

Taylor is also conductor of the Valley Symphony Orchestra Chorale in McAllen, Texas, is artistic director of Alium Spiritum, a vocal quartet based in Brownsville, and director of traditional music at First Methodist Church in Harlingen.

Sean is the son of David Taylor of Brookville and the late Linda Taylor, who was a noted educator in Brookville for many years. Sean's wife, Diane, is also on the UTRGV Music faculty and they are the parents of a 4-year-old daughter, Cecilia, not surprisingly named for the patron saint of music.

Both Sean and Diane will perform in Brookville with Alium Spiritum in a concert at the historic Presbyterian Church on July 27.

\$19.1 Million in Broadband **Expansion Funding to Bridge Digital Divide Across Senate** District 25

Sen. Cris Dush (R-25) confirmed the approval of more than \$19.1 million in state funding across Centre, Elk and McKean counties to increase access to reliable, high-speed internet through Pennsylvania Broadband

Development Authority (PBDA).

"Expanding access broadband infrastructure. especially for the citizens I serve in rural portions of Senate District 25, is proving to be every bit as critical as our utilities and transportation infrastructure," said Dush. "Without question, closing the digital divide is an automatic game changer for families, schools, hospitals, governments, local main street small businesses and homegrown industries, such as agriculture, forestry and fossil fuel production. Securing this highly competitive funding is an absolute must for keeping affordable and reliable digital broadband expansion projects moving forward and making our entire region more appealing for future development and familysustaining job creation."

Specific grant recipients and

funding amounts are as follows:

- · Windstream Pennsylvania LLC received nearly \$2 million for broadband projects in Centre
- · Verizon Pennsylvania LLC received \$17.1 million for broadband projects in Elk and McKean counties.

Made possible by the federally funded Broadband Infrastructure Program, this inaugural round of grants represents a significant milestone in the PBDA's broader initiative to close the commonwealth's digital divide.

All funds must be utilized by Dec. 31, 2026. Grantees will be held accountable for the prudent expenditure of awarded funds. The PBDA has the ability to claw back any unused or misused

Are you Paying Debts Unnecessarily that have been Discharged in Bankruptcy, the Creditor Cannot Prove, or Are Beyond the **Time Limit for Collection?**

Bankruptcy often allows debtors discharge unsecured However, debts. certain creditors, like banks and credit card companies, may sell these discharged debts. Collection companies often buy the accounts for next to nothing. When you are speaking of billions of dollars,

this represents an opportunity for the purchasers of the discharged debts to potentially make huge profits. For example, if the debt is \$1,000 and they purchase it for less than a dollar but collect the whole \$1,000 they are making more than a thousand times the

profit on that dollar investment. This gives the new owners of the debt incentive to attempt collection.

One way this occurs is when they fail to tell the credit bureau that the debt is discharged and the debtor needs to pay it off to get a new mortgage or a loan.

Debt collectors also

sometimes change the account number when they purchase the debt so it makes it harder to track the debt back to the original discharged debt.

Creditors such as credit card companies who illegally pursue the recovery of discharged debts can be held liable for the repayment of any payments they collected illegally, fines and attorney's fees.

A credit report and score are important not just for loans, but they affect your charges for insurance and may affect your ability to rent. It is important for you to protect your credit bureau reports.

Collection companies creditors have even attempted to collect discharged debts from individuals who had the debts discharged in a chapter 7 bankruptcy when they later got behind again and filed a chapter 13 bankruptcy. The creditor files a notice of a claim for the prior discharged debt in the subsequent chapter 13 bankruptcy. A chapter 7 bankruptcy is a bankruptcy where they take a view of what your situation is on the day you file the bankruptcy and determine what, if anything, you must pay on your unsecured debts if your assets exceed your bankruptcy exemptions. A chapter bankruptcy is a wage earner plan where you pay a portion of your debt over time, based upon your income. The payment plan could be over years.

