From the Earley Family Porch to Their Fifth Store: Blue Collar Workwear Expands, Acquires Iconic Jack's Boot Shop



It all started on the side porch of the Earley family home in 1989. What was originally just a side project to sell outdoor apparel has now developed into a full-fledged business that now has its fifth home in Brookville. The company, Blue Collar Workwear, is now the new owner of Jack's Boot Shop in Brookville.

Brothers Brad and Dan Earley are at the helm of the company as their father's start-up business expands to its fifth location.

"Blue Collar Workwear was started by my father (Mike) out of our side porch about 30 years ago," Brad Earley told exploreJeffersonPA. com. "Back then, it was called Earley's Outerwear. Now, we have stores in Olean, Rochester, Jamestown, Ellicottville, and now this store in Brookville."

We are all judgmental. Yes, even you. I certainly am, many times I think it's human nature and yet while it is in our nature to be judgmental, I don't think it's ever useful to us. Do you look down on others, as if you are so much better? Do you realize this creates division between people? Think about it for a second, we see someone, and based on their looks or actions, we pass judgement on them. Normally not good judgment, either. Usually without even knowing the person. That's it, that's usually the extent of our interaction with that person. We don't make an effort to get to know the person, or understand them, or to see whether our judgment was right or not.

Why not this month try not to pass judgement and instead build a bridge between yourself and others. If you find yourself being judgmental, stop yourself. This will take all of us a great effort to do. The first step is to think about your thoughts for a few days, try to notice when you're being judgmental. This can be difficult at first, but once you keep reminding yourself to do it, it will get easier each day. Once we are more aware can we stop ourselves from being judgmental? Take this to heart. So many of us judge without having a clue what that person is going through. We look on the outside, maybe their clothes, house, cars, jewelry, I could go on and on. This month stop and take the time and think of once simple scripture. Do not judge for you shall be judge, pretty simple right?

Presbyterian Church Celebrates 200 Years

As The Presbyterian Church of Brookville celebrates their 200th Anniversary, we look back on the buildings as part of our history. The Bethel congregation, the predecessor of the current church, was first noted in 1824. It was the only church in the frontier community for many years. Members worshipped in a log schoolhouse, in a log church in Union Township, and then in an upper room of the old stone jail that was built in Brookville in 1831.

When the Civil War ended in

1865, the congregation found themselves financially able to build a new church. The second church, of Gothic style, cost \$11,518 and served the congregation from January 1870 until March 1904.

In 1841, the Presbyterians built a church building at the western

edge of the borough at a cost of \$1,100.

Clergy housing, the current manse behind the church, was built in 1884 at a cost of \$7,927.

The current church, completely modern in its design at the time, is built of brownstone in the popular Richardsonian Romanesque





style. It cost \$50,000 and was dedicated in December 1905. The sanctuary was renovated and a new education building, still in existence, was dedicated in September 1915.

location in Pennsylvania. Earley said the store's location and its culture influenced by the previous owner Steve Logue were the major reasons for Blue Collar Workwear's expansion to the Brookville area.

"When we came down here and saw the location and also the culture that Steve had developed we thought it was identical to the story from our business," Earley explained. "Steve (Logue) was looking for someone to take over the store that had that same type of story. We saw it as a perfect fit."

Jack's Boot Shop was founded by Steve's father, Jack Logue, of Sligo, in 1963; the business was originally a hardware store.

While the Earley family is taking over the business, they still want to honor the history of the store and offer the same products as Jack's Boot Shop.

"We don't want people to lose the feel of Jack's Boot Shop because we bring the same thing," Earley said.

He explained that the business is just being rebranded as Blue

Collar Workwear. The same products that Jack's Boot Shop sold will continue to be sold at Blue Collar Workwear.

While the Earleys will keep the same products that Jack's supplied, they have plans to expand their camping selection and add women's Carhartt products.

"The opportunity that we see is a huge camping area," said Earley. "We have a lot of real estate over here that we can use, and we are excited to see what we can offer besides what's already here."

While the company is rebranding the store's aesthetics with new outdoor signs and doormats, they also need to hire employees, including a manager and an assistant manager.

Earley said they are looking for a manager that fits their culture, emphasizing that the customer comes first.

"It is important to continue the legacy of Jack's Boot Shop. We owe a big thank you to Steve (Logue) for the seamless transition and for giving us this opportunity," Earley noted.

Tax season is upon us, and what better time to add a little excitement to the mundane task of filing taxes? While most people aim to file their taxes accurately and without incident, why not spice things up a bit and aim for an audit or rejection instead? After all, who doesn't love a good challenge? Here are ways to get your taxet and what was taxet and wa

are ways to get your tax return audited or rejected:

Creative Math: Throw.

Creative Math: Throw caution to the wind and let your imagination run wild with your calculations. Forget about the numbers on your W-2 forms; just make up your income and deductions as you go along. Who needs accuracy when you can have creativity? The tax

authority's computer will catch math errors and when your income records submitted by Social Security, your employer, or financial institutions show different amounts than reported.

The Art of Omission: Embrace the minimalist approach by leaving out crucial information from

your tax return. Don't bother reporting all your income sources or providing documentation for your deductions. After all, less is more, right? One common reason tax returns are rejected is because the filer fails to include the Health Insurance Marketplace Statement, IRS Form 1095-A.

Procrastination Nation: Why rush to file your taxes on time

when you can procrastinate until the very last minute? Better yet, wait until after the deadline has passed and see how long you can go without filing. It's like playing a game of chicken with the IRS! Of course, the non-filing penalty with the IRS is 5% of the unpaid taxes for each month or part of a month that the tax return is late, but the penalty will not exceed 25% of your unpaid taxes. There is also interest charged on the late payment of taxes. The interest rate is much lower than the penalty for not filing.

Go Big or Go Home: Aim for the stars with your deductions and credits. Claim every possible deduction under the sun, regardless of whether you qualify for them or not. Remember, the bigger the deduction, the better your chances of catching the IRS's attention.

Mismatch Madness: Keep the IRS on their toes by providing conflicting information on your tax return. Make sure to report one thing to your employer and something entirely different to the IRS. It's like a fun game of spot-the-difference, but with higher stakes!

