EDSO Member Profile – Don McHarness

Board member, Don McHarness, joined EDSO in 2011 shortly after he and his wife, Lynn, moved to Oregon. Since then he has held various positions within the organization, including President for 2 years and site selection chair for 3 years, in addition to planning the Beach Party 4 years and Holiday Party 3 years. Don likes participation in sports – you name it. He has always been an organizer / contributor to the organizations that he joins.

Born in Oregon, Don graduated from Tigard High School - his 60-year reunion this summer was cancelled because of the Coronavirus. In high school Don played baseball (outfield) and church basketball. He went directly to PSU and transferred to OSU where he graduated with a BS in Civil Engineering. While at OSU, he coordinated the dorm intramural sports activities. After graduation, he was involved in the startup of Project 50 which was associated with the YMCA and a singles group which had various activities, i.e., a sailing event in Puget Sound.

After OSU, Don worked for the Oregon Department of Environmental Quality. As part of his job, he sampled rivers and monitored wastewater treatment plants throughout Oregon – which is why he is so familiar with obscure parts of the state. He moved to the Bay Area to attend Stanford University and graduated with a Masters in Environmental Engineering. During this time, he and several co-workers participated in the first ever Earth Day in 1970. It involved a commode! Ask him about this. After graduating, he stayed in the Bay area working for a consulting engineering company. It was in the Bay area that Don became active with the Sierra Club as the bicycle coordinator. When they returned to the states, they moved first to Grosse Pointe Park and then north of Detroit area to a small lake where Don honed his water skills – swimming, kayaking, etc. Once they both retired, Don and Lynn moved back to his state; first to Lake Oswego (8 years) where he was a member of the LO Transportation Advisory Board (6 years) and now to the Willamette View Retirement Community where they are nicely settled in. Don continues his trend of participating by taking on the position of manager of the furniture store, gathering refundable containers from bins on campus for drop-off, and the resident emergency preparedness program, all at Willamette View.