Of course, if a bankruptcy is thrown out because the debtor has not done what he was supposed to do, bankruptcy was withdrawn by the debtor, or the debtor was later found to have additional assets not reported by the person filing the bankruptcy, the debt may become collectible legally, as there would be no discharge or the additional assets would become available to the creditors. The debtor may also feel morally obligated to pay the debt when he is able, but should obtain approval from the bankruptcy court before

There is a huge market in selling debts, whether discharged or not discharged in bankruptcy. In order for the debt collection company to collect non-discharged they have to show they own the debt, which may require proving the assignment of the debt from the original creditor, but also present admissible evidence to document the claim. This becomes difficult if they are using records created by someone else that they cannot authenticate. If you were being sued by a debt collector or credit card company, you should seek the advice from an attorney that handles these types of matters, as the creditor may not have a valid claim. Defenses may involve the statute of limitations or inability to prove their claim.



"Recreation Conservation" public parkland but is mostly used for parking.

Arthur McKinley stated "Trees will help to beautify the area and make our waterfront more inviting for recreation (walking, biking, jogging, dog walking, picnicking, fishing, etc.). We hope that the Borough will support planting additional trees on the riverbanks, along our town's Historic Main Street and on the roads leading into Brookville.

For a number of years, Arthur

McKinley has been on a mission to bring Brookville's three rivers back into focus. In 2019 he proposed a "Brookville Riverwalk" and developed extensive plans, petitions and over \$10,000 in funding for the project which was not pursued by the Borough. Later, while serving as a board member with the Chamber of Commerce he organized 2 "Picnic Areas" on private riverfront land and started the river tree plantings with High School volunteers.

More recently he has proposed a "Pathways Project" to designate safe in-town recreational paths for walking, running, biking, and

The "Pathways dog walking. Project" with directional signage was designed to be created at low cost and without consultants, grants, outside contractors. would connect the popular Redbank Valley Trail system with Brookville's already existing public sidewalks, municipal parks, bridges, riverbanks and historic Main Street. It would also help to connect the town's neighborhoods, northside, southside, eastside, etc. It could instantly create a new central attraction for Brookville, generate foot traffic, encourage new commerce and lead to new pride and beautification efforts.

Plane Mate and Mobile Lounge Prototype Vehicles have arrived onsite at Brookville Equipment Corporation

Brookville Equipment Corporation (BROOKVILLE) was given Notice to Proceed (NTP) on a \$16.4 million contract by Metropolitan Washington Airports Authority (MWAA) on November 2, 2023, for the rehabilitation and upgrade of the

BROOKVILLE's rehabilitation will include one prototype of each vehicle type. When the work is complete, MWAA will have the option of revamping the rest of the fleet for an estimated \$143 million, not to exceed \$160 million, over six years. "We are so excited to have the opportunity to rehabilitate these vehicles and bring them back to life, after being a critical part of the operations at Dulles International. We plan to reimagine the functionality of these vehicles, with anticipation will be in operation for decades into the future," said Joel McNeil, Executive Vice President of Brookville



Equipment Corporation.

The vehicles are used to transport passengers from the main terminal area to Concourse D, which is not connected to the AeroTrain. In the 1960s, Washington Dulles came up with the concept of the mobile lounge. in the peak of the jet age, by saving passengers time by eliminating

walking long distances from the ticketing gate to the jet ramp. Currently, the vehicles are used to disembark passengers from most international flights arriving at Dulles International.

The fleet in its entirety consists of 19 mobile lounges and 30 plane mates. The mobile lounges have been an essential part of Dulles International since opening in 1962 and are considered a historic element. The plane mates were an evolution of the concept and produced in Pennsylvania in the 1970's and 80's. The vehicles remain a critical part of the airport's passenger transfer operations. "Mobile lounges and plane mates are important parts of Dulles International Airport's They operations. provide flexibility and increased capacity to move passengers around the airport while offering unique views during the ride. Built in the 60s, it's time for a major overhaul of these iconic vehicles. We look forward to following the two prototypes through refurbishment," said Richard Vice President Golinowski, and Airport Manager, Dulles International Airport. As MWAA continues to expand the facilities at Dulles Airport, including the AeroTrain, the fleet remains a highly effective solution for moving passengers between terminals and aircrafts until future facilities are completed. The vehicles are considered





A Decision Not Made Is Still a Decision

Whether through inertia trepidation, investors who put off important investment decisions might consider the admonition offered

motivational speaker Brian Tracy, "Almost any decision is better than no decision at all."