Cash is King: Channel your inner outlaw by underreporting your cash income. Who needs to report those under-the-table tips or side hustles anyway? Just remember to keep your fingers crossed that the IRS doesn't catch wind of your creative accounting tactics.

Signature Shmignature: Who has time to bother with signing their tax return? Skip the signature and date altogether and see what happens. After all, rules are made to be broken, right?

Dush Legislation Would Make Gym Class Optional for PA Student Athletes

Sponsored by Sen. Cris Dush (R-25), legislation to allow Pennsylvania student athletes

to fulfill physical education (PE) requirements through participation in interscholastic sports (Senate Bill 454), was advanced by the Senate Education Committee on Tuesday.

"This important legislation would clearly give school districts the flexibility to substitute participation in student athletics for physical education," said Dush. "As a state representative, I was originally inspired to sponsor this bill by a student athlete, Levi Roseman, who was enrolled at Brookville High School. Levi participated in cross-country, indoor track, outdoor track, and golf. He graduated as a salutatorian but could not complete as many advanced placement courses as he

Roseman is now a graduate of Dartmouth College, an Ivy League school in New Hampshire, where he was also a multi-sport student athlete.

Under current law, high school students who participate in varsity sports may be required to take physical education classes. These students are involved in strenuous activities that meet the intent of keeping students fit and active, as well as developing a sense of sportsmanship and camaraderie, which required PE courses are meant to foster.

Senate Bill 454 would enable school board directors to permit students to satisfy PE requirements through their participation in an interscholastic sport. Students would be able to use this extra academic time for either a study hall, to access the campus broadband and library facilities for their homework. or to take additional classwork which would benefit them in preparation for college.

"Since students who are involved in varsity sports are significantly more likely to be higher academic achievers, they are more likely to be involved in advanced placement courses which require significantly more study time," said Dush. "I have repeatedly spoken to school administrators across Senate District 25 who are supportive of Senate Bill 454, because it encourages both athletic and academic growth. This legislation specifically intended to give commonwealth school administrators greater flexibility and more options so they can better accommodate outstanding student athletes like Levi."

Senate Bill 454 now advances to the full PA Senate for consideration.

Dush, Benninghoff **Confirm \$1 Million** in Funding for **Centre County Infrastructure Projects**

Sen. Cris Dush (R-25) and Rep. Kerry Benninghoff (R-66) today announced that more than \$1 million in state funding has been awarded for three Centre County infrastructure improvement projects.

"My team and I are constantly working to secure highly competitive financial assistance for the benefit of our

local townships, boroughs and municipalities," said Dush. "It is always rewarding to see state funding return to the 25th Senate District to help offset or eliminate taxpayer costs for essential infrastructure enhancements."

"I was more than happy to advocate on behalf of leadership in Gregg Township when they approached me personally about funding for the Bitner Hollow Road-Middle Road project," said Benninghoff, who serves as Republican chairman of the House Transportation Committee. "These are the type of investments our constituents expect us to make in order to maintain local infrastructure, and I applaud the township supervisors for taking the initiative."

Specific projects and funding amounts are as follows:

- \$500,000 was awarded to College Township for the construction of a shared use pathway along East College Avenue from Puddinton Road to Hastings Road.
- \$400,000 was awarded to Gregg Township for Bitner Hollow Road and Middle Road Phase II improvements.
- \$118,688 was awarded to Snow Shoe Township for Kato Road Phase II improvements.

The grants were awarded

through the Multimodal Transportation Fund administered by the Commonwealth Financing Authority. The fund was created to encourage economic development and ensure that a safe and reliable system of transportation is available to the residents of the commonwealth.

Dush, Smith Confirm \$721,000 Awarded for **Jefferson County** Infrastructure **Improvements**

Sen. Cris Dush (R-25) and Rep. Brian Smith (R-66) announced today that \$721,138 has been awarded for three Jefferson County infrastructure improvement projects.

"Strategically bundling infrastructure upgrades, drainage improvements, utility work and other quality of life enhancements whenever possible are proven methods to reducing overall construction costs, increasing public safety and minimizing disruptions for Jefferson County residents and job creators," Dush said. "We all share the benefits of an adequately funded and properly maintained local transportation infrastructure."

"As a former truck driver and trucking business owner, I can't stress enough how important it is to stay on top of our road maintenance," Smith said. "Our goods can only get where they need to go if there's a stretch of asphalt to get them there. This funding will help offset the high costs of these important projects to our local municipalities."

Specific projects and funding amounts are as follows:

- \$350,000 was awarded to the Falls Creek Borough Main Street Revitalization Project for sidewalk replacement, streetscape improvements and to address additional pedestrian concerns.
- \$259,138 was awarded to the Jefferson County Service Center Road Improvement Project, which includes paving reconstruction. Service Center Road is a vital connection between several Jefferson County facilities, including the county jail and county communications office, six private sector businesses employing 420 workers, and major transportation routes.
- \$112,000 was awarded to Sykesville Borough for the resurfacing of Kauffman Street and Sykes Alley.

The grants were awarded through the Multimodal Transportation Fund administered by the Commonwealth Financing Authority. The fund was created to encourage economic development and ensure that a safe and reliable system of transportation is available to the residents of the commonwealth.

A Story about a Life that Ended too Soon and the Impact of Choice & Hope

My name is Katie Peterson. My story to share is about my late husband Trevor Peterson. Trevor and I met working at the same restaurant in Pittsburgh in 2010. I was 20 years old, and Trevor was 25. Trevor left the city of Pittsburgh to move to Brookville with me to be closer to my family. My family was his family too. Trevor quickly fit right in and became so close with my parents who loved him like a son and my brothers who

loved him as another brother and lifelong friend. We married in 2012 and were blessed with 2 wonderful children, Cooper & Olivia.

