § 65.24) which require catch-and-release for all species except trout, and allow PFBC staff to consider this reservoir for management with Big Bass (58 Pa. Code § 65.9) and Panfish Enhancement (58 Pa. Code § 65.11) special regulations. Glade Run Lake was completely dewatered during spring 2011 to upgrade the dam and spillway structures per Pennsylvania Department of Environmental Protection dam safety standards. Following the completion of these repairs and modifications, refill occurred in winter 2017, and the PFBC stocked the lake from 2017 through 2023 with select fish species to establish a high-quality, warm-water and cool-water fishery. The black bass and panfish populations

The PA 529 GSP allows families to save at today's tuition rates to meet tomorrow's tuition costs—meaning saving enough to pay for a credit today will pay for that same credit years from now. PA 529 GSP account earnings are based on college tuition inflation rates. Families can choose the tuition level they wish to save at—from community colleges up to Ivy League universities.

Families with children born January 1, 2019, or later, already have a \$100 Keystone Scholars account to jumpstart their education savings. This automatic deposit is available to every baby born in Pennsylvania, and those adopted by Pennsylvania families. The program uses no taxpayer dollars. Families are encouraged to register their Keystone Scholars accounts online at pa529.com/keystone and open their own companion PA 529 account to continue saving for their child's future.

PFBC Announces Awards for **Outstanding Achievements in** Law Enforcement

The Pennsylvania Fish and Boat Commission (PFBC) is pleased to announce several awards presented to Waterways Conservation Officers (WCO) in recognition of outstanding achievements in law enforcement. Awards were presented during the PFBC Board of Commissioners quarterly business meeting on April 29, 2024, in Harrisburg.

The Northeast Conservation Enforcement Chiefs Association Officer of the Year Award was presented to WCO Matthew Visosky, whose district includes the Central Erie County district in the Northwest Region. In 2023, WCO Visosky's exemplary law enforcement efforts included 36 days of onboard boat patrols, 480 boardings, the issuing of 166 citations, and the investigation of 16 incidents. Additionally, WCO Visosky participated in 24 public educational events in his district. Visosky is a 2002 graduate of the PFBC's H.R. Stackhouse School of Fishery Conservation and Watercraft Safety.

The Gerald L. Greiner Environmental Protection Award was presented to Justin Boatwright, who was the WCO in the Clinton/W. Lycoming County district before recently being promoted to Sergeant in the Northcentral Region. This award is presented annually to the WCO who best exemplifies the ideals of 'Resource First' - the protection, conservation, and enhancement of the Commonwealth's aquatic resources. In 2023, Boatwright investigated seven environmental incidents within his region. Boatwright is a 2016 graduate of the PFBC's H.R. Stackhouse School of Fishery Conservation and Watercraft Safety.

The Top Gun Award was and Watercraft Safety.

The National Association of State Boating Law Administrators (NASBLA) Butch Potts Boating

presented to WCO Kyle Robinson, whose district includes Mifflin and northern Huntingdon counties in the Southcentral Region. This award is presented annually to a WCO who displays outstanding effort in the detection and apprehension of impaired boaters. In 2023, WCO Robinson's exemplary law enforcement efforts included 41 days of onboard boat patrols, the investigation of five boating accidents, 838 boardings, the issuing of 637 warnings, 117 citations, and seven arrests for Boating Under the Influence. Robinson is a 2020 graduate of the PFBC's H.R. Stackhouse School of Fishery Conservation





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Law Enforcement Officer of the Year Award (Pennsylvania) was presented to WCO Michael Blair, whose district includes southern Bucks County in the Southeast Region. In 2023 WCO Blair's exemplary law enforcement efforts included 31 days of onboard boat patrols, the investigation of three boating accidents, 320 boardings, the issuing of 180 citations, and two arrests for Boating Under the Influence. Blair is a 2016 graduate of the PFBC's H.R. Stackhouse School of Fishery Conservation

While patrolling the Allegheny River on March 5, 2024, WCO Opfer received a call from the Kittanning Borough Police Department to request Opfer's assistance with a dog attack incident which had occurred nearby. Upon arriving at the scene, WCO Opfer and two local police officers found a male victim bleeding severely from his arm, which required immediate medical attention. WCO Opfer acted quickly to apply first aid to the victim's arm, which stopped the bleeding until emergency medical personnel arrived to transport the victim to the hospital for immediate surgery. WCO Opfer's quick thinking and training is credited with saving the victim's life. Opfer is a 2022 graduate of the PFBC's H.R. Stackhouse School of Fishery Conservation and Watercraft Safety.

allow PFBC staff to consider this reservoir for management of all species with Commonwealth Inland Waters regulations (58 Pa. Code § 61.1). Chapman Dam Reservoir was completely dewatered during fall 2017 to upgrade the dam and spillway structures per Pennsylvania Department of Environmental Protection dam safety standards. Following the completion of these repairs and modifications, refill occurred in fall 2018, and the PFBC stocked the lake from 2019 through 2023 with select fish species to establish a high-quality, warm-water and cool-water fishery. Sportfish populations were evaluated from 2022 through 2023 to monitor progress towards development of a high-quality, warm-water and cool-water fishery. Sportfish abundance and population size structure have improved to levels where populations can now sustain harvest. If adopted on final rulemaking at a future meeting, these changes would go into effect on January 1, 2025.

The Board voted to approve the addition of 20 new waters to the PFBC's list of wild trout streams and the revision of the section limits of four waters currently listed. A list of waters proposed for wild trout stream

designation can be found in the Pennsylvania Bulletin. All of these additions will go into effect upon publication of a second notice in the Pennsylvania Bulletin.

Public Access and Real Estate

Commissioners voted authorize the lease of the Tidioute Borough Access, which provides public fishing and boating access to the Allegheny River in Tidioute Borough, Warren County. Under the proposed agreement, the PFBC will lease approximately four acres of property to Tidioute Borough for a period of 25 years. The Borough, which previously leased the property beginning in 1976, has continued to act as a holdover tenant since the expiration of the initial lease agreement. The Borough is interested in pursuing opportunities to enhance the access site through different grant programs and potential partnership opportunities, which will require a new lease agreement. Under the agreement, the Borough will continue to be responsible for the routine maintenance, operation, repair, and supervision of the access site, which will remain open for public fishing and boating free of charge.

approximately totaling acres, and a permanent flowage easement totaling approximately .5 acres are needed as part of a pending dam rehabilitation project at Harris Pond. The flowage easements are expected to have minimal value, and the PFBC will pay the estimated fair market value of the rights or accept donations if offered. Staff will pursue the acquisitions in an amicable manner and only utilize the Commonwealth's power of eminent domain as a last resort. Additionally, staff will adhere to the PFBC's standard practices for acquiring property including meeting due diligence and funding requirements. **Special Announcements**