This investment inaction is played out in many ways, often silently, invisibly, and with potential consequences to an individual's future financial security.

Let's review some of the forms this takes.

Your 401(k) Plan

One of the worst decisions may be the failure to enroll. Not only do non-participants miss out on one way to save for their retirement, but they also forfeit any potential employer-matching contributions. Not participating can be a costly decision. But under the SECURE 2.0 Act, employers will be required to automatically enroll employees in retirement plans starting in 2025.1

The other way individuals let indecision get the best of them is by not selecting the investments for the contributions they make to the 401(k) plan. When a participant fails to make an investment selection, the plan may have provisions for automatically investing that money. And that investment selection may not be consistent with the individual's time horizon, risk tolerance, and goals.

In most circumstances, you must begin taking required minimum distributions from your 401(k) or other defined contribution plan in the year you turn 73. Withdrawals from your 401(k) or other defined contribution plans are taxed as ordinary income, and if taken before age 59?, may be subject to a 10 percent federal income tax penaltv.

allow us to cull inappropriate investments - or even determine if the portfolio reflects our current investment objectives we are making a default decision to own investments that may be inappropriate.



Brookville Presbyterian Church Building Orientation

The Susquehanna and Waterford Turnpike was a major overland route completed in 1822 that ran through the dense wilderness from the west bank of the Susquehanna River in Clearfield County westward and northwestward to Waterford, in Erie County. In 1830, when Brookville was laid out, the "S & W Pike" became the main thoroughfare in the new town. It was a popular route for stagecoaches and Conestoga wagons moving across Pennsylvania. The western boundary of the new borough was Gordon Alley, that ran north and south. It was named for attorney Isaac Grantham Gordon (1819-1893), who was elected to the Pennsylvania Supreme Court in 1873 and in 1887 became Chief Justice. His house still stands at 12 Walnut Street and is presently the home of Tuyler and

its side elevation along Main Street. That building stood until early in the 20th century when it was replaced by the present 1905 church building which

Gordon Alley was vacated by the Borough, but the northwest section, including the side lawn of the Presbyterian Church, is still an unopened Borough alley.

The PIAA recently entered into an agreement with the National Federation of State High School (NFHS) Association, the body that writes the rules of competition for most high school sports and activities in the United States. NFHS can provide a streaming service, and often, schools will choose to exercise that capability in high-profile situations. What this does is eliminate the ability for local media outlets covering the away teams to do what they do best and requires anyone who wishes to stream the game to pay a subscription fee to access it.

Brown, Struzzi and Smith issued this statement after sending the letter, signed by 45 lawmakers on both sides of the aisle, to the PIAA:

"The PIAA's current broadcasting policy is unfair on many levels, and most importantly, to the families of the players on the fields and courts of Pennsylvania. Our athletes work for years to hone their skills in their respective sports, and a lucky few get the chance to show those skills in PIAA playoff matchups. However, those matchups can be several hours away from their local communities.

"Pennsylvania is blessed with many local media outlets who faithfully cover high school sports throughout the season. More often than not, those outlets are happy to travel whatever distance is required to cover their teams for their communities. But time and time again, they're blocked the exclusivity contract between the PIAA and NFHS. These athletes finally reach their moment on the big stage, and all too often their friends and family are blocked from watching them by an NFHS paywall.

"During a 2022 hearing

the Department of Education assured lawmakers that the issue of exclusivity between PIAA and the NFHS Network would be resolved. On January 26th, 2023, legislation was introduced to allow visiting teams in high school athletic competitions, and their local broadcasters, the same rights to broadcast, stream, and provide play-by-play as the home team. As of today, House Bill 30, the Fair Play in Broadcasting Act, has strong bipartisan support and could move from the House Education Committee at any time.