Trevor was the kind of guy that everyone wanted be around – always so fun. much loved to joke around, SO kind and knew something about any He topic. loved sports and was

fantastic with trivia. He just always made a person smile and feel good. Trevor was a faithful and loyal husband and father. He always showed up for everything and would do whatever was asked of him. Trevor loved helping coach sports, not just to be with our son Cooper, but to help other kids and get to know them as well. He always came home from practice and games with a smile on his face and a story to tell. He very much enjoyed the friendships formed on the field with the fellow coaches and volunteers. Trevor loved the simple pleasures

of life and spending time with friends and family. Knowing all of these things about the person he was and the way he lived his life makes it that much harder to try and understand why he chose

> to end his life so soon. In June of

2022, Trevor o p e n e d C&O Deli & Seafood on Main Street Brookville. He had many different career paths be for e going out on his own,

trying to find what he could do that made him feel joy and accomplishment. Trevor excelled and was well-liked at every one of his prior careers, but he was driven and always wanted to grow and be even more successful. It just seemed as though he was ambitious and continued to search for more opportunities. Trevor loved being in downtown Brookville with C&O Deli and spent a lot of time dedicating himself to the success of the business. The business did well and Trevor hoped to grow it even more in the

future. I thought any person in Trevor's shoes would be stressed, but I was so proud of him and supported him nonetheless. The same goes for our family, friends and community – everyone loved what Trevor brought to the town with his unique specials, seafood, sushi, sandwiches & grocery items. It was a successful and exciting adventure. He loved going to work and seeing the familiar and new faces that walked through the door.

I could tell Trevor was starting to get burned out working so many hours and was putting a lot of pressure on himself, but he did that in every job that he had. We then discussed the importance of self-care: making time for himself and our family. At the time, I had recently started walking with a friend, and Trevor was so supportive and thought it was great. He was reluctant to make time for himself like I was, but with persistence from myself and close friends, he did end up joining a gym in May and he was very excited to do so. Though

the year had been busy, Trevor still had dinner with our family every night, went to church every Sunday, volunteered to coach sports and socialized with friends. We went on vacations, went out to eat and had made many short-term plans, such as a weekend birthday party for myself and a last day of school sleepover for my son and his 11 friends.

But still, May 19, 2023 Trevor committed suicide. It was a surprising and devastating decision that impacted our family and community significantly. As someone who was not only happily married to Trevor but also considered him to have been my best friend for the last 13 years, I am still shocked to know that I did not know how much he was struggling nor for how long he was inundated with this degree of depression. None of his family or friends knew what he hid behind his smile and laughter.

Eligibility is based upon the income guidelines here. The Brookville Food Pantry does not set these guidelines but is required to follow them. The total household income is based on 185% of poverty.





Community Digital History Storytelling Class is a Heinz History Center (Pittsburgh) project originated at the prior California University of PA and now expanded to the three Penn Western Universities of Clarion, Edinboro, and California, PA. 

3 years, we hosted Brookville's Hickory Grove 4th Grade classes. This year we expanded our reach to other schools and we will be hosting Clarion-Limestone School District 4th Grade. Many of the students living along the border of Clarion & Jefferson counties attend this school.

This grant funds bussing of the students from their school to the park, students' and teachers' lunches, and teaching materials (Jr. Ranger and Pollinator booklets). JCHC will cover Presenters' lunches. Please see associated press release from National Park Service and USDA Forest Service in this issue for more information.

Presenters are professionals in their field of expertise, ranging from Pollinator -Pond habitat, Lumbering/Forestry/ Conservation Practices (also including any Birds & Mammals of the Park observed that day), Native American Rockshelter/ Archaeology, and a Tour of the Rocks: The story of the engraved boulders and the engraver, Douglas Stahlman. The latter program is part of the cultural history of the Park. There is also a fun activity for the kids where they all receive a "Trail Name," based on the names of Forest Animals, and associated stickers they can either wear or post in their Booklets.

It will be a fun filed trip day for the students, and also a day focused on nature, cultural heritage and stewardship.

41 Grants Awarded Will Get More Than 31,000 Kids Outside

National Park Trust is pleased to announce the 2024 grantees of the Every Kid Outdoors Small Grants Program, developed in partnership with the USDA Forest Service, This Program supports schools and momprofit organizations focused on connecting elementary schoolaged youth to public parks, lands, and waters.

This program was open to 501(c)3 non-profit organizations and schools seeking resources to connect their community's elementary school-aged kids with local parks, public lands, and waters. what brought Trevor to this decision or how long he struggled with it. What I do know now is that what I saw was different than what Trevor saw. Perhaps the glimpse of what our life was like and whom Trevor was can help you see that Trevor's mental state and suffering was not known to anyone and therefore he fought his battles alone. We knew and loved a fun, successful and honorable man. Trevor's world was black and white though, and he let the darkness outweigh the light. Every bump in the road, small mistake, tired day, etc, he saw as a failure and direct reflection of his character and worth, while the rest of us saw a hard-working and wonderful human just trying to make a good life for himself and family.

While Trevor's home life growing up differed much from my own, he grew up in what he knew as a loving and involved family. His father was an alcoholic and struggled with this addiction for most of Trevor's life though. Trevor wasn't aware just how bad it was until later on in his own adult life. His father's alcoholism is eventually what ended his life just a year before Trevor ended his. Trevor struggled with the loss of his father, and I believe this is just one more thing that weighed him down when he was already in such a fragile state of mind.

The importance of this story is not just a sad story of a person's life that should have been lived out longer. It's also not just to remember someone who was loved and is missed every day. The importance of sharing this story is so that I can share what I've learned from this experience and HOPE that my story can help someone else's journey. I want to raise awareness for mental health in HOPES that someone else may have a different outcome. If anything, I have learned that mental health does not discriminate and can truly affect anyone despite how loved and admired a person is by others.

All of this information I share with you is what I've been able to process in retrospection through the last year of being widowed. As I stated before, I see now that Trevor only saw darkness. What I've also learned is that when a person only sees darkness, they can no longer see themselves getting to a place where they can find HOPE. Even the smallest sliver of HOPE is what keeps us fighting to live another day whatever that looks like. It can be just getting out of bed or staying home for a "mental health" day. **HOPE** can be going for a walk or talking to a friend or teacher. **HOPE** can be forgiveness or letting go. HOPE can be getting professional help or just knowing tomorrow is another day. Life doesn't always move in a forward direction; there will always be detours and missed turns. That doesn't mean we can't strive to keep our compass pointing north. We may not all take the same path to tomorrow and that's okay; just as long as we all HOPE to get there.

So whatever it is in life: sorrow, anxiety, depression, grief, pride, embarrassment or anger – just know that it doesn't always have to be "this" or "that." Do not define yourself by one heavy feeling or setback or temporary moment. You can have these weights pulling you down, but it doesn't mean that they are anchored there forever. Whether

it's taking time for yourself, spending time with friends and family or finding someone safe to talk to, just know there are ways to get through the dark times and the pressures of life.

While I HOPE you never find yourself able to relate to this story, I also HOPE that if you do, you'll continue to walk on, just like I have done. Three days before Trevor's passing was my birthday. Trevor was excited to give me new walking shoes (I, of course, picked them out) that he had wrapped in brown deli paper and wrote "To: Katie, From: Katie. Love, Trevor." Though it hasn't been easy and some days have been harder than others, I continue to lace up my shoes and go out in the heat or in the cold and on the beautiful days. I remember the good times and reminisce on what could have been. I get angry and sad and feel bad for him and myself and my children and anyone else who knows what this is or could feel like. I think about how badly I wish Trevor would have talked to someone and am disappointed he didn't ask for help. I used to think I had to pick a feeling and couldn't feel more than one way about my experience with this loss, but through walking, journaling, leaning on my family and seeing a counselor, I have learned that an experience like this can be a combination of emotions in waves or all at once. I've also learned that I can take a moment to process my feelings


The Brookville Mirror and cry or be sad; I just cannot stay there and wallow. I've held onto **HOPE** that my children and I will still have a good life despite the devastating and tragic loss of Trevor.

If you take away anything from this, it's that I HOPE you know that you are never alone. If you do feel that way – please, keep moving forward. Try to Walk with HOPE in your heart. You will find a way through it. Whether you realize it or not, the silent battles you suffer have silent supporters and warriors that are rooting for you. Please know I will always be one of them

PA Wilds Center CEO Ta Enos says having up-to-date, accurate, high-quality maps of the PA Wilds region is key to helping visitors have a positive and safe outdoor experience, making the outdoors and our region's vast public lands more accessible, and encouraging visitors to continue exploring rural communities and small businesses on their adventures. 

The **Marinette** Story SPRING, 2024

by Paul E. Harvey, MD



INTRODUCTION -

This is the story about our 75 HP Marinette gas engine residing at CPM. A catalog picture of our engine is shown. There is a long and interesting tale about this engine and its makers; and it will unfold before us now. So let's travel back in time to discover its beginnings.

WHERE IS MARINETTE? -

Our time travel takes us to the shore of Lake Michigan in the early 1800's. Wow! This is really a big wilderness; but wait a bit there are already a few French-Canadian fur traders here. The first European settler was Stanislaus Chuppu, a fur trader. The area prospered from the fur trade, but it was short lived. Lumber became prominent then and lasted many years.



The town was named for Marie Antoinette Chevalier, (1793 - 1865). Her father was French-Canadian, and mother was Menominee. Marie became a very astute and fair businessperson and opened a

Trading Post at the mouth of the Menominee River. She was so successful that she was called Queen Marinette. She married another trader, John Jacobs, and they had three children. The oldest, John Jr., continued with the family business and finally mapped out the town of Marinette. And so, our stage is

Marinette, Wisconsin has continued to prosper during the ensuing years. It has had a relatively stable economy. The photo shows a very pleasant mid-western town, which is the county seat of Marinette County. The city now has a population of about 11,000.

THE IRON WORKS -

Our time travel has left us a very early and primitive part of Marinette's history. So, let's move up a few years and see what industry they now have. Wow! In 1867 a gent named DeWitt Clinton Prescott, along with R. H. Trumbell and Austin Cruver established a shop on Joe Bart Island to repair sawmills. It burnt in 1870, but they were already building a big shop on Main Street of Marinette. In 1872, Prescott bought out his partners and formed the Marinette Iron Works. They could build a large variety of equipment including steam engines and locomotives. Several years later, the Walrath

Engine would be added. This is the beginning of the Marinette engine.

In 1898, Prescott moved to Chicago where he set up his business headquarters. He built a plant in Chicago Heights to manufacture the Marinette Gas Engine, as they had outgrown the Marinette Iron Works. It was a huge facility but the demand for the engines was great. This was advertised as the largest factory in the country devoted solely to gas engine manufacture, and was named the Marinette Gas Engine



Co. But Prescott passed away in 1918, and his company soon evaporated. It was the end of an era for the Marinette engine.

Foos Engine Company of Springfield, Ohio, bought Marinette about 1907 and continued making the engines for many more years. With a few changes, they were very successful.

JESSE WALRATH -

Now, let us return in our time travel to 1838 and visit the village of Chittenango, Madison County, New York. On November 7, 1838, Jesse Walrath was born. He was the son of Mr., and Mrs. Daniel Walrath. HIs father was well known for his expertise in manufacturing and farming. Jesse was educated at local schools and colleges and became an expert machinist and



mechanical engineer. His career quickly blossomed.


Upon graduation, Jesse was recruited by George Corliss of the Corliss Steam Engine Works in Providence, RI. He was soon promoted to General Superintendent. Here, he had the opportunity to work with Edwin Reynolds, (1831 - 1909). This would be a wonderful experience for him. Reynolds was a prodigious engineer and worked for Corliss from 1861 to 1877. Reynolds was then asked by Edward P. Allis to move to Milwaukee to be his general superintendent. His Reynolds -Corliss steam engine was most successful. Reynolds was a prime mover to develop Allis -Chalmers in 1901. He designed much machinery and products for them.

Jesse remained there until 1880 and then moved to Racine, Wisconsin to become the general superintendent of J. I. Case. He was there until 1896 and made many improvements for them. Also, during these years, his interest in gas engines was sparked, and he did very significant work that eventually became the Marinette engine. In





1903, he retired to private life and became a consulting engineer. He passed away on April 30, 1909. He is buried in Oakwood Cemetery in his hometown of Chittenango.






RAYMOND OR WALRATH?