"It has become clear that fair broadcasting is not a priority being addressed in the PIAA. We, and the 42 other lawmakers who signed our letter, believe this issue needs to be addressed as soon as possible for the sake of Pennsylvania's players, families and fans."


with the altos. On the wall of the choir loft, just behind the tenors, is a small brass plaque, inscribed "In Honor of Sara (misspelled!) Maude Henry, Director of Music, 1945-1989," a tribute to our long-time choir director.

In 1939, the "beloved" high school English and dramatics teacher Sarah Maude Carnahan, valedictorian and graduate of Grove City College and the University of Michigan, married H. Clair Henry, the supervising principal of the Brockway-Snyder Joint School District. In 1945, when he was elected assistant superintendent of county schools, the family which now included sons David and Thomas, moved to Brookville. In 1958, he was named superintendent at a salary of \$10,000 (\$107,379.24 today).

As a single woman in 1933, Sarah Maude Carnahan accompanied the choir of the Brockway Presbyterian Church choir when they performed Handel's Messiah. Married, she continued as an accompanist, volunteered with the Annual Red Cross Drive and a polio campaign, and was a member of the Brockway Women's Club.

In Brookville in 1948, she was the director, when a choir of "more than 50 voices" from the Methodist and Presbyterian churches performed the Handel oratorio. Ten years later, she once again directed the Messiah, this time with a choir of 35 in Brookville, continuing with a performance in Brookville in 1961, and performances in 1964 and 1965 with a joint choir in Brockway.

She knew a great many local soloists and convinced them to sing the see PEOPLE on page 46

Cook Forest - Vacation Close to Home

Cook Forest State Park is 15 miles from Brookville and yet many never consider it as their vacation spot.

Did you know that Cook Forest is now a National Natural Landmark and was rated one of America's top 50 state parks by National Geographic Traveler magazine? And it was chosen by DCNR (Department of Conservation and Natural Resources) and its Bureau of Parks as one of "25 Must-see Pennsylvania State Parks." This 8,500 acre park is located right in our "back yard." It features 27 trails totaling about 29 miles for hiking with a terrain of rolling hills and cool valley streams.

The park is nestled close to the Clarion River and with its majestic Forest Cathedral, it is an absolutely beautiful landscape. The park is home to some of the oldest trees this side of the Rockies and they are quite impressive to see. There are many trails to walk which take you to the Forest Cathedral. The most popular trail is the Longefellow Trail.

Also along the Longfellow Trail you will find the Memorial Fountain. It is located behind the Log Cabin Enviormental Learning Center. This fountain was build in 1950 in honor of the original members of the Cook Forest Association, who were important roles in creating the park. Well deserving honor.

Cook Forest also has Henry Run Sawmill Dam Falls. Many people don't even know about this gorgeous water fall because it can't be found on the park map. It is located along the Baker Trail, not far from the Clarion River. It can be reached from the Cook Forest Fire Tower or from Gravel Lick Road, the waterfall is a small 10-15 feet tall, but it is a something that you will be glad

The Cook Forest Fire Tower is an impressive 87.5 feet above the hilltop. When you climb the 108 steps to the top you will have a fantastic view. Be sure to ask the Park office when the tower is open for you to climb to the observation area. It is only open on occasion. However, you can still get a great view if you climb to just below that area.

Close by the fire tower is Seneca Point which also provides a spectacular view of the Clarion River Valley without having to climb 108 steps. Seneca Point also provides for aview of the rocky ground where native tribes once ground grains and seeds. Look closely to see if you can find indentions made by their stone tools.

The Clarion River is an awesome place for canoeing, tubing, kayaking and fishing. It provides a relaxing, gorgeous scenic ride as it meanders through

You may not have realized that Cook Forest also has a Swinging Bridge. It is slightly off the beaten path, located not far from the Park Office (about 1/4 mile). It can be reached from a variety of trails and it crosses Toms Run.