These two very gifted engineers had ideas that were very similar, and their paths finally crossed. We have just learned of Jesse Walrath's life and career, and know he was General

Superintendent of J. I. Case and overseeing all their products.

So now let us see what John Raymond is doing. About 1891, he was in San Francisco designing a vertical engine with rotary valves. A very handsome design with odd flywheels.



It had a vertical shaft between the cylinders that had a gear that drove the two rotary valve gears and the governor head. Note the oilers on top for the rotary valves. Walrath had a very similar design in 1895, but the central vertical shaft drove poppet valves. During this time, both were in the employ of Case!






The following illustrations will help us understand the two makers engines. Raymond left Racine in 1896.





Is there a connection in the work of these two engineers? They worked together at Case for three years and must have had some interaction. Were they friends or adversaries? We will never know!!!!

This is the only known Raymond in existence. Note that it was built by Hicks in Chicago, and not by J. I. Case. Interesting, but that is another long story. It is now in a private collection.






WALRATH PATENTS -

Jesse was a very prolific designer and considering his employment with Corliss, Reynolds, and Case, he had the opportunity to expand his imagination. And that he did!!! He also included several other topics for at least 33 patents. His


earliest patent is in 1868 for a brick making machine!

But for our purposes, the author will only include Jesse's significant gas engine patents.

1. First gas engine patent found: July 10, 1894. 522,811.




Jesse's first gas engine patent. Appears to be a reasonable horizontal twin cylinder engine. It also appears to be




very complicated. There is no evidence that it was ever built. But this was his first venture into gas engines.

2. Second gas engine patent: March 2, 1897. 577,898.



This is a very interesting patent. It represents an engine very similar Raymond engine However poppet

valves instead of Raymond's rotary valves. The vertical shaft drove a large gear in the center of the head which had a face cam to actuate the poppet valve. Note

6. Sixth gas engine patent: October 26, 1900. 676,642.






Of the six patents that I selected, I think these are the most significant to show the development of the Walrath engine. His air start mechanism shown here was unique, and necessary for the large engines.

Jesse had many more gas engine patents that detailed various items on his engine. These included the mixer, the igniters, and the governor. He covered every aspect of his new engine in detail that produced a very successful machine.

OFF SET CRANKSHAFT -

Perhaps you noticed in the sixth engine patent, the crankshaft appears off set to the cylinder center line. This is a very common practice on large vertical engines. Hmm! Wonder



The catalog is in remarkably condition and comprehensive. Note that the Marinette name is retained until purchased by Foos, and the Walrath connection is proudly advertised. It starts with a very detailed introduction to the engine and gives some history. The illustrations are superb.

Early into the catalog, we are greeted with this little 4 hp Marinette. Yep, just like the big ones with all the same features.

Cute, but looks expensive! The catalog tells us that the single cylinder engines were built from 4 to 40 HP; the twin cylinder engines were built from 8 to 80 HP; and the triple cylinder engines from 50 to 250 HP. Other references suggest a 2 HP as well




Shown in the catalog, the firm included this line of special engine. These were built to 15 HP and appear to be the "economy model." None appear to exist!

This open frame version of the Marinette is absolutely fantastic. It was built to save weight in many uses. But why, you ask?? Well, it was adapted to marine use, but also many

portable applications. Certainly a magnificent machine. Hmmm? Wonder if one still exists??



This photo illustrates the need for weight reduction. Fantastic portable electric generation! Interesting where the driver sat during transport. Wonder how many horses were needed to move it?



This is the interior of one of the machine shops in the new factory at Chicago Heights. Hmmm! Looks like some house

cleaning is needed. But it was so successful and so many engines were built and ran well.



The entire catalog is well designed with excellent illustrations, and contains additional tables concerning pulley speeds, fuel consumption, and other useful information. It has 48 pages!

CPM MARINETTE -



Our Marinette engine has a very unique history before arriving here. But let's wind up our time travel by just going back 50 + years. I was just beginning collecting and had visited John Wilcox at Trail Run. I was so impressed with his 40 HP Bruce McBeth twin cylinder vertical as I had never seen anything like it before. John said he knew where there was a large three-cylinder engine, but it was in bad shape. He was involved moving another large engine to his collection and didn't want this one. So, I was off to Freeport, PA, as another adventure unfolds. Wow, vep, the

engine was a large three-cylinder Marinette located in a big mill. So what do we know about the engine's history? Although the mill had closed, the elderly miller lived next door and provided me with some history!



I was told that the engine was originally installed in the Schenley Hotel in the Oakland section of Pittsburgh. It was used to generate electricity. This was a common practice in Pittsburgh. With the advent of commercial electricity, the engine was no longer needed. The hotel is still in use today by the University of Pittsburgh for apartments and meeting facilities. Sometime later, the engine was removed from the hotel, and relocated to Valley Mills, in Freeport, PA. It is located on Buffalo Creek close to it joining the Allegheny River in Freeport, PA. The mill had a water turbine, but the millers wanted the back up of an engine during low water times.

The original mill burned during the Civil War. The Mickey family bought the site in 1871 and built the current mill. as shown. It operated until 1965 under three different families.

Most commonly, it is known as Valley Mills or Mickey's Mills. It specialized in grinding winter wheat and buckwheat. The building is still intact and



preserved by the Freeport Area Historical Society. The map shows the location of the mill.



So, I had just found a very large engine; much bigger than anything I had ever moved. I had just acquired the "tilt bed," a tandem 1956 S model International with a big winch. So how to proceed?

The engine had been added on with a crude building. The Historical Society wanted the mill restored to waterpower, so that engine had to go. This was very fortunate for me, as they wanted in removed.

This very poor photo shows the engine moving day in 1971, The engine house had been removed and its location can be

seen over the tractor. Soon, it was on my truck and on its way to Coolspring. My Dad, Earle Harvey, and a friend, C. A. (Al) Burcher, helped on the move. It went very well.

I certainly want to acknowledge Francis H. "Dutch" Laube (1949

who made having the Marinette at CPM possible. He was CEO of Freeport Brick, and very community



community oriented. Leading the effort of saving of the mill, he graciously made the engine available here. His dream was to restore the mill to water power.