The North Country National Scenic Trail passes through Cook Forest. It runs with the Baker Trail, a 140-mile trail that runs from Freeport, PA through the Allegheny National Forest. 12 miles of the trail runs through Cook Forest State Park. The North Country Trail is a 4,600 mile trail that goes from Vermont to North Dakota. How great is it that a section of this trail goes right through Cook Forest?

Cook Forest State Park's Ridge Campground offers 217 campsites with picnic table and fire ring. Some sites are rustic,

permitted in designated areas for an additional fee. Pets are prohibited at sites in the back section of the park.

The campground includes modern restrooms with showers during the camping season which is the second Friday in April through the third Friday in December. Shower houses #3 and #4 may be closed in the case of freezing temperatures.

River Camping is also available downstream from Gravel Lick Bridge at Thompson Eddy. This area is for those canoeing or kayaking and use is limited to one night. It is for tents only, with a maximum group size of ten.

If you don't like tent camping and you don't have a camper, Cook Forest also offers some rustic cabins for rent. The River Cabins are on a hillside looking over the Clarion River. The Indian Cabins are along Toms Run behind the Park Office. The cabins sleep four, six, eight or ten people. Up to two dogs are permitted only in designated cabins for a fee.

Each cabin has beds with mattresses, heat from a gas heater, refrigerator, stove, table and chairs. Frost-free faucets are outside and a shower house is close by. Firewood is not provided.

Reservations for campsite and

Cook Forest also offers a variety of educational programs March through December. They include hands-on activities, guided walks and evening events which help participants to gain an understanding and appreciation of the natural resources the area provides.

The Sawmill Center for the Arts is a local, non-profite craft organization located in the historic sawmill. It offers many crafts, a gift shop and classes/ demonstrations on crafts.

Also located at The Sawmill Center is the Verna Leith Sawmill Theater which offers plays, musicals and other entertainment throughout the summer months.

In June, The Sawmill Center for the Arts hosts a French and Indian War Encampment. This is a great series of living history events depicting life during the French and Indian war. It includes woodland natives, cannon and muskeet fireing demonstrations, sutler camp, council and trading events, nationally renowned living historians, French and Indian War era artisans, live tactical engagements children's programs. Don't miss it! The encampment will be held June 9-10, 2024. Go to events. dcnr.pa.gov for a complete schedule.

MaBeth's Cabins has beautiful cabins situated on the wild and scenic Clarion River. It also has a camp store which has been a recognizable landmark in Cook Forest for many years. It is the place to meet and coordinate the days activities. It is open daily and the friendly staff is there to give you directions, help you get your fire started, gear you up with supplies for the day or just offer you a comfortable bench to relax.





How is Parkinson's **Disease Treated?**

According to the Parkinson's Foundation. nearly 60,000 diagnosed Americans are each year with Parkinson's disease, a brain disorder that causes shakiness, stiffness and problems with balance and coordination. While there is no cure for Parkinson's, treatment is available to help reduce symptoms.

What causes Parkinson's?

"The main symptoms of Parkinson's occur when nerve cells in the basal ganglia, which is the part of the brain that controls movement, become impaired or die," said James Pacelli, MD, a neurologist with Penn Highlands Neurology in DuBois, Pennsylvania. "Unfortunately, we still do not know what causes the nerve cells to die."



Some cases appear to be hereditary. However, while genetics is thought to play a role, most cases of the disease do not seem to run in families. Rather, many researchers believe that Parkinson's occurs from a combination of genetics and environmental factors.

What are the symptoms?

Parkinson's develops slowly over years, and symptoms generally begin on one side of the body. As the disease progresses, symptoms often affect both sides. Symptoms can include:

- · Involuntary shakiness in the hands, arms, legs, jaw and face
- · Stiffness or tightness in the arms or legs
 - Slowness of movement
 - Poor balance and coordination



- Quiet or slow speech
- Dementia (in advanced stages)

How is Parkinson's disease diagnosed?

"There is no blood or imaging test that can check for Parkinson's," said Dr. Pacelli. "Instead, your physician will ask about your medical history and the symptoms you are experiencing. They will also perform a physical and neurological exam, which may include checking your hearing, vision, reflexes, balance, strength, memory and concentration."

Because the symptoms of Parkinson's disease are similar to other neurological conditions, your physician may order blood tests or scans to rule out other causes. They may also prescribe Parkinson's disease medication to see if it helps reduce your symptoms. If it does, that would likely indicate your symptoms are caused by Parkinson's.

How is Parkinson's treated?

At this time, there is no cure for Parkinson's disease. There are treatments, however, that can be effective at controlling symptoms and slowing the progression of the disease. Medication is typically very effective, especially if started in the early stages of the disease. If medication stops controlling your symptoms as the disease progresses, your physician may see PARKINSON'S on page 31



Caffeine is commonly used to help you feel more awake and alert, but the long-term health effects of excessive caffeine consumption should be taken very seriously.

Caffeine accelerates the time it takes for the body to receive signals from the brain. Caffeine is referred to as a stimulant drug. It is found in common items like coffees, teas, chocolate, sodas, and energy drinks.

The Mayo Clinic advises that you consume no more than 400mg of caffeine per day. This equals around 4 cups of coffee a day. If more than 400mg is consumed, it could lead to serious health risks.

The effects of caffeine differ

depending on the source of caffeine, individual differences in health, and quantity of intake.

The Alcohol and Drug Foundation suggests caffeine's short-term effects last about 30 minutes to 6 hours, which include increased faster heart rate, rise in temperature, headaches, dehydration, and stomach pains among other more individual responses.

Small doses of caffeine do not present a life-threatening risk, but not moderating your caffeine intake could lead to severe longterm effects that may plague older children as they continue to feed a dependency that is established earlier in the life cycle.

The CDC classifies longterm effects of caffeine as high blood pressure, cardiovascular diseases, reproduction

developmental abnormalities, and mental disorders.

While new coffees, sodas, and energy drinks sweep over the nation with popularity. 



Celebration."

Picnics, of course, can take place at any time of the year, and when reviewing our local newspapers, it seems people picnicked as soon as the weather was pleasant!

Picnics often were more than just eating out in the open. In Richardsville on the Fourth, people gathered on the lawn of the Richardsville Baptist Church to hear speeches before gathering for dinner. A large cake, three feet long and two feet wide, had been prepared by A. S. Rhines.

In 1870, the Roman Catholics held a picnic to raise funds to repair damages to the church building, including the organ and several paintings. The picnic was well-attended as was a program at Nicholson Hall that evening, and double the amount needed was raised for the repairs.

In 1872, the Fourth of July picnic in Brookville was

sponsored by the Brookville Fire Department and was meant to be a fund-raiser. The picnic was rained out. Fortunately, the ball held that evening in Nicholson Hall was a success, and funds were raised!

Another picnic, sponsored by the Ladies Park Auxiliary in August of 1916, succeeded in raising \$200 (\$5,730.86 today) for the park fund.

Like the Auxiliary, picnics were often hosted by organizations that drew people

together to enact business of one sort or another. A Grange picnic in 1879 included speeches about the purposes of the organization. The Daughters of the American Revolution (DAR), Oddfellows, American Legion, Summerville Telephone Company, Red Bank Telephone Company, and the Jefferson County Medical Society were other organizations that held large picnics.

Businesses often entertained their employees with a picnic. L. A. Leathers owned a thriving automobile business in Brookville



and hosted a picnic for his employees and their families in 1916. He continued these picnics throughout the 1920s and invited local photographer Frederick Knapp to take pictures (archived today at the Jefferson County History Center.) Brookville Park, near White-Brook, was the setting for baseball games between the mechanics and the office staff, races, volleyball, and a basket dinner. In 1925, after picnicking, the crowd attended a performance of "A Woman Pays" by the Bowdish Stock Company.