TRANTER MFG CO. -

It has been a good time travel trip, but let's just sidestep a bit to visit a very old company in Pittsburg. Tranter most likely played an important role in saving our engine. OK. I will explain, as we are looking through some of their nice old shops. We are at 105 Fort Pitt Blvd at the edge of downtown Pittsburg. It was called Water Street back then. Tranter was established in 1836 and incorporated in 1891. It survived into the 1970's! Originally it was building all sorts of heavy equipment, catering to the mining industry. But as time passed, Tranter became a reseller more than a maker. They would

acquire used equipment, tune it up a bit, and resell it. Probably this is what saved our engine!


Back in Coolspring, we find our engine has a Tranter name plate just below the original Marinette plate. Sooo- Although there is no documentation of it, one could easily surmise that Tranter acquired the engine from the hotel, saving it from scrap, and reselling it to Valley Mills in Freeport, PA. This seems to be their business practice at that time. Hmmm! What is your guess?



TURNER - FRICKE CONNECTION –

About 1900, we find the ambitious George Turner was named as the Pittsburgh area sales representative for the Marinette engine. He did a marvelous job saturating the area with these engines. He soon partnered with Henry C. Fricke

(Pronounced Frick - E) to form the Keystone Engine Company in 1901 to install the Marinette engine in various locations. This was extremely successful.



Probably their most ambitious and successful effort was electrifying the Diamond Market Square of downtown Pittsburgh. This actually became the forerunner of the present Duquesne Light Company.



The Diamond Market Square plant went online in 1903. It contained 10 three cylinder, 85 HP Marinette engines direct connected to generators.

But Turner and Fricke were not satisfied with this accomplishment and created the Turner - Fricke Manufacturing Company to produce vertical gas engines. Amazing that they

Their engine was successful but so different from the Marinette. Considering the graceful lines of the Marinette, the TF was much more massive. It was built for hard work also. It was a "T" head design which had the valves in the block, as opposed to the overhead valve design of the Marinette. Examples of each are operational at CPM.


FREEPORT AND THE MILL

So where did our Marinette spend its working career? To answer that question, we have to travel back to the 1790's and see what was happening along the Allegheny River near the mouth of Buffalo Creek. Wow! A town was forming! Going way back to the 1760's, we find David Todd and his brother William acquiring a large portion of riverfront property here. They

sold 27 lots for \$24.00 each there. But they had the stipulation that all the riverfront was free to all sorts of vessels. No charge could be made for docking, unloading, or loading. Originally known as Todd's Town, the name was changed to Freeport in 1833.

Freeport was an ideal place for a mill with Buffalo Creek joining the Allegheny River, and Pittsburgh close by. Excellent access to good markets!

The first mill built on the site was in 1816, and a mill has been there ever since. The present mill dated to 1871 and was named the "Freeport Flouring Mill." In 1881, the "Freeport Journal" notes that the mill was renovated with a new boiler and steam engine. The dam on Buffalo Creek was updated and the water wheel was replaced with two



turbines. In 1883, the name was officially Valley Mills.


In 1898, Elmer Mickey and his family moved to Freeport, and purchased the mill. From that day on, most people called it Mickey's Mill. Although maintaining the water turbines, Elmer purchased a large gas engine. He also installed a small engine and mill for little jobs. In 1942. Mirl Mickey took over and they were producing 500 barrels a day of the best four in the valley. Mirl finally closed the mill in 1965 due to failing health. Obviously, our Marinette engine had a busy life!

The later one-story addition that housed the large gas engine, the Marinette, was attached to the mill where the window is absent. It was torn away by 1971 when I removed the engine. The engine has a large, direct connected clutch pulley that extended into the main part of the mill to operate the extensive maze of shafts, pulleys, and belts. Impressive! The small engine and its mill were located on the main floor of the building, handy to grind a couple bags of grain. It was an International Harvester 4 HP hopper cooled Mogul engine.

The old miller really loved that engine, and it probably kept the mill open a few more years.

OUR ENGINE -

We have just returned from a marvelous time travel trip and have learned so much about the Marinette engine. Enjoyable journey, but let's return to Coolspring to look at our engine! A story that spans 50 years.





The engine is a three-cylinder vertical of 10 1/4 inch bore and 14 inch stroke. Its serial number is 386 and it is rated 75 HP. This view shows the vertical push rods that operate the overhead valves, and the igniter. The vertical governor controlled the main mixer, adjusting the amount of gas and air each cylinder got. The secondary mixing chambers allowed each cylinder to be finetuned. The wooden platform and

stairs were original to the engine. Note the holes in the flywheel used to insert a bar to position the engine for starting. The actual starting was then done by compressed air.





Note the cam shaft and tappets.


When acquired, the engine was really worn out. It had a hard life. The heads were beyond repair but there were new patterns stored in the mill.



I brought them home back in 1971 as a curiosity. Reflecting, they might have been made by Tranter, knowing how bad the heads were. However, when Justin restored the engine, he used the patterns. He felt they were the best he ever used.

EPILOGUE -

Let's let our time travel take us back to the present. It has been a great voyage. The Marinette is back to where I unloaded it in 1971. But, look! It is different and runs so well. Why? Justin Jenkins took it back to his shop and did a total rebuild. So many parts, including the heads, had to be remade. With his magic, it lives so well again. A long and successful story.

Hope Darr, last month's featured person, was member of Daughters of the American Revolution (D.A.R.), a national organization founded in 1890 by three women, who wanted to find a way to express their patriotic feelings. Membership was open to women whose ancestors had served in the Revolutionary War.

Laura Cook became a D.A.R. member in 1896 when she lived in Pittsburgh and was the founding regent (president) of the chapter that began in Brookville in 1899. She attended Pittsburgh Female College (my alma mater now Chatham University) and Northwest Conservatory of Music. She served as regent until 1914. The wife of timber



In the spring of 1939, Brookville's D.A.R. chapter recognized an oak tree on property at 144 Jefferson Street. The tree had been planted 75 years prior from an acorn sent from England to the parents of Evan Rice Craig. Mrs. Anthony Wayne (Laura) Cook is seated in the middle of the front row.

entrepreneur Anthony Wayne Cook, the Cooks also had a home in Forest County, and in 1907, moved into a home in Brookville near the corner of Jefferson and Pickering Streets. They were parents of a son and an infant daughter, who died in 1904.