Music was sometimes part of a large picnic. The S J Marlin Hook and Ladder Cornet Band entertained at an 1878 picnic, and the Brookville Brass Band played at many local picnics. The Emerickville Brass Band was part of the Harriger reunion in 1906, a picnic in Harriger Grove where "regular meals" could be purchased for 25 cents.

Besides Brookville Park and the old fairgrounds, many picnics were held in the various groves located throughout the county; groves, like Harriger's, Truman's Grove in Sigel, and the grove that now houses the History Center

Harriger's Grove, Ramsaytown, has been a popular picnic site since 1895 when the Jeffersonian Democrat described a Children's Day rally and picnic lunch. Harriger family reunions were held there as well as picnics sponsored by various church

Archives Building.

Walter Dick Park became a popular picnic site when it was established in 1951. Located at the North Fork dam, parking, swimming, and playground equipment continue to make it a favorite picnic location. Named for civic-minded Dr. Walter Dick who died in 1951, the park is still a favorite spot for picnicking.

One thinks of a picnic


happening on warm sunny days, but on several occasions, picnics were held beneath the moon. Someone hosted a "moonlight picnic" in 1878, and there were several others around the turn of the century. Hosted by young people, they were well-attended.

The Jeffersonian Democrat editor claimed in 1915, "One of the principal industries now is picnics." Looking forward to my church's picnic, I can echo that phrase. We are fortunate to have such wonderful expanses of forest in Jefferson County, great places to explore and enjoy a picnic lunch. We hope you enjoy several picnics this summer!

Through this experience, students interact with local manufacturers and learn their requirements including performance metrics for production, quality, and on-time delivery. Students are getting the opportunity to be mentored, gain expert insight, and develop manufacturing skills. The working relationships established and developed will position the students for future employment opportunities.

All of these regional SRME programs, and the Summit, are supported in part by The Pennsylvania Department of Community and Economic Development (DCED) through the Manufacturing Training-to-Career grant program.

PFBC Sets 2024 Daily Creel Limits for Lake Erie Yellow Perch and Walleye

The Pennsylvania Fish and Boat Commission (PFBC) announced that the 2024 creel limit for Lake Erie Yellow Perch will remain at 30 per day and the creel limit for Walleye will remain at six per day.

The PFBC Lake Erie Research Unit evaluates the populations of Yellow Perch and Walleye in Lake Erie annually. If populations reach critically low levels, processes are in place to reduce harvest and rebuild the numbers of Yellow Perch and Walleye in the Lake. All jurisdictions on Lake Erie adhere to this system.

"The 2023 assessment showed that both Yellow Perch and Walleye populations in Pennsylvania waters of Lake Erie remain at levels that don't necessitate regulation changes," said Mark Haffley, PFBC Lake Erie Research Unit Leader. "Based on this, the 2024 creel limits are being maintained at the standard limits."

At its March 22, 2024, meeting, the Lake Erie Committee allotted to Pennsylvania a Yellow Perch total allowable catch (TAC) of 457,000 pounds, a 14% decrease from 2023, and 16% below the long-term average of 546,768 pounds. The 2024 level includes a Yellow Perch TAC for Pennsylvania's commercial trap net fishery of 100,000 pounds. Currently, Pennsylvania is a very small part of the total Yellow Perch harvest in Lake Erie. Yellow Perch harvest has averaged about 36,000 pounds over the last five years. In 2023, Pennsylvania harvested only 53,209 pounds (1.24%) of the 4.3 million pounds harvested lake wide.

The Yellow Perch and Walleye populations in Lake Erie are maintained strictly by natural reproduction. Good "hatches" and survival of young fish are necessary to provide fish for sport and commercial fisheries. The Lake Erie Walleye hatches have been record-setting over the last five years while the Yellow Perch hatches have been poor over the last five years. Both fisheries reflect these trends. Walleye fishing is excellent and Yellow Perch fishing remains below average. Sport fishing is very selfregulating. Anglers tend to fish for species based on the quality of the fishery. In 2023, 86% of Lake Erie boat anglers targeted Walleye, while only about 1% targeted Yellow Perch.