In February 1900, she hosted a dinner for D.A.R. members and guests at the American Hotel. In June, the women sponsored a Flag Day celebration, and more

than one hundred people attended the event at the Main Street home of Jane Henderson. The newspaper report was especially interesting to me because Azuba Tuttle Keith read "a paper on the personal reminiscences of Veterans of the Revolution." Azuba was my husband's greatgreat-grandmother and her picture hangs in my hallway next to her husband Albert.

For Sports Fans! by Carole A. Briggs

Sports have been around for a long time. Images of wrestlers appear in cave drawings. Egyptian Rock Art depicts swimming and wrestling as early as 10,000 B.C.E. Romans watched their gladiators, professional combatants, for years.

Sports have been around for a long time in Brookville, too. Among the first sports described is foot racing or running. An article in an 1894 edition of Jeffersonian Democrat stated, "Running, leaping, and wrestling were the leading athletic sports engaged in by the young men of Brookville..." The article then described a race by Moses Knapp (1814-1880), son of county pioneer Moses Knapp. Young Moses wagered he could run a mile in less than five minutes. He ran and won the five-dollar wager!

Running is a sport that requires no equipment, important in a time when resources were limited. After the Civil War, foot races or running were popular events on the Fourth of July and during the county fair, usually with a monetary reward, but at least once, with an award of cigars!

In the twentieth century, athletics became a larger part of school curricula, with both team and individual sports being promoted. The local YMCA was involved with athletics as well.

In early May 1919, eighteenyear-old Charles "Chuck" Taylor exhibited diving at the

local YMCA, then later in the month, was the "individual star" of the second annual swim gala at the YMCA for fancy diving, plunge for distance, and 50-yard breaststroke. That same month he represented Brookville High School at the Fourteenth Annual Interscholastic Track and Field event in Pittsburgh, where he was entered in six events: 100-yard dash, 200-yard dash, running high, running broad, pole vault, and discus throw. (He set swim records while at Brookville, played baseball and basketball, and played golf at Pinecrest.) That fall, he placed first in eight events in the high school's interclass field meet. He attended Culver Academy in the summers, earning three all-around athletic championships before enrolling in Mercersburg Academy in

The next February, when the Mercersburg team traveled to Madison Square Garden in New York City, Chuck was part of the four-man relay team. He ran the second lap, increasing the lead to ten feet. They broke the earlier world record at 3:35. In May, the team won the interscholastic track and field event in Philadelphia. Chuck participated and placed in four events, broad jump (first), pole vault (tied for first), high jump (tied for first), and 100-yard dash (third).

That summer he participated in an international event in England, breaking records once again. "Taylor's record jump was 22 feet 4 inches, and was performed from a soft take-off, which makes the record even more remarkable."

Coach Miller, of the University Pittsburgh, and Jimmy DeHart, coach at the University

Airmail flights in the United States began in 1918. In 1938, along with two other pilots, Raymond Humphrey and Mort Stahlman, Taylor participated in the first airmail flight from Henderson Field in Brookville as part of National Airmail Week and also commemorating the twenty-fifth anniversary of the death of Brookville's pioneer flyer, Lewis Earle Sandt. During his lifetime, Charles Taylor was involved with many Brookville organizations. He was 87 when he died in 1988.

Track and field events in American high schools evolved around the turn of the century. Locally, there were occasional track and field events during the summer, but nothing official in the county's schools. An Indiana track team performed in 1915, possibly as an attempt to raise some interest in Brookville, and in 1921, track and field events were part of the Brookville Fair. Chuck Taylor, experienced with track and field at Culver, was both an official and a performer at the fair, exhibiting his prowess with the running broad jump. There was interest, and by 1921, Brookville High School had a track team and the local newspaper claimed, "Brookville

of Georgia, made no reservation in their opinions that he is "the greatest track and field man in American prep schools today."

graduating Princeton University in 1926, he worked for the Bigelow Sanford Rug Company in Amsterdam, New York, and Europe. He was an employee of Columbia Gas and Electric Company in Pittsburgh, before joining the Walter J. Sandt company (Pennzoil) in 1934.



Preserving Heritage by Helping in Israel

Shortly after the October 2023 Hamas attacks in Gaza and Israel, Allan Tissenbaum, MD, and his wife Charlene, put any fears aside about what they may be encountering and were on a plane to provide help.

Dr. Tissenbaum, who is a boardcertified orthopedic surgeon with Penn Highlands Orthopedics and Sports Medicine — in Rostraver Township, Pennsylvania, went to the site of the attacks in Israel to provide medical care to those injured.

"As the son of a holocaust survivor, I saw this attack as a threat to my people's survival, Dr. Tissenbaum explained.

For the last seven years, the Tissenbaums have been members of Emergency Volunteer Program (EVP) that Charlene brought to Pittsburgh. The organization began as firefighters that respond to situations in Israel and has grown to include medical corps. EVP's mission is to train and send physicians, nurses, paramedics, firefighters and other community volunteers to Israel when needed. "Last October

situation occurred, the organization solicited volunteers to help over there. We were deployed to Israel and we arrived, the situation was under control. The Israeli medical community was able to cope with the load."

During the two weeks the Tissenbaums were deployed in Israel, he trained at Israeli Defense Federation facilities.

"I would go back for a medical trip in a second and I am not alone. My wife, brother, sister and holocaust survivor mother are going to do volunteer work there in the near future," Dr. Tissenbaum added.

Bringing Better Health to Diverse Populations

Shane Sergent, DO, believes in identifying disease before it happens — not just treating it. Dr. Sergent, who is an emergency medicine physician and the Central Region Medical Director of Emergency Medicine at Penn Highlands Healthcare, shares his skills and expertise beyond the U.S. borders in Central and South America. He is immediate past president of DOCARE International, a medical outreach organization dedicated to sustainable healthcare and education in under-resourced communities around the world. Dr. Sergent also served as Clinical Faculty and Medical Director of Global Health and Research at Michigan State College of Osteopathic Medicine's (MSUCOM) Institute of International Health, and as Clinical Faculty and Professor Honorario at Universidad César Vallejo in Trujillo, Peru. He has been involved with MSUCOM's Peru Outreach program since 2009, implementing numerous research and health initiatives.