Based on a 2024 abundance estimate of 72.07 million Walleyes age two or older, the Walleye population has decreased approximately 20% from 2023. It typically takes three years for Walleye within Lake Erie Walleye to fully grow to the 15" minimum size limit.

The PFBC's objective is to keep harvest limits at conservative levels without being too restrictive to fisheries, but also be able to act promptly if Walleye or perch populations reach critically low levels. The PFBC adopted a regulation in 2012 which established flexible creel limits for

Active in the Presbyterian Church of Brookville, she directed the choir between 1945 and 1989, served as an elder and a trustee, was the paid director of Christian education for several years, and chaired Clarion Presbyterial (1975-1976).

She was a capable leader and in 1963 was named Pennsylvania's Mother of the Year. From 1966 to 1968, she served as the state president of the Pennsylvania Federation of Women's Clubs. In 1974, the Chamber of Commerce awarded her the Walter Dick Memorial Award "for her continuing devotion to the community." She was president of Brookville's Business and Professional Women's Club (BPW) during 1974-1975.

When I arrived in Brookville in September 1971, the phone rang and Sarah Maude Henry told me, did not ask, but told me to attend choir practice on Friday evening at 7 o'clock. An odd time for a rehearsal I thought, but learned later it was to accommodate baritone David Borden, whose work kept him out of town during the week. I learned later that she'd used the same technique on tenor Bob Hetrick, "We moved to Brookville from Quakertown on a weekend, and I think it was a Monday or Tuesday night when I got a call from Mrs. Henry. She said, 'Bob, choir practice is Friday night, and you will be there....it was not a question, it was a directive!"

Two years later, in 1973, I helped organize a 200-voice choir concert, directed by Gloria Valentine from St. Marys. The singers came from 29 area churches and opened the Western Pennsylvania Laurel Festival with a concert on Sunday evening at Brookville Area High School. The group was accompanied by the Reverend Martin Peterhaensel, guitar; Rick Wells, percussion; Bruce Turnbull, Alan Dobson, Robert Estep, trumpets; and Ken

Johnson, bass. The performance was recorded. What a joy it was to sing compositions by Bach, some favorite spirituals, and parts of Handel's great *Messiah*.

In 1975, the Presbyterian Church revived a junior choir. James English recalled that he'd shouted out "Holy Hoboes" when we searched for a name for the group. He also recalled crying "Please, no more songs," when Sarah Maude was directing some singing at a tureen supper!

Sarah Maude Henry was wellacquainted with church music. Under her direction, we sang the classics of Bach, Beethoven, and Mozart. I remember them well.

I also remember that she often directed with a piece of music

"Some health screenings are recommended based on your age and gender," said Dr. Dobariya. "Other screenings depend on risk factors, such as family health history, lifestyle factors such as smoking and diet, and other health conditions you may have."

If you have elevated risks, you may need to start some screenings earlier than recommended or have them done more frequently. Scheduling an annual checkup with your primary care provider is a great way to ensure that you get the screenings you need when you need them.

Your primary care provider may

recommend a multiphasic blood test, which is one test that can check for early warning signs of conditions such as coronary heart disease, liver disease, kidney disease, diabetes and others. In addition, here are some general preventive health screening guidelines for adults:

Age 18-39

- Blood pressure annually
- Cholesterol: baseline test in your 20s, more frequently if you have high cholesterol
- Skin: full-body check for moles or other spots that could be skin cancer
- Women: clinical breast exam annually, pelvic exam annually with an HPV test and Pap smear every three years if results are

Walleyes and Yellow Perch based on the annual quotas established by the Lake Erie Committee, which consists of fisheries managers from Pennsylvania; Ohio; New York; Michigan; and Ontario, Canada.

Under the regulation, the PFBC sets daily creel limits for these species by April 15 each year.

"Adaptive fishing regulations are based on the most recent fishery assessment results and are better aligned with the current status of the Yellow Perch and Walleye stocks," Haffley added. "This regulatory flexibility gave fisheries managers the ability to change daily harvest limits prior to the onset of the summer boat fishing season on Lake Erie."