Dr. Sergent began going outside the U.S. in 2009 with a medical trip to the Andes Mountains where he was working in an altitude of more than 14,000 feet. Since then, he and his wife, a fellow physician, accompanied by their daughter, have provided healthcare in Peru. He also has been on medical trips to Belize and Guatemala.

"I have been to a lot of different locations," said Dr. Sergent. "Most recently, we have been focused on developing healthcare access in the Peru Amazon River region working closely with physicians there. When we visit remote communities, we have worked in hospitals, churches and

even off boats."

Treating both children and adults, Dr. Sergent has been providing care for communicable and non-communicable diseases as the region grows.

"We do a lot of medical screening and offer medications for disease maintenance and treatment," said Dr. Sergent. "We have incorporated research into our trips to look at disease prevention with water quality and vaccinations. Much of the research we do is focused on environmental impacts of health."


Dr. Sergent finds the time he spends in Central and South America to be invaluable experiences.

"I truly appreciate opportunities I have had working with these populations. I feel that it has improved my development of being a physician, honed my ability to think like a researcher, and made me more aware of health disparities. I hope to continue this support in our local communities in the same capacity."

Inspired to Help Our Troops and the Underserved

Growing up in Jakarta. Indonesia, Michelle Mouria, MD, FACS, a board-certified surgeon specializing in trauma emergencies with Highlands General Surgery in DuBois, witnessed religious and racial struggles among different groups. At the age of 17, when she emigrated to the U.S. with her family, she embraced the freedoms and protections that this country offers and pursued an education in medicine.

"I used my newfound opportunities and was inspired by the chance to address the societal inequities in healthcare that I witnessed firsthand, as well as the global crisis characterized by war, famine, poverty and disease," explained Dr. Mouria. "I decided to pursue a career in surgery in order to provide the most immediate and life-saving

care to patients most desperately in need."

Dr. Mouria served as a general surgeon at an inner-city hospital in Chicago and at a variety of stations throughout the U.S., Guam and Cambodia to reach out to populations in need. In 2019, when she heard stories from a patriotic Marine combat veteran, she was strongly motivated to join the Army Medical Reserve.

"Listening to stories about his deployment in Afghanistan, I realized that my passion to help others in dire need in austere humanitarian environments could be extended to our soldiers — the most worthy men and women who sacrifice to defend our country," explained Dr. Mouria, "I want to help our injured soldiers at the most forward frontline; to do life-saving trauma surgery so they can

make it back home."

Dr. Mouria was deployed to Syria with her Forward Surgical Team in 2022 to perform resuscitative damage control surgery and to stabilize the severely injured soldiers so they could be transported for further definitive repair of their injuries. The team was also ready to provide care to potential civilian casualties and the local coalition force

In December 2023 and January 2024, Dr. Mouria volunteered in a poor underserved missionary hospital in Zambia through the World Medical Mission. While in Southern Africa, with limited resources, she provided surgical care such as emergency C-sections, hysterectomies, pediatric and

The chapter grew "wonderful rapidity." meetings, members read papers related to the American Revolution and voted to offer a prize of a five-dollar gold piece to the best essay on the Revolution written by a local high school junior. Who wrote the best essay? In 1905, the son of Rev. Britt, a minister in Corsica, won the gold piece with an essay about Virginia's role in the Revolution. He was thirteen! Students in later years wrote about the "Advantages of American Citizenship" (1908) and "Schools and Colleges of Colonial Times" (1912). The annual essay contests in the schools of the county lasted for many years.

Laura Cook moved through the offices of the local D.A.R. and was elected regent of the state D.A.R. in 1916, then an organization with 80 chapters in Pennsylvania. As state regent during World War I, she was responsible for the D.A.R. purchasing field hospitals and trailer kitchens.

When Laura became national president-general in 1923, front page headlines of *The Washington Star* claimed, "Factional Rows

Bitter as D.A.R. Delegates Elect." The controversy stemmed from a private letter accusing her son of being a draft dodger. The local newspaper eventually reported that she had "successfully bucked the machine, hammered the gang, licked the bosses, and blew up the steam roller." In Brookville, the Browns hosted a grand reception for her that was attended by more than 200 people at "Old Orchard," (now the home of Arthur and Catherine McKinley).

Recognized for her "efficiency and gracious personality," as president-general between 1923 and 1926, the idea to construct a building devoted to the D.A.R. emerged, and Laura became involved with the building of Constitution Hall in Washington, D. C., a structure completed in 1929 and costing more than a million dollars. Speaking upon its completion,

President Coolidge appointed her to the Bicentennial Commission to commemorate the 200th anniversary of U.S. President George Washington's birth, an appointment reconfirmed by President Hoover. (In 1932, she was one of 69 women actively supporting Hoover's reelection.)

Groundbreaking for the \$2M D.A.R. Constitution Hall took place in June 1928. Laura was present when President Hoover's wife spoke at the formal dedication the next

The Brookville Mirror **vear.**

Speaking shortly after the formal dedication of the Hall, Mrs. Cook said, "There is criticism of our American social life today in which the instances of looseness, irresponsibility, and reckless display of selfish pleasure-seeking are constantly brought to the surface, but we are a God-fearing, home-loving citizenry. The exceptions to this are so exceedingly small in number that they only appear great in being conspicuous."

She was a strong supporter of Prohibition, making national headlines in 1930, "I shall still have faith...to prophecy that the Eighteenth amendment will not only never be repealed, but that in each succeeding year of our democracy that it will be more and more successfully upheld."

She was the first woman to receive an honorary Doctor of Law degree from George Washington University in 1926, served on the Valley Forge Park Commission, and was a board member of the Thomas Jefferson Foundation.

When she died in 1946 at the age of 79, Laura Haines Cook was the honorary president-general of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution. Her portrait hangs in Constitution Hall and the *Jeffersonian Democrat* referred to her as a "great lady."
